HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS LEAVE THEIR MARK ON KWAJALEIN

Carson Collup laid the butcher paper stencil on the pavement to mask his design before applying another coat of white spray paint.

Family members stood with him, admiring the fine details of his handiwork: a buccaneer’s skull and crossbones, with the crossed necks of two acoustic guitars and his name lettered carefully in a blue gothic script. The skull has one gold tooth.

“I play music,” said Carson, by way of explanation of the design. He checked out the sketch and applied a third, even coat.

Elsewhere, down Lagoon Road, members of the senior class, parents and friends were painting intricate emblems on the road.

The biggest community art project of the year took place Oct. 4 at Kwajalein High

School, as the senior class of 2022 completed another milestone in the steady march toward graduation—painting their personal tag on the street in front of Kwajalein High School.

The appeal of street painting on Kwajalein is understandable. Street art is as loud, sassy, obnoxious and personal as you can possibly get. Military bases are none of these things. The thrill of If someone handed you a can of spray paint, the thrill of being able to paint on a military base would be amazing.

The personalized tags stay for the duration of the year as a not-so-subtle reminder to the student body about who’s at the top of this year’s food chain.

The rumor is that years ago, everyone turned a blind eye one night of the year, and the senior class tagged their names

on the street. The activity is now sanctioned and scheduled, but the paintings are always a challenge.

These are not just any tags. For many students, the tagging project is the first time that they’ve produced anything in such a large scale using spray paint.

These tags are personal: A cross in a mound of sand; the heart- and club-shaped bows of two golden keys, draped in a band of red fabric. A panda bear. This year’s paintings have tiny, intricate details and designs. They are meant to be seen from up close. There is not a single shark among this year’s designs. Morgan Dethlefsen made sure to advance the reel in his design—a mixtape of “Side A,” bearing his name. Eden Pope made a simple sea turtle.

The student and volunteers worked for hours before enjoying lunch grilled by James Chong-Gum.

Then, they were back to work, laying in the street that runs between where for years, many of the students have lived, worked and played.



It’s fitting that it is here the senior class makes a final mark before taking the next steps into their adult lives.

To-Do List Before Inspection Day

1) Call Ahead. To ensure safety for your pets and our inspection team, please notify Omie Weaver in advance via email: omie.weaver@amentum.com if you have a dog and/or cat residing in your House.

This is a requirement—not a request.

Some team members may be allergic to cat hair and pet dander. All pets must be secured before entrance into the home and remain secured until our team departs your home.

2) Complete Inspection Forms. A notice will be posted on each AFH front door approximately 72 hours prior to the inspection time. Please complete the information beforehand and have it available for the inspectors. If you are unable to be present, please leave the completed form inside your quarters near the front door and visibly available for collection.

4) Clear a Path. To help the inspection go quickly, please ensure the white government property tag on your furniture are visible and easily accessible. Please move any personal items that may obscure these tags before your inspection. Housing with inaccessible tags will be reported to Army Housing COR and USAG-KA Command.

U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

What does the northern United States have in common with Kwajalein Atoll? Together, both areas share a common era in space and missile defense development history.

Home to the first Minuteman missile squadron, Montana's Malmstrom Air Force Base was selected in the second round of sites for the deployment of the Sentinel missile program.

As in North Dakota, the Malmstrom Complex would include a Perimeter Acquisition Radar, a Missile Site Radar and related missile fields. The first step in establishing the site was awarding the water supply system contract. Bids for the work opened on Oct. 7, 1970 in Seattle. Eight companies responded to the invitation for bids.

An Army Corps of Engineers colonel at the time noted that per the Pentagon guidance, "great stress had been put on the fact that prospective bids must include a plan for employment of minority workers, when invitations to bid were mailed out."


Only two included such a plan. The remaining six were declared unresponsive, and "the successful bidder submitted goals of minority workers' employment to 15 percent of total force, with minority employment ranging from six to 40 percent in specific trades and crafts."

The 3.2 million pre-construction site preparation contract was awarded to Red-Samm Mining Company, a joint venture.



My neighbor always has random bruises and I'm worried they are in an abusive relationship. What can I do to help?

Domestic violence doesn't discriminate. People of any race, age, gender, sexuality, religion, education level, or economic status can be a victim — or perpetrator — of domestic violence.

That includes behaviors that physically harm, intimidate, manipulate or control a partner, or otherwise force them to behave in ways they don't want to, including through physical violence, threats, emotional abuse or financial control.

If you fear for the safety of someone you know, report it to someone you trust like a police officer or medical professional. Confronting the possible abuser may escalate the situation and create more issues for the victim. Be supportive and help connect them with access to the resources they may need to find safety, example: let them use

your computer or phone to find a place to stay or plane ticket so the partner cannot track it.

A healthy relationship means two individuals equally sharing in responsibilities they have determined to share, treating each other with respect and kindness.

Remember: no one deserves to experience abuse of any kind for any reason, and every type of abuse is serious.

Q. What do I do if my dog gets into the chocolate Halloween candy?

Halloween is quickly approaching, and as much as we love candy, so do our pets.

Unfortunately, they cannot have the same candy we do as their bodies cannot process the same chemicals ours can. For example, chocolate toxicity occurs

ical called Theobromine, also found in coffee. Ingesting as little as one to two ounces can be deadly.

If you suspect your pet has ingested candy, please contact Kwajalein Veterinary Services immediately. The sooner your pet will respond to treatment. In fact, if you catch it early enough, your pet may be able to go home with you the same night instead of being hospitalized.

Q. When are you most contagious with a cold?

The common cold, influenza and COVID-19 are all caused by respiratory viruses that are spread through airborne droplets. Droplets can be spread by coughing, sneezing, or sharing common

airspace with an infected person who is not wearing a mask.

When droplets are inhaled by another person, they begin replicating in the respiratory tissues, which in turn become inflamed. Respiratory viruses can also be spread by direct physical contact like hugging, kissing or shaking hands with a sick person, or by touching surfaces where a sick person's viral droplets land.

While there are more than 200 different viruses that cause cold symptoms, the most common cause is the rhinovirus. Respiratory viruses cause respiratory tissue irritation and symptoms of nasal congestion, sore throat, mild body aches, watery eyes, low grade fevers and cough.

Symptoms usually start two to three days after infection (incubation period) and can last for one to two weeks.

Once symptoms begin, they tend to progressively worsen and plateau over the first three days, and then gradually resolve. The highest risk period for spreading disease occurs in the initial days of symptoms and persists—albeit at a progressively decreasing amount—until symptoms have resolved, usually within one to two weeks.

How can you minimize your risk of spreading respiratory viruses? Stay home and avoid going into work, school

VECTOR CONTROL TO SPRAY FOR MOSQUITOS

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

As part of Kwajalein's mosquito and mosquito-borne disease management plan, Vector Control will implement an ultra-low volume adulticide treatment program.

Mosquito spraying will take place on Wednesday, Oct. 13 and Saturday, Oct. 16, from approximately 7 to 9 p.m., depending on weather. Fogging will not take place if rain is forecasted for the anticipated time of fogging.

To Reduce Mosquito Spray Exposure

Although your chances of experiencing any health effects from spraying are very low, the following common-sense steps will help you reduce possible exposure to pesticides before, during or after spraying.

When practical, children and pregnant women should take care to avoid exposure when practical. If possible, remain inside or avoid the area whenever spraying takes place until 30 minutes after spraying is complete.

Close windows and doors and close the vents of window air conditioning units to circulate indoor air. Alternately, before spraying begins, turn AC units off. Windows and air-conditioning vents can be reopened approximately 30 minutes after spraying.

If you come in direct contact with pesticide spray, protect your eyes. If you get pesticide spray in your eyes, immediately rinse them with water.

Wash exposed skin. Wash clothes that come in direct contact with spray separately from other laundry.

Consult your health care provider if you

think you are experiencing health effects from spraying.

Precautionary Steps

- The pesticide used by Vector Control is an environmentally friendly pesticide and will not leave significant residues on surfaces, but exposure can be reduced even further.
- If you have a garden in your yard and are growing vegetables, rinse thoroughly with water before cooking or eating.
- Bring laundry and small toys inside before spraying begins. Wash with detergent and water if exposed to pesticides during spraying.
- Bring pet food and water dishes inside

Is there a beep or a chirp coming out of your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? What does it all mean? Knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family! Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and knows how to respond. Learn the sounds of your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms by checking the user guide or search the brand and model online.

What is your alarm telling you?

SMOKE ALARMS

- A continued set of three loud beeps—beep, beep, beep—means smoke or fire. Get out, call **9-1-1**, and stay out.
- A single “chirp” every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be changed.
- All smoke alarms must be replaced after 10 years.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

CARBON MONOXIDE (CO) ALARMS

- A continuous set of four loud beeps—beep, beep, beep, beep—means carbon monoxide is present in your home. Go outside, call **9-1-1** and stay out.
- A single chirp every 30 or 60 seconds means the battery is low and must be replaced.
- CO alarms also have “end of life” sounds that vary by manufacturer. This means it's time to get a new CO alarm.
- Chirping that continues after the battery has been replaced means the alarm is at the end of its life and the unit must be replaced.

Make sure your smoke and CO alarms meet the needs of everyone in your home, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.

Some tips:

- ✓ Install a bedside alert device that responds to the sound of the smoke and CO alarms. Use of a low frequency alarm can also wake a sleeping person with mild to severe hearing loss.
- ✓ Sleep with your mobility device, glasses, and phone close to your bed.
- ✓ Keep pathways like hallways lit with night lights and free from clutter to make sure everyone can get out safely.

Hear a Chirp, Make a Change!

A chirping alarm needs attention. Replace the batteries or the entire unit if it's over 10 years old. If you don't remember how old the unit is, replace it!

- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area and on every level of your home.
- Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- Roughly three out of five fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

WEATHER DISCUSSION: After a record-breaking dry August with only 3.43 inches rain at the Kwajalein weather station, September rebounded strongly with a near normal tally of 11.30 inches.

On average, October is the wettest month of the year, and a wet start to the month puts us above normal thus far. Not atypical for October are pleasant days with light winds contrasted with days having rain, thunderstorms, and gusty winds.

The Intertropical Convergence Zone which brought our recent heavy rains, has lifted north of the Marshall Islands, placing us within a pattern of lighter winds and occasional weak disturbances. Low pressure is forecast to strengthen along the ITCZ well to our north and track west of Wake Island over the coming days.

Strength and evolution

of this low (uncertain at this time) will determine how well the ITCZ is able to re-consolidate closer to Kwajalein next week.

SATURDAY: Partly sunny with isolated showers. Winds ENE-ESE at 5-10 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY: Partly to mostly sunny with isolated showers. Winds ENE-ESE at 5-10 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY: Partly sunny with widely scattered showers and a stray thunderstorm possible. Winds E-SSE at 5-12 with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK: ITCZ attempts to re-consolidate closer to Kwajalein, introducing better chances for showers along with increased cloud cover.

Winds will be light to moderate, varying from the northeast to southeast, with a few stronger gusts possible associated with any heavier rainfall.
