USAG-KA CELEBRATES THANKSGIVING

Festive greenery and entrée service courtesy of active duty military personnel were among the highlights at Thanksgiving meals on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. Together, diners on Kwajalein and Roi consumed more than 600 pounds of roasted turkey in addition to sides, salads and desserts.

How Thanksgiving dinner happens on the atoll is a story that begins months before those mashed potatoes hit your plate.

Big meals require big plans. USAG-KA Thanksgiving is the biggest meal coordinated by Dining Services all year.

Meal Prep

While residents slept, Dining Services employees at Zamperini Cafeteria and Café Roi worked through the night before Thanksgiving to prepare foods and sundries for the annual fall banquet. Actual meal planning for USAG-KA Thanksgiving began months in advance, with logistics and Dining Services personnel coordinating the selection, purchase and transportation of the menu items.

This year, the Zamperini Cafeteria and Café Roi served the same menu options. Diners enjoyed a fresh fruit and salad bar with cranberry sauce, deviled eggs, fruits and nuts. This year's entrées featured turkey, carved ham, prime rib and steamship round.

The biggest change between this year's dinner and Thanksgiving 2018 came in the timetable involved for the cooking schedule, said Kevin Guidry, dining operations manager. The cooking schedule for entrees required the roasting process to begin the night before the meal. That one small change restructured the entire cooking process.

Steamship round, a colossal cut of beef, can take four to five days to thaw before cooking. When entrees that large start cooking, they occupy an entire oven for many hours.

"It had to go in first, so it could have plenty of time to cook," Guidry said. "Steamship round has to reach 140 degrees before serving. [Kwajalein required] two of these rounds, and they could each only cook one at a time."

Dining services worked with the Sunrise Bakery to provide two special decorated cakes for dinner. Further meal preparation included turkeys, pies and pastries, as well as cold and hot bar items.

The credit for that goes to Ronald Jenkins, a Kwaj DFAC manager with more than 37 years' experience in the dining industry, said Guidry.

"Ronald had a lot to do with our success," he said. "The DFAC supervisory staff all came in with many years' experience in the dining services industry. Most of us have worked in the Middle East, as well. Jenkins helped coordinate our meal, along with Michael Stevens and Bernice Dora. Jose Santiago was instrumental in getting items we needed to enhance the décor."

The Thanksgiving decorations were the special touch that made dinner unique.

"We don't have a lot of decorating material here, so the staff brought the beautiful island greens inside," said Guidry. On Roi, Nancy Rubon helped weave baskets out of palm fronds to adorn the dining area at Café Roi. Herna Samson and a team of decorators used fresh greens and flowers to adorn Zamperini tables and dining fixtures.

"Someone asked me, 'Why can't we do this all the time,' said Guidry of the décor. "It really created an atmosphere."

Dinnertime

Diners on Kwajalein lined up outside before the 11 a.m. meal began. They were greeted by a dining crew in bright orange shirts and a towering display of fruit and pastries. Palm fronds and flowers decorated tables and the edges of cakes and pies. Roi's large multi-flavor sheet cake was created by Akino Smith and arranged in the dining room as a centerpiece. On both islands, fruit arranged in watermelon baskets chilled on ice near shrimp cocktail. On Roi, pianist Jetno Bolling played for during dinner.

As diners on both islands moved forward in line, they met a special group of servers.

Kwajalein's USAG-KA Command staff served steamship round and turkey at Zamperini. Mary Beth Taylor and John Taylor served dinner on Roi with help from members of Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 5's Detail Marshall Islands.

"They were outstanding," said Minton of the special service. "They did a great job."

If the big smiles and return trips for seconds and thirds were not evidence enough, diners expressed their satisfaction with their dinner to dining supervisors.

"People enjoyed themselves," said Randall Minton, food services manager for Roi. "Many came at the beginning of the meal and stayed for the full meal period just talking and visiting."

In special thanks for their hard work, the Café Roi crew received certificates of appreciation.

The rest is history—and leftovers. On Kwajalein, more than 620 diners between the lunch and dinner meals went home with full bellies. On Roi, more than 145 diners enjoyed good music and good food. We hope that your Thanksgiving was enjoyable.

SILENT NIGHT CHRISTMAS CAROL TRADITIONS

COMMUNITY CONNECTION

The Kwajalein Hourglass welcomes community writer Liz Nolan as she shares the history behind the music for the winter holiday season.

Every Christmas the birth of Christ is celebrated in nations all over the world. Christmas trees are adorned, presents are wrapped, and homes are decorated. Families, friends and communities come together to enjoy this festive season and to continue these traditions. One of these much-loved traditions is the joyous event of singing Christmas carols in a choir, at church or simply within the community. Silent Night has become one of the most famous and well-loved of all Christmas carols sung annually.

In 1816, the text of Silent Night was authored as Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht by Austrian associate priest, Josef Mohr. In 1818 these strophic verses were set to music by fellow Austrian composer, musician and teacher, Franz Xaver Gruber, on Christmas Eve at Oberndorf, Salzburg. Later that night the carol made its debut at midnight Mass, performed simply with guitar accompaniment. Gruber was an organist, and as was customary for that period, church organ would have been the accompanying instrument. But on that particular night the organ was out of commission. This change of instrumentation led to the congregation hearing the beautiful folk-like melody and gentle lyrics of Stille Nacht, Heilige Nacht performed with a simple and heartwarming delivery.

Even though there have been numerous English translations of Mohr's lyrics, the most popular version was penned by American John Freeman Young. In 1859 he published a 16-page pamphlet, Carols for Christmas Tide, which featured seven Christmas carols, the first of which was his translation Silent Night, Holy Night.

Since its first performance over 200 years ago, Silent Night has crossed many cultures and been translated into numerous languages. It has been recorded by artists such as Bing Crosby, Aretha Franklin, Kelly Clarkson and Enya, amongst others. It has become the most popular Christmas carol of all time, with Time Magazine reporting in 2014 that there were 733 recordings of Silent Night since 1978.

One of the most touching and poignant stories connected to this song is the World War I event of Christmas 1914. Deep in the trenches during the unofficial Christmas Truce, British soldiers heard Silent Night being sung by German soldiers. Initially unsure as to what was happening, they slowly joined in singing along. Eventually this culminated in a meeting of both British and German soldiers in No Man's Land, singing carols and celebrating Christmas together. This armistice is a fitting memorial to a timeless song that continues to resound a reminder of the love of Christ, the love of Christmas and the eternal hope for peace and goodwill for all.

ROYAL THAI ARMY, GUARD SHARE DOMESTIC RESPONSE EXCHANGE

CAMP MURRAY, Wash.—Officers from the Royal Thai Army joined Washington National Guardsmen in a Military Operations Other than War exchange, the Thai version of domestic operations.

“The Thai military has a significant role in domestic response operations in Thailand,” said Maj. Jae Kim, executive officer for the Washington National Guard Counterdrug Program. “They protect their borders and conduct disaster planning and response operations, all of which are very important.”

During the three-day exchange in November, the Thai delegation learned about the Washington Military Department’s role in the domestic response. They toured the National Guard Joint Operations Center and the State Emergency Operations Center. Topics discussed included coordinating disaster response efforts among multiple jurisdictions, and wildfire missions. The Kingdom of Thailand and Washington State have both seen an increase in wildfire activity in the past several years.

Many of the military assets highlighted in the exchange are part of the Washington National Guard’s Counterdrug Task Force, which utilizes their platforms to

respond to state emergencies and to assist law enforcement.

Linguist support is also a consistent part of exchanges with the Royal Thai Armed Forces. Staff Sgt. Cameron Hartley, a Thai linguist with the 341st Military Intelligence Battalion, routinely is called to support the missions.

“These engagements are great for me to use my language skills,” said Hartley. “Just in the few engagements I have supported, I have raised my language test scores from a 2/2 to a 3/2 plus; with more engagements I could easily continue to see my score increase, becoming more proficient in Thai.”

Hartley said the exchanges have helped him learn more about both organizations.

“I sit in a lot of briefings about different topics highlighting the Washington National Guard, so I have been able to take a lot of that information back to the unit and talk about the missions my soldiers haven’t heard about,” said Hartley.

In 2020, the Washington National Guard and Royal Thai Armed Forces will conduct about 30 engagements in Thailand and the United States.

“We do frequent engagements in Thailand and in Washington State with our Thai partners,” said Maj. Keith Kosik, State Partnership Program director. “Our exchanges build relationships, capacity and support Indo-Pacific Command’s efforts in Southeast Asia.”

ARMY AWARDS GRANTS FOR UNIVERSITIES TO PURCHASE DEFENSE RESEARCH EQUIPMENT

RESEARCH TRIANGLE PARK—The U.S. Army awarded 47 grants totaling more than \$10.2 million for scientists to purchase state-of-the-art equipment for perform cutting-edge defense research in 2020.

The awardees are working on basic science research across disciplines on topics including, ultra-high-speed quantum communication, high performance machine learning and live imaging of dynamic protein behavior in cells and robotics.

Army officials said these grants, awarded under the Defense University Research Instrumentation Program, will benefit 38 institutions across 21 states.

“The DURIP awards meet a critical need for researchers,” said Dr. Barton H. Halpern, director of the Army Research Office, an element of the U.S. Army Combat Capabilities Development Command’s Army Research Laboratory. “They provide scientists with the tools they need to drive scientific discoveries that will provide the Army with game-changing future technology programs.”

DURIP is a tri-service Department of Defense Program that enables university researchers to purchase equipment costing between \$50,000 and \$1.5 million. The equipment must augment current university capabilities or develop new capabilities for performing pioneering defense research.

The annual DURIP award process is highly competitive. The program is administered through a merit competition jointly conducted by the Army Research Office, Office of Naval Research, and Air Force Office of Scientific Research. Officials seek specific proposals from university investigators conducting foundational science and engineering research of importance to national defense.

In the fiscal 2020 competition, the three military service research offices received 724 proposals requesting nearly \$295 million in funding. Selections made by the service research offices are subject to successful completion of negotiations with the academic institutions.

USAG-KA YOUTH DRIVER PROGRAM

Here are the steps youth drivers can take in order to start renting carts:

1. Youth with a valid State driver's license, learner's permit, and/or KSS Road Code proof of graduation will bring a signed parental permission form to our office. Forms can be obtained from the MWR Office in Building 805 and by calling 5-3400.

2. Once the Parental permission form is received, youth may coordinate with the Kwajalein Licensing office to obtain their Kwajalein License (we will provide them with contact information and hours of operation as they turn in their parental permission forms.

3. Licensed youth may rent and operate electric scooters the same as all other Licensed Kwajalein drivers. Youth with learners permits and/or Road Code Graduates are required to have a fully licensed driver in the front seat when the cart is in operation.

Any driving infraction will result in the youth's removal from the program. This pilot program is operating on a provisional period, expiring March 14, 2020. For more information, please contact MWR at 5-3400.

SUNDAY: Partly to mostly sunny with isolated showers (10 percent coverage). Winds ENE-ESE at 13-17 knots.


