CLASS OF 2022 TURNS TASSELS AT GRADUATION

Friends, families, students, Marshallese traditional leaders and members of the local and national governments of the Republic of the Marshall Islands gathered at the Kwajalein High School Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room for the graduation of the Class of 2022 on May 20.

This year’s highly accomplished class of 24 graduates included six Marshallese Rikatak students and many students who have lived on island for more than a decade. Several graduates are planning to pursue higher education with specific career goals and aspirations in mind. Among them, one will attend an Ivy league institution, one has enlisted in the U.S. Navy and two have accepted entry to U.S. military academies.

During the ceremony, two students with the highest grade-point averages were honored. Additionally, three students all completed the highest number of Advanced Placement courses, received the highest grades possible in every class, and have been named co-valedictorians: Jenna Gray, Eden Pope and Maddie Nienow.

In her address to the class, Jenna Gray exhorted her classmates to cherish their

memories of Kwajalein and to value their friendships and relationships in the community as they prepared to face the challenges ahead.

“How we deal with these challenges is what’s most important,” Gray said. “When encountering obstacles, I encourage each of you to never give up. Instead, stay confident in yourselves, persevere through hardships one step at a time, and ask for help when needed. As Winston Churchill once said, ‘Success is not final, failure is not fatal; it is

the courage to continue that counts.”

USAG-KA Command Sgt. Maj. Ismael Ortega and Lt. Col. David Taylor, Reagan Test Site range director took the stage to deliver each graduate their diploma, accepting a flower lei in return.

The students specially thanked their class mentors, as well as parents and faculty members who have supported and encouraged them over the years, leaving the stage to give them teary-eyed hugs and purple orchid leis. The

ceremony included many lighthearted moments—such as a full class hula performance and a slideshow of grad photos and the reading and reenactment of the class history, beginning with the kindergarten years.

“Kindergarten was a year of learning and exploration,” narrated Lima Lelet. “We learned the consequences of forgetting about Sean [Hepler] during a fire drill. We found him asleep under a table.”

Gerber said he had complete confidence in the class because the island's families had so invested in their success. He stressed that graduation was the beginning of a new journey—one in which the families and community on Kwajalein who had helped raise the students would continue to play an important role.

"Thank you so much, for what you all do to raise the kids," Gerber said. "It really takes an island. It takes great families. I am so grateful for each one of you and what you've done for these kids. They will still need your support in every way when they go from here. It will be different—they will need encouragement, instead of an alarm clock, in some cases, but you'll be there for them."

After the graduates turned tassels, they left the MP Room in much the same way they entered it on the first day of their senior year—dancing—and headed out into the courtyard to meet the loved ones and friends who had come to wish them well and to help them make their next big steps into the future.

PATIENCE AND FUN, SAYS CYS COOK

Originally from the isolated and lush island of Mejit, US-AG-KA Child and Youth Services Cook Linda Jaime grew up on Ebeye and has worked on Kwajalein since 2001 as a teacher for the island's youngest children.

These days, she splits time between the classroom and the CYS kitchen, preparing snacks for each of the age groups' programs.

Over the years, Jaime has seen the children's programs grow and change. She remembers when infant care was added to the program lineup. Her CYS training has allowed her to alternate between the classroom and the kitchen to assist in a variety of areas.

In working with children, Jaime has learned a thing or two. She became a teacher after raising her own family. While she was surprised at the new things she learned, she said it is important to keep patience and a sense of fun when working with kids.

"I'm doing snack, and I love it," Jaime said. "Every after-

noon, I serve them lunch. I stay with the kids. Some kids are good, and some are hard to work with. So, we try to do our best.

"We get them involved. We teach them new words so we can tell them what we are doing in the classroom. We smile to them, talk to them nicely—everything we must do in the classroom. If the kids come with a hard attitude, we give them a hug and see how we can get them involved in the classroom so their parents can go to work."

A typical day on the job for Jaime includes tending the CYS garden and then heading inside to wash up and check out the meals listings posted in the kitchen. Jaime may fill in for teachers as an assistant and help young kids work on learning concepts.

She has even started a Saturday tradition to help kids become excited for the weekend.

"Every Saturday, I do a crazy thing," Jaime said. "I jump up, I dance, I sing, and everybody's like 'Whoa!' So, every Saturday, they do that now."

The flags of the RMI and United States fluttered in the breeze at a humble beachside potluck May 25, as George Seitz Elementary School's sixth graders prepared to transition to junior high school.

The promotion ceremony featured a performance by the sixth-grade band, led by band directors Kyle Miller and Ashley Wright, as well as special remarks delivered by educators and KHS graduates.

Sixth-grade teachers Krissy Behrends and Misti French congratulated the students on their accomplishment and awarded each a certificate of achievement and a specially made sash featuring the colors of the RMI flag, purchased by the GSES Student Council.

KHS alumni DJ Chong-Gum and Kim O'Rourke welcomed the students to junior high school. They encouraged them to take an active role in their learning and lives.

"My piece of advice for is to choose your friends wisely and always make wise decisions," Chong-Gum said. "I hope you choose the right path." He also shared tips for developing an enjoying student life by participating in activities and leadership roles at the Namo Weto Youth Center.

"This time can be terrifying but also exciting," said O'Rourke. "I encourage you all to look forward to it. ... Take responsibility for your own ed-

ucation and your newfound independence."

Behrends shared some of her favorite memories of several students.

"I can't wait to see the activities that you get involved with, and the friends you'll make," Behrends said.

Kwajalein High School Principal Matt Gerber encouraged parents to seek out ways to best help their students prepare for the changes of the KHS schedule and class workload by finding a balance.

"If you can help your students develop really strong practices and routines for getting their homework done every night so they're ready to go the next morning, they will benefit for their entire lives," he said.

He also reminded parents that while the students are now junior high school students, they are still growing and learning. Every once in a while, it's good to "take a pulse."

"Ask them once in a while 'How are they really doing?' 'How are things going with your friends?'" Gerber said. "You need to talk about any of those social situations. They're going to need support in those ways, too."

In closing, Misti French challenged the students to maintain high expectations of themselves. "It's been a privilege to have you as a class," French said. "Never accept less than your best. Keep working just as hard as you are now. You're amazing. You're truly an amazing class. You're one of the finest classes I've ever seen."

REMEMBERING DAN ADLER

Kwajalein is known as the boomerang, the rock, paradise. You arrive on the island expecting to learn to love island time, soak up the sun, bask in the salty ocean. What ends up being surprising—although it's not to anyone who has lived there for any amount of time—is how quickly and easily you develop friendships. And even more surprising and pleasant is when those friendships grow into something more, and before you know it your family has grown. Kwaj Family—the unexpected gift from the Marshall Islands.

That was my experience on Kwajalein with the Adlers.

I was fresh out of college with a degree in Communications and someone 6,000 miles away decided to take a chance on me and hired me as the Associate Editor of the Hourglass at USAG-KA. I didn't know when I stepped off the plane on Kwajalein in 2009 and met Dan Adler, the managing editor of the Hourglass, that he would become such an important person in my life.

Dan was close to retirement age when we started working together. I had assumed at the time that he had been in the journalism business his whole life. He had in fact only worked supporting the Hourglass during his Kwaj years. He was part of the team recognized with the U.S. Army Maj. Gen. Keith L. Ware communications awards in 2000 and 2003—a significant honor that not many contractors received. He was a colorful and masterful writer. His opinion pieces were passionate, informed, and often times fiery.

He wasn't as eloquent in real life as he was on paper. When it came to his passion for life, his work, and those he cared about, he wore those emotions on his sleeve. Sometimes those emotions led to newspaper boxes being kicked around the office in a flurry or a "love tap" to a filing cabinet. It always came with a lesson.

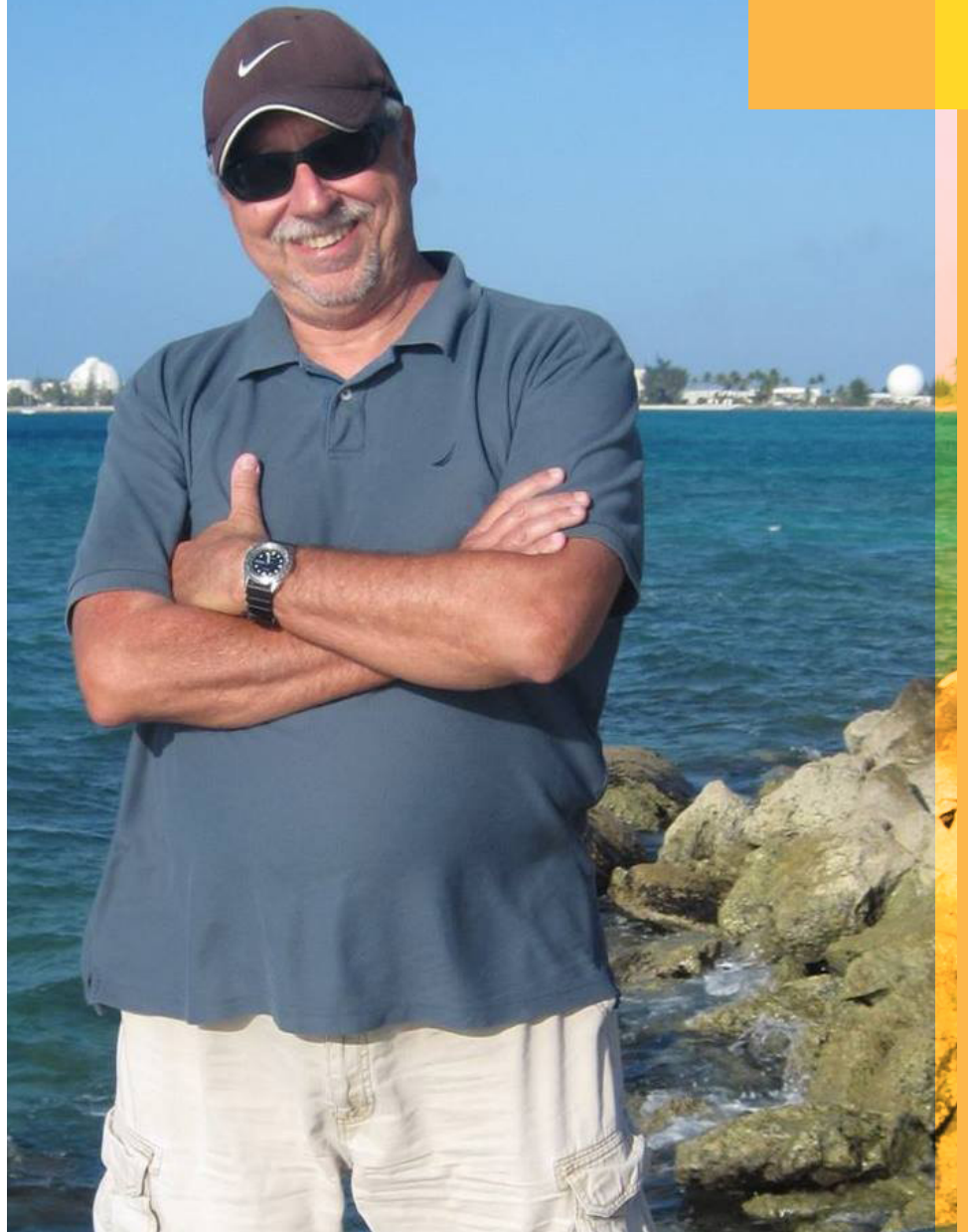
Dan shared every part of managing the media services department with me. The good, bad, and the exasperating. I was a year out of college, and he was a year away from retirement. But he always treated me as an equal and included me in everything possible so I could learn.

That's what Dan did best: teach.

Dan saw potential in me and mentored me. He spent hours showing me the intricate functions of software and how to use a DSLR camera and all the manual settings. He taught me skills that even more than a decade later I still use every day in my job.

His mentorship was felt at the high school, as well. Dan began hiring high school students to work part-time at the Hourglass, helping with the Roller announcements and parts of the paper. Each year, two lucky students got to learn from Dan. Those positions were highly coveted by the Kwaj teens. Those who spent time working with Dan at the Hourglass also went on to remain close to Dan, even after they graduated and moved stateside.

Dan was, and still is, who I consider

to be the greatest and most important mentor in my life.

We stayed close after Kwaj, visiting each other's family any time we could. He attended my wedding, and he spoiled my kids like they were his own grandchildren.

A few weeks ago, when I learned how sick Dan had become, I hopped on a plane to see him one last time. We reminisced about our Kwaj days. We talked about how Dan moved out of his office and gave it to me because I was always freezing and ran my little heater 24/7. We looked at pictures from my first ever helicopter ride on one of the old Huey's when we covered the Outer Island Christmas Drop for the Hourglass.

We recounted the boat trip with the Marine Science class when I saw whales for the first time and Dan captured the

most amazing photos. Some of my most memorable and extraordinary moments were shared with Dan on Kwajalein.

Life on Kwaj can be surprising. Like when Dan arrived on Kwaj in his jeans and cowboy boots, vowing to never give in to island wear, but just days later begrudgingly transitioned to shorts and flipflops. Like many, Dan and Carol went to Kwaj for "just two years" and stayed 17. Dan was an unexpected gift in my life.

Dan did what any of us can hope to do with our lives. He left a positive mark in this world. He was a loving husband, a caring and nurturing father to Kathleen, a reliable friend, and a wise mentor.

Luckily a piece of Dan will always live on, and those who knew him and love him can always look up old Hourglass issues between 1998 and 2010 to read and "hear" his voice again.

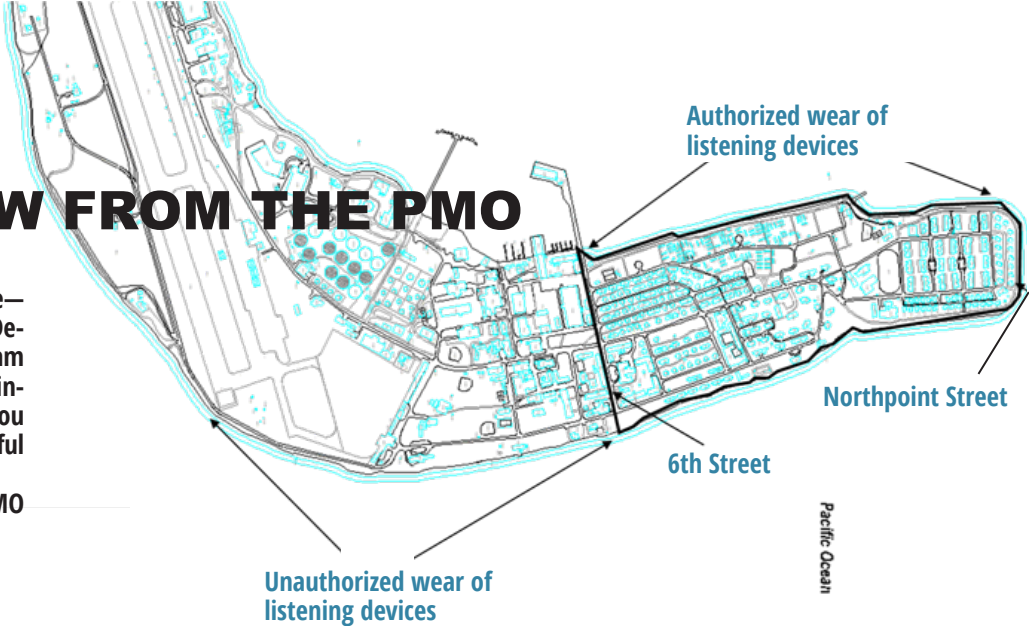

Read on for a few updates from the PMO about safety and island life.



REGULATION UPDATE

USAG-KA Regulation 56-4 Motor and Non-Motor Transportation, Vehicle Operation and Control, was signed into effect April 26. (This action rescinds USAG-KA Regulation 190-5, Motor Vehicle, Non-Motor Vehicle and Bicycle Traffic Supervision, and consolidates its contents into USAG-KA 56-4).

If you enjoy listening to music or audiobooks while walking or doing physical fitness activities around Kwajalein, this regulation applies to you.

- Wear of portable listening devices is authorized only while walking, running, jogging and cycling on USAG-KA roads between 6th Street and Northpoint Street, so long as the device is not “noise canceling.”

Wear of listening devices south of 6th Street is unauthorized.

- Bicycles and/or riders are required to operate a form of lighting in use while operating on USAG-KA roads between sunset and sunrise. Headlamps on the rider and/or flashlights affixed to the bicycle are acceptable.
- Wear of protective helmets while cycling is a Sponsor’s decision. However, helmets are required when conducting “speed training.”

About the Veterinarian

Dr. Conrath spent her first year practicing in central Illinois before returning home to the Chicagoland area where she practiced emergency medicine in addition to private day practice.

While Dr. Conrath enjoyed the fast paced, unpredictable environment of the ER, her true passion of surgery and shelter medicine was fulfilled as a veterinarian surgeon at PAWS Chicago.

During her time at PAWS, Dr. Conrath helped to control the pet overpopulation problem by performing high quality spay and neuter surgery on more than 25,000 animals. She also provided

surgical and medical care to the shelter animals on their path to finding their fur-ever homes.

In 2017, Dr. Conrath moved to Hawaii to continue her quest to help fix the pet overpopulation problem via HQHV spay and neuter through work with multiple rescues and shelters. She also works for the Army providing veterinary services to the pets of military members and has worked on projects in Kabul, Afghanistan to provide veterinary care for the explosive detection canines at the U.S. embassy. Most recently Dr. Conrath created Paws of the Pacific to start delivering veterinary services to neighboring Hawaii and Kwajalein.

Outside of the veterinary world Dr. Conrath spends her time enjoying island life on Oahu with her boyfriend Russel and their 2 dogs, Pumba and Guava. NAMING COMMISSION ANNOUNCES ARMY BASE NAME RECOMMENDATIONS

COMMUNITY CONNECTION

Washington, D.C.—The commission tasked to provide Congress new names for U.S. military bases and other Department of Defense assets originally named in commemoration of the Confederacy and its leaders announced its recommendations for nine Army installations.

The Naming Commission also reviewed Fort Belvoir, Virginia, originally named after U.S. Army Maj. Gen. Andrew A. Humphreys in 1917 and renamed in 1935 after the Colonial-era plantation that once stood on its grounds. The commissioners determined that Belvoir does not meet the criteria provided in the 2021 National Defense Authorization Act for a renaming recommendation but will recommend the Department of Defense conduct its own naming review of the post.

The Commission visited the installations last year for listening sessions with military commanders and community leaders to gain feedback on their process, preferences for new names and an understanding of local sensitivities.

Over the course of those initial sessions and a public comment period via its website that closed Dec. 1, 2021, the commission received more than 34,000 submissions related to naming activities, which included for consideration 3,670 unique names of individuals, locations, values and more. Between January and April, the Naming Commission developed a short-list of potential new names for the nine installations before re-engaging the same community groups through virtual listening sessions to gather more input on their naming preferences.

At the start of May, the commission met for extensive deliberations that resulted in the final name selections. “This was an exhaustive process that entailed hundreds of hours of research, community engagement and internal deliberations,” said retired Navy Adm. Michelle Howard, the chair of the Naming Commission. “This recommendation list includes American heroes whose stories deserve to be told and remembered; people who fought and sacrificed greatly on behalf of our nation.” Howard said she doesn’t consider the list of recommendations to be an exclusively

Commission-generated product, since “every single one of the names selected either originated from, or resonated with, the communities we engaged at the bases; and certainly, were all suggested by members of the American public at large. So, this list is as much, if not more, theirs as it is ours. And we are

within the Department of Defense that commemorate the Confederacy.

In addition, the commission is reviewing any “base, installation, street, building, facility, aircraft, ship, plane, weapon, equipment or any other property owned or controlled by the Department of Defense.”

Dear Housing Residents,
U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein will undergo an installation-wide facility inspection program between May 4 and June 11.

WHERE: USAG-KA Army Family Housing and Bachelor Quarters

WHEN: Through June 11, Tuesday through Saturday, from 8 a.m. - 5 p.m. Housing residents are not required to be home during the inspection, which could take 60 to 90 minutes.

WHY: Inspections of Army Family Housing and BQ facilities are required by HQ IMCOM to document standardization of facility conditions. Inspections will allow consistent reporting to the Army's real property database and provide analytical data for resourcing of funding.

Housing-escorted contractor teams of two to five assessors from Wood, PLC, will be required to enter your

housing unit to complete a visual inspection of building components. The contractors must access all interior and exterior spaces to take measurements and document findings.

The contractors are required to take photos of building components but will not take photos of residents or personal identifiable information such as names, photos and certificates.

A full schedule is being developed, and can be found on the next page. Please note there could be short-notice changes to the schedule. This is a mandatory inspection that helps standardize documentation of facility conditions.

Before Inspection Day
To ensure safety for your pets and our inspection team, before inspections begin, it is required that all pet owners please notify Jim Streetman via email if you have a dog and/or cat residing in your house. Some team members may be allergic to cat hair and pet dander.

All pets must be secured

before entrance into the home and remain secured until our team departs your home.

Weather Discussion

After active weather Thursday night and Friday morning, conditions have settled. Dry air in the mid-levels will work into the Kwajalein Atoll area and keep conditions predominately dry through Saturday.

A weak wave on the inter-tropical Convergence Zone will bring more unsettled weather to Kwajalein on Sunday, with scattered to possibly numerous showers expected.

Showers look to be more hit or miss on Monday, though that could change depending on how the ITCZ cycles.
