## **UNE OCEAN, ONE MORLD** KHS PACIFIC RESEARCH ORGANIZATION CLEANS UP GEHH BEACH

Students from the Kwajalein Jr.-Sr. High School Pacific Research organization, under the direction of Matt Gerber, created a temporary art installation with the contents of 47 bags of trash recovered in a beach cleanup operation on the island of Gehh during a daytrip this fall.

**Most Kwajalein residents** don't think twice if they receive an invitation to join a boating party to an outer island. Few of them might spend the day picking up the trash they find on that distant beach. Thankfully, this fall, Marine Biology instructor Matt Gerber brought his students to the island of Gehh to do just that.

After hours spent tromping around in the sand and hot sun, the students did something unexpected: They brought back their prodigious haul of 47 bags of trash, tabulated its contents and arranged it by color in a temporary display on the floor of the KHS Multi-Purpose Room.

"The members of our class and the few chaperones who attended the trip surely did not think we would collect as much [trash] as we did," wrote one member of the students' scientific communication group, the Pacific Research Organization, in a recent post.

Gerber's boat trip is one in a series of exploratory excursions in which students can apply their classroom lessons out of doors where problems may be encountered firsthand, in the sand. They were assisted by PRO teacher sponsors Masina McCollum, Doug Hepler and Don Engen. This year's PRO members include Iolani Anjolok, Connor Charlton, Brent Coté, OJ Debrum, Cameron Dodson, Yuto Kaneko, Kye Lorok, Makena Moseley, Jaci Nam, Hilai Reimers, Aaron Seelye and Julia Sholar.

The team's upcoming projects will assuredly include more opportunities to check out the trash on distant shores in the winter and spring. Last year, PRO students performed a similar beach cleanup on the island of Bigej. With the help of engineering students, they also tied for first place in an international environmentalism contest. The prize: a day's excursion on the Okeanos Marshall Islands, a sustainable energy vessel.

If the photos don't catch you, the numbers will. PRO members counted every item they brought back from Gehh for a grand total of 3,749 pieces of trash.

"Apart from these numbers, we also found hangers, combs, computer parts, plastic silverware, straws, diapers and more," continues the PRO post. "Scattered across the beach and buried beneath the sand were innumerable tiny pieces of plastic."

However, there is no better way to

"With 47 bags of trash, we made our trip back to Kwajalein with a new perspective on our daily actions," continues the post. "Maybe yours will change, too."

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### SAME WORLD

**The Marshall Islands** can feel like its own world because of how far away from everything it is. It is isolated not only by distance but also by its unique way of life. The Marshall Islands has its own culture and a language only spoken by less than 0.0001 percent of the world.

Though ocean pollution is a pressing issue facing the entire world, some countries are more heavily impacted by it. The Marshall Islands is one of these countries. Millions of pounds of trash have been washed onto the once pristine beaches, like the beach on Gehh cleaned up by our Marine Biology class.

It's interesting to think about how far each piece of trash must have drifted before getting beached in the middle of the Pacific. How many days, months, or even years did it float through the vast expanse of open ocean, slowly getting broken down and bleached by the sun?

A lot of the trash was unidentifiable, but you could tell the origin of some of it by the language on it. There were bottles, ropes, and other pieces of junk inscribed with Chinese, Japanese, Spanish, French, English.

It all serves as a reminder that we live in the same world. It's obvious how different people are around the world, but it's not always obvious that we're facing the same problems.

Regardless of differences in location, language, and culture, we are all connected. We share the same oceans, we face the same problems.

### **PLASTIC= OVEN?**

**What happens** if a hermit crab crawls into an empty water bottle? Hermit crabs need a big sandy space in order for them to live their life naturally. In order to molt and grow, they need to be able to bury themselves in damp, moist sand.

They also need to be in a surrounding where they can be able to renew shells when they are done molting. When a hermit crab ends up stuck in a water bottle without any food, he then grows out of the shell he once had when he climbed into a littered piece of plastic. He has to abandon his shell in order to avoid being cooked alive inside the plastic bottle. There is now a vulnerable, hungry, naked hermit crab trying to find its way out of your trash. They are unable to climb out of the water bottle and so they don't molt or grow. They just helplessly sit in an enclosed wall of plastic and slowly die. That wall of plastic they are trapped in are basically ovens that these tiny creatures are getting baked in. They starve and/or get roasted alive. It's not just one hermit crab that gets stuck in that plastic water bottle. It's multiple. Some might have crawled into the water bottle because they saw shells that might fit them when they need to renew their shells. Some might have fallen into the bottle by accident.

It doesn't really matter how these crabs got into the water bottles. What matters is that pollution has turned into a habit. A habit that seems impossible to get rid of. These creatures can't do anything about what we humans do. Only we can. They don't know that they are crawling toto their deaths. Those plastic water bottles end up as graves for hermit crabs.

The Marine Biology class collected 1,364 plastic water bottles. Imagine how many hermit crabs died in these water bottles? Who knows how many hermit crabs die every year due to the habit of pollution that we humans have adapted into our daily lives. Break the habit of pollution today.

#### HOURGLASS REPORT

**Throughout October**, U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll representatives teamed up to raise awareness about domestic violence.

Mary Beth Dawicki, Employee Assistance Program counselor, and Chief Warrant Officer 2 Jarell Smith, Sexual Harassment /Assault Response and Prevention advocate, teamed up at swag tables stationed in high-traffic areas in the community to serve as resources for public information. They provided garrison residents with safety takeaways, stress relief toys and glowsticks to use during Halloween.

The EAP Office held workshops on anger management, communication and strategies for bolstering mental health during the past weeks as well.

Domestic abuse is an issue that may not be immediately visible. According to statistics provided by the EAP office, one in four women and one in nine men report experiencing violence from their partners in their lifetime. One in 15 children are exposed to domestic violence every year. 90 percent are eyewitnesses to the abuse.

Domestic violence can be defined as a pattern of behavior in any relationship that is used to gain or maintain power and control over an intimate partner. It includes the use of physical violence, threats and intimidation, stalking, emotional and psychological abuse and financial control. It may also include:


- Physical abuse or the threat of abuse of the victim, children or pets
- Rigidly controlling finances or withholding money
- Sabotaging a partner's job by making them miss work, constantly calling them at work or showing up uninvited
- Verbal insults that humiliate a partner
- Telling a partner who they can or cannot hang out with, text or be friends with on social media
- Stealing or insisting on having a partner's internet or bank passwords
- Isolating a partner from family and friends

If you or someone you know may be a victim of domestic violence, please speak with legal or medical professionals near you.

The annual military health awareness month provides communities and military installations worldwide an opportunity for community members to ask questions related to mental health, safety and relationships.



#### Modernization and Draft Finding of No Significant Impact

**The United States** Air Force Global Strike Command announces the availability of the Draft SEA for Minuteman III Modification and Fuze Modernization and Draft FONSI. The Draft SEA assesses the potential impacts associated with Minuteman III Modification and Fuze Modernization flights from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, to the US Army Kwajalein Atoll, Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site.

The Draft Supplemental Environmental Assessment for Minuteman III Modification and Fuze Modernization Flight Tests, June 2019, documents the potential environmental impacts of: (1) the ongoing Minuteman III missile flight tests conducted at Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, and US Army Kwajalein Atoll in the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI); (2) extending the Minuteman III flight test program another 10 years through 2030; and (3) Fuze Modernization flight tests using the same missile platform and infrastructure support between fiscal years 2019 and 2022.

The public is invited to review and comment on the Draft SEA and Draft FONSI. 

# WEATHER WATCH

**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** Tropical Depression 99W moved by Kwajalein Atoll Thursday evening into Friday bringing some gusty winds, but we did not get the amount of precipitation anticipated. However, 'feeder' rain bands are expected to develop Saturday and last into Sunday, keeping scattered showers and general cloudiness in the area. Some of these showers will have gusty winds. Looking into next week, a return to the ENE trade wind pattern is expected with the Intertropical Convergence Zone, to occur along 7N from Kwajalein to east of the dateline. Thus, we will still have widely scattered showers in the area.

We received 10.53 inches of rainfall during the month of October, which is about one inch below normal. For the year we are 15 inches below normal or about 80 percent of average. The biggest rain day this past month was Oct. 9, with almost 2.5 inches of rainfall.

**SATURDAY:** Mostly cloudy with scattered showers (30 percent coverage). Winds E-SE at 10-15 knots with stronger gusts near showers.


