PACIFIC PARTNERSHIP VISITS USAG-KA

U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll recently welcomed the USNS BRUNSWICK and mission members from Pacific Partnership 2019, a multinational humanitarian assistance and disaster relief preparedness mission. Delegations from PP19 conducted search and rescue training and worked alongside clinical staff at mission sites.

On Kwajalein, PP19 teams also engaged directly with citizens of the RMI and residents of USAG-KA at community events.

Pacific Partnership 2019 arrived in late March on its fourth visit to the Republic of the Marshall Islands since 2007.

In its current mission, PP19 provides opportunities for host nations across the Indo-Pacific region to fortify relationships with invited mission partners through disaster resilience training and outreach activities. Participating nations in this PP19 include the United States, Japan, Australia, Peru and the United Kingdom.

While berthed at Kwajalein, the BRUNS-WICK, an expeditionary fast transport ship, opened for community tours to give Kwaj residents a taste of mission life aboard the Navy vessel. U.S. Pacific Fleet band musicians gave workshops and demonstrations to Kwajalein music students and performed outdoor family concerts.

During the visit, delegations from PP19 made special trips to Ebeve and Enniburr to meet the residents and organize health clinics.

On March 25, more than 50 residents of Enniburr met with local and visiting medical professionals for free dental care and health screenings and enjoyed a band concert of popular radio tunes and selections from Disney's animated film "Moana," performed by the U.S. Pacific Fleet Band.

Following the concert, PP19 visitors put on a health fair and shared tips on nutrition and fitness. For the duration of the afternoon, mission members interacted with Enniburr residents and engaged in friendly competitive field sports. Children ran laps alongside Navy personnel and cheered on teens in games of basketball and soccer.

"It's a great privilege to be here," said PP19 Director of Mission Capt. Patrick "Paddy" Allen, of leading the 2019 mission crew. "We've got a wide church of individuals. They are all absolutely professional and they are a pleasure to work with."

PP19 members traveled to Roi-Namur for a ceremony at the War Memorial March 26 in remembrance of those who fell during Operation Flintlock in WWII. They were joined by U.S. Deputy Chief of Mission Rachel Doherty; Rear Admiral Murray Joe Tynch III, commander, Logistics Group Western Pacific, Task Force 73, Singapore Area Coordinator; Col. James DeOre, US-AG-KA commander; and Maj. Daniel Lacaria. USAG-KA Host Nation director. The PP19 delegation continued to Enniburr that afternoon with Col. George Kyle, command surgeon of U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command, to participate in a groundbreaking ceremony at the site of a future Enniburr health clinic.

Before departing Kwajalein, several members of PP19 expressed humility and gratitude at the opportunity to visit the RMI. They look forward to the chance to return. The scene is set for future Pacific Partnerships, as mission members prepare to forge disaster relief plans and friendships through teamwork between nations.



U.S., JAPAN HONOR WWII On Kwajalein Atoll

Members of the U.S. Navy and Japanese Maritime Self-Defense Force along with partner nations from Pacific Partnership 2019 held a ceremony March 26 honoring servicemembers who had died during the WWII Battle of Kwajalein.

The battle, which lasted from January 31 to February 4, 1944, took place from Kwajalein in the south to Roi-Namur in the north. In total, more than 8,000 men perished.

As U.S. Navy Cmdr. Grace Schonhardt said in her remarks, Pacific Partnership provided the opportunity to "gather to pay tribute to a common cause and compassion, to sacrifice and valor, to patriotism and determination."

"We cannot choose our history," she continued, "but we can choose what lessons to draw from it. We can focus on the resilience grown from friendship and trust. We can look to our future with full hearts."

Japanese Maritime Self-Defense Force Lt. Cmdr. Hiroyuki Kosuga, a pilot by trade who is currently serving as part of the Pacific Partnership 2019 team, shared similar sentiments.

"I hope that our visit here contributes to the further development of our cooperative relations," Kosuga said. "And I believe it is our duty as armed forces to preserve peace around the world. We never forget both Japanese and American soldiers who showed bravery in the battle and sacrificed their lives for each nation."

The Deputy Chief of Mission from the U.S. Embassy in the Republic of the Marshall Islands, Rachael Doherty, spoke to the importance of remembrance. "The act of remembering is as important to honoring the past as it is to guiding the future, and in this place where there is so much remembering to do it is my hope that we all are able to absorb some of that guidance. The United States, Japan, and the Marshall Islands are now inextricably linked here. We have intermarried; set down roots together; our fates are now shared, our partnership strong."

Pacific Partnership began in response to one of the world's most catastrophic natural disasters, the December 2004 tsunami that devastated parts of South and Southeast Asia. The mission has evolved over the years from emphasis on direct care to an operation focused on enhancing partnerships through host nation subject matter expert and civil-military exchanges.

Working at the invitation of each host nation, Pacific Partnership is joined by partner nations that include Australia, Canada, Japan, Malaysia, Peru, the Republic of the Philippines, South Korea, Thailand, and the United Kingdom to strengthen disaster response preparedness around the Indo-Pacific.

The Pacific Partnership's mission is to work collectively with host and partner nations to enhance regional interoperability and disaster response capabilities, increase stability and security in the region, and foster new and enduring friendships across the Indo-Pacific.

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PP19 WRAPS UP "HADR" IN THE MARSHALL ISLANDS

Pacific Partnership 2019 recently conducted a series of exchanges centered on Humanitarian Assistance/Disaster Relief during their mission stop in the Republic of the Marshall Islands, March 11-28.

The Pacific Partnership mission began in response to one of the world's most catastrophic natural disasters, the December 2004 tsunami that devastated parts of South and Southeast Asia. The mission has evolved over the years from emphasis on direct care to an operation focused on enhancing partnerships through host nation subject matter expert and civil-military exchanges.

Subject matter expert exchanges create lasting bonds of friendship and trust that enable the mission to return to countries and build bridges for greater cooperation between the United States, mission partners and host nations.

The first official HADR event of PP19 was an incident command system subject matter expert exchange in Majuro sponsored by the U.S. Forest Service and the Office of the Telecommunications Authority, March 11-15.

The incident command system brings a standardized approach to the command,

control, and coordination of emergency response, providing a common hierarchy within which responders from multiple agencies can be effective.

"While we can't control the disasters, we can control how we prepare and react," said U.S. Army Sgt. Christina Richardson, PP19 HADR team lead. "Collaborative efforts like these promote greater cooperation and partnerships that benefit everyone involved."

Next, the U.S. Coast Guard hosted a search and rescue exercise in Majuro, March 20-22. This was a "train the trainer" evolution that began with a planning workshop and culminated with a simulated SAR exercise.

Local government officials from the Marshall Islands National Disaster Management Office, sea patrol and police department were in attendance and in turn traveled to Ebeye the following week to train their Kwajalein counterparts, March 25-26.

"These lessons in interoperability support a collaborative, rapid response to natural disasters in the Marshall Islands," said U.S. Navy Lt. Luke Carpenter, the officer in charge of the Republic of the Marshall Islands mission.

The final HADR event of this mission stop was a basic first responder symposium in Ebeye, March 27. Local police officers, firefighters, sea patrol, nurses and other first responders attended the event.

The symposium used the exchange of ideas and relationships among the participating countries and organizations to help strengthen response preparedness. Risk management and first responder training were discussed along with case studies from past disasters.

"Trainings like these are important because we are all in the same room learning from each other and going over scenarios so everyone is prepared when a disaster happens," said Harris Kaiko, Marshall Islands Sea Patrol.


The technical skills exchange focused on enhancing the capabilities of U.S. military forces to work together with their partners from Marshallese government agencies in the event of a natural disaster.

These HADR subject matter exchanges will be a recurring theme of PP19 as the mission continues.

Pacific Partnership, now in its 14th iteration, is the largest annual multinational humanitarian assistance and disaster relief preparedness mission conducted in the Indo-Pacific. Each year, the mission team works collectively with host and partner nations to enhance regional interoperability and disaster response capabilities, increase stability and security in the region, and foster new and enduring friendships in the Indo-Pacific.





MARSHALL ISLANDS DELEGATION VISITS SMDC

Leaders from the government of the Republic of the Marshall Islands visited the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command headquarters to learn more about the command's strategic mission and how it affects them.

USASMDC/ARSTRAT leaders underscored the important position that Kwajalein Atoll and the Marshallese play in the command's strategic mission during an April 5 visit. During a command overview brief, leaders emphasized the significant role that Kwajalein and the Marshallese play in the command's strategic mission and that trust, mutual respect and open dialogue are key to the success of the bilateral relationship.

"This is the second time I have visited the command and I have learned more today than last time," said John M. Silk, Marshallese minister of foreign affairs. "That is because we have a very open dialogue between the two parties and last time I was here we established trust, which is very important. If you look at the way the relationship has developed, we have seen much progress and this trip tops it off."

The event was organized when Minister in Assistance David Paul, Kwajalein Atoll senator, requested to visit the command with a delegation to discuss issues of mutual interest and to enhance the bilateral relationship.

Besides Silk and Paul, the delegation

included Hirata Kabua, Kwajalein Atoll mayor; Lanny Kabua, RMI Representative to U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll; Odrikawa Jatios, Kwajalein Atoll Development Authority board member; and Felix Loeak, KADA board member; as well as Col. James DeOre, USAG-KA commander; and Maj. Dan Lacaria, host nation director.

Also present at the forum was SMDC's lead in supporting the mutual defense and security relations and cooperation between the U.S. and RMI. He discussed how these meetings foster positive relationships and address the longstanding foreign, economic and political policy concerns of both nations.

"It is significant to renew our decadeslong relationship and this was a forum for us to discuss the mutual benefits of our organization's mission and the residents of the Kwajalein Atoll," said Kevin Crumlish, SMDC political-military adviser. "It is important to be able to sit down and discuss the path forward to grow stronger as the mission potentially changes or grows and how the Marshallese can potentially benefit from those interactions. We look forward to continuing these discussions in the future.

"Our meetings were very successful," he added. "We took some actions from both sides to be able to coordinate in the future things that can only come up when you are having face-to-face conversations. We will continue that dialogue to leverage the many recent successes we have had in our relationship and to improve them in the future."

During the command overview brief,

delegates learned about the enduring nature of the RMI and SMDC's bilateral relationship and the capabilities of the Huntsville and Kwajalein mission control centers.

Before leaving Redstone Arsenal on their way back home, Kwajalein's garrison commander told how appreciative he was for the opportunity to increase understanding about the role SMDC plays on the atoll and how to better the relationship in the future.

"This delegation has come to reaffirm the commitment of the two countries as a mutually beneficial relationship between the United States and the government of the Marshall Islands," DeOre said. "They are integral in developing our national security and defense activities. They are a huge element in workforce development for the Reagan Test Site on the Kwajalein Atoll and they have a great deal of interest in the welfare of the workforce that comes from the local community in the Marshall Islands.

"The missions that occur within the Marshall Islands are incredibly important and the highly technical nature of the activities within the Reagan Test Site are unmatched anywhere in the world," he added. "When you bring all of our leaders together, we can talk about where we have been successful and can talk through some areas where we need to improve the relationship and learn how we can fix some other areas. Seldom do you get a collection of people together who can actually solve problems and this is absolutely the right group of people to do that."


WEATHER DISCUSSION: A large-scale pattern is still dominated by El Nino where abnormally warm water along the equator keeps organized rain systems south of 5N latitude. Expect below average precipitation for the upcoming seven days. Trade winds remain moderate Saturday and Sunday increasing Monday with possible small craft advisories needed for Tuesday. Winds fall to moderate levels with knots in the mid-teens at end of the week.

The U.S. drought monitoring program for the Marshall Islands is now listing Kwajalein and Majuro at short-term extreme drought levels (Level 3 of 4), while Utirik and Wotje Atolls are listed at exceptional short-term drought levels (Level 4 of 4). Majuro reports that dry conditions have resulted in some brush fires, likely started by discarded cigarettes. Drier conditions are expected for the next several weeks.

SATURDAY: Partly to mostly sunny with stray showers (less than 10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds ENE-E at 13-17 knots.

SUNDAY: Partly to mostly sunny with isolated showers (10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds ENE-E at 14-18 knots.


MONDAY: Partly to mostly sunny with stray showers (less than 10 percent coverage across the atoll). Winds NE-ENE at 15-20 knots.
