#### HOURGLASS REPORT


**The weeks leading** up to Easter Sunday were busy on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. Together with community volunteers and on-island organizations, Easter was an egg-citing time for Kwajalein residents.

The Easter Bunny made an apperance at the Grace Sherwood Library April 18 for storytime and crafts with the island's young readers. But his work was far from over—the Easter Bunny was spotted again April 20 with members of U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion FOUR. Their mission: To assist USAG-KA Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation staff with an Easter egg hunt.

It was a day of surprises, record-breaking times and new personal bests for the island's athletic community as the Kwajalein Running Club celebrated the 40th Anniversary of the RustMan Triathlon this past weekend.

With direction from event organizers Bob and Iane Sholar, the triathletes convened at Emon Beach for a safety briefing before taking a quick bus ride with Thomson Tarwoj down to Echo Pier to begin the swim segment of the event. Competitors in the bike and running segments lap the island for the next few hours. returning at last to Emon Beach for a barbecue and awards ceremony with family members and friends.

The RustMan is a challenge and a community celebration. Athletes tackle a 1-km swim, 42-km bike and 10-km run segment, vying to beat individual goals and break longstanding record times achieved in previous RustMan iterations.

For many Kwaj athletes, training begins months in advance. RustMan 40 included Olympic swimmers, competitors from the Micronesian Swim Championships, multi-RustMan winners and novice ath-

letes. Though competitors may enter the event as individuals and in teams, some have strong RustMan principles about the proper way to train and race. Kwaj residents know they have a RustMan purist to root for if a humble single-speed beach cruiser is parked at the bike staging area alongside sophisticated multi-speed bikes.

Nevertheless, nothing can take the thrill out of stretching the island's relatively small square footage into the mileage needed to achieve a triathlon distance. "It's exciting," said one competitor. "In the RustMan, you get to be part of something greater than yourself, and exceed the limits of your own expectations. It's a rush!"

The athletes are only a portion of the reason why the activity is a communitywide favorite. RustMan welcomes community involvement in every aspect of its operation and volunteers bring their excitement and dedication to supporting the community. Teen honor societies, groups of friends and families volunteer to help run portions of the event and operate hydration stations. Each year, a team of timekeepers offer their critical skills to

record and tabulate times for each event segment. There are also hardworking groups of heroes who man spatulas and grill up dinner on the beach for the hungry athletes and volunteers.


This year, Sholar offers special thanks to Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation, Matol Jabjulan and the Buildings and Grounds Team, and Naval Mobile Construction Battalion FOUR, led by Lt.j.g. Tristen Dmitrijev for their support as road marshals.

Last but not least, when the going gets tough, the cheers of encouragement along the route are among the most valued pieces of the event for athletes caught up in the action on race day.

And what a race it was! Among the highlights were Dan Tibbles' individual time of 2:31:46 for the ages 62 and up category, Colleen Williams' 2:28:26 for the ladies' category with a 42:57 run segment-the fastest ladies' run segment in RustMan history. Mike McMahon broke longtime speed records and took firstplace standing with an individual overall score of 2:23:48. Read on for more statistics and photos from RustMan 40!





RMI interns have the opportunity to participate in a 10-week information technology training program on Kwajalein. Supported by the Massachusetts Institute of Technology Lincoln Laboratory (MIT LL) and the United States Army Garrison–Kwajalein Atoll (USAG-KA), two motivated interns will gain valuable on-the-job training in the field of information technology related to computer management, server administration, and computer networking.

Each week, interns will learn new topics and apply their knowledge to hands-on projects in the laboratory and a final project in the field. Topics include computer hardware and software, network equipment and configuration, and troubleshooting. In addition to class and laboratory work, interns will receive lectures and tours, including a weather station tour and a visit to Roi-Namur to learn about radar, optics, and telemetry.

As part of the program, the selected interns will receive a weekly monetary stipend for expenses for the duration of the program. After successful completion of the program and acceptance into an accredited university, interns are also eligible for a \$1,000 scholarship to continue their education!

**Kwajalein dancers** donned their hula gear April 21 and joined mother-daughter dance teachers Palepa Smith and Masina McCollum onstage for a hula dance recital at the Kwajalein Jr.-Sr. High School Multi-purpose Room. They were joined by Kwajalein band Pure Aloha and band bassist Dave Eggers, who served as master of ceremonies for the evening, and even more family members, friends and hula fans.

The 2019 dance recital featured the largest number of hula dancers to perform together on Kwajalein to date. Entire families joined McCollum's practices. By the end of the evening April 21, Kwajalein witnessed a record 137 children and adults onstage performing intricate and expressive dance steps choreographed by McCollum, and set to lyrical and fast-paced dance music.

The hula craze began on Kwajalein more than 30 years ago when Palepa Smith began teaching classes for Kwajalein residents. Generations of Kwaj women and girls have now practiced hula with Smith and McCollum. They have each instructed dance for more than 18 years.

Smith returns to Kwaj each year to continue the hula workshop with McCollum, now a counselor at Kwajalein Jr.-Sr. High School. She also helps dancers design dance performances for their own events and special occasions, in addition to the practices leading up to the annual recital.

"I want you to love hula," said McCollum during a women's group practice. "I love hula. There is a freedom and beauty in it. It's not all about strict form and where you place your feet, like in some western dance traditions."

McCollum also stressed that her teaching of hula is about communicating and respecting aspects of Pacific culture.

Dances performed during the recital included many different Pacific dance traditions, including gestures to Hawaiian and Tahitian dances, and Smith's native Samoan heritage. The Wahine, an adult women's group, performed "Kuu'ipo," a love song about the Hawaiian Islands. Wiki Wiki, an advanced adult women's group, paid homage to Queen Liliuokalani in sober black dresses. Elementary school and high school students also displayed their technical prowess with dances performed with percussive sticks and shell tools.

The night included special moments. For the first time, three generations of Smith's family performed together, as she, McCollum and granddaughter Maliana danced. A surprise favorite, the Kane, a new men's group, gave Kwaj residents a taste of the fierce New Zealand Haka.

"Hula, more specifically the Haka, provided me an opportunity to learn a bit about another culture, and to get on the stage with the dedicated men that performed this year was exciting," said Kenneth Zimmerman following the performance.

"Being a part of this group also allowed me to make memories with my family as all four of us participated in the show. All the men worked so hard and took great pride in ensuring that we performed with dignity and respect for the culture that was shared with us," he said.





# LARSON DESIGNS COMMAND COIN

**Kara Larson**, a project manager for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers-Honolulu District, who works remotely as a project manager forward with customers on Kwajalein took on the challenge of designing a commander's coin.

In November 2018, U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein Atoll Commander Col. James DeOre asked for local military or civilian government employees on Kwajalein Atoll to use their artistic skills in generating a new commander's coin design. The most specific requested standard for the new design was that it be "something unique to the Marshall Islands and not a circle coin."

"I was inspired by the unique wooden hook from (the island state of) Pohnpei in (the Federated States of) Micronesia," Larson said in an email describing her participation in the design process. "Since I didn't know what a garrison or challenge coin was, I studied other coins to learn what is placed on these coins and drew up my sketch for consideration."

Little did she know that her interest in creating a new design would later take on a unique twist.

Larson's coin design is in the shape of a hook similar to one found on Pohnpei.

The front of the coin features the U.S. and Marshallese flags and the U.S. Army Values (loyalty, duty, respect, selfless service, personal courage and integrity).

"Respecting the U.S. government's partnership with the Marshallese government, I included the words 'Republic of the Marshall Islands' " Larson said "Since these coins are given in recognition of special achievement, I added the words 'Presented for Excellence'."

The reverse side of the coin identifies the units previously stationed on Kwajalein Atoll Operation Flintlock—7th Infantry Division, 4th Marine Division and current tenant organizations—30th Signal (NETCOM), U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command, USACE, U.S. Navy Seabees, U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll, the insignia of sergeant major and colonel.

Larson was informed by USAG-KA at the end of December 2018 her design was selected for the new garrison coin.

In late February 2019, Lt. Gen. James Dickinson, commander, U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command formally recognized Larson for creating the Kwajalein garrison's new command coin.

"He (Dickinson) shook my hand and handed me his commander's coin," said Larson. "Col. DeOre then recognized me on behalf of the garrison for the design and presented me with the first new (USAG-KA) coin - the coin I designed. What an honor!"
