RMI NITIJELA PRAISES BARTEL

In a unanimous vote April 26, the Republic of the Marshall Islands Nitijela honored U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Commander Col. Jeremy Bartel for contributions to the safety and security of the RMI. The ceremony proceedings were first reported by Giff Johnson in The Marshall Islands Journal.

Bartel was accompanied by diplomats from U.S. Embassy Majuro to the ceremony, where RMI Speaker Kenneth Kedi read the entirety of Resolution 41, honoring Bartel for his work on the atoll since his July 2019 arrival.

The resolution “expressed the ‘deep gratitude’ of the government and people of the RMI to Col. Bartel for his tremendous support and commitment to protecting lives and providing essential services during the ongoing national response to Covid-19,” writes Johnson.

For the Nitijela, the meeting proved historic for its record number of landmark actions. Never before has any other resolution been read aloud in its entirety, signed and presented following its reading. The unanimous vote to accept the resolution was also a rare verbal vote conducted during a Nitijela session.

As RMI Foreign Minister Casten Nemra recalled, the session was the first time the Nitijela has honored a colonel. It was also the first time a USAG-KA commander was recognized by the RMI national government.

In delivering his own remarks, Bartel became the first military commander to address the Nitijela while the governing body was in session.

During the ceremony, Nitijela members thanked Bartel and shared reflections on

working with him over the years: “Nemra described Bartel as a professional who didn’t sugarcoat his discussions. But in partnership with Bartel, ‘there was always a way, a solution.’”

Several of Bartel’s programs currently benefit atoll communities. U.S. Army veteran and Majuro Sen. Kalani Kaneko also expressed gratitude for the establishment of Majuro’s first American Legion post, providing both camaraderie and resources for RMI veterans of the U.S. military to reconnect in the Indo-Pacific region.

Programs planned for the future include supplying power to the Enniburr community and USAG-KA hosting the swimming portion of the 2022 Micronesian Games.

Together with members of the Kwajalein Atoll local government and RMI national government, Bartel is currently working to bring a regular supply of air-freight produce to Ebeye in the future. This plan is in development.

Several Nitijela members also acknowledged their appreciation for Bartel’s work on the RMI repatriation program, which has allowed the safe return of Marshallese citizens and atoll residents stranded abroad due to Covid-19 restrictions. Tranches continue to successfully complete quarantine without incident.

Kwajalein Sen. David Paul described the RMI’s repatriation program as “a resounding success” that offers a “blueprint for other nations like the RMI,” and ultimately, a way forward.

Others praised Bartel’s efforts to meet with traditional and government RMI leaders. Over the past year, Bartel has traveled regularly to Majuro to respond to questions about Army programs, repatriation and quarantine at community

town halls.

“You’re a very important part of our Covid success story,” said RMI Minister of Health and Human Services Bruce Bili-mon.

Following the ceremony, other leaders have expressed their appreciation for Bartel’s contributions to atoll life.

“Since my arrival on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll back in July 2020, I have witnessed Col. Bartel work tirelessly to ensure that Kwajalein Atoll continues operations during the global pandemic,” wrote Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site Range Director Lt. Col. David Taylor to the Kwajalein Hourglass. “His unique ability to think outside the box while utilizing every asset at his disposal has been crucial to the dual repatriation of RMI families and the USAG-KA workforce.”

Taylor’s sentiments were echoed by Ambassador Cabral: “This historic official recognition by the RMI leadership and parliament of Col. Bartel’s outstanding service as USAG-KA commander demonstrates not only their appreciation for his dedication and efforts to strengthen the base’s partnership with the Ebeye and Kwajalein atoll communities, but also underscores the important role USAG-KA plays in ensuring our bilateral relationship remains close and strong.”

Bartel’s positive impact will be reflected in the RMI for years to come. Kedi and Paul reflected on how Bartel has strengthened the mutually beneficial and peaceful relationship between the U.S. and RMI. As Johnson writes, Kedi said, “the resolution was a demonstration of the RMI’s ‘unwavering’ support and partnership with the United States.”

THE ONLY WAY TO PCS

There are PCS parties, and then there are PCS parties.

Throwing a last celebration for friends departing Kwajalein and Roi-Namur can remove a bit of the sting in a farewell.

Still, few can boast that they sent a friend into outer space.

In May 1966, Kwajalein celebrated Stan Sholar and his family with a big PCS party as they prepared to leave island. Little did Sholar and his colleagues know that he would be fortunate to return to the Kwajalein Missile Range years later. Nevertheless, the party ensued and went down in Kwaj history.

If you're going to depart from Kwajalein, take some cues from this mega-bash of yesteryear, when the range community went all out to show their love for a key member of their team.

A few classic shenanigans ensued, and more than a few surprises—especially for Sholar. Here is the account of that historic party in his own words.

When I left Kwaj in 1966, I had a great party at what was then the Pacific Martin Zachary Club by the island golf course.

There was dinner, speeches, gag gifts and then, an event that my guys put together without me having any foreknowledge.

They dressed me up in an astronaut's suit and took me to a rocket at the edge of the patio, just outside the roof line. I sat in this rocket equipped with a window from which to look out.

Then, much to my surprise this rocket started lifting off and I remember seeing the edge of the roof pass downward before my eyes. When I "returned to earth," they placed a halo on my head, and the festivities continued. I realized later that I was on a forklift and the simulated smoke at liftoff was from fire extinguishers.

There was one gag that I was in on, at least partly, relating to my moustache. I had agreed beforehand to let one of the culprits shave it off in the finale.

However, unbeknownst to me, all of the guests were given artificial moustaches to wear after I had been shorn—even my wife, Yvonne and all the ladies. I looked out to the audience and everyone had a moustache but me.

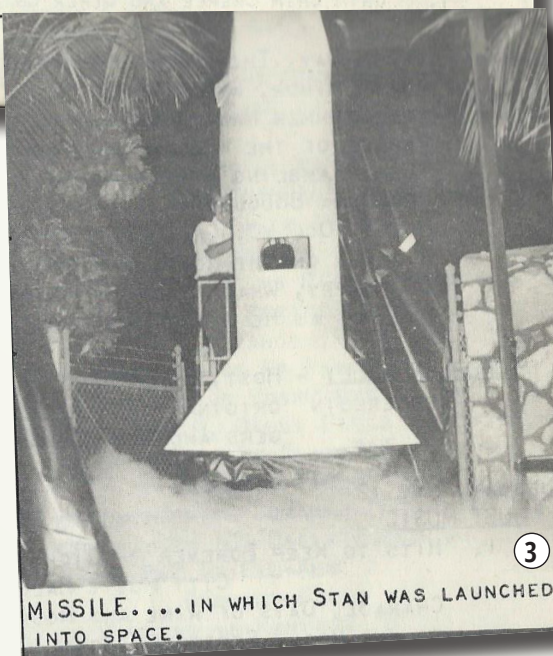

HISTORY WITH U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND

On May 8, 1997, the U.S. Air Force launched GT-24PA. This operational Peacekeeper missile was tracked by all seven of the Kwajalein Missile Range Radar systems during this flight test. The range also used this mission as an opportunity to test the KMR Missile Impact Scoring System or KMISS, an array of hydrophone sensors that score RVs by impact instead of splash.

When fully operational, the KMISS replaced the splash detection radar and telemetry equipment positioned on Gellinam, creating a considerable cost savings for U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. For the Air Force, this mission was successfully supported with data collection for the IFTU and TOM correlation experiments.

MINUTEMAN III TEST LAUNCH ABORTS PRIOR TO LAUNCH

An unarmed Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile test launch from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California, experienced a ground abort prior to launch.

The cause of the ground abort is currently under investigation and Air Force Global Strike Command is assessing the potential to reschedule the launch.

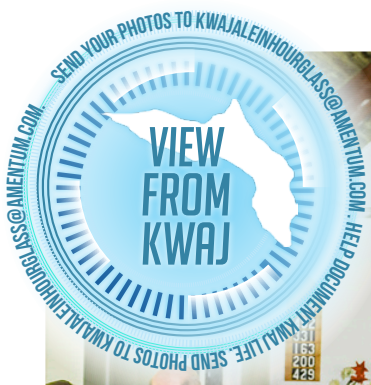
The Air Force adheres to strict protocols while performing operational test launches, only launching when all safety parameters with the test range and missile are met.

The test launch program helps the command evaluate the Minuteman III and gather data to keep the system effective.

The Department of Defense celebrates May 1 – 31, 2021 as Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month. During this month, we honor the generations of Asian Americans, Pacific Islanders and Native Hawaiians who continue to serve proudly and selflessly in the defense of our nation.

The month of May is significant, as it commemorates both the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants to the United States on May 7, 1843 and the contributions from Chinese prisoners who helped complete the first Transcontinental Railroad on May 10, 1889.

This year's theme, "Advancing Leaders Through Purpose-Driven Service," highlights AAPI's advancement as leaders in our military and civilian ranks. We take this time in May to acknowledge and honor the military and civilian leaders of our AAPI communi-

ty, such as Brig. Gen. Albert Lyman, the first Chinese Hawaiian American general officer who commanded the 32nd Army Division; Vice Adm. Raquel C. Bono, Medical Corps, who served as the command surgeon, U.S. Pacific Command; Brig. Gen. Coral W. Peitsch, the first female Asian American general officer in the U.S. Army; and the highest ranking AAPI in the military, Eric Shinseki, a four-star general who served as the Army Chief of Staff.

We also honor U.S. Sen. Tammy Duckworth, retired U.S. Army lieutenant colonel, pilot and Purple Heart recipient, who lost both legs and partial use of her right arm during Operation Iraqi Freedom. Each of these leaders have demonstrated what dedication to the security and safety of our nation looks like.

Today, AAPI make up more than 5 percent of the enlisted corps, 7 percent of the officer corps and 12 percent of the civilian workforce. Nearly three dozen AAPIs have been awarded the Medal of Honor, the highest military decoration for valor. Despite the racial injustices and inequalities they face in their communities, the AAPI leaders of today remain committed to the safeguarding of freedom and protection of all citizens in the United States.

Our strength as Soldiers, Sailors, Marines, Airmen and Guardians is rooted in our commitment to embrace and value the differences of our entire workforce. As we serve together as one force, let us stand together in solidarity to celebrate the rich history and culture of the AAPI community and the contributions of their patriotism and courage.

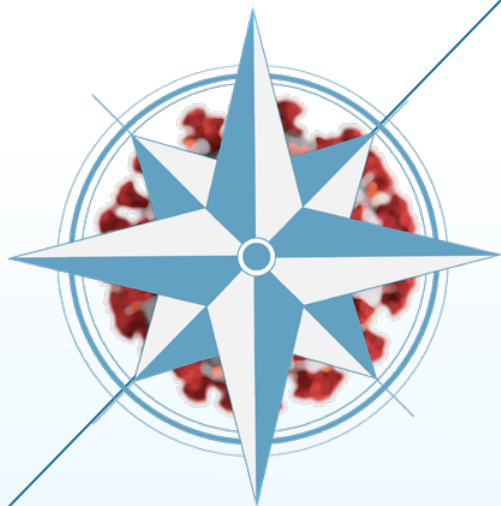
The Three-Person, Three-Club, Nine-Hole Golf Challenge

Headed off island this summer? Be prepared.

The Kwajalein Hospital reminds everyone that it is not possible to have prescriptions filled while you reside in quarantine. Please bring enough refills to last through your two weeks of quarantine in Honolulu and on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. A 90-day supplement is recommended. Also, while off island, it is recommended that island

residents seek any routine or specialized medical and dental treatment they may need—including mammograms, root canals and surgical extractions for wisdom teeth—if it is possible to schedule such appointments in advance with a primary healthcare provider. OUTBOUND COVID TEST POLICY AND FLIGHT REQUIREMENTS

FLIGHT REQUIREMENTS

No Covid-19 flight test is required if flying on the ATI or United Airlines if you are flying with official government orders.

- All other UA passengers must have a negative Covid-19 test one to three days before traveling.
- This testing requirement is mandated by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

- Please bring a copy of your UA flight itinerary to testing.

The Kwajalein Hospital is not a trusted partner for Hawaii. All travelers extending stay in Hawaii must verify safe quarantine requirements with the State of

Hawaii's Safe Travels site.

All destinations and hotels have their own Covid testing and documentation requirements.

It is the responsibility of the traveler to verify requirements before travel.

FOR OUTBOUND UNITED AIRLINES PASSENGERS FLYING WITHOUT GOVERNMENT ORDERS

Passengers will visit the Kwajalein Hospital on the last hospital business day before their flight departs.

- Testing hours: 9 - 11 a.m.
- Results pick-up time is 4 p.m. on the day of testing. The Kwajalein Hospital closes for the weekend at 4:30 p.m. No test results will be given after 4 p.m.

These CDC requirements do not change or impact the state of Hawaii's testing requirement or quarantine procedure.



MULTIPLE REQUIREMENTS FOR ENTRY

There are six primary steps required for travel to and entry into Hawaii to avoid the 10 day quarantine. Following are some of the key requirements. Be certain you understand all requirements prior to your departure. SafeTravels Hawaii is here to clarify the process with our messaging service. Our site SafeTravels Hawaii is not related to the Hawaiian Government safe travels health form that you need to complete.



Online Traveler Account

You are required to manage all your travel details – personal & trip information, test results and more. – with your mandatory online travel form account.



A Current Covid-19 Test

You are required to take & test negative on a specific type of Covid-19 test and only from a lab that's on the pre-approved list of partners.



Present Your QR Code

Upon successful completion of all the required steps you will need to present your unique QR Code upon arrival in Hawaii to clear screening.

Forms and information regarding mandates and requirements to enter Hawaii can be found online for free through the State of Hawaii Safe Travels Program Premium. Click the logo to visit the site.

Hawaii also offers a Save Travels Premium Text Message Subscription Service to connect travelers with breaking news alerts,

critical government mandates and Hawaii's mandatory form and entry requirements. This mobile service may be helpful for those planning future travel. A monthly registration fee is required to use the app.

UNITED AIRLINES POLICIES FOR DEPARTURE

Customers at Kwajalein’s airport boarding United Airlines flights need to present the items described below:

Customers with a negative test result need to present written or electronic documentation which clearly indicates:

- **Customer name.** (The customer name and any other personal identifiers must match the customer ID).
- **Date the test was taken.** Test must be taken within three calendar days of flight.
- **Type of test.** The CDC rule requires a viral test, which means a molecular COVID-19 test (such as PCR or LAMP) or antigen test.
- **Results must state “negative,”** “SARS-CoV-2 RNA not detected” or “SARS-

CoV-2 antigen not detected.” A test marked “invalid” is not acceptable

Customers who have previously tested positive must present written or electronic documentation, dated within the last 90 days, of recovery from COVID-19 after previous infection.

This should be in the form of a positive viral test result and a letter on official letterhead that contains the name, address and phone number of a licensed healthcare provider or public health official stating that the passenger has been cleared for travel.

All United customers must also comply with the following requirements:

- **Presentation of a disclosure and attestation form.** The form can be found

on the CDC website and will also be available at the departure airport. Customers are encouraged to print and complete the form prior to arriving at the airport.

- **Check-In.** All international originating customers will be required to check-in with a Customer Service representative to verify digital or paper documentation. This mirrors the process we’ve set up within the U.S. for many international destinations.
- **Failure to Comply Will Result in Boarding Denied.** Customers who do not show proof of a test or refuse to test prior to travel will be denied boarding. Denied boarding compensation will not be paid. Customers in this situation shall be offered a refund or rebooked for a later date at no additional charge.

NOTE: These documentation requirements do not apply to customers flying from U.S. territories such as Guam to the mainland.

QUARANTINE PHASE TWO REDUCED TO TWO WEEKS

PUBLIC NOTICE

The RMI Phase 2 Quarantine Changes for Persons Traveling into the RMI from Countries with Covid-19 Community Transmission

As of March 25, 2021, the duration of the Second Phase of Quarantine on Kwajalein Atoll has been revised to 14 days. The total period of quarantine is now 28 days. This applies to all individuals entering the RMI from countries deemed high-risk for Covid-19 transmission (where community transmission is present).

The two-phase quarantine strategy

remains in place and includes the following components:

- 1) **Phase 1** – Secure and monitor hotel quarantine for 14 days in Hawaii. This includes a Covid-19 PCR test and an antibody test prior to entering quarantine, another Covid PCR test on day one and a final Covid PCR test within 48 hours of scheduled departure from Honolulu.
- 2) **Phase 2** – Secure and monitored quarantine on Kwajalein Atoll for 14 days. This includes Covid-19 PCR tests and antigen tests on days 7 and 14.

This guidance is consistent with cur-

rent WHO guidance on travel quarantine as well as other national health ministries and other public health agencies. This time period reflects the maximum incubation period for Covid-19 and includes individuals vaccinated against Covid-19 as well as unvaccinated individuals. Covid-19 variants of concern currently follow an incubation period of 14 days.

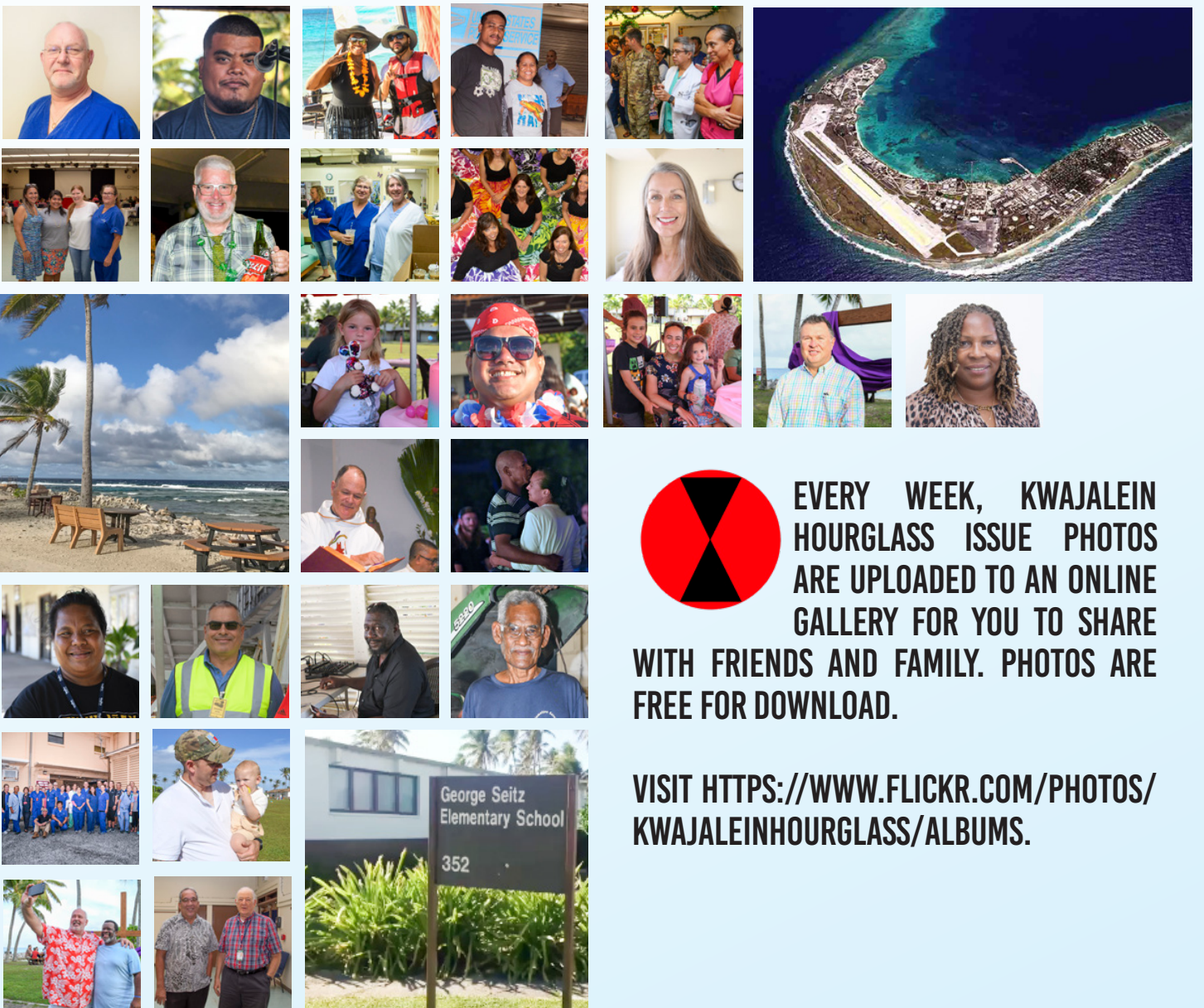
