DAY OCTOPUSES ON THE PROWL

Slinking, scooting and stalking through the reef flats of Micronesian waters, it's everyone's favorite cephalopod: Octopus cyanea. Known as the day octopus, or the big blue octopus, it is the most common species of octopus scuba divers and snorkelers on Kwaj and Roi will see during an outing among the coral heads.

The included photos depict two different day octopuses (Yes, it's "octopuses," not "octopi") spotted during a mid-day diving venture in shallow waters around Kwajalein. With a depth limit of about 20 meters, these fellas prefer the sun-drenched shallows where there are plenty of tasty bites for them to sink their beaks in.

Day octopuses, and octos in general, are the smartest of the cephalopods, packing an intelligence sophisticated enough to engage in play behavior, solve mazes and learn by observing other octopuses' behavior. With half a billion neurons to play with, octopuses have roughly the same mental capacities as domesticated dogs and cats, researchers conclude.

This intelligence gives them an advantage when they're out prowling the reefs.

They hunt during the daylight hours—hence the species' common name—and prey on shrimp, small reef fish, bivalves, crabs and other crustaceans. By flattening their stretchy, boneless bodies over small inlets into the reef, they use their sucker-laden eight-pack of arms to subdue and ensnarl trapped prey.

When a day octopus catches a mean larger than, say, a shrimp, it hauls the animal back to its den, jetting water through its siphon to quickly dart through the water toward home. The octopus will inject a venom into the prey and use its sharp beaks to crack the animals' shell to get at the meaty goodness inside.

The day octopus often relocates the shells and carapaces of


its victims around its den in an arrangement colloquially called an "octopus's garden" (The Beatles' Ringo Star was a fan of the species. See the Beatles' "Abbey Road" album for more.) If you find a dense accumulation of shells and carapaces next to a hidey hole, chances are you've located an octopus' home base.


Evolution didn't give octopuses protective shells as defense against predators; rather, evolution gave the species mesmerizing abilities to deceive, confuse and make it invisible to both predator and prey, by mimicking the colors and textures of its immediate surroundings. Like the pixels of a TV screen, the top layer of its skin contains thousands of small pockets housing three colors that can be displayed, hidden and blended in a wild array of palettes to match the animal's surroundings—like an organic invisibility cloak. It can take the appearance of a looming, spiky coral head peak one second and in the next, assume the likeness of a lumpy bed of green algae or a mottled gray, rocky outcropping.

The day octopus uses its stealth to not only help it hunt, but to also help keep it alive. Combined with its ability to squeeze into impossibly small spaces, its shapeshifting abilities and ink sac defenses can make it a tough lunch to score for its predators—largely shark, big fish and sometimes eels and dolphins. Fortunately, its most dangerous predator, Homo sapiens, has not created or caused conditions forcing its population to become threatened. In fact, the International Union for the Conservation of Nature has the day octopus listed as a species of least concern for population threats worldwide.

ASMDA SCHOLARS ATTEND SPACE CAMP

HUNTSVILLE, **Alabama** - Sixteen students experience the future of space travel in the Rocket City.

The students, recipients of an Air, Space, and Missile Defense Association, or ASMDA, scholarship, spent June 30-July 5 at Space Camp at the U.S. Space and Rocket Center in Huntsville. On July 3, the scholarship winners were treated to lunch by members of the ASMDA board and had a chance to speak with those who made the week possible.

"I don't think I am exaggerating when I say I am looking at tomorrow's heroes," said Dr. Steve Pierce, chief technology officer, U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command. "Each one of you need to realize that you are the future. Don't focus on promotions and don't focus on money. Focus on what you can do to make a difference.

"There are a lot of people here who have a passion for space, have a passion for missile defense and have a passion for directed energy," he added. "Each one of you need to develop a passion and

think of what you would like to do in the future."

Since 1996, ASMDA has awarded scholarships to children, ages 9-11, of a parent or guardian currently assigned to the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command; Program Executive Office Missiles and Space; Joint Functional Component Command for Integrated Missile Defense; Missile and Space Intelligence Center; NASA Marshall Space Flight Center; or Missile Defense Agency, whether military or government civilian.

The 16 Space Camp students this year are from Alabama, Alaska, California, Colorado, Kentucky, Virginia and Kwajalein Atoll, Republic of the Marshall Islands. They are: Grace Allen, Olivia Campbell, Christopher Deoki, Rachel Deoki, Lonnie Dunbar IV, Iris Haas, Cassidy Hinkle, Sean Kearney, Henry Ledebuhr, Alana Leines, Christopher Phelan, Joshua Pierce, Nathaniel Seipel, Morgan Selzer, Connor Streling and Griffin Taylor.

Community leaders also talked to the campers and told them how proud everyone was of them for being selected and congratulated them on receiving the Space Camp scholarships.

"As you go through the Space Camp

program you learn an awful lot," said Huntsville Mayor Tommy Battle. "You learn about science, technology, engineering and mathematics, and you learn to do some things you never thought you could do. As you learn these things, you start finding out you can apply that to later life and it is something I hope you can take away from this."

During the week, the children participated in activities including rocket construction and launch; water activities; a simulated Space Shuttle mission; Mars mission simulation; Manned Maneuvering Unit; Multi-Axis Trainer, or MAT; and an IMAX movie.

"I enjoy Space Camp a lot," said Christopher Deoki. "It is amazing and fun. My favorite thing is the MAT because it spins you around."

The students were selected for the scholarship based on an essay, school grades, interest in science and space, and financial need. The scholarship covers one week at Space Camp, travel, a flight suit, clothing package, a calling card and spending money.

"I have enjoyed Space Camp; it is awesome," Hinkle said. "Others should definitely come to Space Camp because it is fun and you get to train on cool stuff. I would come back if I could."




SPOT AWARDS GO TO CUSTODIAL STAFF





RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

A Near Equatorial Trough moved from the south to the north over Kwajalein this past week. A week circulation developed within this trough causing a period of westerly winds giving the marinas some grief. This trough is now north of Kwajalein and fading away. The area will now remain free of any disturbance with trade winds attempting to return next week. But still light winds remain for much of the weekend with only isolated to widely scattered shower coverage. Another good weekend to be on the water.

DEGAN

The next 3-month forecast of precipitation was issued last Friday. NOAA National Weather Service is expecting average to below average precipitation amounts for the Kwajalein area due to weak state of El Nino. El Nino is decaying into a neutral state where the climate is expected to remain remainder of 2019.
