CARDBOARD BOATS MAKE A SPLASH ON LABOR DAY

There were so many ships in the water it would have been easy to mistake Kwajalein for a Navy base.

The U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll community Labor Day celebration included a vendor fair, live music by Pure Aloha and DJ Neil Dye and snow cone and tie-dye fundraisers to support students at Kwajalein High School. The main event on Sept. 7 was the much-anticipated cardboard boat regatta.

Teams and solo captains of all ages—and a few fans dressed as sharks—pulled their ships and cardboard craft up on Emon Beach in the afternoon for inspection prior to the launch and race down and back to the black buoy. In the weeks preceding the race, crews had scoured Kwajalein in search of cardboard and worked together

designing their craft for maximum speed and buoyancy.

Strict rules of engagement applied to this year’s race for competitors in the five race categories. All boats must be made from cardboard. Adhesives could be used to affix décor that didn’t interfere with the first rule.

Each group of builders brought something unique and creative to the race. Anaya Read and Eliana Forsmann piloted the sturdy Suffrage Cat boat for Kwajalein Girl Scout Troop 801 to commemorate the 100th year of women’s right to vote. They included a cat-shaped sign lashed to their hull.

Team Megabyte from the Kwaj DynCorp International Information Technology Department fashioned their prow into the gaping, toothy maw of a shark—complete with a fake, disembodied arm to lend a hand.

The prop limb was a thoughtful touch. It brought to mind the fateful line from Steven Spielberg’s blockbuster hit “Jaws,” as Roy Scheider considers the challenge posed by a three-ton great white shark: “We’re going to need a bigger boat.”

As luck would have it, the bigger boat was available nearby. With its four smokestacks and an unmistakable two-tone hull, the cardboard replica of the RMS Titanic was recognizable immediately.

Mateo’s Titanic was built by father and son team Noé and Mateo Caro of team Paddle Power. Mateo had studied and sketched the ill-fated craft for weeks before the event and had strong opinions about the placement of ship features and even the color of his small captain’s hat, said his mother Claudia.

“I decided to write the team name on the back of the ship,”

she said. “And he came to tell me, ‘Mom, that’s not what it was like on the real boat.’”

At last, race time had come, and the crowd cheered as the small boats pushed off into the water. A few fans wearing shark fins on their heads swam out to show their support. Seconds into the race, the excitement began. The Titanic was destined to sink for a second time, much to the dismay of the captains. Other boats began to sink soon after they entered the water. The crowd cheered the remaining boats on as they made their way out and back and claimed their painted coconut trophies from MWR staff.

Congratulations to this year’s cardboard boat regatta competitors. The island community will be ready to cheer you on next year.

One minute steady blast


KPD RECALL

One 10-second blast, a 10-second pause, 10-second blast and a 10-second pause. The entire sequence will repeat.

ALL CLEAR

One 20 second blast. This blast also sounds each work day at 6 p.m.

RETURN TO KWAJ

After completing her 21-day quarantine, Christy Johnson stepped outside and discovered Kwajalein hadn't changed much since her last visit.

"Kwaj is as beautiful and magical as I remember from when I visited 11 years ago," said Johnson. "At that time, my daughter, Chloe and I visited family members who were living here—my brother and his family, Greg, Ona, Ava and Emerson Moore and my parents, Bob and Becky Prosch. It's been fun meeting people who knew them from their many years living on Kwaj."

Johnson moved to Kwajalein from Boise, Idaho. Though she's traveled to Scotland, Ireland and England, this is the first time she has worked overseas. She

is now the Kwajalein School System's Speech-Language Pathologist.

It was for family that Johnson first visited Kwaj, and also family that compelled her to study speech-language pathology.

"My brother, Greg was influential in helping me decide to pursue speech-language pathology," said Johnson. "I originally thought I might like to teach English as a second language like he did. Greg suggested I pursue [SLP] because it would provide more flexibility and opportunities to work in diverse settings. He was right."

Though her first few weeks after quarantine have been busy, Johnson finds time to play soccer with Likatus. She's excited to go snorkeling, to learn to dive and to help students with creative problem-solving.

"It's so rewarding to help students become successful communicators," Johnson said. "I'm an [SLP], so what I do is a bit different than teaching in the classroom. As an SLP, I work individually or in small groups with students to teach underpinning skills that help bridge gaps in speech-language areas where they may have difficulty."

Johnson decided on SLP as a career field because of that joy of helping young people learn.

"I decided to pursue this field because I get to help young people to communicate; teaching them to say sounds correctly or develop language skills," she said. "Our field is very broad, so some of the areas that I address are working on pragmatic and social language, augmentative and alternative communication, feeding and swallowing, vocabulary and language skills and articulation and speech sound development. On Kwaj, I don't work with students with severe disabilities, so most of my work focuses on developing sounds and language for those who need extra support."

Given all of her favorite books for

young people, Johnson says it would be difficult to narrow down her choices to make a recommendation.

"I don't know if I can name just one. I really liked Madeline L'Engle's "A Wrinkle in Time" when I was young and love the picture book, "Giraffe Problems." I would also recommend reading "Unbroken" since it's about Louis Zamperini and his experience on Kwaj."

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

SUOMI NPP CAPTURES FIRES, AEROSOLS ACROSS AMERICA

On Sep. 7, the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration and National Aeronautics and Space Administration Suomi National Polar-orbiting Partnership or Suomi NPP satellite provided two different views of how fires are affecting the U.S.

A true-color image of the United States appears on

the left side. Obscuring the surface is a blanket of smoke from California to Arkansas with a haze present over the East Coast as well. The Suomi NPP satellite also provided information about aerosols that were released from these fires and have traveled across the United States' landscape as shown in the right side of the image.

Although the OMPS suite was designed to measure ozone it also has the capabil-

ity of measuring other atmospheric particles like sulfur dioxide and ash. The aerosol index value is related to both the thickness and height of the atmospheric aerosol layer. For most atmospheric events involving aerosols, the AI ranges from 0.0 to 5.0, with 5.0 indicating heavy concentrations of aerosols that could reduce visibilities or impact health. Color codes range from colorless (0.0) through yellow (.5 - 2.6), orange (2.7-3) deep red (>3 - 5.0). This image shows a significant area of deep red range which means aerosols in the area could potentially be dangerous to the health of those in that area.

The smoke released by any type of fire, whether it be forest, brush, crop, structure, tires, waste or wood burning, is a mixture of particles and chemicals produced by incomplete burning of carbon-containing materials. All smoke contains carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide and particulate matter—PM, or soot. Smoke can contain many different chemicals, including aldehydes, acid gases, sulfur dioxide, nitrogen oxides, polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, benzene, toluene, styrene metals and dioxins. The type

and amount of particles and chemicals in smoke varies depending on what is burning, how much oxygen is available and the burn temperature.

High aerosol concentrations not only can affect climate and reduce visibility, they also can impact breathing, reproduction, the cardiovascular system, and the central nervous system, according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. Since aerosols are able to remain suspended in the atmosphere and be carried in prevailing high-altitude wind streams, they can travel great distances away from their source as evidenced in these images and their effects can linger.

NASA's Earth Observing System Data and Information System Worldview application provides the capability to interactively browse over 700 global, full-resolution satellite imagery layers and then download the underlying data. Many of the available imagery layers are updated within three hours of observation, essentially showing the entire Earth as it looks "right now."

Actively burning fires, detected by thermal bands, are shown as red points.



UPDATE ON SPACEX STARLINK MISSION

On Thursday, Sept. 3 at 8:46 a.m. Eastern Daylight Time, 12:46 Universal Time Coordinated, Falcon 9 successfully lifted off with the twelfth Starlink mission, carrying 60 Starlink satellites to orbit. Falcon 9 lifted off from Launch Complex 39A (LC-39A) at Kennedy Space Center in Florida.

Falcon 9's first stage previously supported launch of the GPS III Space Vehicle 03 mission in June 2020. Following stage separation, SpaceX will land Falcon 9's first stage on the "Of Course I Still Love You" droneship, which will be stationed in the Atlantic Ocean.

The Starlink satellites deployed approximately 15 minutes after liftoff.

The virus was first detected in Wuhan City, Hubei Province, PRC, and subsequently cases of COVID-19 have been detected in 213 countries and territories.

The new virus is a coronavirus, which is a family of viruses that include the common cold, and viruses that cause severe respiratory infections. The virus can be transmitted from person to person, similar to other influenza viruses.

In response to the declaration of PHEIC, the Republic of the Marshall Islands' (RMI) former COVID-19 travel advisories and restrictions. The new virus is a coronavirus, which is a family of viruses that include the common cold, and viruses that cause severe respiratory infections. The virus can be transmitted from person to person, similar to other influenza viruses.

In response to the declaration of PHEIC, the Republic of Marshall Islands' (RMI) former COVID-19 travel advisories and restrictions (Issuance 1: 24 January 2020, Issuance 2: 31 January 2020 and Proclamation declaring State of Emergency dated 7 February 2020, Issuance 3: 13 February 2020, Issuance 4: 26 February 2020, Issuance 5: 25 February 2020, Issuance 6: 3 March 2020, Issuance 7: 5 March 2020, Issuance 8: 7 March 2020, Issuance 9: 8 March 2020, Issuance 10: 17 March 2020, Issuance 11: 2 April 2020, Issuance 12: 30 April 2020, Issuance 13: 7 May 2020, Issuance 14: 2 June 2020 and Issuance 15: 3 July 2020); 30 July 2020 (Issuance

16) have been reviewed and updated as of 4 September 2020 (Issuance 17) with the following interim inbound and outbound travel restrictions for all visitors to RMI. Because COVID-19 is a national threat these requirements will come into effect immediately.

An extension of the total suspension of international travelers coming into the RMI via air travel until 5 October 2020. All aircraft that need to hand in the RMI for refueling purposes must adhere to the National Disaster Committee approved Amata Kabua International Airport Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) Periodic spot checks will be conducted on airport ground crew handling aircraft in the RMI. Ground crew not adhering to the strict no human-to-human contact protocols will be subject to an immediate minimum 14-day quarantine.

Suspension of all domestic passenger travel between Kwajalein and Majuro and international airlines. Air travel between Kwajalein and Majuro on Air Marshalls is still permitted.

At the discretion of NDC, any persons entering the RMI without official clearance shall either be removed or placed immediately under quarantine in a secure RMI government-approved facility and submit to all testing at the direction and discretion of RMI medical personnel no less than 21 days from arrival.

All cruise ships including live aboard vessels and yachts at this time are suspended from visiting the RMI until further notice.

All fishing vessels that have transited through or departed from COVID-19 infected countries are suspended from entering the RMI ports until further notice.

To ensure continuity of transshipment services, a limited number of carrier vessels shall be exempt. However, these carrier vessels are strictly required to spend fourteen (14) days at sea prior to port entry and only after clearance by MoHHS, RMI Ports Authority, MIMRA and the RMI Immigration Division. *Traffic shall be limited to twenty (20) purse seiners and ten (10) carriers at any one time. Vessels within the transshipment area are subject to RMI Ports Authority's coordination of entry and exit, including access to the wharf for provisioning purposes.*

Fishing companies are required to produce company policy and/or SOPs in compliance with the travel advisory and the Maritime SOP requirements, such as no human-to-human contact, etc. Said SOPs shall be amended as per this updated travel advisory and shall remain in effect unless otherwise revised by the Maritime Working Group (MoHHS, RMI Ports Authority, MIMRA and the RMI Immigration Division). MIMRA shall provide a list of eligible fishing vessels and carriers for entry purposes. Vessels not on the list may appeal to the NDC through the Maritime Working Group for entry prior to departure from their originating port.

To make sure that we can continue to allow food and supplies to enter the country, all container vessels and fuel tankers are exempt but are strictly required to spend 14 days outside of the RMI after departure and prior to arrival at the RMI Pilot Station. All container vessels and fuel tankers must adhere to the National Disaster Committee approved Standard Operating Procedures-Maritime (SOP). Human-to-human contact is strictly prohibited.

Citizens and residents of the RMI with plans to travel abroad are strongly advised to postpone their

travel arrangements. If travel arrangements cannot be postponed, individuals should be aware that they may be subject to restrictions on reentering the RMI. It is also strongly advised that at this time all citizens and residents currently residing on Majuro or Ebeye who are intending to travel to the outer islands to reside or work, do so as soon as possible.

All GRMI officials, including elected officials, SOEs and auxiliary bodies, are required to suspend all international trips paid for by the GRMI or sponsored by outside agencies or organizations with the exception of patients approved by the RMI Medical Referral Committee.

The Chief Secretary, as the head of the National Disaster Committee, together with the Secretary of Health and Human Services, based on recommendations from the RMI Public Health division and the National Disaster Committee, reserve the right to make exceptions to any of the above restrictions to allow for essential services. All safety protocols developed by the Ministry of Health and Human Services in compliance with WHO and CDC guidelines will be followed in these instances.

Any failure to comply with the terms set forth in this Travel Advisory #13 shall be subject to the Emergency Order on Fines and Penalties.

These are interim travel restrictions, which have been introduced by the Government of the RMI as part of current health emergency preparedness measures for COVID-19. These restrictions will be reviewed and updated as needed and communicated to the public.







WEATHER DISCUSSION: Another end of the week disturbance brought needed rain to the atoll Friday. Conditions will dry out for the weekend with just a few smaller showers passing through. Light to moderate easterly trade winds start to return near end of the weekend lasting into the end of the following week.

It's official: A La Niña pattern is established. This transition is the reason for a reduced number of tropical storms to have developed and drier than average conditions. La Niña typically trends to drier end of the year, but the correlation isn't strong. On the positive side, coral bleaching risk along the equator is reduced.

SATURDAY: Morning showers drying out during the afternoon (less than 10 percent coverage). Winds ESE-SSE at 5-10 knots.

SUNDAY: Partly to mostly sunny with isolated showers Winds E-SE at 5-10 knots.

MONDAY: Partly cloudy with widely scattered showers. Winds ENE-ESE at 7-12 knots.

MID-WEEK: Isolated to widely scattered showers, light to moderate easterly trade winds. Hints of doldrums returning near end of week.

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Meck Drinking Water Total Trihalomethanes MCL Violation

The Meck drinking water system recently exceeded a drinking water standard. This incident is not an emergency. However, public notification is required to meet the requirement in the USAKA Environmental Standards. The information below is a summary of cause of non-compliance and actions taken to ensure drinking water quality.

- Testing results from the second quarter of fiscal year 2020 (2QFY20; January - March 2020) show the Meck Island drinking water system exceeds the standard, or maximum contaminant level, for the TTHM locational running annual average.
- The standard, or MCL, for the TTHM LRAA is 0.080 mg/L determined by averaging the results of samples collected at each sampling location for the past four quarters. The level of TTHM averaged at each of two locations for 2QFY20 were 0.083 and 0.084 mg/L.

What should I do?

- Nothing. You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective actions.
- If you have a severely compromised immune system, are pregnant, or are elderly, you may be at increased risk and should seek advice from your health care providers about drinking this water.

What does this mean?

- This is not an emergency. TTHM are four volatile organic chemicals which form when disinfectants, such as chlorine, react with natural organic matter in the water.
- Long term consumption of water with levels of TTHM in excess of the MCL may result in issues with liver, kidney, or nervous system, and an increased risk of cancer.
- Short term exposure has not been shown to lead to adverse health effects.
- Potential exposure to Meck personnel is considered short term due to the limited time the MCL has been exceeded.

What is being done?

- The Meck Island water system includes a Granular Activated Carbon filter system, which treats the entire Meck drinking water supply to remove naturally occurring organic compounds before the water is disinfected with chlorine reducing the resulting TTHMs to minimal levels.
- An investigation of the Meck GAC system revealed a broken valve allowing a portion of the raw water to bypass the filtration unit.
- The valve was replaced in January 2020 and preliminary test results indicate the GAC is currently operating correctly and the presence of TTHMs in Meck Island drinking water has been significantly reduced to acceptable levels.

The US Army Garrison, Kwajalein Atoll has completed a significant environmental cleanup project to remove the shoreline portions of the Former United States U.S. Navy Dump on Kwajalein. The U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards require that results of removal actions be described in a VAR document and be provided for public comment. The VAR provides a summary of the completed cleanup activities for this site. The goal of the removal actions at the Navy Dump was to remove shoreline metal debris and contaminated soil and prevent migration of lead, arsenic, and polychlorinated biphenyls to the marine environment.

The public is invited to review and comment on the VAR in person or on line.




SWIM SAFELY THIS SCHOOL SEASON
