
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

ebruary is busy month on Kwajalein with school activities, winter sports and ceremonies on Ebeye and Kwajalein to honor historic dates in atoll history. Island residents took their lawn chairs to North point to watch for the telltale re-entry glow of an unarmed Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile test.

Developing news of an illness in China seemed like a distant concern, and travelers from Kwajalein continued to take annual leave. Late in the month, some residents were stranded by travel restrictions in their respective airports. Big changes loomed ahead.



ew on island could have expected what March would bring.

As news of COVID-19, the novel coronavirus, spread around the world, the Republic of the Marshall Islands quickly closed its borders to inbound travel. This move effectively stranded many Marshallese citizens and USAG-KA residents and also kept COVID-19 out of the country.

The RMI Ministry of Health and Human Services, National Disaster Committee and U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll began months of intense work together with on-island partners to develop safety and contingency plans for keeping COVID-19 out of the RMI. USAG-KA also carried on with the task of continuing mission support with essential person-

nel and island residents stranded off island and supply chains impacted by the global crisis.

In the months that followed, unique perspectives on 2020 would emerge. The Marshall Islands would become one in a handful of countries with no known active cases of COVID-19. Atoll residents stranded abroad by travel restrictions experienced the month in self-isolation wondering when they would be able to return. In the atoll, life was impacted by necessary safety precautions applied to cargo offload operations, travel and daily life. These changes would last through 2021.

It would still be several months before the first return residents set foot on Bucholz Army Airfield. As news of the pandemic reached the island through friends and family members abroad, the community began to adapt to new Department of Defense safety regulations requiring social distancing. Without the immediate threat of COVID-19, many tried to continue daily life as normally as possible—and waited for what was to come.



By April, Kwajalein began to look different. Emergency services personnel—who had worked without days off to ensure seamless safety operations around the garrison for months—continued duty on Meck, Kwajalein and Roi-Namur with no break in sight. Social distancing reminders were posted at major points of sale like the Food Court and AAFES. Hand sanitizer practically flew off the shelves.

Perhaps one of the most telling changes was, by spring, how empty the Zamperini Cafeteria was at lunchtime as employees opted for to-go containers more often than they stayed to dine in. Kwajalein Dining Services also removed tables to enforce the distancing protocols as directed by the Department of Defense.

Together with USAG-KA Command, the Kwajalein Hospital activated an outdoor temperature-check station prior to entry, and enforced hand washing before appointments. Community volun-

teers began to pitch in and sew masks to "cover" the atoll.

In late April, a live COVID-19 drill allowed on-island groups to practice a strategy for accepting return residents—though when and how they would return remained uncertain. For USAG-KA MWR, a daunting task loomed: how to continue to provide services? Sometimes, there is no easy answer. One thing was for sure: Kwaj life had changed.

1) MWR devised a socially distant Easter Egg Hunt for young Kwaj residents on the island's athletic fields. As participants waited for the signal to rush out onto the field, a cloudburst dumped rain on the island. The single tent available to shield tables of event prizes suddenly became the most popular spot on the island. Parents and children were able to band together under the small tent without fear of infection. Elsewhere, communities were forced to cancel hol-

iday festivitites. 2-3) In small groups and in large teams, island crafters began to volunteer time on community mask-making projects, often donating or purchasing their own supplies. In April, Kwajalein had no known active cases of COVID-19. However, life on island changed as a result of global transit and travel regulations. Members of the community departing from Kwajalein appreciate the masks after regulations for outbound travel changed to require face coverings. The logistics crews supporting Bucholz Army Airfield used masks as part of their required personal protective equipment every day on the job. 4) A sign of the times: At Surfway, instructions indicate social distancing requirements required for patrons. Similar signs are posted at AAFES and other major points of sale. 5) A socially distant Easter sunrise service. Guest speaker Michael Love delivered the morning's remarks. Pastor Brian Conner was stranded in Texas during Easter.

solution USAG-KA revealed in June had been months in the making: quarantine. Working with the Department of Public Works, the Kwajalein Hospital, on-island information technology services and many other departments, USAG-KA Commander Col. Jeremy Bartel announced the implementation of an on-island quarantine system to bring in a small number of emergency services personnel necessary to assure the life, health and safety of Kwajalein. On-island quarters were prepared to accept the incoming groups.

The first group to complete their 21-day tenure indoors included Godfrey Capelle and Benjamin Thomas, two Marshallese fishermen recovered after their powerless, small boat drifted at sea for 42 days. Next to follow: a small group of much-needed emergency services per-

sonnel. More would arrive in the months to come.

Elsewhere in the Indo-Pacific region, communities erected hand wash stations and shipped each other supplies to prepare to meet the challenges of COVID-19, all the while working to keep it out. The U.S. Navy Seabees continued public works construction projects to help their host nations prepare, as well.

Typically, June is also a month to celebrate high school graduation. While the Marshall Islands considered postponing school graduation ceremonies to avoid the potential for atoll residents to be stranded if COVID-19 should enter the country, USAG-KA determined how best to host the traditional baccalaureate and graduation ceremonies. Some creativity and elbow-grease resulted in heavy use of the MWR outdoor, inflatable mov-

ie screen to televise ceremonies with limited seating to an outdoor audience. With fall college admissions uncertain, the graduating class faced an uncertain future. For those hoping for the usual pomp and circumstance, 2020 was a very different year.









Health Alert: Confirmed Two Positive cases of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) in the MARSHALL ISLANDS

<u>28 October 2020</u> The Marshall Islands first border cases of novel coronavirus (COVID-19) have been identified on the military base on Kwajalein Atoll. These two people arrived yesterday, Tuesday, October 27th, 2020 on the ATI Flight that flew directly from Honolulu, HI to Kwajalein Atoll. The National Disaster Committee, in close coordination with the President and the Cabinet and USAG-KA, are rapidly responding to these cases and we can assure the public that these are strictly border cases and were discovered while these people were in quarantine, where they remain until this time. The Response Teams are monitoring the situation very closely. Neither of the cases are symptomatic or showing signs of the virus.

Case #1, a 35-year old female, tested positive on the evening of October 27th after arriving earlier in the day. This person was known to have had COVID-19 in late July 2020. Case #1 has received an antibody test, the results of which are still pending. This will determine if this COVID-19 case is indeed a historical infection, meaning the person previously had COVID-19 and is not infectious/contagious.

Case #2, a 46-year old male, tested positive earlier today, October 28th, after also arriving on previous day on the same flight as Case #1. As with Case #1, we are still waiting for the results of the antibody test. As far as we know, this person previously did not have COVID-19.

The 2 cases are not epidemiologically linked and protocols in place on USAK-GA have ensured they have not had contact with the community and both, along with their tranche, remain under strict quarantine.

Advice to the public:

At this time, members of the public are requested to remain calm and stay tuned for updates from the National Disaster Committee.

At the present moment, this remains a border quarantine case of COVID-19, with no threat of Community Transmission.

as they were designed to do.

As a result of the tests, incoming residents and repatriated Marshallese will stay in Honolulu quarantine for a longer period of time before beginning US-AG-KA quarantine. The lessons learned from October will ultimately save more lives in the Indo-Pacific region.

he month of October marked the 34th anniversary of the Compact of Free Association between the United States and the Republic of the Marshall Islands. The auspicious occasion was commemorated in a ceremony on Majuro at the International Conference Center. Just days prior to Halloween, atoll residents received word that two individuals in quarantine on USAG-KA had tested positive for COVID-19. With the news, the RMI lost its place among the dwindling list of nations who have not yet had an active case or positive test results but gained huge benefits in return. The garrison community and RMI had proof that quarantine procedures—planned,

Flight Test-3 (FT-3) Draft Environmental Assessment/ Overseas Environmental Assessment

The United States Army Rapid Capabilities and Critical Technologies Office and the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command, as Participating Agencies, have prepared a Draft Environmental Assessment / Overseas Environmental Assessment (EA/ OEA) in accordance with the National Environmental Policy Act (42 United States Code 4321, as amended), the Council on Environmental Quality Regulations for Implementing the Procedural Provisions of NEPA (Title 40 Code of Federal Regulations [CFR] Parts 1500-1508, July 1, 1986), the Department of the Army Procedures for Implementing NEPA (32 CFR Part 651), and Executive Order 12114, Environmental Effects Abroad of Major Federal Actions.

The Draft EA/OEA analyzes the impacts of the continuing collection of data to demonstrate a reduction of risk for a longer-range payload system. Specifically, the FT-3 would continue to develop, integrate, and flight test a payload system to demonstrate the maturity of key technologies. The U.S. Army RCCTO determined that a launch from the Pacific Spaceport Complex-Alaska to Kwajalein Atoll, Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI) was preferred. They also considered the No Action Alternative, as required by the CEQ regulations.

All missile demonstration programs proposed to occur at U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll (USAG-KA) and within the RMI territorial waters must comply with the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards (UES). A modified Document of Environmental Protection (DEP) is under development to outline the activities proposed to occur at USAG-KA and within the RMI. The proposed activity is located on Illeginni Islet and in the broad ocean area of the Pacific Ocean. As fully analyzed in the Draft EA/OEA, the U.S. Army RCCTO proposes one experimental flight test.

WEATHER DISCUSSION:

Kwajalein continues to enjoy mostly dry and breezy weather on this New Year's Eve. A wave moving along the intertropical convergence zone over the southern RMI could bring increased showers overnight and into New Year's Day, especially for southern Kwajalein Atoll.

The forecast gets tricky after New Year's Day as an upper level trough approaches from the east. This feature is forecast to weaken as it moves over the Marshall Islands, but could increase the risk for some thunderstorm development around Kwajalein Atoll over the weekend. It will remain breezy throughout, while prevailing wind speeds are expected to stay below Small Craft Advisory.

SATURDAY:

Partly to mostly sunny with isolated showers. NE-E at 15-20 knots with occasional higher gusts.

SUNDAY:

Partly sunny with widely scattered showers and a thunderstorm possible. Winds NE-E at 15-20 knots with occasional higher gusts.
