ISLAND MEMORIAL CHAPEL HONORS UKRAINE WITH CANDLELIGHT VIGIL

A cool evening breeze swept through the Island Memorial Chapel March 6, as young children, teens and adults gathered in the pews for the monthly evening “Prayer and Praise” worship service. Some bowed their heads, and others stood with uplifted hands. They all raised candles to honor the citizens of a faraway country.

Creating an occasion to honor the people of Ukraine affected by the current conflict in Europe was timely and needed, said Protestant Ch. Brian Conner.

“It was on everyone’s hearts Sunday morning,” said Conner, who leads early and mid-morning interdenominational services. “We got out the candles we use during holiday worship services. Everyone received one when they came in.”

Themed throughout the year, “Prayer and Praise” nights offer the opportunity for self-led praise and worship through music. Attendees whose work schedules compete with Sunday mornings can join the evening event to reflect and connect. Anyone is welcome, and the event is free.

As is tradition, Conner invited attendees to the altar to receive a slip of paper bearing an anonymous prayer request to pray over. On Kwajalein, the practice builds community and con-

nects hope and hopelessness through a tiny slip of paper.

“We started with candles right away, and kept the people of Ukraine in our thoughts,” said IMC Administrative Assistant Julie Makovec, who prepares each praise night’s song selections. This month’s music was drawn from a recent Youth Fellowship retreat on Roi-Namur.

As the anthemic “10,000 Reasons” played, some closed their eyes and others stood, and sent their prayers out to the Kwajalein community, and further, to Europe.

The psychological effects of war can be felt miles away even in the isolation of the Pacific. So, too, can the desire to provide witness, to take action and aid those in need to let them know they are not forgotten.

Congregant Gayle Hill had attended Protestant services at the chapel that morning and invited community members throughout the day before returning to IMC for the nighttime vigil. Being part of a body of people who wanted to help was, in turn, helpful for her, she said.

“We were all going to be there,” Hill said, of the usual nighttime service plan, “and we decided to do something different. We wanted to lift up Ukraine in prayer.”

ROAD SAFETY COMES FIRST AT STUDENT BIKE RODEO

Surrounded by classmates at George Seitz Elementary School during a recent visit, Kwajalein Police Department Lt. Shawn Delaney answered serious questions from a student in the second-grade class: How do we show others which way we are going?

Kwajalein's youngest commuters are children on bicycles, and they have much to learn. As they become familiar with basic bicycling skills, they must also learn how to stay safe and avoid injury while sharing the road with carts, adult cyclists and large vehicles. Luckily, there are experts on the island to assist them.

"Let's all practice signaling together," said Delaney. Together, the class stood, and the officer showed them how to indicate to vehicles and others sharing the road which way they intended to go with arm signals.

"You are doing a great job," Delaney said. "That's how you let everyone know where you're headed."

Delaney's visit was part of the annual Bike Rodeo held Feb. 23. KPD officers and community volunteers led Kwaj students in grades through the annual road safety and skills workshop to introduce the young island residents to the rules of the road, basic turning signals and avoiding hazards in a path of travel. After completing each checkpoint, students earned stickers for good work. Following completion of the course, classes visited with KFD personnel and checked out a fire truck.

Like several of the students, this wasn't Delaney's first Bike Rodeo. Reviewing road safety concepts is important for young people, and Delaney is happy to help. The workshop will help prepare them for years of safer travel, he said.

"I enjoy helping the kids learn about road safety and how to use hand signals in traffic," said Delaney. "Then, for them to go practice those skills."

Among their activities on the course, students signaled right and left turns, moved through an obstacle course marked by colored traffic cones, and watched for pedestrians and other vehicles at a crosswalk.

"One of the things we are working on is road safety for several students for whom riding a bike is a new experience," said KSS counselor Dr. Lauren

Wallach. "It can be a lot, but it's important."

For new bike riders, it helps to see their school-aged peers along the course offering them encouragement and reinforcing good skills.

"I really enjoy getting to help the kids learn more about road safety," said Joey Aragon, who provided stickers at a roadside checkpoint. Together with fellow volunteer Noah DiBiase, Aragon reminded students to make a full and complete stop at their station—a neighborhood stop sign. Wearing big smiles, the young bikers traveled up the street to give Sparky the Fire Pup a high five.

In time, and with practice, students will learn to avoid road hazards. Defensive driving is key to protecting everyone in a community, said KPD Chief Charles Goodson.

"The more they understand, the safer we can all be on the road," Goodson said.

ART ROCKS: KWAJ GIRL SCOUT TO BEGIN PAINTING WORKSHOPS FOR MENTAL HEALTH

Kwajalein resident Kendal Warren has invited U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll to join her mission.

Warren delivered her call to action in a briefing March 3 to USAG-KA Commander Col. Tom Pugsley, members of the garrison Command team and a panel of community experts prepared to support her endeavor—a Girl Scout Gold Award project proposal to utilize free arts workshops to reduce stress and address mental health through a communal painting project.

“I was nervous,” Warren said, of giving the briefing,” but this project is really going to help Kwaj.”

The entire community is encouraged to participate in this free initiative. Using donated river rocks from Nan, Inc., community members can volunteer to decorate a rock. Completed works will be displayed in a wooden bin to be installed outside the Kwajalein Art Annex, said Warren’s father, Darin. While painting, artists can check out resources on mental health and enjoy the chance to create a small work of art.

In the coming weeks, with KAG support, Warren will chronicle her progress and the finished rocks on a project website. The site will also advertise upcoming workshop locations. Students enrolled in kindergarten through sixth grade will attend workshops at the art studio classroom of Jane Christy, project advisor and George Seitz Elementary School art teacher. Teens and adults will attend workshops at the Art Annex.

When the capstone project is completed, Warren will earn the highest GSA program honors available to Senior and Ambassador Girl Scouts. Her endeavor is supported by the Kwajalein Art Guild; Nan, Inc.; the Employee Assistance Program; the Warren family; and the Kwajalein Hourglass.

The project will offer the Kwajalein community a creative outlet and opportunities to relax. So, while island residents can help Warren with the project, the project may help them, too.



“We are really isolated out here in the Pacific Ocean, and a lot of us haven’t seen our families in the states in a long time,” Warren told Pugsley during her briefing. “That can be very frustrating. Some people are struggling, and no one even sees it. I’m hoping my project will reduce or prevent stress and depression.”

Warren, who said she has studied art for all 12 years of public education, finds that in addition to mental health, the challenging pace of life can pose obstacles for adults and children alike. Battling “island fatigue” or stress is one of Warren’s main goals. The solution: Create.

“Art is a great way to relax,” Warren said. “I’m hoping it will help other people too. ... Lately, people are very disconnected from society because of technology and social media. Even I feel like I get sucked into that. I’m hoping this will be a way to help people reconnect.”

Nan, Inc.’s contribution of 50-pound bags of river rocks provides an abundance of resources. Interest in the project is likely to grow as word spreads.

What if not all the rocks fit into the planned display frame?

Pugsley encouraged Warren to consider inviting painters to locate additional places to place painted rocks a surprise for anyone taking a stroll.

“I know whenever me and my family find something like that, it always brightens our day,” Pugsley said.

“You have given this idea a lot of consideration and thought, and I approve this project,” Pugsley told Warren. “We look forward to how this project can benefit the island community.”

SURFWAY MURAL SHOWCASES CREATIVE TEAMWORK

The Surfway entryway has a new piece of original art, thanks to students from the Namo Weto Youth Center.

Over the past months, students enrolled in U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Child and Youth Services spent Thursday afternoons working together to decorate the store wall with a large, original brand designed by island resident Gabby Africano. Working in shifts with guidance from USAG-KA Child and Youth Services Lead Rachel Raczynski and permission from Surfway, the team prepared the painting surface, blocking in layers of color and fine details over several weeks. Painting supplies were donated by the garrison community.

In the painting, a surfer girded by palm fronds surfs on a multicolored wave. His eyes are closed, and he wears a quiet smile. The finished product has received numerous compliments from island residents, including Surfway personnel.

“I absolutely love the way the mural turned out,” Surfway General Manager Shalva Forsmann said. “It’s better than I expected and so colorful. ... Kids came back week after week and some even came in between painting sessions to sand down one of the walls to prepare it for more painting.”

In working on the project, students who had never painted learned a new skill. Some, like ninth-grader Anne Marie Zink and seventh-grader Ellie Miller put their love of art, concept design and drawing to work. Miller enjoyed painting in teams and watching the finished image emerge. The Surfway mural is the largest art piece they have ever worked on, the students said. They described a challenged faced by the need to match colors each week.

“We did half of [one section,], and then we couldn’t find the same color,” Miller said. “I think someone had mixed it.”

Luckily, Anne Marie Zink decided mixing color would be a major part of her contribution to the mural.

“I was trying to go for a more realistic tone, for the surfer,” said Zink. “All

of the colors [we had] were very bright, and not really what I was going for. So, I used my understanding of color theory to dull the colors. If you look at a color wheel, you see green. On the opposite end is red. I mixed in red, and it helped a lot.”

Gabby Africano, who submitted the final design for the project, said she enjoyed seeing her small sketch become larger than life after it was transferred to the Surfway wall. Rendering the surfer’s hands and the board were two of the toughest parts of creating her piece. She plans to sketch people more often in preparation for future projects and has plans to produce a comic book.

“Art is a talent I’ve had for a long time,” Africano said. “It helps me put down what’s in my mind.”

Seventh-grader Matthew Walter spent time painting, and sanding and preparing the painting surface. He said the level of interest and participation in the project was unique.

“One day, we had 15 students there to help,” Walter said. “It also wasn’t just elementary school or high school students.

Every single homeschooler came to participate.”

Though he has a busy schedule, and is currently in two sports, Walter said he would welcome the chance to paint again, as would his peers.

“I would argue that a lot of students would come out and help, no matter what their schedules are like,” Walter said.

So far, the students’ work is complete—until the next mural.

Africano is looking forward to the next opportunity to create and would welcome another chance to create public art, to animate or to draw.

“Anything related to art or making art for people that help us every day,” Africano said. “People who work at the Food Court, cashiers, police officers and firefighters.”

Thanks to the island’s young artists, shoppers at Surfway can enjoy the original art piece for years to come.

“They are all so talented,” said Forsmann. “Hopefully this mural gets to shine on for many years. Thank you, kiddos, for your gift. I thank you, and Surfway thanks you.”

REMEMBER THE MARSHALLESE SCOUTS

KWAJALEIN HOURGLASS HISTORY

HOURGLASS REPORT

Hideo Milne, former marine and recreation superintendent at U.S. Army garrison-Kwajalein Atoll (called USAKA in the 1990s), was just a baby when the Americans came to the Marshall Islands during World War II. Although he doesn't remember those days, he has cherished recollections about historic events of the era from his relatives who were interpreters and scouts for the Americans during the war. He recalls how the uncles were recruited and worked.

After the invasion of Kwajalein, U.S. servicemen came to Ebon, where Hideo's family lived. There were very few Japanese living on Ebon at that time, says Hideo. The Japanese fired upon the Americans and were subsequently killed.

Afraid, the Marshallese on Ebon approached the Americans with a flag of truce. The Soldiers asked for Hideo's uncles: Edward, James M., James K. and Walter Milne, all grandsons of a Scottish whaling captain and a Gilbertese woman. The Americans knew the men spoke English and wanted them to translate and reassure the Marshallese that they would not be killed.

Hideo's uncles boarded a landing ship tank (LST) vessel where they joined up with Dwight Heine, grandson of the missionary Carl Heine, and several other Marshallese men who had been picked up by the Americans on other islands. They all went to Kwajalein and worked as interpreters and scouts for the American forces.

The scouts helped with the "mop up" or securing of the islands and atolls that were not heavily fortified by the Japa-

nese. They went ashore at night to check on the Japanese and explain to the Marshallese that the Americans would not hurt them.

Edward also told Hideo that the Marshallese were afraid of him at first. Marshallese people in those days, he explained, did not travel to other islands, and Edward with his light skin and bald head, did not appear to be Marshallese.

The Marshallese were fearful of the Japanese who had confiscated food and severely punished them if they didn't cooperate. The Japanese also told the Marshallese that the Americans would kill everyone.

The Americans bypassed fortified bases on Jaluit, Maloelap, Mili and Wotje atolls. Although they didn't invade, U.S. forces harassed those bases daily with bullets and bombs.

Edward and other scouts went on reconnaissance missions on those atolls

to report on the condition of the Marshallese and Japanese there. When he was on Maloelap, Edward learned that his brother Alex was imprisoned at the camp on Taroa, Maloelap.

Alex had disappeared after some American pilots had been shot down. When the Japanese came to get him to interpret, he was out gathering breadfruit. Suspecting he was trying to help the pilots, the Japanese took him away from his family. They never saw him again.

Visiting Maloelap in the 1950s, Hideo found a grave bearing Alex's name. The Marshallese at Taroa said he'd been beheaded.

Hideo's uncles are gone, and with them, important information about a significant time.

"They rarely talked about that time," says Hideo. "And only when I asked. I'm glad I asked about that time of their lives, but I wish I had asked more."

The Draft DEP for the continued activity of the Protection of Cultural Resources provides the guidelines for Cultural Resource protection during ongoing operations, maintenance, construction, and mission activities at the U.S. Army Garrison – Kwajalein Atoll. This document focuses on guidelines for Cultural Resource consultation procedures.

The public is invited to review and comment on the Draft DEP. The Draft DEP and the UES are available for review at the Grace Sherwood Library, the Roi-Namur Library, and the RMI Environmental Protection Authority (RMIEPA) offices on Ebeye and Majuro.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

Typical dry season conditions will close out the work-week on Saturday, with more unsettled weather on the way as the Intertropical Convergence Zone pushes north.

A series of disturbances within the ITCZ will bring increased cloud and shower coverage through the week-end and into early next week. We will see stronger, gustier winds on Sunday with a robust subtropical ridge to our north while low pressure builds to our south.

At the same time, increasing low-level convergence and moisture across the region will bring significant cloud cover and more widespread shower activity, which may be heavy at times Sunday night.

A stray thunderstorm or two may even be possible. Winds should ease up on Monday, although unsettled weather will continue with another round of heavier showers possible through Monday night.

Periods of heavier rain may continue through the early part of next week, with a return to drier conditions

around mid-week, followed by another period of unsettled weather by next week-end. Overall, next week looks to be trending towards wetter conditions, with breaks of drier weather in between.

SATURDAY

Partly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-ENE at 15-20 knots with occasional higher gusts, especially near showers. Increasing cloud and shower coverage Saturday night.

SUNDAY AND MONDAY

Mostly cloudy with isolated showers, increasing up to numerous showers at times in the evening and overnight hours with a stray thunderstorm possible. Showers may be heavy at times. Winds NE-E at 16-22 knots on Sunday, decreasing to 14-19 knots on Monday. Frequent higher gusts, especially near showers.

Next Week: Winds NE-E at 15-20 kts with increased moisture and cloud cover during the early and later parts of the week, with a stretch of drier conditions around mid-week. Periods of heavy rain will be more likely early and late in the week.

THE THREE R'S OF UXO

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch. You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- **Recognize** an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- **Retreat** from the area of the UXO; and
- **Report** suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 5-1433. You can also call CPS at 5-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- **Location.** Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- **Size of the UXO** as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

UXO AWARENESS AND SAFETY CLASSES

Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal will be conducting monthly UXO hazard awareness classes on the first Wednesday of every month. Classes will not meet on holidays.

This class is a 30-minute new hire and refresher UXO class explaining specific dangers on Kwajalein. Meetings are scheduled for the first Wednesday at each month at 1 p.m. in Building 1025.
