Now in its second year after a long hiatus, Kwajalein High School students visited Carlos Nov. 29 for the "Holidays on Carlos" gift drop and presented the island's teachers and students with donated treats and supplies in an early celebration of the winter holidays.

After months of sourcing community donations, NHS members packaged goods in boxes and bags for students, and traveled by catamaran with teachers, band members and personnel from the USAG-KA command team to share the gifts and a few unique surprises.

Collecting supplies for donation was a focused effort this year, as Carlos had expressed a need for school supplies, said NHS President Morgan Dethlefsen. Donors contributed student backpacks and other materials.

One small local team also made a big difference in collecting items to meet that need: the George Seitz Elementary School Student Council.

Ember Miller, council chair, coordinated the collection of school supplies and books from the Kwajalein School System, said GSES Advisor Misti French.

"It was fantastic to see our younger students and leaders with so much enthusiasm for helping others and partnering with the older students at the high school on NHS's project," French said.

"Our [NHS] chapter is grateful for all of the organizations that helped this event to be a success—USAG-KA Command, the Host Nation Office, the Kwajalein Marine Department, the Kwajalein School System, the community and the people of Carlos," said NHS Advisor Mindi Gerber.

Dethlefsen agreed: "Planning and working with US-AG-KA Command went really smoothly, and they were very supportive of the event."

On Carlos, after presenting students with gift bags, the two schools traded songs.

Band Director Kyle Miller conducted a KHS woodwind quintet that provided instrumental accompaniment for high school carolers. In return, Carlos students raised their own voices in song.

"What's more universal than music and giving, especially during the holiday season?" said Miller. "We were very happy to put together a small ensemble to share some Christmas carols with the Carlos community."

Next came the opening of the large gift boxes. Together, students from both schools checked out the bounty of children's books, classroom supplies, clothes and sports equipment. Spontaneous games of four-square commenced. For a while, it was all fun and games—just students being students.

"We had a great time playing games with the kids and connecting with the community on Carlos," Dethlefsen said.

Carlos alap Juliet Kilma treated visitors to fresh coconut juice, presented wut marmars bedecked with shells and allowed the visiting students to go exploring before their journey home.

Kwajalein High School Principal Matthew Gerber recognizes the student-led event as a valuable opportunity for them to witness the reward of service firsthand. Together, he and Mindi Gerber hope the gift drop tradition will continue.

"Seeing people with tears in their eyes as they open the gifts—and knowing how so many came together to make it possible is so impactful," said Matt Gerber. "Our students work so hard to pull this off. I continue to be thankful for this service project and wish everyone could have the chance to experience it."

MAILING RESTRICTIONS ON **E-CIGARETTES, SIMILAR DEVICES**

The United States Postal Service has posted its final ruling on part 47 of Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted and Perishable Mail. The rule implements new restrictions on mailing Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems, or ENDS, including their liquids, parts, components and accessories.

ENDS devices include any device that delivers a substance-not just nicotine-via an aerosolized solution to users inhaling from the device. These include electronic cigarettes, e-hookahs or vape pens.

All such items are prohibited in inbound and outbound international mail effective immediately. This includes mail to and from overseas military and diplomatic addresses. For more information, visit the USPS Postal Pro online at https://postalpro. usps.com/node/10267.

Help U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll and garrison Postal Operations do their part to protect physical security on island. Island residents are not authorized to share use of their mailbox with unauthorized customers.

Only yourself or registered members of your immediate island household may check and withdraw mail from your mailbox. Please do not give out the combination to anyone not authorized to collect your mail.

Registered APO holders on Kwajalein may elect to have an individual collect packages and letter mail during the APO box holder's extended travel. If this convenience is desired, APO box holders should visit the post office to arrange for temporary authorization for mail pick-up.

A UNIQUE HOLIDAY "GIFT": THE PRINZ EUGEN ARRIVES ON KWAJALEIN ATOLL

The Prinz Eugen

The Prinz Eugen came to be a part of the Kwajalein landscape in late December 1946.

A part of Nazi Germany's Kriegsmarine, the Prinz Eugen, a 654-foot, 15,000-ton German heavy cruiser, was launched in 1938 and entered service in 1940. Named for the 18th century Austrian general, Prince Eugene of Savoy, the Prinz Eugen first saw combat in Operation Rheinubung and the Battle of the Denmark Strait, an attempt by the German Navy to break out into the Atlantic Ocean in May 1941.

The Prinz Eugen and the Bismark battled the British battlecruiser, HMS Hood, and the HMS Prince of Wales battleship. During the battle which destroyed the Hood and damaged the Prince of Wales, the Prinz Eugen was redirected to raid Allied merchant shipping. Following a period in Occupied France for repairs, the Prinz Eugen returned to Germany and later deployed to Norway.

Three days after arriving, the cruiser was torpedoed by the Trident, a British submarine, and returned to Germany for repairs. After returning to active service, the ship deployed to the Baltic Sea and the Eastern Front to provide artillery support against the advancing Soviet army. In May 1945, the Prinz Eugen was surrendered to the British in Copenhagen and subsequently transferred to the Americans.

In 1946, the American Congress authorized atomic weapons testing at the Bikini Atoll. Operation Crossroads was designed to assess nuclear effects on naval vessels and determine the vulnerabilities. A flotilla of 95 target ships, including the Prinz Eugen, was assembled. Some ships were sunk in the initial airborne blast. More were sunk in the second test, conducted underwater a few weeks later.

The Prinz Eugen, on the outer limits of the test zone, was not affected by either

blast. A collection of 50 ships, which had survived the blast to include the USS Saratoga, the USS Pennsylvania and the Prinz Eugen were towed to Kwajalein and anchored off Echo Pier. For the next several months, they were subject to inspection teams and decontamination squads which studied the effects of the two blasts and radioactivity upon the ships.

On Dec. 21, 1946, the Prinz Eugen began to take on water and list. Fearing the ship would block the harbor, Kwajalein Commander, Commodore George A. Seitz, ordered the ship be pushed across the lagoon and beached. These efforts failed as prevailing winds pushed the ship broadside on the reef. The Prinz Eugen officially capsized on Dec. 22, 1946 off Carlson Island.

There the ship has remained for decades, periodically leaking oil into the lagoon, as it gradually rusted away. The U.S. Navy addressed this issue in 2018. During a three-month operation, the Navy successfully removed 228,900 gallons of oil trapped in 173 of the fuel tanks in the submerged hull. This mission eliminated the potential of a catastrophic release and helped preserve the local marine life.

George Seitz Elementary School

The presence of a school system was one feature which factored as an asset for Kwajalein as teams scouted the globe for a site suitable for the new Nike-Zeus missile defense test program.

The Navy had opened an elementary school in 1947. By 1959, elementary instruction for students in grades one through eight was housed in three wooden buildings on the northeast side of the island.

A single-story building housed the principal's office, the library and some classrooms. The remainder of the classrooms were in two single-story structures. With one principal and 10 teachers the school system supported approximately 200 students. At this

time there was no high school instruction on the island.

Students in grades 9-12, assisted by two teachers, continued their education through a correspondence program from the University of California. Students typically took four courses per semester, and annual tuition fees for this program were \$270.

With the expected influx of personnel and dependents with the Nike-Zeus program and to support recruiting efforts, additional facilities would be needed. Construction for the George Seitz school, named for Commodore George A. Seitz, USN, Commander of Kwajalein and Governor of the Marshall Islands in 1947, began in 1960.

The school opened two years later, albeit with a modest high school curriculum. (Continuing Education was also important to these new personnel and a University of Hawaii extension program was established at the same time.)

The student population soon outgrew the facility and "panelfab" buildings were added in 1964 to provide additional classroom and fine arts (music) space.

By 1967, an image of the George Seitz School, located in the dependent housing area, shows a compact campus almost filled to capacity with nearly 700 students in grades 1-12.

These issues were soon addressed. In January 1969, the construction projects for the Kwajalein Junior/Senior High School and the Ivey school for elementary students were due for completion.

Safeguard

The SAFEGUARD Anti-Ballistic Missile system, the first missile defense system deployed by the United States, was initially planned as a multi-phased deployment.

By 1971 construction was underway at the North Dakota, Colorado and Montana locations. The second phase called for additional sites in Sedalia, Missouri, near Whiteman Air Force Base, Warren AFB, Wyoming and the National Capital Region. The locations were selected based upon a computer study of 90 sites across the nation.

On Jan. 7, 1971, a plan for five sites was publicly announced for Sedalia/ Whiteman AFB—a Missile Site Radar and four remote Sprint launch sites, with no immediate plans for construction. In March, authorization to proceed was granted and Whiteman was designated the Fire Control Center.

Initial assessments called for an influx of more than 2,000 people (workers and dependents) with construction scheduled to begin later that year. The expected completion date for the site, which would have 900 permanent Army employees (Soldiers and civilians) was 1976. A year later in 1972, the authorization was rescinded and the Malmstrom Air Force Base, Montana site became the FCC.

"Bullying is any conduct whereby a service member or members, regardless of service, rank or position, intends to exclude or reject another service member through cruel, abusive, humiliating, oppressive, demeaning, or harmful behavior, which results in diminishing the other service member's dignity, position or status. Absent outside intervention, bullying will typically continue without any identifiable end-point.

Bullying may include an abuse of authority. Bullying tactics include, but are not limited to, making threats, spreading rumors, social isolation, and attacking someone physically, verbally or through the use of electronic media."

According to the regulation, every service member and civilian who lives and works on Kwajalein Atoll deserves the right to work and live in an environment free of hostility. Please, think twice before you post.

Hypertension, or elevated blood pressure, is a very common condition that, when left untreated, increases the risk of heart attacks, stroke, and kidney disease. Most people with hypertension have no symptoms and can thus remain undiagnosed and untreated.

The first step to determining if you have high blood pressure is to see your primary care physician. Hypertension is the pressure against which your heart must push to get blood to your organs and limbs. Over time this increased work can enlarge your heart and make it more prone to arrythmias (irregular rhythms) and failure. Hypertension also damages our kidneys, and increases the risk of kidney failure and strokes.

What steps can you take?

Find out if you have hypertension and if treatment is warranted.

- Increase your activity level. Regular exercise—30 minutes a day, five days per week-or walking is a constructive way to lose weight, reduce stress, and lower blood pressure. Stop smoking
- Lose weight. This one step can have dramatic effects on blood pressure and overall health.
- Change the way you eat. Choose foods lower in salt and fat and increase the ratio of vegetables and fruits in your diet. As a place to begin, cut out processed snack foods.
- Monitor your blood pressure. If over 140/90 or you have known risk factors to include: diabetes, smoking, obesity, sedentary lifestyle, family history of heart attacks or stroke in close relatives younger than 50 years old, or high cholesterol, come see your doctor.

Taking small steps to improve your diet, body weight, and lifestyle, along with regular check-ups (and possibly medication), can significantly reduce your risk of heart attacks, strokes or kidney disease and extend your lifespan.

If you are traveling to the U.S., you must visit the Kwajalein Hospital during regular business hours the week before your departure to pay for your Covid-19 test and to schedule your weekend swab. The hospital is open 8 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch. You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- **Retreat** from the area of the UXO; and
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 5-1433. You can also call CPS at 5-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- **Size of the UXO** as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

For a detailed refresher on UXO safety, attend the new island orientation or call Kwajalein EOD at 5-1433.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

A southward diving jet stream and a surface trough of low pressure over the northern Marshall Islands has resulted in a temporary lull in winds and shower activity over the Kwajalein Atoll area, which looks to last into Saturday morning.

As the general pattern shifts west, the threat for showers and possibly a few thunderstorms will increase on Saturday, with winds becoming breezy from the south to southeast. A return to breezy northeast to east trades is expected over the weekend with generally sparse shower coverage. For next week, brisk trades continue with increasing chance of showers as the Intertropical Convergence Zone shifts into the southern Marshall Islands.

HIGH SURF AND INUNDATION

Very strong winds north of the Marshall Islands are generating a large northeasterly swell which will affect mainly north and northeast exposures of Kwajalein Atoll over the next several days with hazardous surf of 8-12 feet. The swell is arriving during King tides and will likely produce nuisance inundation on Roi-Namur and Third Island around times of higher high tides from Dec. 4-7. Some damage to seawalls and adjacent roads can't be ruled out.

SATURDAY

Mostly cloudy and becoming breezy with scattered showers and stray thunderstorms. Winds becoming SE at 12-20 knots with higher gusts.

SUNDAY

Partly to mostly sunny with isolated showers. Winds becoming NE-E at 12-18 knots with occasional higher gusts.

MONDAY

Most sunny with isolated showers. Wind NE-E at 13-19 knots with occasional higher gusts.

NEXT WEEK

Some increase in cloudiness and showers Tuesday with brisk northeast to east trades.

As ITCZ lifts north, increased chance for showers Wednesday and Thursday while winds stay breezy from the northeast to east.

HOW OUR NEWSPAPER GOT ITS NAME

The shoulder sleeve insignia of the 7th Infantry Division consists of two black, equilateral triangles placed vertically on a red circular disc giving it an hourglass shape. The hourglass of the insignia was consequently used in the title of the island newspaper, The Kwajalein Hourglass.

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
