



THIS WEEK IN KWAJALEIN HOURGLASS HISTORY

SERVICE SONG FOR SPACE OPERATIONS

VIVID IDI EIN HOLIDEL DES ODEHIVE

When it comes to outer space, it appears that the Navy was ahead of its time. This 1961 Kwajalein Hourglass article shares today's publication date—June 6—when the article would have been a hot topic amongst the island's personnel.

In 1961, as Americans looked to the stars and Department of Defense programs began to consider the

future of space operations, Cmdr. Joseph Volonte of the Pacific Missile Range proposed a new verse for the Navy hymn, "Eternal Father, Strong to Save," acknowledging "those who soar through outer space."

Today, U.S. Space Force Guardians serve with Sailors, Airmen, Soldiers and Marines. As the DOD continues to explore space operations, perhaps it is an opportune time to revisit Volonte's verse. THE NEW VERSE WAS FIRST PRESENTED AT THE DEDICATION OF PT MUGU'S "CHAPEL OF FAITH FOR THE SPACE AGE" ON MAY 13 AT WHICH SECRETARY OF THE NAVY JOHN B. CONNALLY JR WAS THE FEATURED SPEAKER

THE FULL TEXT OF THE PROPOSED VERSE IS:
"ETERNAL FATHER, KING OF BIRTH,
WHO DID CREATE THE HEAV'N AND EARTH,
WHO BIDS THE PLANETS AND THE SUN,
THIER OWN APPOINTED ORBITS BUN:
O HEAR US WHEN WE SEEK THY GRACE,
FOR THOSE WHO SOAR THROUGH OUTER SPACE"

IT WOULD NOT BE THE FIRST VERSE ADDED TO THE HYMN SINCE ITS ADOPTION BY THE NAVY FORMERLY TITLED "ETERNAL FATHER, STRONG TO SAVE", THE ORIGINAL LYRICS WERE WRITTEN DURING THE CIVIL WAR BY JOHN B DYKES TO A TUNE BY WILLIAM WHITING

AS THE NAVY BECAME AIR-MINDED THE HYMN WAS KEPT IN STEP WITH THE TIMES BY THE ADDITION OF A VERSE ASKING PROTECTION FOR AVIATORS

COMMANDER VOLONTE, WHO IS A 1942 GRADUATE OF THE NAVAL ACADEMY, HAS HELD A VARIETY OF IMPORTANT ASSIGNMENTS IN THE MISSILE FIELD SINCE COMPLETING A TWO-YEAR COURSE AT THE MASSACHUSETTS INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY IN 1950

HIS VERSE HAS BEEN SUBMITTED TO THE CHIETOF CHAPLAINS FOR CONSIDERATON

ALTHOUGH THE NAVY HAS ADDED THE SONG, IT HAS NEVER CHANGED THE INSPIRING WORDS OF JOHN DYKES, WHOSE MEMORABLE FIRST VERSE READS:

"ETERNAL FATHER, STRONG TO SAVE,
WHOSE ARM DOTH BIND THE RESTLESS WAVE,
WHO BIDD'ST THE MIGHTY OCEAN DEEP,
ITS OWN APPOINTED LIMITS KEEP,

FOR THOSE IN PERIL ON THE SEA"

WET SEASON BRINGS GREATER RISK OF LIGHTNING

Are you prepared to stay safe as you live and play on Kwajalein? Weather on the atoll can rapidly change during the summer months. In this June 17, 2017 Kwajalein Hourglass article, RTS Weather meteorologists Sean Stelten and Tyler Bodnar provide safety tips and some useful know-how to understand storms on Kwajalein.

Summer quickly approaches this little rock we call home. As the first months of 2021 fly by, the heart of the rainy season is fast approaching, as well as a higher likelihood of thunderstorms descending on Kwajalein Atoll.

Thunder and Lightning

A thunderstorm is officially reported only if thunder can be heard on island. Whether you're enjoying some time at the beach or refueling the Metro for a flight up to Roi-Namur, it is essential to keep an eye on the weather and take precautions before threatening weather arrives, not once it's overhead.


Lightning occurs when there is an imbalance in electrical charge between the clouds and the ground, two different clouds, or the cloud and the surrounding air.


To get this imbalance, showers and storms need to be strong and long-lasting enough to build up a significant imbalance. Because of this, lightning is more likely to occur during the wet season, when strong and long-lasting showers are more common.

On average, there are 49 lightning related fatalities and hundreds of injuries each year in the mainland United States. Nearly all of these are caused by people being unaware of the current weather conditions and not taking proper shelter. A surprising aspect of these fatalities is that most of them do not occur when the storm is directly overhead. They occur as the thunderstorm is approaching and moving away. The main factor here is many people don't know that lightning can and often does travel up to 10 to 15 miles away from the parent thunderstorm.

RTS Weather warns for storms with lightning potential that are within 15 miles of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur; however, the world record for the longest lightning bolt was recorded in 2018—440 miles in Brazil--or the distance between Washington, D.C. and Boston. For a local reference, that length is a little bit farther than the distance between Kwajalein and Kosrae, in the Federated States of Micronesia.

Kwajalein typically sees 11 thunderstorm days per year, with most thunderstorms seen during June through November. Based on RTS Weather and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration records, there is about one thunderstorm day each month during this time period, except September and October—approximately two thunderstorm days. In that time period during 2020, RTS Weather recorded 11 thunderstorms occurring within the 13

thunderstorm days.

Remember, RTS Weather will issue lightning warnings if a cell within 15 nautical miles of Kwajalein or Roi-Namur shows potential for lightning, or if a lightning strike is recorded within 15 nautical miles. Data from the KPOL weather radar and the daily synoptic sounding, or weather balloon, are used to determine if individual showers show any potential for lightning. Actual strikes are detected using a network of four sensors located around the atoll.

Accompanying heat, light, and electricity, lightning also emits an electromagnetic signal. The signal falls within radio frequency range and can be heard within white noise on AM radio.

Each of the four sensors detect this signal, which then triangulate the location of the strike. If either of these occurs, a notification crawler will be put up on the AFN weather channel (20.1), as well as on the RTS Weather website (rts-wx.com).

Weather Safety

What should you do if you get caught outside while a dangerous thunderstorm is approaching? Seeking shel-

ter is your only option for protection during a lightning storm. If a lightning warning is issued, or especially if you hear thunder, move as quickly and safely as you can to an enclosed building. Do not take cover in open air shelters or pavilions like those at Emon Beach and near many of the BQs.

Despite it often being regarded as common knowledge, crouching down should never be used as a last resort. Crouching actually provides zero extra protection during a lightning storm, especially on flat and remote Pacific islands. Finding a well-built and enclosed shelter is the only way to protect yourself. If you happen to be fishing or diving in the lagoon, try to return to land as quickly and safely as possible. Boaters should also contact the marina for advice on further required actions.

As the National Weather Service states, "When thunder roars, go indoors." Hearing thunder indicates it is time to seek shelter. Don't become just another statistic waiting for lightning to strike or a storm to gather overhead before taking cover. The first lightning strike can be your last.

U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

HOURGLASS REPORT

In June 1961, the Nike-Zeus system was installed on Kwajalein Missile Range. The system was comprised of four launch cells, battery control equipment, seven radars and a target intercept computer.


The system's target tracking radars used a clutter fence—a device used to prevent reflections from objects near to the receiver—to block signals reflecting off nearby facilities. Clutter fences may also serve to protect ground crews from a sensor's microwave signal.

Over the years, equipment and technology used to support the KMR mission has changed, as have the modern-day names of many facilities.

Given Kwajalein's proximity sea-level and Zeus stored in silos, the Army built up the launcher complex called Mount Olympus, and today called Telemetry Hill—to be able to use the production-type silos while still being above the waterline. The Nike-Zeus launcher complex, visible in an early 1960s USASMDC photo on the following page, shows how Kwajalein's low elevation posed a challenge for its earliest engineers.

Throughout June 1961, the Kwajalein Hourglass reported on the facility's construction progress and promoted a June 18 open house and "Camerama"—a special open house for photographers—for those interested in photographing the complex, on June 25, 1961.

In July 1964, KMR was transferred from the U.S. Navy to the NIKE-X Project Office



Today, Kwajalein is backfilled, and the area of ocean visible in the photo is now part of an extended shoreline and dry land.





It is easy to use drinking as a coping skill to de-stress or manage other mental health-related concerns. If you are a social drinker, be especially warned: Binge drinking is the most common, costly and deadly pattern of excessive alcohol use in the United States. The Centers for Disease Control warn against episodes of binge drinking to prevent both short and long-term health consequences.

For women, binge drinking is considered the consumption of more than four drinks within two hours. Despite myths of greater alcohol tolerance, for men, the total drinks is five.

Don't let alcohol become your habit. It has the power to lower your inhibitions and leave you vulnerable to personal shame and regret. Drinking can irreparably damage health, friendships and complicate future relationships.

If drinking is a personal health concern, before the next social gathering develop a plan to limit your intake. If necessary, connect with a friend to help you maintain accountability so you can both enjoy the next party safely.





USAG-KA WEATHER WATCH

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Kwajalein currently finds itself in kind of a limbo pattern where the subtropical ridge that typically brings dry weather and higher winds is not quite strong enough to completely hold off the Intertropical Convergence Zone, which brings rainy weather.

Offshoots from convection within the ITCZ is expected to develop isolated to widely scattered showers during the morning hours of the weekend.

Isolated showers are likely to continue into the beginning of next week until a central Pacific low-pressure system diminishes the subtropical ridge, thus allowing the ITCZ into the area during the middle of the week. This likely means waves of scattered showers over the atoll through the end of next week.

SATURDAY: Partly sunny with slight chance of morning showers becoming isolated showers. NE-E at 9-14 knots. Higher gusts associated with morning showers

SUNDAY: Mostly to partly sunny with isolated showers. NE-E at 10-15 with occasional higher gusts.

MONDAY: Mostly cloudy to partly sunny with isolated to widely scattered showers. NE-E at 8-13 knots with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK: Above average precipitation, particularly from the middle of the week into the weekend. Waves of scattered showers possible with the intrusion of the ITCZ in the area. Winds will vary from NE-SE dependent on ITCZ location in the region.

REFLECTING ON ASIAN AMERICAN AND PACIFIC ISLANDER HERITAGE MONTH IN THE PACIFIC

As Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month 2021 was drawing to a close, members of the IMCOM-Pacific team reflected on what the observance meant to them.

George Chun, a member of the IM-COM-Pacific senior staff, is the Equal Employment Opportunity manager overseeing EEO programs throughout the Pacific. Chun provides guidance and assistance on EEO matters to IM-COM-Pacific organizations across the region.

"It has been my experience that being culturally different does not mean we do not understand. It means we have a different perspective. We all share the same stories, which makes us a diverse family and yet provides one of the greatest sources of synergy to overcome any challenge that we might face, both personally and professionally," said Chun.

Before coming to IMCOM-Pacific, Chun served as the EEO Manager, Complaints Manager and EEO Specialist at

U.S. Army Garrison-Hawaii and was an investigator at Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, Honolulu local office.

Michael Harada, chief of the Engineering and Plans Branch of the Public Works Division at IMCOM-Pacific, started his 40-year civil service career in Hawaii at Marine Corps Air Station Kaneohe Bay in 1981 and moved into Army public works at Schofield Barracks a few years later. He spent several years serving customers at Schofield Barracks before taking a job at U.S. Army Pacific.

In the early 2000s, Harada was transferred from USARPAC into the Installation Management Agency's Pacific Region Office, which is now IMCOM-Pacific. He has been with IMCOM-Pacific ever since. Throughout his career, wherever he served, Harada's personal goal – and clear evidence of his purpose-driven service – was to care for service members and their families.

"My philosophy has been, we need to show them that even though we are their only service, we are the best service that they could get ... I always strived to ensure whatever products or programs I worked provided the best we could for our service members."

When asked about his thoughts on Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month, Harada said, "Having grown up in Hawaii, I did not realize I was a man of color until I was in my forties or fifties, when I was asked to speak at an event honoring minorities."

Harada explained that ideas around diversity when he was growing up in Hawaii are a little bit different than they are in the mainland.

"I think, having grown up in Hawaii, racial barriers were fairly minimal. Everybody was a minority, if you think about it. There was no distinct majority. In Hawaii, we just take it for granted that we are who we are. Asian Americans are considered one group, but in Hawaii we have specific categories because of our cultural backgrounds," Harada added.

Harada summed-up IMCOM-Pacific's mission with a clear statement, "If we are the only choice for our service members,

we'd better make darn sure that we are the best choice. I believe that's what we are here for"

When asked what Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month meant to her, Kimberly Straube, Chief of IMCOM-Pacific's Directorate of Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation said, "AAPI Heritage Month is an opportunity to highlight the contributions of the AAPI community and remember the stories of those who came before us. The fact that I have the opportunity to serve as a leader in the same organization that established the highly recognized 442nd Regimental Combat Team is an evolution that is not lost on me. The difficult work to overcome adversity requires a concerted effort between those who are willing to endure it and those in the position to enable it. Each generation has the ability to make things better for the next. I feel fortunate to work with team members and leaders who appreciate the diverse cultures and ethnicities in Hawai'i.

Straube grew up in Honolulu, Hawaii and has served within IMCOM, from the U.S. Army Garrison-Hawaii to IMCOM-Pacific, since 2007. She took the lead at IMCOM-Pacific's DFMWR in 2020.

A brief history of Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month

In 1978, Congress established Asian/Pacific American Heritage Week. The first ten days of May were chosen to coincide with two important milestones in history: the arrival of the first Japanese immigrants to the United States on May 7, 1843 and the contributions of Chinese workers to the building of the transcontinental railroad, which was completed May 10, 1869. In one of the greatest engineering feats in American history, 12,000 Chinese immigrants constructed the western section of the transcontinental railroad from 1865 to 1869. In 1992, Congress expanded the observance to a month-long celebration. In 2009, Asian/Pacific American Heritage Month was changed to Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month.

TRAVEL AND QUARANTINE

Tracking changes to RMI travel restrictions and travel regulations? Check back here each week for updates to island flight information, quarantine and Covid-19 testing information from U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll and Republic of the Marshall Islands.

UNITED AIRLINES POLICIES FOR DEPARTURE

Customers at Kwajalein's airport boarding United Airlines flights need to present the items described below:

Customers with a negative test result need to present written or electronic documentation which clearly indicates:

- **Customer name.** (The customer name and any other personal identifiers must match the customer ID).
- Date the test was taken. Test must be taken within three calendar days of flight.
- Type of test. The CDC rule requires a viral test, which means a molecular COVID-19 test (such as PCR or LAMP) or antigen test.
- Results must state "negative," "SARS-CoV-2 RNA not detected" or "SARS-CoV-2 antigen not detected." A test marked "invalid" is not acceptable

Customers who have previously tested positive must present written or electronic documentation, dated within the last 90 days, of recovery from COVID-19 after previous infection.

This should be in the form of a positive viral test result and a letter on official letterhead that contains the name, address and phone number of a licensed

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healthcare provider or public health official stating that the passenger has been cleared for travel.

All United customers must also comply with the following requirements:

- Presentation of a disclosure and attestation form. The form can be found on the CDC website and will also be available at the departure airport. Customers are encouraged to print and complete the form prior to arriving at the airport.
- Check-In. All international originating customers will be required to check-in with a Customer Service representative to verify digital or paper documentation. This mirrors the process we've set up within the U.S. for many international destinations.
- Failure to Comply Will Result in Boarding Denied. Customers who do not show proof of a test or refuse to test prior to travel will be denied boarding. Denied boarding compensation will not be paid. Customers in this situation shall be offered a refund or rebooked for a later date at no additional charge.

Depending on your final destination please notify vet services to discuss travel planning for your pet(s) during the recommended timeframes below:

- CONUS 45+ days prior to PCS
- Honolulu and Guam Three to six months prior to PCS
- Other countries Six months or more prior to PCS

If you plan to leave Kwajalein within the next three to six months, please reach out to Kwajalein Veterinary Services at 5-2017 to ensure your pet is up to date on annual diagnostics and vaccinations.

Outbound Covid Test Policy and Flight Requirements

FLIGHT REQUIREMENTS

No Covid-19 flight test is required if flying on the ATI or United Airlines if you are flying with official government orders.

- All other UA passengers must have a negative Covid-19 test one to three days before traveling.
- This testing requirement is mandated by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

GETTING YOUR COVID-19 TEST ON KWAJALEIN

To schedule a test on Kwajalein, call the Kwajalein Hospital at 5-2224.

- Tests cost \$125.
- Please bring a copy of your UA flight itinerary to testing.

The Kwajalein Hospital is not a trusted partner for Hawaii. All travelers extending stay in Hawaii must verify safe quarantine requirements with the State of Hawaii's Safe Travels site.

All destinations and hotels have their own Covid testing and documentation requirements.

It is the responsibility of the traveler to verify requirements before travel.

OUTBOUND UNITED AIRLINES PASSENGERS WITHOUT GOVERNMENT ORDERS

Passengers will visit the Kwajalein Hospital on the last hospital business day before their flight departs.

- Testing hours: 9 11 a.m.
- Results pick-up time is 4 p.m. on the day of testing. The Kwajalein Hospital closes for the weekend at 4:30 p.m. No test results will be given after 4 p.m.

These CDC requirements do not change or impact the state of Hawaii's testing requirement or quarantine procedure.

NOTE: These documentation requirements do not apply to customers flying from U.S. territories such as Guam to the mainland.

Covid-19 vaccinations are now in progress

USAG-KA QUARANTINE IS 14 DAYS

The RMI Phase 2 Quarantine Changes for Persons Traveling into the RMI from Countries with Covid-19 Community Transmission

As of March 25, 2021, the duration of the Second Phase of Quarantine on Kwajalein Atoll has been revised to 14 days. The total period of quarantine is now 28 days. This applies to all individuals entering the RMI from countries deemed high-risk for Covid-19 transmission (where community transmission is present). The two-phase quarantine strategy remains in place and includes the following components:

1) Phase 1 – Secure and monitor hotel quarantine for 14 days in Hawaii. This includes a Covid-19 PCR test and an antibody test prior to entering quarantine, another Covid PCR test on day one and a final Covid PCR test within 48 hours of scheduled departure from Honolulu.

2) Phase 2 – Secure and monitored quarantine on Kwajalein Atoll for 14 days. This includes Covid-19 PCR tests and antigen tests on days 7 and 14.

This guidance is consistent with current WHO guidance on travel quarantine as well as other national health ministries and other public health agencies. This time period reflects the maximum incubation period for Covid-19 and in-

cludes individuals vaccinated against Covid-19 as well as unvaccinated individuals. Covid-19 variants of concern currently follow an incubation period of 14 days.

These quarantine procedures are subject to periodical review by the Ministry of Health. Bunton kein im jerbal kein ikijjen jerbal in etalle/kakkolkol rej ped wot iumwin jerbal ko an MoHHS (ak jikin Ejmour eo).

Plan now for your travel and quarantine needs.

While off island, it is recommended that island residents seek any routine or specialized medical and dental treatment they may need—including mammograms, root canals and surgical extractions for wisdom teeth—if it is possible to schedule such appointments in advance with a primary healthcare provider.

It is not possible to have prescriptions filled while you reside in quarantine. Please bring enough refills to last through your two weeks of quarantine in Honolulu and on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. A 90-day supplement is recommended.
