EAMWORK AT KWAJALEIN POWER PLANT

A successful mechanical repair after seeking a second opinion is common enough at an automotive repair shopbut how about at a 30-year-old power plant?

Technical experts at the Kwajalein Power Plant on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll have repaired the alternator for a disused plant engine—a move which extends the life of the historic US-AG-KA asset for mission support.

Maintained by multiple contract entities over the years, the engine's large AC alternator last functioned in August 2015. The engine sat disused for six years.

The situation intrigued incoming Se-

nior Utilities Manager Samu Laszlo, who recently began work on the garrison. For years, Laszlo has supported operations at power facilities in locations like Afghanistan. He began to investigate the initial assessment.

"I asked 'why," said Laszlo, "and I kept asking 'why' to try and ascertain the reason.

Why not inspect the condemned components again?

Laszlo shared his impulse with Lead Electrical Engineer Volker Jaenke. Next, Lead Electrician Claude Thomas led the replacement of the two main bearings on the engine alternator and performed the necessary alternator winding and insulations tests.

"These tests proved acceptable," Laszlo said.

The team obtained Army permission to test the machine and its newly refurbished components. Now with multiple tests at and above load capacity, the engine has so far continued to perform.

What began with a question led to an unlikely and welcomed success.

USAG-KA Directorate of Public Works Energy Manager Robert Sholar congratulated team members and specially recognized Thomas for the bearings' replacement.

"The repair of this 30-year-old alternator in recent months is a major and unexpected achievement," Sholar said.

USAG-KA KWAJALEIN TOWN HALL

At the end of an eventful second quarter on U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein Atoll, USAG-KA Commander Col. Tom Pugsley opened the Dec. 9 Kwajalein town hall with an invitation for continued communication between the community and his support staff of Department of the Army civilian employees.

"I hope you don't believe this is the only opportunity you have to present an issue or a good idea," Pugsley said. He and Command Sgt. Maj. Ismael Ortega maintain an open-door policy for all community members and encourage an open dialogue to share suggestions and innovative ideas.

In his opening remarks, Pugsley provided an overview of current garrison works in progress and a vision of the way forward for vaccinations, changes in quarantine procedures and the impending contract transition for base operations support.

The Command Update

In the second year of the pandemic, despite logistical and transit challenges, mission support continues uninterrupted, said Pugsley. He commended the community for an excellent job facing adversity to "provide that critical support to the nation in support of U.S. national defense."

"We remain fully mission capable, and a lot of that is due to the people here," he said. "I do applaud you all for that."

Vaccination Clinics on Kwajalein

The Kwajalein Hospital is now distributing initial vaccines and booster shots for the Pfizer COVID-19 vaccine on an appointment basis. Those interested are encouraged to reach out to USAG-KA

Health Systems Specialist Suzanne Mosier to schedule their appointments. Email Mosier at suzanne.m.mosier.civ@army.mil.

Children aged 5 to 11 years are eligible to receive their vaccine. A first tranche of 36 island children has received their shots, said Pugsley.

Scheduling vaccines can be tough for those traveling over the holidays, based on the limitations of the scheduling process.

cess.

"We have to have the exact number of people there for the first and second dose," Pugsley said.

January Quarantine Reductions

After two months of negotiations with the Republic of the Marshall Islands government regarding quarantine procedures for incoming atoll residents, Pugsley shared an update.

"I just signed a memorandum of understanding with the government of the RMI to get a further reduction of quarantine in Hawaii from seven days down to three days," he said. "This is a step in the right direction. They do understand—and our medical staff understands—that quarantine-free travel is not recommended by anybody."

The MOU comes during a period of increased global concern about the impact of the omicron variant. In the interests of safety, both negotiating parties agreed to the new quarantine timeline after also exploring the possible application of applying a 24-hour test result mandate for all travelers. Because of the difficulty in obtaining such test results at a distance, Pugsley said, that issue will not be explored further at this time. The reduced quarantine time is expected to begin in January.

"We've been very successful in catch-

"My promise to you is we'll take diligent notes. We'll provide immediate, next-week feedback, and next month, we'll provide where we are and a resolution on issues. I can't promise you'll get the response you want, but you will receive a response," said Pugsley at this month's Kwajalein town hall. "Feedback is the most important element of communication."

ing COVID in Hawaii and not here. We're continuing to make progress. ... The [RMI government] will continue to look at reducing quarantine further on Kwajalein with an intermediate goal of 10 days. That's a big change. Going from 14 days down to 10 days will be a significant step in the right direction. That's our next step. We're pretty excited about that."

Looking ahead, Pugsley encouraged all USAG-KA residents to receive the shot, as he believed a vaccine requirement for DOD contractors was imminent.

"It's going to come," he said. "When it comes, I do not know."

COVID-19 has also impacted available space-available travel for government employees. Pugsley extends his continued thanks to Lt. Gen. Daniel Karbler, U.S. Space and Missile Defense Command, and Craig Deatrick, IMCOM-PACIFIC director, for their support in assisting a request to return some portion of space-A authorization approval to the garrison commander.

Planning Ahead for 2022

The commander provided updates on several garrison projects designed to improve overall infrastructure and quality of life for USAG-KA residents with the completion of the Annual Work Plan, an initiative of all planned, funded projects coordinated with support from tenant organizations.

"We have 90-something projects in which we're getting at critical infrastructure and quality of life on Kwajalein and Roi, and a few projects on some of the other defense sites," said Pugsley. "It took months of planning and work with Amentum and the Department of Public Works to focus on those high-priority issues that affect day to day life."

While the plan is complete, funding the many projects poses an ongoing challenge.

"As you all know, with a \$2.6 billion-dollar price tag to get this installation to standard, I only get \$90 million

per year to fix it," Pugsley said. "If you look at the degradation rate we have on the installation infrastructure here, it's the most corrosive environment in the DOD. Our deterioration rate is bigger than our investment rate. Luckily, we're getting some significant consideration and advocates from Congress. For this year's budget, we actually got a bumpup in our budget which allows us to put more money into Facilities Sustainment, Restoration and Modernization program project funds. We're also getting some good consideration for our DOD mulitary construction projects—Bucholz Army Airfield, Dyess Army Airfield and the air traffic control tower. We're looking at renovations this year for the dining facility, Roi Café and a renovation for Surfway."

Base Operations Support Transition

"Amentum-DI is moving out in the next six months, and Vectrus is coming in," Pugsley said. "Hopefully, the transition will be fairly transparent. It is going to be a significant emotional event for my team and the contractors. There are a lot of moving pieces. We just ask you to be flexible and understanding. We're going to try to not interrupt service delivery. We'll try to make sure we communicate that to the community. There will be a big influx of personnel coming out to the island as we work through this transition between now and June."

The Community Activities Survey

Pugsley thanked the community for its participation in the first Community Activities Survey.

"There were a lot of things that I did not expect," he said. "You caught MWR by surprise. We did pretty good."

Pugsley said that more than 20 percent of the community had reported in with ideas for how to improve or augment community enjoyment at island facilities and recreational spaces and events.

"Thank you for the input," Pugsley said. "It was well-received. We'll do our best to use that as we look forward to a more responsive MWR in the future. There's a lot of stuff I am looking forward to supporting."

FROM THE LAST TOWN HALL Phones in Bachelor Quarters

There is now at least one working emergency phone in each bachelor quarters building. Phones are located near exit doors.

Any issues related to emergency phones or phones in bachelor quarters should be directed to the USAG-KA command team.

Supply Stock at Self-Help

The island's home repair supply is consistently depleted of much-needed, popular items, like gardening equipment and paint.

"We're working to make sure it's more responsive to the community's needs, that it's providing the stuff you need," said Pugsley.

Bachelor Quarters Furnishings

More money has been allotted to refresh bachelor quarters furniture on a two-year and five-year cycle, respectively. Bedframes have been financed for this year. Next year, funding for ancillary furniture is tentatively planned.

The plan to replenish oudated furniture items for bachelor quarters will support the longterm Army misison and ensure the island workforce has access to basic items to improve their quality of life, said Pugsley.

"The earlier system for lifecycle management was not very sustainable," said Pugsley.

Sign Up For 2022 Optical and Veterinary Appointments Now

An Optometrist and Veterinarian are expected to visit in February, said Hospital Deputy Administrator Shana Darrah. Community members are encouraged to sign up now to express their interest in a future scheduled appointment.

Phonebooks

Currently, the Command team and support staff are working to create an island-wide phonebook with both commercial and residential listings for the community. The last phonebook of this type was produced in 2018.

"We are making some headway on

it," said Pugsley. "We have most of the commercial piece done. We are verifying the residential piece. We are doing some other things with the phone book as well. We'll be trying to make it usable through the Digital Garrison app. We're trying to provide more opportunities to use it. We will be providing a digital document for sure."

COMMAND EXPECTATIONS FOR COMMUNITY CONDUCT

Pugsley encouraged the island community to look out for each other.

"We're a small family," he said, of the garrison. "Some people refer to the island as a fishbowl. For the most part, we have a good relationship with each other. If you see something, say something."

Continuing to practice good neighbor behaviors can help the garrison mitigate unwanted activity and problematic decorum issues that have no place on an Army installation, Pugsley said: "Believe it or not, we still have issues with sexual harassment on island. More than zero cases is a concern."

Community members are encouraged to actively work to foster and maintain a friendly, safe atmosphere.

"Look out for your buddies," said Pugsley. "Look out for your team members ... If you look at all the incidents we have on island—and I see them all—most all of them have some basis in alcohol. This goes from sexual harassment to arguments."

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

During the commander's question and answer session, community members discussed topics of interest. Below are some of the items shared during the town hall.

- Incoming residents who are vaccinated will be granted three-day Honolulu quarantine in January. Those who are not vaccinated will still reside in Hawaii quarantine for 14 days.
- The limited access to United Airlines travel will be reserved for active duty military and Department of the Army civilians only until further notice.
- Shipping times for mail are impacting timely delivery of prescription medication for island residents.
- Shipping delays have impacted the supply of dairy products in Kwajalein's Surfway grocery store.
- In celebration of New Year's Eve, the garrison will host a fireworks display at Emon Beach at 10 p.m. during the Dec. 31 MWR New Year's Eve celebration.
- Restoration of Emon Beach areas and the older beach pavilions is being addressed.
- Community members raised questions about the AFN roller channel and additional solutions to staying informed on Kwajalein.


In closing, parents and friends in the audience joined the student musicians for a tradition that began last year—the singing of the school's anthem, "We're George Seitz."



How does this impact you? If you are traveling to the U.S., you must come to the Kwajalein Hospital during the week prior to departure day for your COVID test and to schedule your weekend swab.



Q) What is the status on the Pfizer Covid-19 vaccines on the island? Who is eligible to get the vaccine?

Children aged 5 to 11 years old are eligible to receive the pediatric vaccine. Currently all doses on Kwajalein are reserved, but there is a waiting list for the next shipment.

Children aged 12 and older are eligible to receive the initial vaccine. Appointments are scheduled in blocks of six people. Register now to claim your place on the waiting list for the vaccine.

Those aged 16 and older are eligible to receive the Pfizer booster shot. Scheduling is ongoing.

MAILING RESTRICTIONS ON E-CIGARETTES, SIMILAR DEVICES

The United States Postal Service has posted its final ruling on part 47 of Publication 52, Hazardous, Restricted and Perishable Mail. The rule implements new restrictions on mailing Electronic Nicotine Delivery Systems, or ENDS, including their liquids, parts, components and accessories.

ENDS devices include any device that delivers a substance—not just nicotine—via an aerosolized solution to users inhaling from the device. These include electronic cigarettes, e-hookahs or vape pens.

All such items are prohibited in inbound and outbound international mail effective immediately. This includes mail to and from overseas military and diplomatic addresses. For more information, visit the USPS Postal Pro online at https://postalpro.usps.com/node/10267.



Only yourself or registered members of your immediate island household may check and withdraw mail from your mailbox. Please do not give out the combination to anyone not authorized to collect your mail.

Registered APO holders on Kwajalein may elect to have an individual collect packages and letter mail during the APO box holder's extended travel. If this convenience is desired, APO box holders should visit the post office to arrange for temporary authorization for mail pickup.



UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch. You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO; and
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 5-1433. You can also call CPS at 5-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- **Size of the UXO** as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

For a detailed refresher on UXO safety, attend the new island orientation or call Kwajalein EOD at 5-1433.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

Predominately dry weather will continue, courtesy of high pressure north of the Marshall Islands, and sinking air at higher altitudes. Just a few passing showers can be expected from time to time, with below normal rainfall accumulation expected over the next several days.

Winds will be breezy from the northeast to east and will begin to slacken later Monday or Tuesday as high pressure is replaced by low pressure north of the Marshalls.


The slackening trend in winds will continue well into next week. Slightly better chances for rainfall could be seen around the middle of next week, mainly for southern Kwajalein Atoll.

SUNDAY and MONDAY: Mostly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-E at 14-19 knots with occasional higher gusts.

NEXT WEEK: Slackening northeast to east trades. Slight to moderate increase in clouds along with a few more showers possible around midweek, especially for southern Kwajalein Atoll.


