A range operation is scheduled for Oct. 19 – 30. Daily caution times are 8:30 p.m. through 2:30 a.m. in conjunction with this operation.

During operations, notice to Mariners (NOTMAR) and notice to Airmen (NOTAM) caution areas will extend into the open ocean near the Kwajalein Atoll and surrounding areas.

The mid-atoll corridor will be closed from 4:01 p.m., Oct. 15, through activity completion. The caution area extends from the sur-

face to unlimited latitude.





USAG-KA CELEBRATES U.S. NAVY BIRTHDAY

A unique birthday celebration occurred on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Oct. 13, as active-duty military personnel and members of the community joined U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion 5, Detail Marshall Islands at the Zamperini Cafeteria.

The occasion: a surf and turf lunch to commemorate the 246th anniversary of the U.S. Navy birthday.

USAG-KA Commander Thomas Pugsley and Command Sgt. Maj. Ismael

Ortega joined NMCB 5 at a specially decorated table draped in navy blue linens while diners formed long lines for steak, lobster and hot wings, a Wednesday lunch favorite.

Pugsley offered complements for the choice of menu as he waited in line to approach the serving line. After all, it was only appropriate to serve seafood.

“For the Navy, we’ve got to have lobster,” he said.

Despite the tasty meal, it was evident the island’s diners attended for more than lunch.

In the crowd, Navy enthusiast pins flashed on hats and T-shirts. Navy veterans showed their pride and support with ballcaps from their respective ships and service stations.

Chief Warrant Officer 3 Yessenia Johnson, installation senior food officer, said the event was an opportunity to celebrate active duty service with the community. Johnson credits Kwajalein Dining Facility Manager Ronald Jenkins for making the idea a reality.

KWAJALEIN POLICE DEPARTMENT CONDUCTS SMALL ARMS TRAINING

Kwajalein Police Department Lt. Shawn Delaney squared his shoulders to the paper target at the Kwajalein Small Arms Range, hand poised over his holster, ready to draw his weapon.

A few paces behind, Lt. Casey Smith, acting range master, issued directives via electronic headset at a safe distance.

“On my mark,” said Smith.

Together with fellow members of the Provost Marshal’s Office, Delaney drew his weapon. He eased his hands into the familiar hold.

He exhaled and fired four rounds his paper target.

“Nice work, gentlemen,” said Smith’s voice in his headset. “At ease. Collect your targets.”

Three of Delaney’s shots had hit their center mark. All of them were effective shots.

Those who reside on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll and appreciate its safe, hometown atmosphere. They may be surprised to learn that a portion of the population regularly trains for work by handling firearms.

Nevertheless, KPD and Security and Access Control contract officers conduct periodic firearms training exercises to meet their vocational requirements and safety standards mandated by the Department of Defense.

On Kwajalein, range activities are controlled and conducted safely with supervision from a designated range master. Groups of officers demonstrate targeting, approach, posture, stance and firing skills under a variety of conditions, such as firing at night.

Range days are advertised weeks in advance, and a red range flag is displayed

near roadblocks to prevent visitors from entering the range area during exercises.

After transporting equipment and tools to the long, concrete range bays, officers begin training with maintenance and a safety briefing. Even before practice rounds begin, a full inventory of all gear is conducted, down to the last bullet.

Together, officers clean, inspect and load their firearms. They distribute safety gear, and a first group heads down-range to affix targets to a wooden frame riddled with impact holes.

Officers not involved in the practice remain off the range during tasking exercises and the post-activity briefing for each officer.

The range master signals an all-stop whenever an unexpected issue or situation could lead to a safety hazard.

“Hold on—who’s got a stapler?” some-

one called, in the silence between exercises. A stapler was found, and the fluttering edge of a target was tacked back into place before firing resumed.

Constant practice is necessary—not just on USAG-KA but for law enforcement professionals around the world. Many officers enjoy the challenges of training to handle and master a new firearm. Others appreciate the chance to help others become skills experts.

Sgt. 1st Class Jonathan Debates shared a story of his visit to the Congo for a military skills competition while serving as a platoon sergeant with the 503rd Military Police Battalion from Fort Bragg, North Carolina.

“It was the most fun I’ve ever had,” Debates said.

“We go out and we shoot the Galil R4. It is like a semi- to fully-automatic weapon. You have a single-round shot capabil-

ity and automatic fire. It has a bipod on it. We're shooting at 300 meters and we were not allowed to use the bipod. It was perfect because now you've got someone shooting, unstable, at 300 meters."

An experienced rifle and pistol instructor, Acting Police Chief Charles Goodson trains officers to understand the science and math of firing to enhance their safety and effectiveness. At its core, shooting is thinking, Goodson said.

At its core, shooting is thinking, Goodson said. He shared the story of training conducted with a stateside officer. "We couldn't get the guy on target that night," Goodson said.

He worked with the officer to change his thinking about how to target.

"The next morning, he shot 45 out of 50," said Goodson.

On the range, Goodson demonstrated various shooter stances. The Weaver Stance, in which the shooter's firing side is extended toward the target, could leave their torso exposed to attack, he said, whereas the Isosceles Stance, squared to an adversary, could afford an officer greater protection with their body armor.

Firearms do not perform in identical ways. The minute of angle—the accuracy or size groups in which a gun fires within its range—of service weapons, can vary dramatically. A low MOA indicates greater accuracy in long-range firing.

"Most service guns are one to four-minute guns," Goodson said. "They could be off four inches in one other direction, not even on target. Most sniper guns are one minute or under. ... If you're off four inches, you could be off 12 inches. The average chest size of a man is 17 inches."

For KPD officers, the fine details make a big difference, and are all part of keeping up effective practice.

"Shooting is a science and a lot of math," Goodson said.

HOLMBERG HISTORY

WITH U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND

How did the Chromite, a 300-foot motorless ship pictured above, get all the way from Majuro to Carlos? Look no further for the answer than the namesake for Kwajalein's golf course: Rear Adm. Paul Holmberg, a WWII hero and innovator.

Soon after arriving at U.S. Space and Missile Defense command, Lt. Gen. Daniel Karbler instituted a people-first initiative encouraging command leaders to recognize their employees and their accomplishments.

The service records from many of our earliest U.S. military leaders reaches back into World War II. Here is the story of one member of The Greatest Generation who made a profound impact on Kwajalein Atoll.

In October 1963, Capt. Paul A. Holmberg received the Navy Commendation Medal for a variety of actions undertaken as the Commander of the Pacific Missile Range Facility, Kwajalein.

Holmberg and some of his officers and interested civilians personally cleared a site of rocks, raked, planted grass, and weeded to create a popular golf course that has remained in constant use ever since. For his efforts, he is perhaps best remembered on the island as the founder and namesake of the Holmberg Fairways, but his impact was far greater.

As Kwaj parents past and present will appreciate, Holmberg also initiated the process to have the new George Seitz school accredited.

Holmberg was also awarded the Commendation Medal for a daunting task. He converted the Chromite, a 300-foot, motorless concrete lighter ship abandoned in Majuro Lagoon into a breakwater to protect the pier on Carlos. This innovative approach not only saved the Navy time and money, but protected the personnel using the facility.

The ship protected the dock area from "almost constant high waves" which had caused numerous accidents in the past.

At the same time, Holmberg was commended for his efforts to avert a polio epidemic throughout the Pacific Trust Territory.

Once polio cases were diagnosed on Kwajalein and adjacent islands, Holmberg arranged for treatment and immunizations across the communities, successfully managing the outbreak of this highly communicable disease.

Holmberg was lauded for the action for building goodwill and favorable relationships, all the while overseeing "tremendously rapid growth" and development on the missile range in support of the Nike-Zeus test program as well as Project PRESS, and Project MERCURY.

Beginnings and Battles

Holmberg was a native of Stanberry, Missouri. The youngest son of a Swedish father, Holmberg was the valedictorian of his high school and went on to attend the University of Missouri before graduating from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1939.

His first duty station was the U.S.S. Saratoga. In 1941, Holmberg attended flight school in Pensacola, Florida, and was later assigned to a bombing squadron in the Pacific.

Lt. j.g. Holmberg served as a dive bomber of Bombing Squadron Three, attached to the U.S.S. Yorktown. For his actions during the Battle of Midway, June 2 through 4, 1946, and for actions off the Solomon Islands, Holmberg received the Navy Cross from Adm. Chester Nimitz.

"Disregarding the extreme danger from intense anti-aircraft fire and enemy fighter opposition, he, vigorously and with heroic determination, pressed home his attacks against the Japanese invasion fleet thereby contributing great measure to the glorious and decisive victory of our forces."

Newspaper accounts published on the 20th anniversary go further. Retired Rear Adm. Maxwell F. Leslie, then the lieutenant commander of the dive bomber squadron led the dive on the Japanese carrier Akagi, one of the carriers that had attacked Pearl Harbor.

In a 1962 interview, Leslie explained that his wingman, Lt. Paul Holmberg, scored a direct hit on the Akagi's flight deck, hitting the ordnance loaded elevator.

"As history will record," Leslie said. "Holmberg delivered the first effective blow in the battle."

One year later, Lt. Holmberg received his second Navy Cross during the Guadalcanal campaign. Holmberg's "conspicuous courage" was recognized in the citation which read in part "for extraordinary heroism in operations against

the enemy while serving as pilot of a carrier-based Navy dive bomber in Bombing Squadron Three, attached to the U.S.S. Saratoga, during actions against a Japanese naval task force in the Solomon Islands area on Aug. 24, 1942. With complete disregard for his own personal safety, Lieutenant Holmberg launched a determined and vigorous attack against an enemy aircraft carrier, contributing effectively to the probable destruction of that vessel."

Holmberg would later be described as one of the most highly decorated carrier bomber pilots during World War II.

After WWII

In 1943, he transferred to the Naval Air Test Center where he helped to develop the napalm bomb. After the war, Holmberg attended Massachusetts Institute of Technology earning a master's degree in aeronautical engineering.

While with the Navy's Bureau of Aeronautics, he worked on the Lark and Loon missiles and later the Regulus I. In 1957, he helped to develop the Pacific Missile Range Office. He arrived on Kwajalein in July 1961.

Following his tour, Holmberg transferred to Washington, D.C., to become the technical liaison officer with the Surface Launched Missile Systems Group.

Promoted to rear admiral in 1967, Holmberg became the deputy commander for research and technology at the Naval Air Systems Command.

From 1968 until his retirement in 1971, Adm. Holmberg served as the vice commander of the Naval Air Systems Command.

Rear Adm. Holmberg died July 27, 1986. He was survived by his second wife, five children, and five grandchildren. He was buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Holmberg Park, in Arlington, Virginia, contains a memorial to Holmberg and the Battle of Midway.




USAG-KA HALLOWEEN GUIDE

GET INFORMED ABOUT UPCOMING MOSQUITO FOGGING

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Not only a nuisance, mosquitoes can pose a serious health threat. Mosquitoes feed on a large variety of hosts, such as rats, birds, animals, and can become infected with diseases that they can then pass along to humans, like dengue fever, Zika and chikungunya.

Kwajalein Mosquito Fogging Schedule

Fogging is scheduled for dusk, between 6 and 8 p.m., from Wednesday, Oct. 20 through Saturday, Oct. 23. Fogging will be highly dependent upon weather conditions. If high winds and rain are forecasted, fogging will not take place.

Fogging will continue until all scheduled areas are addressed. These areas include the following locations:

- Bachelor quarters areas
- Army Family Housing neighborhood areas
- 6th Street and areas northward
- Man Camp and Kwajalein Memorial Gardens
- Public beach areas, including Emon Beach, Camp Hamilton and Coral Sands

Why fog for mosquitoes?

Insecticide fogging is performed to kill adult mosquitoes when the population of mosquitoes increases. During the island's rainy season, it is likely that fogging will be conducted on a monthly basis.

Fogging will be performed around the evening dusk time for the following reasons:

- Most mosquitoes are active in the evenings and only a few species are active during the day. In general, mosquitoes prefer to avoid sunlight and prefer to hide in shady areas during the day. Based on discussions with the Army Installation Management Command entomologist, spraying around dusk is much more effective (75% effective) compared to early morning dawn spraying (25% effective).
- Houseflies are very active in the hours just before dark. Evening fogging will be effective against them as well.
- In the evening hours around dusk, the temperature has lowered. Often, the temperature closer to the ground is higher than air temperature. This allows the fog to settle on the ground more easily, and to stay in an area for a longer period of time. Near dusk, winds have typically decreased—another important factor in successful fogging.
- Most insecticides will kill not only mosquitoes but also other small bugs and insects that may be beneficial to the area. Most “good” insects like butterflies, ladybugs and bees are active during the day. These insects are less likely to be active after dusk, and therefore less likely to be harmed by spraying. So, fogging at dusk won't cause as much harm.

What Insecticide Spray Will Be Used on Kwajalein?

Kwajalein Vector Control fogs for mosquitoes using the botanical insecticide EcoVia EC, an eco-friendlier product, with active ingredients including 20% thyme oil and 8% rosemary oil. This product is safer than toxic insecticides such as Fyfanon, which pose danger to humans and domestic animals.

Very small amounts of the EcoVia insecticide will be sprayed into the air to kill flying mosquitoes. The spray is a fine mist that acts as a fogger in the area. It is applied at dusk when the mosquito activity is highest.

How You Can Help Control Mosquitoes

Community cooperation is essential to any good mosquito control program. Individuals may protect themselves and others by following a few simple practices:

- Make weekly checks around your resident and workplace for standing water in which mosquitoes breed.
- Don't let water accumulate in outdoor containers. Buckets, planters, toys, pools, birdbaths, flowerpot saucers, tires and trash containers are all potential mosquito breeding grounds.
- Trim heavy vegetation around your residence so standing water on the ground will dry. Rake up or mulch leaves with a lawnmower to prevent them from holding water.

What should I do during or after spraying?

Spraying is safe when applied by a licensed vector control professional who follows label instructions.

The spray is not harmful to pets. However, if you prefer, during mosquito fogging operations, you may remain inside your quarters and close all windows and doors.

It is recommended that children and pregnant should take care to avoid fogged areas for approximately 30 minutes after spraying.

If you come in direct contact with pesticide spray, protect your eyes. If you get insecticide spray in your eyes, immediately rinse them with water. Wash exposed skin, and launder clothes that may come into direct contact with the insecticide. Contact your doctor or healthcare provider if you have any concerns following mosquito fogging.

Additional Precautionary Steps

The EcoVia EC insecticide used by Kwajalein Vector Control is an environmentally friendly product. It will not leave significant residues on surfaces. Potential exposure can be reduced by following the steps below.

- Close windows and doors and close the vents of window air-conditioning units to circulate indoor air or, before spraying begins, turn them off. Windows and air-conditioning vents can be reopened about 30 minutes after spraying.
- If you have a garden in your yard, rinse your veggies thoroughly with water before cooking or eating.
- Bring toys, garments and pet food and water dishes inside before spraying begins. Wash with detergent and water if exposed to pesticides during spraying.
- Parents should advise children not to play in the fog.

My neighbor always has random bruises and I'm worried they are in an abusive relationship. What can I do to help?

Domestic violence doesn't discriminate. People of any race, age, gender, sexuality, religion, education level, or economic status can be a victim—or perpetrator—of domestic violence.

That includes behaviors that physically harm, intimidate, manipulate or control a partner, or otherwise force them to behave in ways they don't want to, including through physical violence, threats, emotional abuse or financial control.

If you fear for the safety of someone you know, report it to someone you trust like a police officer or medical professional. Confronting the possible abuser may escalate the situation and create more issues for the victim. Be supportive and help connect them with access to the resources they may need to find safety, example: let them use your computer

or phone to find a place to stay or plane ticket so the partner cannot track it.

A healthy relationship means two individuals equally sharing in responsibilities they have determined to share, treating each other with respect and kindness.

Remember: no one deserves to experience abuse of any kind for any reason, and every type of abuse is serious.

Electronic Guam Customs, Quarantine Agency Form

The Guam Customs and Quarantine Agency form has transitioned to an Electronic Declaration Form. All passengers and crew arriving and processing into the Guam International Airport Main Terminal will fill out the EDF on their mobile devices or desktop computers, 72 hours prior to their arrival into Guam.

United encourages everyone to take advantage of the 3-day eligibility window prior to boarding for a completely touchless entry process with Guam Customs. Links are as follows:

The EDF kiosks are accessible in Guam airport baggage claim area for convenience.

Flight Requirements

- No COVID-19 test is required if flying on the ATI or United Airlines if you are flying on official government orders. All other UA passengers must have a negative COVID-19 test one to three days before traveling. This is a requirement of the Centers for Disease Control to enter the United States.
- Call the Kwajalein Hospital to schedule your test at 5-2223. The cost for the test is \$125. Passengers must bring a copy of their UA flight itinerary at the time of appointment as proof of flight.
- All passengers tested are required to pick up results at 4 p.m. on the day of testing.

WEATHER WATCH

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

WEATHER DISCUSSION: October continues to be wet for Kwajalein Atoll and surrounding areas, with rainfall totals for the month remaining about 0.5 inches above normal.

Weak diverging air aloft will maintain at least some upper-level support for precipitation through this weekend, meaning a few more rounds of heavy shower activity like what the atoll has seen over the last few days isn't out of the question.

Overall flow at the surface will generally remain weak and variable in direction. This should cause relatively little swell generation in and around the RMI, so outside of any shower activity this weekend should exhibit excellent boating, fishing, diving weather. Weak surface winds and periods of heavy shower coverage will persist into the next work week, before some forecast models start hinting at a return

to more consistent easterly trade wind flow late next week.

SATURDAY: Partly sunny with isolated showers. Winds ENE-ESE at 8-13 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY: Partly to mostly sunny with widely scattered showers, mostly in the late afternoon to evening. Winds light and variable with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY: Mostly cloudy with scattered to numerous showers throughout the day. Winds light and variable with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK: Continued light and variable winds at the surface, with additional periods of widespread heavy rain. At the moment, forecast models are suggesting another of these periods to move through late Tuesday. A return to more consistent easterly trade wind flow seems possible by late next week.

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT



Provide the following information: Location (building #, GPS, landmarks, etc); Size (compared to common items - football, scuba cylinder, etc). Treat UXO like you would treat dangerous sea creatures.

Look but do not touch. For a detailed refresher, please attend the Island Orientation Briefing on the fourth Wednesday of every month.
