# **KWAJALEIN REMEMBERS IMATA KABUA**

#### HOURGLASS REPORT

**U.S. Army** Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll offers condolences to the Kabua family after the passing of Iroojlaplap and former President Imata Jabro Kabua in Honolulu Sept. 17.

In the following weeks, the atoll community paid tribute to Kabua through acts of remembrance.

In accordance with an executive order issued by the Office of the Republic of the Marshall Islands President, the flags of the RMI and all other flags were flown at half-mast from Oct. 1 through 8. Throngs of people on Ebeye, Majuro and Kwajalein lined the streets to witness the Kabua family traveling together to Ebeye, where Kabua was laid to rest.

On Kwajalein, black mourning ribbon and green flower leis adorned light poles and palm trees along the route from Bucholz Army Airfield to Kwajalein Dock Security Checkpoint. Kwajalein residents and RMI employees dressed in black gathered to witness the procession. The ribbons remain on display throughout the week.

The Marshall Islands Journal reported that a large gathering of citizens visited Amata Kabua International Airport to witness the family's arrival on Majuro from Honolulu. Following their arrival, the Kabua family, esteemed guests and visiting dignitaries convened at the Nitijela Chamber for a state funeral ceremony Oct. 2.

Those in attendance included Republic of the Marshall Islands President Hilda Heine, who remembered Kabua as "truly a man of the people," who had made a profound impact on the lives of U.S. residents of Kwajalein and the Marshallese people, reported the Marshall Islands Journal.

Dignified guests and speakers reported in attendance included Speaker Kenneth Kedi; Irooj Katwell Jormelu; and Senator Christopher Loeak, as well as the Rev. Palukne Johnny, president of the United Church of Christ. Emcee Antari Elbon read messages of condolence from U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo, Assistant Secretary of the Interior Doug Domenech, U.S. Space and Missile Defense Command Commander Lt. General James Dickinson, Taiwan President Tsai Ing-wen, Japan Ambassador Norio Saito and Russian Federation Ambassador Igor Khovaev.

The Kabua family was joined by friends, relatives and dignitaries last Thursday for services at the Ebeye United Church of Christ. U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands Karen Stewart and USAG-KA Commander Col. Jeremy Bartel attended the burial service.

Kabua was laid to rest at the family cemetery Oct. 5 on Ebeye. An "Eoraak," the final phase of the funeral, took place last week.

## **TECH CENTERED** KWAJALEIN HOURGLASS INTERVIEWS MR. THOMAS WEBBER, U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND TECHNICAL CENTER DIRECTOR

The U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command Technical Center supports Department of Defense science and technology in directed energy, space, missile defense and integrated air and missile defense. Mr. Thomas Webber, Director, Technical Center, shared a few thoughts on current projects in development and the role U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll plays in support of the Army warfighter.

#### Jessica Dambruch: Please tell us about a few of the Technical Center's current projects.

**Thomas Webber:** It's exciting to see what we've been doing in the Tech Center. The command has a direct focus on space as a fighting domain. From a technical perspective, that focus will create a lot of opportunity for Kwajalein. The island will be a key place to support the space mission as we determine how to provide the best capability for our warfighters in that new domain. The Tech Center also continues to work on scientific and technological development that lets us make better, more capable systems for our warfighters.

In the Technical Center, we're working some of the Army's and Department of Defense's highest priority efforts. For example, the Army has recognized that hypersonic weapons are a capability they can put in the hands of the warfighter in the very near future, and we have successfully conducted hypersonic weapons tests on Kwajalein.

Another project we've demonstrated is mounting a high-energy laser on a Stryker vehicle to support maneuver short-range air defense, a technology that's transitioning to actual warfighting capability. That's been exciting. The Army Rapid Capabilities and Critical Technologies Office handles technological prototyping initiatives for such technologies to help inform future program requirements. High-energy laser work is currently in the throes of being developed into a system we can hand off to the warfighter.

Then there is proliferated, low-earth orbit, or LEO, space. Inexpensive satellites in quantity can provide a lot of robust, resilient capability both for communications and as position, navigation and timing assurances, as well as provide persistent surveillance acquisition and targeting capability. Think of intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance from LEO with large numbers. The data gleaned may not be exquisite, but it can provide the warfighter with direct downlink information needed to achieve situational awareness. A Soldier will know, for example, if there are tanks on the other side of the hill or a launcher getting ready to launch. Those are examples of data the warfighter can get near

real-time with LEO, which is rather unprecedented.

So, that's technology we've been working on and demonstrating. We are successfully testing new tools for the warfighter and sending satellites into orbit that provide a capability. The future continues to look bright. In many ways, Kwajalein is a huge, critical player. The island's operational tempo is going to increase as we move forward. The Army and DOD will be looking for places to test capabilities such as hypersonic weapons prior to transition to the warfighter. Kwajalein will be one of them.

#### JD: As activity increases, how will this affect the chance for academic research communities to visit Kwajalein?

**TW:** Kwajalein will still be able to support NASA campaigns. We know that's important. What they're doing and trying to do will benefit the military and DOD, too. Understanding the ionosphere and its disruptions, for example, will benefit all of us.

#### JD: What is it like conceptualizing the changing identity of warfighters and their training needs for multidomain combat?

**TW:** As a Department of Defense entity, we are learning to fight differently. The better trained we are, the better we execute a mission. Technology is evolving. New technology, such as high-energy lasers will change how a Soldier operates in the field. However, transitioning from the mitigation of counterinsurgency to near-peer, multidomain countermeasures is different. We must adapt so that when we kick in a door, we will have that overmatch. This will be something that has relevance for Kwajalein and the Indo-Pacific region, as the DOD seeks more realistic training opportunities for Soldiers.

#### JD: Please share your perspective on Tech Center growth and success.

**TW:** Right now, the most exciting thing for me is the future. The Technical Center is one of the five Army labs, and a science and technology reinvention lab. We must anticipate needs that will emerge in decades to come. We need to be more lab-like and create more opportunity for young scientists and engineers to join in the evolution of science and technology. With the help of funds allocated by Congress, we are right now building facilities and infrastructure to meet our future-science labs, facilities and areas to recruit and maintain young talent with highly technical research interests. For the Technical Center, it's full speed ahead.

## JD: How does the Center think about cybersecurity as it continues to grow?

**TW:** Meeting the challenges of cybersecurity is an ongoing process. Time and resourcing are required to ensure our systems are safe and not vulnerable as we conduct testing and collect data on our systems.

### JD: What's your favorite part of visiting Kwaj?

**TW:** It was good to be back for the promotion ceremony for Col. (Jake) Wamsley. I am pretty sure that is the first and only time we've promoted the range director to colonel. I lived on Kwajalein for five years, so for me, a visit is like returning home. I never get tired of the water, or sunrises and sunsets. What I look forward to most is witnessing progress. I like to see what is being done to improve facilities and infrastructure as we transition new contracts into place, and how I can help them be more successful.

## JD: Any last thoughts you'd like to share with the community?

**TW:** The community is doing great. I hope you all keep doing the great things you do. Kwajalein is a critical, vital asset out here, but equipment and instrumentation means nothing without the people. We have some of the best and brightest out here working every day. What you do every day is for our country. Your work is vitally important.

# **PROOF OF PUMPKIN**

**"You had better** get over to Surfway," said Surfway Manager Philip Kenley, last week. "The pumpkins are here."

I arrived in time to photograph the box of super squash you see at the top of this page. It was the last of several large cartons that quickly sold out. If you're wondering where they all went, ask your neighbors. Kwajalein residents bought the rest of the stock to prepare for the fall. Now, bike commuters can't go too far before encountering the pumpkins and fall décor which appears to have sprouted in the front yards of island homes overnight.

I have many good pumpkin memories. Throughout my life, I have armed myself with spoons and knives and attempted—it didn't always work, you see—to make jack-o'-lantern art out of oversized gourds. Years ago, I spent many hours at a famous municipal pumpkin patch in Maryland trying to persuade my parents to purchase one of the 400-pound colossal pumpkins. They were not convinced. In college, my roommates dutifully carved a jack-o'-lantern. They set it outside on the steps of our duplex. Much to their dismay, squirrels ravaged their handiwork in the night. Years later, I visited commercial pumpkin farms in north Georgia. For miles, orange and yellow pumpkins dotted the brown fields as far as the eye could see. Even farming is not without its own ironies: the next field over was full of Christmas trees. Last Saturday on Kwajalein, I stared down into a box of medium-sized pumpkins, and even that was good enough to rekindle the feeling of fall. For me, a ton of squash arriving intact so many miles from the mainland is something to celebrate.

Pumpkins and other decorative gourds come in all shapes and sizes with names as distinctive as their look. In the past, you've probably purchased jacko'-lanterns for carving and jack-be-little pumpkins, with curly vines, to display on desks and dining tables. Other common pumpkin varieties include fairytale; munchkin; casper; lumina; sugar; long pie; red kuri; cinderella; and flat white boer ford pumpkins, that more closely resemble deflated volleyballs.

I'm still learning about where pumpkins fit into the scheme of the central Pacific, but the good news is, they often appear in recipes. If a diner finds the right restaurant, they can enjoy steamed pumpkin drenched in sake, soy sauce and sesame seeds, pumpkin soup, pumpkin toasted with coconut and deep-fried pumpkin coated in sugar.

On Kwajalein, with its eternally warm weather, we use pumpkins as visual reminders of the season. Don't take my word for it, though. Grab the kids and take them on a neighborhood walk. See how many pumpkins you can spot around Kwajalein.

# October is Domestic Violence Awareness

## The Facts

- One in four women and one in nine men report experiencing violence from their partners in their lifetime.
- One in 15 children are exposed to domestic violence every year. 90 percent are eyewitnesses to the abuse.

## What is Domestic violence?

Domestic violence can be defined as a pattern of behavior in any relationship that is used to gain or maintain power and control over an intimate partner. It includes the use of physical violence, threats and intimidation, stalking, emotional and psychological abuse and financial control. It may also include:

- Physical abuse or the threat of abuse of the victim, children or pets
- Rigidly controlling finances or withholding money
- Sabotaging a partner's job by making them miss work, constantly calling them at work or showing up uninvited
- Verbal insults that humiliate a partner
- Telling a partner who they can or cannot hang out with, text or be friends with on social media
- Stealing or insisting on having a partner's internet or bank passwords
- Isolating a partner from family and friends

## TRACK GOOD WORK WITH VOLUNTEER MANAGEMENT INFORMATION SYSTEM

USAG-KA values its community volunteers. Read on to find out if your volunteer status requires that you track volunteer hours through the Army's Volunteer Management Information System.

## What is the Army Volunteer Management Information System?

The purpose of the Volunteer Management Information System is to keep track of volunteer activities that take place on an Army installation, including the organization the work is done for and the hours worked. It is essentially a timekeeping program.

### What is the VMIS Designed To Do?

Aside from installation accountability, VMIS can also be used for official volunteer service award recognition. Private organizations are not required to track their volunteer hours using VMIS but are able to if they would like to provide the service for their volunteers to receive any national recognition. This way we can recognize POs as well. As an example, last year we recognized Kwajalein Girl Scout Troop 801 for their volunteer work in researching ocean pollution and participation in beach cleanups, as well as for overall cumulative hours of service.

#### What types of volunteers are recognized by VMIS?

There are two types of volunteers, statutory and non-statutory. Private organizations fall under the latter. US-AG-KA VMIS will document all statutory volunteers, i.e. those volunteers who contribute hours to Child and Youth Services; Morale Welfare and Recreation; the Kwajalein Hospital and Vet Tech clinic and any other government-funded activity. These volunteers are required to have their hours tracked according to Army Regulation 608-1, "Army Community Service."

## **REMINDER FOR RADIO FREQUENCY SAFETY**

### PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

All use of Radio Frequencies or related equipment must be verified by the NETCOM Spectrum Management Office prior to purchase or activation.

The NETCOM SMO will verify adherence to Army, U.S. and international regulations and standards and ensure that proper approvals are in place to use specified frequencies.

Failure to gain approval prior to purchase may result in equipment shut down and wasted funds. This extends to all users within a 200-mile radius of Kwajalein and includes TDY visitors.

Lead times for approval may be from 120-days for simple frequency use to up to two years for equipment approval.

Approved U.S. electronics for home use are exempt from this process.

Any instance of interference should be reported immediately, the SMO will assist in resolving interference issues. Please contact us at 5-2498 with any questions.

Vaccines are safe, effective and the best way to prevent disease. Notifications are being sent out to remind parents which shots their children need. Please make an appointment at the Kwajalein Hospital for the vaccines before Oct. 23.

### Reasons to be Vaccinated

**Protect yourself and your family:** When you and your family get vaccinated, your health is protected.

**Protect your community:** When most members of a community are vaccinated, it greatly reduces the chance that a disease outbreak will occur.

**Protect your world:** Strategic vaccination campaigns can significantly reduce the number of people who get sick from infectious disease.

## DATA ON DENGUE FEVER

**Dengue** is a viral illness spread through the bite of infected mosquitoes. It cannot be passed from person to person.

There are no cases here on Kwajalein and there is a low risk to Kwajalein residents and workers when on the island.

## How can I protect myself, my co-workers and my family?

It is recommended that you limit travel to Ebeye and Majuro until the Marshallese government has declared the outbreak to be over.

If you are concerned, the Centers for Disease Control advise using insect repellents and wearing long sleeves and pants.

## CDC INVESTIGATING INJURY Associated with e-cigarette product use or vaping

### What We Know

- More than 800 cases in 46 states (including Hawaii) since March 2019
  Twelve deaths in 10 states
- All patients have history of e-cigarette product use or vaping
- Products contained nicotine, THC, or combination of both

#### What We Don't Know

- The specific chemical exposures causing injuries
- Specific product or substance causing injuries

#### What You Should Do

- Refrain from using e-cigarette or vaping products, particularly those containing THC
- Adults who used e-cigarettes to quit smoking should not return to smoking
- If you have used e-cigarette or vaping products and have the following symptoms, see your health care provider:
- Cough, shortness of breath, chest pain
- Nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea
- Fatigue, fever, or abdominal pain

# WEATHER WATCH

**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** Situated to the north of the Kwajalein region, the monsoon trough is the location of low-level wind convergence that drives cyclical convective storm development. The trough will remain along 10 N with hints of organized activity developing over the weekend. Forecasts call for periods of scattered showers, with partly clear to mostly cloudy skies. The winds outlook is a toss-up between light and variable to persistent west-southwest winds averaging 10 knots. This possibly keeps harbor and marina conditions a little rough.

In the longer-term, weather models break down the trough and indicate the start of northeast trade winds in the next few weeks. October is still within the wet season where more variability is typical. By December, the ENE trades are typically established. It will be no surprise to see some trends in weather prediction models begin to establish a different pattern.

**SATURDAY:** Partly sunny with widely scattered showers (20 percent coverage) increasing to scattered showers (30 percent coverage) overnight. Winds WSW-SSW at 7-12 knots.

**SUNDAY:** Partly to mostly cloudy with scattered showers (30 percent coverage). Winds WSW-SW at 7-12 knots.

**MONDAY:** Partly sunny with widely scattered showers (20 percent coverage). Winds WSW-SSW at 7-12 knots.
