

KICKOFF TO SAAPM MONTH BEGINS WITH PROCLAMATION, TOURNAMENT

Members of the U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Command team met at USAG-KA command headquarters April 2 for the signing of a proclamation in honor of the Army’s April observance for Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month.

“I appreciate you all being here to witness the signing of this proclamation today,” said USAG-KA Commander Col. Tom Pugsley to those gathered. “On US-AG-KA, we take harassment and assault issues seriously, and we value the opportunity to help foster and create a safe environment for the entire garrison community.”

The signing kicks off a month-long series of SAAPM events for the community coordinated with assistance from US-AG-KA Sexual Harassment/Assault Response and Prevention advocate Sgt. 1st Class Effie Banks.

On April 6, USAG-KA personnel competed against U.S. Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Three, Detail Marshall Islands, in a friendly game of kickball.

In the weeks to follow, the community can meet with Army and Navy SHARP advocates for information and educational training opportunities at an AAFES SHARP tent. Banks will also deliver a special presentation for students at Kwajalein High School.

The community is also invited to dine at the Zamperini Cafeteria on April 20. The awareness themed “Teal Meal” will include a cake-cutting ceremony. Regular meal rates will apply.

Assault and harassment have no place in the Department of Defense, said Banks. Through teamwork, community education and an active commitment to change, the Army family can create a safe and welcoming environment for active-duty and civilian personnel in which mission support can continue uninterrupted.

“Anyone, anytime, anywhere can be targeted by sexual assault and harassment,” said Banks. “We in the Marshall Islands have a dynamic community. It is our goal to involve everyone in the solution for sexual violence and to support and protect those who have been victims.”

Banks encourages the community to take an active role in providing a supportive environment, and to watch for

troubling behavior that could lead to a SHARP incident.

One SHARP motto is a phrase that USAG-KA takes to heart, Banks said.

“The USAG-KA command team and the SHARP program fully support the statement ‘I am,’ which means ‘Intervene, Act, Motivate.’ ... It takes 45 seconds to intervene in an incident that could otherwise result in a lifetime of pain.”

CLIMATE ACTIVITIST POET KATHY JETÑIL-KIJINER VISITS EBEYE, KWAJALEIN

Internationally acclaimed Marshallese climate change activist, poet and performance artist Kathy Jetñil-Kijiner made a recent visit to communities on Ebeye and Kwajalein to share her creative work, meet with students and deliver school writing workshops.

Jetñil-Kijiner is known throughout the world for her powerful spoken word poetry. Her work intermingles the urgent call for global action to halt climate change with ruminations on the challenges posed to Marshallese citizens and culture by discrimination and the U.S. nuclear testing legacy.

In 2014, Jetñil-Kijiner delivered “Dear Matafele Peinem,” a poem to her daughter, at the 2014 United Nations Climate Summit. In recent years, she has partnered with video artists and fellow writers to produce numerous creative pieces to accompany her work, traveling to remote locations such as Greenland and the Runit Dome, located on Enewetak Atoll.

In her presentations on Kwajalein, Jetñil-Kijiner shared the poem “Rise,” a video filmed with Greenland’s Aka Niviâna for 350.org. The piece interlinks the lives of women facing climate change with references to customs and legends. The poets are portrayed as sisters from distant islands exchanging symbolic gifts from their homes—the rocks of Greenland for shells carried from Bikini Atoll and Runit Dome.

“We have a custom in the Marshall Islands where, if you visit someone’s island, you don’t show up empty-handed,” Jetñil-Kijiner said in her address to Kwajalein High School Students, about “Rise.” “So, in the video, we are actually demonstrating that.”

A prophetic Marshallese legend of two sisters from the island of Ujae connects climate change with the desire to retain one’s own home in the poem. After learning that her sister has magically turned to stone, her sibling chooses “to be rooted by her sister’s side,” and shares her fate by choice on the edge of the reef.

“Rise” and an earlier piece, “Tell Them,” convey the shared experiences of those whose lives are impacted by climate change and the rising seas. In “Tell

Them,” Jetñil-Kijiner poses a passionate declaration: “We are nothing without our islands.”

Now a climate envoy for the RMI, Jetñil-Kijiner’s work on the RMI National Adaptation Plan is making the voices of those communities heard. She elevates the concerns and inputs of traditional leaders and Marshallese citizens into discussion informing the renewal of the Compact of Free Association between the RMI and U.S.

“There is a huge undertaking where we will be doing something called community consultations,” said Jetñil-Kijiner in an interview with The Kwajalein Hourglass. “It’s the biggest climate outreach that the national government has done so far. We’re going to get feedback from vulnerable community members—women, fishermen, weavers; sector-level agencies and college students; and we’re getting perspectives on what they’ve seen, what their thoughts are on climate change, and what adaptation pathways they’d like to see in the future. That’s going to feed into our development strategizing.”

At a Kwajalein High School assembly,

Jetñil-Kijiner shared how writing has shaped her life. As a young person, she was compelled by her parents to contribute back to her community and her people. Writing became the key to help her accomplish that goal. It would ultimately fuel her graduate-level work in Hawaii, help her reach global audiences, and later, co-found the Majuro-based non-profit organization, Jo-Jikum. The initiative connects Marshallese youth with opportunities to engage in community-focused climate change activities and education.

“It’s small, but it’s feisty,” Jetñil-Kijiner said of Jo-Jikum. “It’s difficult, as a non-profit, to stay afloat. ... We’re trying to keep turning out projects that help support our youth being involved in these issues.”

The poet credits her mother, former RMI President Hilda Heine, as her major source of inspiration. At KHS, she recalled how Heine had translated her doctoral work from her first language, Marshallese, into English. She shared her pride in her mother’s strength as an educator and leader, and fondly shared Heine’s baffled reaction after accompa-

nying her daughter to a slam poetry reading.

The U.S. Army's recent climate change strategy is "a really big turning point," Jetñil-Kijiner said. She hoped the strategic importance of Kwajalein Atoll as a U.S. missile testing site will encourage support for helping address RMI climate change issues.

"Kwajalein will be just as impacted as the outer islands," Jetñil-Kijiner said. "I think it can only be a good thing. The U.S. Army is a huge contributor to climate change."

In the days that followed her community readings and student workshops, members of the atoll community expressed their gratitude for the poet's visit. Her time on the atoll was made possible with support from Kwajalein resident Pamela Sakaio, Sonia Tagoilelagi of the International Organization for Migration and RMI Minister of Education, Sports and Training Kitlang Kabua. Additional support was provided by a Kwajalein School System planning committee and special assistance from teachers, including Christi Cardillo, Greg Vessar and Sarah Scott.

"You made an impact on these students," Sakaio wrote to Jetñil-Kijiner, of her time on Ebeye. "They were so ex-

cited and inspired to see one of their own up there on stage!"

Jetñil-Kijiner had much to say about her visit to Ebeye and the chance to work with the island's students.

"It was my first visit to Ebeye," Jetñil-Kijiner said. "I wish I could have stayed longer, to be honest. It was nice to do the tour and see the island for myself. It was cool to meet some of the students and perform for them. This kind of poetry—not all of them will like, but some

of them seemed to. That was good. I just wanted to see it. I wanted to be there, physically. I've read and heard about Ebeye so much, and how loving the community can be, and how connected they are. I was really looking forward to just being around. I'm hoping to go back again at some point."

Jetñil-Kijiner hopes the Marshallese youth she met during her visit will be encouraged to try something new to help them give back to their communities some-

day, she said.

"If you are doing something that people think is 'weird' because it's different and no one's done it yet, don't give up," she said. "You can still do it. I'm hoping that helps [and] comes through a bit—that you can study something you care about that's fun and can also find a way to give back to and help our community. ... I'm hoping to be accessible to them. I'm just another member of our community. ... I just want to be a resource for them."

Japan’s Ambassador to the Republic of the Marshall Islands Kanuzari Tanaka signed the Grant Contract for “The Project for Procurement of School Bus” for Ajeltake Elementary School, for Laura High School, Majuro Cooperative School, all in Majuro Atoll with Ms. Amity Jarom, Jimmy Kemem and Kenneth Fernando, principals of each school, respectively, March 16 at the Embassy of Japan on Majuro.

With these projects, it is expected that students in each school will secure safe and proper transportation, which will contribute to improving the educational environment for them as well as for school. With these three projects, Japan’s Grant Assistance for Grassroots Human Security Project in the Republic of the Marshall Islands has reached 158 separate projects.

HAWAII QUARANTINE TIME TO REDUCE TO 5 DAYS

Changes in travel requirements and reduced quarantine time for incoming residents to Kwajalein begin next week, according to members of the garrison command team.

“Five-day quarantine goes into effect next week,” said USAG-KA Command Sgt. Maj. Ismael Ortega in a statement to The Kwajalein Hourglass this week.

Until recently, travelers in Hawaii quarantine continuing on to Kwajalein were required to stay indoors for seven days and also test negative prior to traveling to USAG-KA. Recent changes instituted by the Republic of the Marshall Islands government will allow the travelers of incoming Tranche 98 to have the shortest Hawaii quarantine period since the RMI instituted travel restrictions in 2020.

Upon arrival to USAG-KA all residents are still required to adhere to garrison quarantine protocols and must also test negative for COVID-19 to be eligible for quarantine release.

This new five-day quarantine period will apply to all incoming travelers regardless of their vaccination status, Ortega said. Previous quarantine regulations required unvaccinated travelers to

stay indoors for additional time before being permitted to board.

“We will no longer be differentiating from vaccinated or unvaccinated in Hono,” he said. “They will both be required to only do the five-day quarantine.”

This latest reduction in quarantine time follows changes in the RMI Safe Travels program announced by the RMI

National Disaster Management Office earlier this year. Vaccinated and unvaccinated travelers entering the country had previously been required to complete seven days and 14 days of quarantine, respectively, followed by another two weeks of quarantine after arrival on USAG-KA. To date, the RMI has had zero spread of COVID-19.

U.S. ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

From Trust Territory to Nation

In the five years following World War II, the United Nations established 11 trusteeships in various areas around the globe. Seventy-five years ago this month, on April 2, 1947, the United Nations Security Council approved a Strategic Trusteeship Agreement for the former Japanese Mandated Islands.

The islands in question, identified under Article 1, are the former German islands north of the Equator to Japan which were administered by Japan per the mandate under Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations: the region now known as Micronesia.

Under Article 1, these islands were designated a Strategic Area and placed under Trusteeship per the charter of the United Nations. Under Article 2, the United States was formally designated the administrator of the Trust Territory. As such, the United States was given “full powers of administration, legislation, and jurisdiction over the Territory subject to the provisions of this Agreement” and may apply those laws of the United States “[deemed] appropriate to local conditions and requirements.”

To secure the area, the United States was authorized to fortify the islands, close off the area at any time for security reasons and forbid foreign nationals from entering the area.

The United States was to report periodically on the efforts made to help the local nationals recover and the United

Nations could send periodic inspection teams to evaluate the work undertaken.

As the districts began to vote in favor of ending trustee arrangement in the 1980s, the United States reported that its obligations had been met. The United Nations subsequently dissolved the Trusteeship in 1990.

The former Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands is now divided into four separate governing entities. The Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas has become a commonwealth of the United States.

The other three nations signed compacts of free association with the United States. These are the Federated States of Micronesia, comprised of Kosrae, Pohnpei, Chuuk, and Yap, the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the Republic of Palau.

Army Climate Change Strategies

In recent months, the Department of the Army released its first-ever climate strategy. However, the Army has been pursuing environmental programs for several decades, both on Earth and in space.

Mid-April 1994, Lt. Col. Michael R. “Rich” Clifford served as a Mission Specialist aboard STS-59, Endeavour. The subject of a Discovery Channel Special, the primary payload aboard this flight was the multinational Space Radar Laboratory-1. The SRL-1 included Spaceborne Imaging Radar-C and X-band Synthetic Aperture Radar as well as an atmospheric instrument called the Mea-

surement of Air Pollution from Satellites developed by the German Space Agency and the Italian Space Agency. The mission of the SRL-1 was to create a radar map of the Earth’s surface in order to study human-induced vs. natural environmental change (carbon, water, and energy cycles). Coordinated by the Jet Propulsion Lab, this experiment included 49 principal investigators and more than 100 scientists from 13 countries and three 19 primary observation “supersites” located in Brazil, Michigan, North Carolina and Central Europe.

Split into two teams of three astronauts, the crew was able to work around the clock and collected 133 hours of data for this experiment alone. As reported in Human Spaceflight: A Record of Achievement, “the X-band Synthetic Aperture Radar imaged more than 400 sites and covered approximately 38.5 million miles of Earth, equivalent to 20 percent of the planet.”

Clifford was a 1974 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point with a Bachelor of Science. He earned a Master of Science in Aerospace Engineering from Georgia Institute of Technology in 1982. Clifford was also a graduate of the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School and had earned the designation of experimental test pilot. STS-59 was the second of Clifford’s three space flights. Clifford retired from the Army in 1995 but continued to work with NASA and later Boeing in the space industry until 2011. Clifford passed away on Dec. 28, 2021, from complications of Parkinson’s Disease.

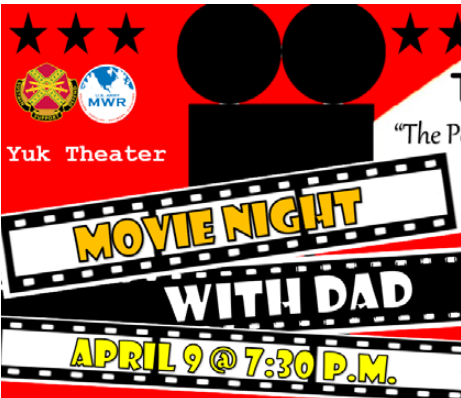

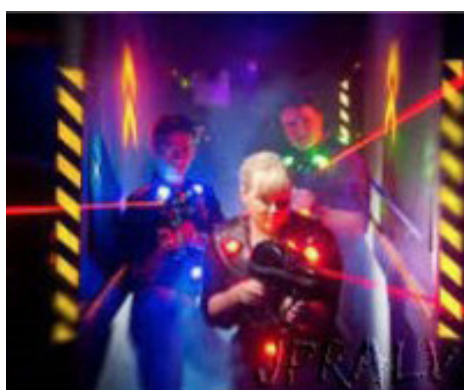

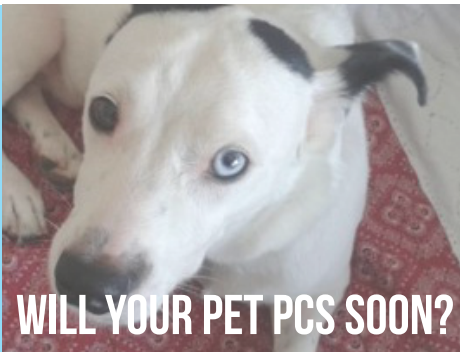

With the Intertropical Convergence Zone settling over the southern Marshall Islands, Kwajalein will see a drier pattern for the end of the workweek into the weekend. A slight increase in showers and a stray thunderstorm can't be ruled out late Monday. The subtropical ridge will maintain a steady NE-ENE breeze into early next week, with speeds generally in the mid-teens knots. For next week, the prospects for rainfall increase with a low-to mid-altitude trough lifting into our area; rainfall accumulations will be potentially heavy during the mid-week period with winds more variable in speed and direction.

Mostly sunny with stray, brief showers. Winds NE-ENE at 13-19 knots with occasional higher gusts.

Mostly to partly sunny with a slight chance of late day showers and a stray thunderstorm, especially for the south atoll. Winds NE-E at 12-18 knots with occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

Chances for rainfall increase with potential for heavy rainfall accumulations during the mid-week period. Winds starting off the week NE-E at 12-18 knots, becoming more variable in speed and direction by mid-week.

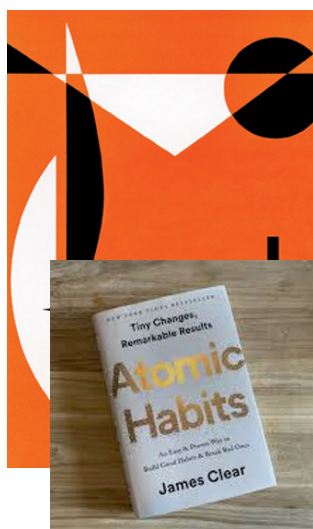
