In a ceremony Tuesday marking the end of Col. James DeOre's tenure as the garrison's commanding officer, incoming Col. Jeremy Bartel assumed command of U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll.

Gathered for the event were foreign ambassadors, the RMI acting president, traditional Marshallese leaders, friends, colleagues and leaders representing the military commands that depended on and worked with DeOre during the past two years. They will look to Bartel to lead in the same capacity his predecessor did.

Karen Stewart, the U.S. ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands, enumerated the stresses that can arise in a truly unique command, executing directions from an American ambassador and three individual military commands: Installation Management Command, Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command and Indo-Pacific Command. DeOre handled the tectonic pressures of answering to four different bosses in stride, Stewart said, adding that Bartel has an excellent example to follow.

"I think anyone who can keep all that straight and keep all four of us happy has clearly done a marvelous job," said Stewart. She was one of six speakers, including DeOre and Bartel, who took to the podium to mark the occasion.

Having completed a handoff with DeOre, Bartel said he "personally look[s] forward to working with the team as we continue to accomplish the mission our nation has given us and meet the challenges that tomorrow will bring." He thanked Lt. Gen. James Dickinson, commanding general of SMDC, and Dr. Christine Altendorf, regional director of IMCOM-Pacific, for the opportunity to serve under them.

Altendorf welcomed the new garrison commander to the IMCOM-Pacific team and described the complexities involved in running, maintaining, and—in some cases rebuilding—one of the most strategic Army bases in the Pacific. She pointed to DeOre as an exemplary leader who helped guide USAG-KA through rough seas during his tenure on Kwajalein, and whom Bartel could call on for advice down the road.

The recent garrison and range contract transitions, which saw the previous contract vehicle split into separate contracts under separate entities, was a process fraught with growing

But the commander rose to the occasion, Altendorf said, completing the primary thrust of the contract transition and also making important headway in building rebuilding critical infrastructure on the islands.

"We've been very fortunate for the past two years, because we've had the right kind of leader in Col. James DeOre," said Altendorf. "Today, we take the opportunity to recognize the outstanding contributions and leadership he's displayed."

DeOre's most important contributions, Dickinson said, bolstered the garrison's core function on Kwajalein Atoll: to provide the foundation and logistics to execute the missile, space and scientific research activities that occur at the Reagan Test Site and in surrounding test bed areas under the auspices of Missile Defense Agency, the Air Force and U.S. Strategic Command.

"The SMDC/ARSTRAT mission set that I'm responsible for is intertwined in many ways with this installation. ... Without this garrison, we would not be able to operate; the two go hand in hand," said Dickinson. "During Jim's time here as the garrison commander, we accomplished 19 critical national security missions, including the recent FTG 11, which tested our ground-based missile defense systems and resulted in a stunning success."

During DeOre's tenure, USAG-KA provided critical logistical support on several theater missile defense systems tests of the Terminal High Altitude Aerial Defense system, the Patriot system, the Aegis system and the Aegis Ashore variant—all under the stringent demands of MDA. The Air Force launched seven unarmed Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missiles, including GT 230 and GT 229 in May, toward Kwajalein Atoll as part of the follow-on operational test and evaluation launch program during DeOre's time. And he and his staff provided the support necessary for a Navy hypersonic experiment and several NASA experiments launched from Roi-Namur, the latest of which studied the ionosphere last month.

"Col. DeOre supported all these tests with logistical support while transitioning to a base support contract," Dickinson said. "And when you think about that—that is no small feat when you know the complexities that go into a very large contract. ...

[It is] a truly remarkable accomplishment."

Under DeOre's leadership, USAG-KA supported not only the range but also the Marshallese people on Kwajalein Atoll in measurable, lasting ways, said acting RMI President John Silk, speaking on behalf of RMI President Hilda Heine.

DeOre's command tenure was "punctuated by one key event: the removal of oil from the Prinz Eugen in the Kwajalein lagoon," Silk said. DeOre led USAG-KA in providing support to a U.S. Navy salvage team's efforts on and in the water during an operation that spanned several weeks and resulted in clearing nearly 230,000 gallons of oil from the German WWII heavy cruiser.

Dickinson echoed Silk in his praise of the teams involved in the success of the Prinz Eugen operation: It was "an outstanding win for the United States and the Republic of the Marshall Islands governments and prevented, in the long run, an environmental disaster that could have happened in the lagoon."

USAG-KA's commitment to environmental stewardship on the islands of Kwajalein Atoll is also evidenced by the ongo-

ing WWII Navy Dump and shoreline revetment project, begun under DeOre's leadership, Silk said. Tasked with safely extracting small mountains of scrap metals, discarded machines and other detritus cast along the shoreline during the rebuilding of Kwajalein following WWII, DeOre and the garrison have aimed to improve the environmental impact of the base. And the people and government of the Marshall Islands have taken notice.

Silk, Dickinson, Stewart and Altendorf all agreed that DeOre's leadership on issues impacting relations between the garrison and the local Marshallese community, and between the U.S. and the Marshall Islands, were consummate

representations of what it means to be a garrison commander at USAG-KA and a key focal point in the U.S.-RMI relationship. Some of those accomplishments included the following.

- ensuring continued support of the Ri-Katak Program for local youth at the Kwajalein Jr.-Sr High School and George Seitz Elementary School
- establishing an RMI post office branch on Kwajalein
- ensuring freshwater was available for residents of Enniburr
- providing emergency generators for Ebeye residents during a pow-

er blackout last winter


- improving Enniburr residents' access to the Roi-Namur Surfway market
- continuing support of reef fish studies and reef fish education campaigns
- authorizing use of USAG-KA assets in the search for Ebeye fishermen lost at sea
- co-chairing the Community Relations Council, addressing a wide array of issues impacting local Marshallese
- beginning studies on a possible energy purchase framework for Enniburr residents
- improving the local RMI workforce's access to the Kwajalein branch of the Bank of the Marshall Islands
- hosting and assisted five Navy Seabee detachments in their humanitarian and aid missions in the Marshall Islands
- hosting and assisted the recent Pacific Partnership activities on Ebeye, Enniburr, Kwajalein and elsewhere in the Marshalls
- establishing the Joint Law Enforcement Committee, a collaboration with the Kwajalein Atoll Local Government authorities on Ebeye and law enforcement entities on Kwajalein

Key infrastructure initiatives included:

- beginning reconstruction of Echo Pier on Kwajalein
- preparing plan for rehabilitation and rebuilding of key infrastructure like Bucholz Army Airfield, air traffic control facilities, medical facilities
- coordinating construction of a large solar farm installation on Meck to reduce diesel use at the Meck Power Plant

DeOre said he was privileged to serve as commander during a frenetic period in the history of USAG-KA. He acknowledged the herculean work that the garrison, LOGCAP administrators, NETCOM, RTS and contractor teams have invested into the contract changeover and stated that effort has begun to pay off and will continue to pay off down the road.

"We've completely changed the way we do business around USAG-KA," he said, adding that one need only to take a quick tour of the island to understand the importance of the new contract models and how they are funded should im-







prove the quality of life and mission success on the garrison. More cash from Washington is only helping, DeOre said: "The government is investing in Kwajalein Atoll at a rate not seen in the past 20 years."

DeOre addressed these challenges "with a can-do attitude of teamwork, flexibility and follow through," Dickinson said. "Jim worked tirelessly to ensure that our workforce and their families have the infrastructure and support to perform the mission, have safe and secure living and working environments and feel [as a] part of the Kwaj team and community. So, if I were to give you a bottom line ... Jim improved the quality of life here in Kwajalein Atoll."

More than anything, DeOre said he was grateful for the bottomless support he received during his tenure from his superiors, his USAG-KA staff and, most importantly, his wife Debbie.

"It took no time at all to see the importance of the little slice of paradise we live in," DeOre said of his and Debbie's first impression of Kwajalein two years ago. "It was immediately obvious that what we do cannot be done anywhere else in the world ... and it takes all of us, a combined effort to execute such an important national security mission."

He thanked all of his partners: RMI government, his garrison staff, contractors.

"Together, we have achieved so much," he told the crowd.

With DeOre set to tackle his next assignment on the staff of the Joint Chiefs at the Pentagon, the USAG-KA community and partners welcome the new garrison commander to his role.

COL. JEREMY BARTEL BIO

Originally from Glasgow, Montana, Bartel commissioned from Kemper Military College in 1995 as an engineer officer and completed his Bachelor of Science in civil engineering from the University of Missouri-Columbia. His initial assignment was with the 9th Engineer Battalion, 1st Infantry Division at Schweinfurt, Germany, where he served as a combat engineer platoon leader and company executive officer while deployed to Kosovo in support of Operation Joint Guardian.

Following completion of the Infantry Advanced Course and the Special Forces Qualification Course, he was assigned to 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) at Okinawa, Japan, where he served for three years as a special forces detachment commander and one year as the assistant battalion operations officer, which included deployments in support of Operation Enduring Freedom-Philippines and training exercises with defense forces from Korea, India, Thailand, Philippines and Australia.

In 2006 Bartel attended Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California, earning his Master of Science in Defense Analysis and subsequently returned to 1st Special Forces Group (Airborne) at Joint Base Lewis-McChord, where he commanded a Special Forces company and deployed to Mosul, Iraq in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. He additionally served as the 3rd Battalion operations officer and the group operations officer.

In 2011 Bartel was assigned to Special Operations Command-Europe in Stuttgart, Germany. During this assignment he deployed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom-Afghanistan with Combined Special Operations Task Force-10 and served several positions with the operations directorate.

From 2014 to 2016, Bartel commanded HHBN, 2nd Infantry Division at Camp Red Cloud, Korea. Following command, he was selected as an Army War College fellow and spent one year in Herziliya, Israel at the Institute for Counter-Terrorism with the Lauder School of Government, Diplomacy and Strategy.

In 2017 Bartel was reassigned to Special Operations Command-Europe, where he ultimately served as the director of operations until his departure for U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll.

Bartel is marred to the former Regan Murphy, of Vincennes, Indiana. Their son Jarek is a junior in the electrical engineering program at Boston University, and their daughter Mara will attend the University of Massachusetts-Boston for nursing beginning this fall.







RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

A monsoon trough, part of the Asian continent monsoon circulation, extends through Chuuk, Pohnpei, and Kosrae ending south of Kwajalein. Any easterly trade winds are ending at the dateline. The monsoon trough will be lifting northward with scattered rain Saturday and Sunday, but mostly west of Kwajalein. The impact is we will have another period of 'doldrum' like winds.

DEGAN

The next 3-month forecast of precipitation was issued Friday. NOAA National Weather Service is expecting average to below average precipitation amounts for the Kwajalein area due to weak state of El Niño. Weak El Niño is anticipated next few months declining to neutral conditions by Q4, 2019.
