Parachute riggers and team members met the day before exercises to pack chutes and speak to USAG-KA Command staff before ascending to conduct their training.

"It was awesome," said one team member. "The water is beautiful, here. Kwajalein is my most favorite place to train."

The team enjoyed a brief opportunity to relax and enjoy the water before their return trip to Kadena. The community looks forward to the next opportunity to see them train.

TEAM KADENA CONDUCTS EXERCISE GRYPHON PACIFIC

The purpose of the exercise, Gryphon Pacific 20-1 was to exercise the 353rd Special Operations Group's ability to employ lethal, agile, resilient forces throughout the United States Indo-Pacific area of responsibility.

Airmen hailing from Kadena Air Base, Japan, and assigned to the 18th Wing and 353rd SOG, conducted detailed planning and executed a complex mission with multiple tasks.

The main focus of the exercise was to conduct long-range expeditionary basing operations within a high threat environment.

A Global Access Special Tactics Team from the 320th Special Tactics Squadron, 353rd SOG, conducted a military freefall jump to seize, establish, and control Wake Island Airfield.

As part of Gryphon Pacific 20-1, two Special Tactics teams rapidly established and controlled landing of facilitating additional Wake Island and Kwaial same night.





EBEYE RESIDENTS VOTE IN NATIONAL ELECTIONS

Thousands of Marshall Islands citizens cast their ballots at the Ebeye Gym during Monday's RMI general election. Braving long lines stretching out into the hot, morning sun and afternoon drizzling rain, Ebeye residents voted for candidates hoping to represent them both on their home atoll and in the nation's parliament, or Nitijela, in Majuro.

The 33 Nitijela seats were up for grabs in a total of 24 districts ranging from Rongelap and Bikini to Majuro, Kwajalein Atoll, Wotje and many more. A simple majority vote decided which candidate vying for a particular seat won his or her contest.

The fate of the presidency will not be

decided until next year. Incumbent RMI President Dr. Hilda Heine, who was elected to lead the country in January 2016, has a term set to expire next January. Unlike the American system, the RMI's head of government is pulled from the crop of elected senators. Thus, the newly elected class in the Nitijela will decide if they wish to keep Heine on for another four years, or whether a different candidate in the Nitijela should take the post as head of government.

The political alliances of the new Nitijela class may have significant impacts on the future of the Marshall Islands' foreign policy. The RMI's allies in the Pacific, from Taiwan to Australia, Japan and the United States, have followed the election closely, knowing the election results—and the question of who will lead the nation as president—could affect big ticket issues like the Compact of Free Association, set to expire in 2023, and how the RMI responds to China's ongoing efforts to carve out its own strategic alliances throughout the Micronesian region.

U.S. Secretary of State Mike Pompeo's August visit to Pohnpei, Federated States of Micronesia to meet with the leaders of the RMI, FSM and Palau underscored the importance of the United States' relationship with the Marshall Islands and regional partners and further signals the importance of this general election.

The official results are still being tallied. The *Kwajalein Hourglass* will publish the results next week

UNUDELNES DENODT

The Kwajalein skyline has changed a lot since the U.S. military first assumed command of Kwajalein Atoll. Throughout the years, old domiciles have been removed and new construction has been added to house families and unaccompanied personnel: However, the shape of the skyline is yet again scheduled to change.

The fiscal year 2018 funding will finance the construction of 26 new housing units. Soon, the Kwajalein skyline will be dotted with new houses.

The construction project also has an air of mystery, says Derek Miller, director of USAG-KA Public Works. No one yet knows what the new quarters will look like.

"We don't know what the houses will be until the construction award is made," said Miller. "That builder for the project is expected to be identified next year. We don't know if it will be half-story homes, domes, stick frame or concrete."

Home Sweet Dome?

Here's what we do know about the Army Family Housing Construction Project. The build will include the demolition of selected housing areas, including Army Corps housing at North Point. The first 26 new homes will be two-to three-bedroom units of at least 1,300 square feet. This initial build will be fol-

lowed by two additional construction projects. Approximately 24 more homes will be built in fiscal year 2021, followed by 75 new units in fiscal year 2024.

The "mystery builds" opens many possibilities for types of housing. Miller looks forward to many aspects of the housing project. He says that the new floorplans and increased square footage will solve some of the island's housing challenges.

"We will get more space," said Miller. "We need more bed space to accomplish mission functions. The new buildout will help alleviate some of these needs."


Miller has a soft spot in his heart for old Navy housing, much of which was built to house Navy families before US-AG-KA became an Army installation.

"I really like old Navy housing," said Miller. "Some people like domes. Other people like tilt ups. The old Navy housing is solid."

In a separate project, many units within that housing series are scheduled to undergo extensive interior renovations and improvements to update cabinets, environmental temperature control systems and appliances.







REACH OUT AND READ UP, NOV. 23

A loved one's suicide is a challenging, confusing, and painful experience, and you don't have to cope with your loss alone. There are support groups specifically for those who have lost a loved one to suicide.

It is important to take care of yourself. Don't feel pressured to talk right away. If you choose to discuss your loss, speaking can give your friends and family the opportunity to support you in an appropriate way. Others may utilize various forms of creative expression such as quilting, painting, music and/or dance. You may also find it helpful to write your feelings or to write a letter to your lost loved one. This can be a safe place for you to express some of the things you were not able to say before the death.

Don't be afraid to let your friends pro-

vide support to vou, or to look for resources in your community such as therapists, co-workers, or family members. Here on Kwajalein, you can speak with a medical provider, the EAP counselor and/or the chaplain. They can also connect you with various online resources if preferred.

The United States Air Force Global Strike Command announces the availability of the Draft SEA for Minuteman III Modification and Fuze Modernization and Draft FONSI. The Draft SEA assesses the potential impacts associated with Minuteman III Modification and Fuze Modernization flights from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, to the US Army Kwajalein Atoll, Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site.

The Draft Supplemental Environmental Assessment for Minuteman III Modification and Fuze Modernization Flight Tests, June 2019, documents the potential environmental impacts of: (1) the ongoing Minuteman III missile flight tests conducted at Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, and US Army Kwajalein Atoll in the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI); (2) extending the Minuteman III flight test program another 10 years through 2030; and (3) Fuze Modernization flight tests using the same missile platform and infrastructure support between fiscal years 2019 and 2022.

The public is invited to review and comment on the Draft SEA and Draft FONSI. The Draft SEA and Draft FONSI are available for review at the following libraries in California: Santa Barbara Central Library, Santa Barbara; the Santa Maria Public Library, Santa Maria; and the Lompoc Main Library, Lompoc. 



WEATHER WATCH





WEATHER DISCUSSION: A disturbance is passing by the area bringing an increase in rain shower coverage and some brisk winds. Scattered showers will remain in the area through the weekend. This disturbance may eventually produce a tropical storm that could impact the Guam region late next week.

High winds along 15N latitude, between Wake and Hawaii, will generate a large, northerly swell next week. This swell is expected to increase tide heights nearly 3.5 feet on Nov. 27, which also happens to be a King Tide day. Some over-wash or breaching of lower sea walls is possible and may cause localized flooding on Roi-Namur. Due to the direction of the swell, there will be no threat of water buildup on easterly facing reefs found in the southern atoll.

USAG-KA YOUTH DRIVER PROGRAM

Here are the steps youth drivers can take in order to start renting carts:

- 1. Youth with a valid State driver's license, learner's permit, and/or KSS Road Code proof of graduation will bring a signed parental permission form to our office. Forms can be obtained from the MWR Office in Building 805 and by calling 5-3400.
- 2. Once the Parental permission form is received, youth may coordinate with the Kwajalein Licensing office to obtain their Kwajalein License (we will provide them with contact information and hours of operation as they turn in their parental permission forms.
- 3. Licensed youth may rent and operate electric scooters the same as all other Licensed Kwajalein drivers. Youth with learners permits and/or Road Code Graduates are required to have a fully licensed driver in the front seat when the cart is in operation.

Any driving infraction will result in the youth's removal from the program. This pilot program is operating on a provisional period, expiring March 14, 2020. For more information, please contact MWR at 5-3400.

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Remember the three Rs of UXO: Recognize an item as possible Unexploded Ordnance. Retreat from the area of the UXO. Report suspected UXO immediately by notifying EOD (5-1433) or CPS (5-4445).

Provide the following information: Location (building #, GPS, landmarks, etc); Size (compared to common items - football, scuba cylinder, etc). Treat UXO like you would treat dangerous sea creatures.
