## **NUTEMAN III LAUNCHES FROM VANDENBERG**

### VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif.-

An unarmed Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile launched during a developmental test Wednesday, Feb. 5, from North

This Minuteman III launch, conducted by Air Force Global Strike Command, was made possible by Vandenberg's extensive range support. This is the first launch that Vandenberg has hosted since it became a part of the United States Space Force. The 30th Space Wing provides critical technical capabilities in support of space launch and test customers to include telemetry and radar, command and control, optics, and commu-

Col. Kris Barcomb, 30th Operations Group commander, was the launch decision authority.

"We are very proud to have accomplished this operation with our long-standing mission partner, Air Force Global Strike Command," said Barcomb. "We look forward to building on this launch as we continue to provide robust, safe and reliable capabilities critical to the testing and evaluation of the ICBM program, and many space and range programs to come."

Col. Anthony Mastalir, 30th Space Wing commander, has a vision for Vandenberg Airmen to lead the next generation of space lift and range capabilities.

'Our Airmen remain laser-focused on the flawless execution of our launch and range missions," said Mastalir. "I am extremely proud of the continued collaboration between the 30th Space Wing and the 576th Flight Test Squadron, culminating in another successful demonstration of our steadfast commitment to mission success."

## ALYSSA ENGLAND TO REPRESENT USAG-KA AS ARMY TEEN PANELIST

**Alyssa England**, a junior at Kwajalein Jr.-Sr. High School, earned a spot in a 10-person youth-focused forum called the Army Teen Panel last week. She's the first contractor-family dependent to be selected out of Kwajalein to join the panel.

Organized each year as a means for high school students to lobby military officials on issues impacting Army youth worldwide, the panel's membership is more selective than that of its regional counterpart for the Oceania region, the Pacific Teen Panel, which receives Kwajalein teens regularly. On this panel, England will represent the Installation Management Command Pacific region, which includes youth throughout Korea, Hawaii, Alaska and Kwajalein.

Inside and outside of workshops in Southbridge, Massachusetts this year, England will work on one specific global issue during her two-year cycle in the program. This cycle's panel members will focus on 10 issues which may range from teen drug abuse and access to recreation spaces, to teen employment opportunities and mental healthcare. The teens will brief Army generals on these topics as they develop their platforms on those issues during the next two years.

The garrison's Child and Youth Services organization nominated England to compete for a seat at the panel because of her dedication to serving her peers on and off Kwajalein, said Dr. Stephanie McCutcheon, Kwajalein's Child and Youth Services coordinator.

In addition to serving on the garrison's youth action council, England is the vice president of the Keystone Club, which

is a Boys & Girls Club youth leadership development organization, McCutcheon explained. England has also briefed garrison command on Pacific Teen Panel issues, and she has attended global youth leadership forum events to lobby for her Kwajalein peers.

"She's done a lot," said McCutcheon. "And she's been leading by example, by spending time at the Youth Center, bringing people there, developing it to meet the needs of the teens and encouraging her peers to voice what they would like to see and improve upon."

England was instrumental in convincing garrison leadership to authorize the Road Code program, which is a driver's education module teens can complete on island to gain their local USAG-KA driver's licenses. Though they cannot operate regular motor vehicles on the garrison, they can now rent and drive MWR golf carts on the base—a luxury Kwajalein teens have desired for years.

England's selection to serve on the Army Teen Panel is special, as most panel seats go to dependents of active duty military or federal civil servant families. Her selection as a dependent of a contractor family is unique and came to a surprise to her.

"Î'm really excited," England said. "Really excited."

Asked why she serves her community, England said: "I like seeing the difference that not only me, but other people around, can make, seeing the change that betters the lives of people here and everywhere else."

Her parents, Eric and Colleen England, are just as thrilled.

"I was super excited for her," Colleen said. "Very proud of her."





**Kwajalein** shares a rare quality with a handful of other rocket and missile towns around the globe: We can see tests from our backyards.

"I actually got it," I read in a recent,

"I actually got it," I read in a recent, proud Facebook post. "Check out my video of the incoming."

There in the 30-second clip is the unmistakable "falling starlight" of a visible ICBM reentry. Applause and cheering are barely audible before the glow slips into darkness below the horizon.

In years past, mission photographs were released as fine art prints and sold on island at Macy's, but one can hardly expect the numerous scientists and camera enthusiasts in the community to sit still on a mission night.

The other lights you're sure to see along the shore will belong to the numerous cameras and cellphones of Kwaj residents angling for the best shots. Behind each light are stories of trial, error and struggle.

"One night my camera accidentally focused on the moon, instead," a photographer told me. "I have three minutes of great shots of the moon. That's still better than the time I left my lens cap on."

"I sat out there at North Point all night, one night last year," said another. "It rained on me. I waited for three hours, and I just knew it wasn't going to go—until it did. All that waiting paid off. It's my best shot."

For Kwaj photographers, framing the shot can be as much fun as capturing a clear, uninterrupted picture.

Check out these beautiful shots from two photographers. Linn Ezell's mission photography was featured in the Kwajalein Hourglass for multiple missions in 2019. In the shot below, she has captured Emon Beach in the foreground.

Featured above is Todd Emmons. An accomplished underwater videographer, Emmons opted to capture the distant glow of Ebeye near the bottom of the frame.

Enjoy the next mission. Charge your camera battery, bring your lawn chair and ask the others about their settings. If you are a confident photographer, challenge yourself to frame your photo to create a dynamic image.

Whatever you do, don't forget to remove the lens cap.

### Coronovirus and What We Know

- 2019 Novel Coronavirus (2019nCov) is a virus identified as the cause of an outbreak of respiratory illness first detected in Wuhan, Chi-
- At this time, it is unclear how easily this virus is spreading between people.
- There are no FDA approved antiviral treatments available for this coronavirus yet.
- Anyone contracting a respiratory illness should not assume novel coronavirus; it is far more likely to be a more common malady.
- However, patients who traveled to China in the past 14 days who are now experiencing symptoms of fever, cough, or difficulty breathing, should seek medical care right away.
- The World Health Organization (WHO) declared a Public Health Emergency of International Concern because of the virus' capacity to spread globally. (Jan. 30)
- The Department of Health and Human Services declared a public health emergency for the entire United States to aid the nation's healthcare community in responding to 2019 novel coronavirus (Jan 31).

### **General Talking Points**

 DOD officials are closely monitoring the outbreak of the virus, first detected in Wuhan, China.

- We closely coordinate with our interagency partners to ensure accurate and timely information is available and encourage all appropriate measures are taken to limit the virus' spread.
- Commanders of individually affected geographic commands will issue specific guidance to their forces.
- The Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) and the CDC are the federal government leads for the response to the virus DOD is only providing support as needed.

### **Department of State Guidance**

- Due to the threat of novel coronavirus (2019-nCov), the Department of
  State recently adjusted the travel advisory for China to a Level 4, meaning individuals should not travel there.
- Additionally, the Department of State has requested that all non-essential U.S. government personnel defer travel to China.

### **Prevention Tips**

### Q&A

### Q1. How does the virus spread?

**A1.** This source of the virus is still under investigation but there is evidence of person-to-person transmission, even when no symptoms are present. It is important to note that person-to-person spread can happen on a continuum. Some viruses are highly contagious (like measles), while other viruses are less so. At this time, it is unclear how easily or sustainably this virus is spreading between people.

#### Q2. Is it safe to travel to China?

**A2.** The Department of State recently adjusted the travel advisory for China to Level 4, meaning individuals should not travel there. The commander of U.S Indo-Pacific Command (INDOPACOM), in support of the U.S. Department of State's Level 4 Travel Advisory, has restricted all DOD travel to the People's Republic of China (PRC).

### Q3. What should I do if I think I have coronavirus?

**A3.** According to the CDC, anyone contracting a respiratory illness should not assume novel coronavirus--it is far more likely to be a more common malady. However, patients who traveled to China in the past 14 days with fever, cough, or difficulty breathing, should seek medical care right away and notify your medical provider immediately of your travel history. Military Treatment Facilities have provided guidance on how to address such circumstances.

## Q4. Why is DOD involved with the coronavirus response?

**A4.** The Defense Department is supporting our interagency partners by housing the evacuees during their 14-day quarantine period.

### Q5. As a service member in the IN-DOPACOM region, what should I know?

**A5.** The commander, INDOPACOM, is aligned with State Department and CDC travel and health warnings and synchronized with DoD Force Health Protection guidance, has restricted all DOD travel to China. This restriction is specific to the geographic confines of the PRC, and applies to all U.S. military, civilians and DOD contractors. There are no travel restrictions from INDOPACOM for DOD personnel in the remainder of the INDOPACOM area of operations. Service members should consult their specific command guidance on travel.

## REPUBLIC OF MARSHALL ISLANDS 2019 NOVEL CORONAVIRUS - HEALTH TRAVEL ADVISORY AND RESTRICTIONS AS OF FEB. 4, 2020

**Currently** the People's Republic of China is responding to a newly identified virus causing a flu-like illness, temporarily named by the World Health Organization as novel coronavirus (2019-nCoV). The virus was first detected in Wuhan city, Hubei Province, PRC, and subsequently cases of 2019-nCoV have been identified in travelers in several other countries.

The new virus is a coronavirus, which is a family of viruses that include the common cold, and viruses that cause severe acute respiratory infection. The virus can be transmitted from person to person, similar to other influenza viruses.

In response to this international disease threat, the Republic of Marshall Islands is implementing the following inbound travel restrictions for visitors to RMI. These requirements will come into force effective January 24, 2020.

All travelling passengers must complete a Special Health Screening Form to assess potential signs and symptoms and exposure to 2019-nCoV, before or on arrival to RMI.


The Republic of Marshall Islands is implementing the following inbound travel restrictions for visitors, effective Feb. 2, 2020:

Suspension of all persons, travelling via air or sea, from the People's Republic of China, Macau and Hong Kong, for a period of 30 days, starting Feb. 2 until March 2, 2020.

All GRMI government and sponsored official trips to be suspended to affected countries, effective immediately, until further notice, with the exception of patients approved by the RMI Medical Referral Committee.

It is strongly recommended that all persons intending to travel to PRC or other affected countries postpone their travel arrangements. In the event that travel cannot be postponed, preventive measures (hand and cough hygiene) should be adhered to at all times and incoming requirements above will be applied upon return to RMI.



### USAG-KA YOUTH DRIVER PROGRAM NOW THROUGH MARCH

It is not too late for island teens to learn to drive. Here are the steps youth drivers can take in order to start renting carts:

- 1. Youth with a valid State driver's license, learner's permit, and/or CYS Road Code proof of graduation will bring a signed parental permission form to our office. Forms can be obtained from the MWR Office in Building 805 and by calling 5-3400.
- 2. Once the Parental permission form is received, youth may coordinate with the Kwajalein Licensing office to obtain their Kwajalein License (we will provide them with contact information and hours of operation as they turn in their parental permission forms.
- 3. Licensed youth may rent and operate electric scooters the same as all other Licensed Kwajalein drivers. Youth with learners permits and/or Road Code Graduates are required to have a fully licensed driver in the front seat when the cart is in operation.

Any driving infraction will result in the youth's removal from the program. This pilot program is operating on a provisional period and is being renewed. For more information, please contact MWR at 5-3400.

Unsolicited Contact/Email | The adversary may use the name of a well-known company to send requests for military-related information. This method is fast and often undetected.

Joint Research Ventures | Alerts an adversary to current scientific initiatives and the military's latest activities, allowing for tailored contact attempts.





## **UXO REMINDER**

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Remember the three Rs of UXO: Recognize an item as possible Unexploded Ordnance. Retreat from the area of the UXO. Report suspected UXO immediately by notifying EOD (5-1433) or CPS (5-4445).

Provide the following information: Location (building #, GPS, landmarks, etc); Size (compared to common items - football, scuba cylinder, etc). Treat UXO like you would treat dangerous sea creatures. Look but do not touch. For a detailed refresher, please attend the Island Orientation Briefing on the fourth Wednesday of every month.

### Promote Pet Safety On Island—Leave Feral Cats in Traps Alone

Kwajalein Veterinary Services does not euthanize feral animals to control the island's feral population.

USAG-LA Regulation 210-8, Chapter 5, details the humane methods of the Trap-Neuter-Adopt/Release Program. Failure to comply with the USAG-KA Regulation by releasing cats from traps harms the feral cat population and puts humans at risk for zoonotic diseases such as rabies.

The Kwajalein feral cat population must be controlled to prevent federally-protected endangered species from being hunted. For more information about the Trap-Neuter-Adopt/Release Program, please call 5-2017.
