
The mid-atoll corridor will be closed from 4:01 p.m., Aug. 12 through mission completion. The caution area extends from the surface to unlimited altitude.

USAG-KA TAKES ACTION, ADAPTS TO NEW NORMAL

Developing COVID mitigation plans, physical distancing and mandated mask-wearing in facilities and vehicles are just a few of the changes in island life this week, as U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll works to contain and slow the spread of COVID-19 throughout the atoll community.

USAG-KA has followed health protection condition level Alpha Plus, Low, since an initial announcement was made Aug. 10. Custom-designed for Kwajalein's small population, the proactive readiness posture will curb community spread as confirmed cases continue to rise in the atoll community.

Island residents and badge holders are expected to abide by the HPCON level at all times. Masks must be worn in communal workspaces, Child and Youth Services facilities and schools, at all bars and clubs, and at dining facilities and retail points of sale. Masks should also be worn whenever operating or traveling in government-owned or contract-operated vehicles, planes and marine assets.

Masks are required for anyone entering Kwajalein's medical care facilities. Patrons must additionally complete a routine health screening prior to being admitted. Those who identify as immunocompromised or feel they are at high risk for severe disease are encouraged to explore solutions to work from home when possible.

The island's tenant organizations and contract partners are working to refine COVID data reporting procedures to assure minimal impacts to services.

The Kwajalein custodial team adopted stringent safety precautions last week as staff masked up while working near others. Across the island, departments and pri-

NATIONAL DOG MONTH Kwaj loves dogs. If you are a dog owner, be sure your pet receives plenty of fresh water after going for a walk. vate organizations are also exercising action plans. CYS and the Yokwe Yuk Welcome Club have postponed youth and social activities until a later date.

KSS staff are exploring plans to augment remote teaching resources. In-person classes remain in session on USAG-KA, and Marshallese Ri-Katak students can continue traveling to Kwajalein for school. The Kwajalein School System is now the only school system open on the atoll after a directive from the Republic of the Marshall Islands national government delayed RMI schools openings by two months.

As individuals and families develop new contingency plans, households are exploring how to work on Kwajalein with COVID. Two-earner couples with young children may face challenges posed by CYS closures or possible restrictions to base access for in-home, domestic workers. Bachelor quarters residents have voiced questions about how dining facility meals will be handled if a diner is too ill to collect their own to-go box.

The community will be able to learn about solutions and garrison plans in development through a new communications strategy.



Delivering guidance, general medical tips, and expectations for community conduct, Pugsley also responded to several questions submitted to the live feed chat by current and former Kwajalein residents.



THE ALOHA SHIRT

The distinctive aloha shirt is such a classic pop cultural icon that it even predates Hawaiian statehood. As you prepare for your next big potluck or beach-casual event this summer, here are some fun facts about your favorite shirts.

The origins of the aloha shirt are intriguing, and interest abounds about the shirt's original designer. Author Dale Hope interviewed Ellery Chun, of Chun Clothiers, about pre-1960s Hawaiian street fashion to learn more. Back then, a beachgoer would assuredly have encountered men wearing the predecessor of the aloha shirt as weekend-wear. Stylish Hawaiian men had a penchant for colorful Filipino bayau shirts, said Chun, and Japanese shirts made of challis, a lightweight, blended fabric.

Ultimately, researchers believe credit is due to Musa-Shiya Shoten, a Honolulu-based tailor shop. In 1935, the shop advertised its bright, custom-made shirts for less than a dollar.

Square-cut, colorful, and comfortable to wear in Hawaii's hot weather, the shirts were the garment of choice. By the following year, ads described the unique garments as "aloha shirts," and they had gained in popularity.

As commercial demand for the shirts grew, modern patterns of surfers, palm trees and boats were added to traditional floral and leaf motifs for aloha

shirt fabric. The shirts became a trademark part of the growing Hawaiian pre-WWII consumer landscape. During and after WWII, an influx of U.S. military personnel and famous visitors to Hawaii all propelled the flashy garment into an iconic fad. Hollywood director John Barrymore and American actress Shirley Temple visited Hawaii—and when they did, they stopped in at Musa-Shiya to purchase aloha shirts. By the late 1930s, the shirt industry had grown and employed more than 400 garment workers.

By the time rock star Elvis Presley had acquired his shirt nearly 30 years later, the shirt business showed no signs of slowing down.

Believe it or not, it still took an official resolution from the City and County of Honolulu to relax its 1946 rules on acceptable work attire to allow the aloha shirt to be considered business-wear for three months of the year, from July through October. By the 1970s, the aloha shirt had found a permanent place in the fashion sense of warm weather aficionados around the world all year.

Like many parts of Hawaiian popular culture, appropriation by enthusiasts and commercial interests has diffused many valuable, local traditions. The good news is the Hawaii you think you know represents only a tiny part of the Hawaii you don't know yet.

Take a moment to learn more about the Hawaiian Islands and their people. You may find you have greater basis for appreciating the history and heritage around you on your next vacation.

Thanks to Kwajalein Senior Boy Scout Myles Sylvester, Kwajalein has acquired a cool, new stand up paddleboard rack at Emon Beach made specially with bachelor quarters occupants in mind. Read on to learn more about his great idea.

Back in early May, I wanted to do something with woodworking that would help the community. Every day I rode to work, I would see paddleboards thoughtlessly left on the ground, out in the sun.

My father and I looked at different online designs until we found one that we liked. The steps I took [to build] consisted of collecting materials, cutting, sanding, drilling, bolting and assembly.

Construction began on May 26 when we gathered all of the wood and tools. We fully finished both racks on July 31. At the very end of the assembly, our team only had four people to work on the final touches on the racks

So much of the wood was donated by the Kwajalein Yacht Club and Dr. Doug Hepler, Kwajalein High School industrial arts and history teacher. The CAD drawings were made by Eagle Scout Jeff Urfer, which gave me all the dimensions for the cuts of the wood. Mark McCollum had the most guidance for my project because he had taught me a lot about drilling, bolting and painting. The most thanks I have, though, is to my father for helping me all the way through the entire project.

This rack was made for people who have no storage at their bachelor quarters. The main thing I would like to tell the community about my project is to use it at their own risk. If you store it there, someone may use your paddleboard.

Also, if you are going on a vacation, please take your board home.

"I recognize these from my Navy time, as I both operated and repaired these same covers while on a three-year tour on the USS Ashtabula (AO-51), a refueling ship."

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

HPCON A+ Low

- Normal occupancy in the workplace; telework when appropriate.
- Communicate to personnel how/when to report illness/seek care for potential influenza-like illness.
- Common areas/large venues (e.g., sit-down dining, movie theaters, gyms, and stores) increase established cleaning/sanitation protocols
- DoDEA schools will operate following CDC recommendations/guidelines specific to schools as implemented in operational procedures/guidance from the Director, DoDEA. Any DoD guidance that is more stringent than CDC guidance must be followed.

+ Maximize telework where possible, especially for individuals who self-identify as immunocompromised/at high risk for severe disease.

+ Mandatory mask wear in indoor common areas/communal workspaces, *including* schools/CDC/CYS. As well as all government-owned or contract-operated vehicles, planes and marine assets.

RICTED "GARDEN OF EDEN

A multitude of birds soar just over the treetops as you walk below the verdant green, punctuated with openings in the canopy revealing azure blue skies. The birds are at home, but you are not. Welcome to Eniwetak – a lush, 15-acre

conservation area of nesting birds and sea turtles, crabs and dense jungle, that is a protected and restricted area here in the atoll that the majority of people who live and work on Kwajalein will never see.

Designated as a conservation area by U.S. Army Garrison - Kwajalein Atoll, the islet near Meck provides an off-site option to compensate and mitigate potential impacts to sea birds, sea turtles, coral reef habitat and other protected resources resulting from mission activities at defense sites throughout the atoll. The Eniwetak Conservation Area Management Plan provides protocols for surveillance, biological monitoring, and maintenance of the ECA to provide for protection of sea turtle and sea bird nesting habitats.

RGNext's Environmental Management team of Don Swanby and Sherrie Dallas visit the ECA each month to conduct a survey of the islet's teeming population of terrestrial species, shoreline activities and monitor for human activity.

Monitoring the ECA assists in safeguarding the islands intended purpose as a conservation area," said Dallas, the Occupational Health, Safety and Environmental Manager for RGNext. "It is an important aspect of managing its delicate ecosystem."

Dallas has worked on Kwajalein since 2017, managing occupational health and environmental services in numerous industries both stateside and abroad for 30 years. Mission operations is one of the best parts of her job, and how they are a critical element of our nation's security, she said.

"I realized many years ago that I wanted to be an advocate for a safe work environment for those who were uncomfortable speaking for themselves," she said, "including my own father who as a result of exposure in the workplace experienced three separate types of cancer.

Another aspect of her job that she loves is working in paradise. "My job permits me to travel to all the islands where

we manage work," she said. "It's a great day when I can say my office for the day was on a tropical conservation/nature reserve in the middle of the ocean or from the air in a helicopter all the while contributing to local RMI/USAG-KA environmental measures and aspirations."

Dallas' office on Eniwetak is home to nesting sea turtles, a protected species here in the Marshalls. Cameras monitor the islet as the RMI government strictly forbids trespassing.

"I've witnessed turtle tracks and evidence of turtle nesting once," said Dallas. "Our cameras have captured evidence of turtle movement and haul out - when the hatchlings make their way from the nest across the beach and to the ocean. It's very exciting to see.

"It's typical to see black noddies and white fairy terns on every occasion, but now and again we observe other species that, as a nature lover, are magnificent to witness," said Dallas. "Every visit is a new adventure and we are fortunate to have insight into a place that so few have had the opportunity to experience.

"Understanding the role this island used to play in support of the Reagan Test Site is also important," she said. "We've observed remnants of the past – names of people who used to work there carved into cement blocks, and knowing that the significance of the islet's transition to a conservation area is just as important and plays an imperative role in conserving RMI ecological systems."

The monthly ECA biological monitoring excursion begins on the Patriot, Kwajalein's dive boat, together with members of Kwajalein Pest Control who take measures to minimize the effects of the invasive Yellow Crazy ant (Ano-plolepis gracilipes). "Once on shore, the team surveys the island for approximately three hours to conduct the survey on the resident Black Noddy trends, observe the presence or absence of nesting sea turtles and to track the overall species richness of the islet before the return trip to Kwajalein, she said." Some Eniwetak birds are migratory but several stay all year and make their home there, she added.

During the survey, cataloging of the nesting locations and location of popular bird "hangouts" provides an expectation to find different members of Eniwetak's feathered community, she added.

The team also observes the environ-

ment that houses the islet's terrestrial species and tabulates visible changes to the shoreline. Simple changes, however small, can mean a big impact on the ecosystem.

"The smallest impacts to the island, especially from human activity in relationship to the species that occupy it, can reduce or eliminate coconut crabs, conchs, turtles and turtle nesting populations that live, shelter or nest there, or disrupt the natural balance of the islet," said Dallas.

- Approaching or anchoring within 300 meters of Eniwetak Islet
- Accessing Eniwetak Islet without authorization
- Fishing, boating, diving, snorkel-

A STITCH IN TIME: VOLUNTEERS SEWED MASKS

When Pam Carroll arrived on Kwajalein last fall, she expected to spend the next few months meeting the neighbors. As the spouse of a U.S. Air Force Veteran, she was familiar with the process of turning an unfamiliar place into home. She could not have expected what happened next.

Pam's husband Shawn, a member of island law enforcement, returned to the United States for required training. Then, he was stranded by early COVID-19 flight restrictions. Both he and Pam awaited a date for his return flight. Weeks turned into months.

News of COVID-19 and global mask shortages reached Kwajalein, and groups of residents and sewing aficionados banded together to volunteer their time sewing masks. Pam, a skilled seamstress, saw an opportunity to help. Like many crafters and artisans who move to Kwaj, she had come prepared with fabrics, notions and a sewing machine. Pam put out a call for volunteer mask-makers to sew masks enough to cover the residents of Kwajalein and Roi-Namur. The effort started small and then grew to include more than 15 members. The volunteers called themselves the "masketeers."

'I didn't want to stand out or take any credit," said Carroll. "I just wanted to help in the effort. I was by myself, and this was something I could do to help everyone here. We didn't know what was going to happen, and I wanted us to be prepared."

The masketeers stitched face covers from scratch using a design that required multiple pieces of fabric. Carroll

estimates that after preparing materials, each mask took at least one half-hour to produce.

Pam transformed her quarters in old Navy housing into a mask-making studio.

"You should have seen my house," Pam said, of the effort. She rolled up her rug, shoved furniture to the corners, stowed her collectibles and worked.

"At one point, I know myself and a few other people each stitched 100 masks on their own.


Hours slipped by as they sliced strips and squares of fabric, pressed and prepared materials and bundled them into supply kits for volunteers to take home to sew. Those who couldn't sew cut materials to size. Others contributed materials from their own caches of craft supplies. There seemed to be no end to the work, but the work covered Shawn's absence.

To date, there are no known active cases of COVID-19 in the Republic of the Marshall Islands, but USAG-KA is officially "covered." The masketeers delivered their supplies to USAG-KA Command in early June—a whopping more than 1,500 masks. They were formally recognized in an appreciation ceremony. It seemed their work was done. Now they would wait for what happened next.

During her work, Carroll looked to her faith to get herself through the ordeal of being separated as she waited for Shawn to come home.

Last week, her prayers were answered. Happily, the Carroll household is full again. Together, the couple completed Shawn's 21-day required quarantine this past week.

After premeasuring and cutting strips for ties and sides, she folds three, wide creases across the front of the mask before assembling and stitching the ties onto the short sides. The finished product belongs to me and is a snazzy shade of blue. It's going to come in handy this week. —Jessica Dambruch



TIPS TO CONSERVE WATER

Don't let our precious resource drip away. To make water conservation a habit in your home, follow these steps to keep the installation's water tanks at safe levels:

Only water your plants and lawn with reclaimed water.

Turn off the faucets at the island's SCUBA dip tanks.

Do not fill dip tanks to the brim unless there are enough people washing gear to justify using a large amount of water.

Report all water leaks to the Department of Public Works Service Desk at 5-3550.

Take a shower instead of a bath. A five-minute shower uses about 25 gallons of water, while a full-size bath consumes double that amount.

Take shorter showers.

Chill drinking water in your refrigerator instead of running the faucet until the water is cold.

Fill a container with water and use a vegetable brush to wash veggies.

Your washing machine uses up to 34 gallons of water for each load of laundry and your automatic dishwasher uses up to 11 gallons? To save water, wait to run these appliances with a full load of laundry.

E-WARENESS: PETROLEUM STORAGE TANK WEEKLY INSPECTION

Each department must inspect tanks weekly via trained custodian: Examine tank and piping for evidence of leaks and weeps.

Examine tank for evidence of fuel/water within interstitial spaces.

Inspect secondary containment area and ensure locks are in place (if applicable).

Inspect leak detection system and alarm panels to ensure they are functional.

Verify adequate spill response kit is readily available.

Ride a bike that works—it really doesn't matter how well you ride if the brakes don't work.


Wear equipment to protect you and make you more visible to others, like a bike helmet, bright clothing during the day, reflective gear and a white front light and red rear light and reflectors on your bike at night or when visibility is poor.

Ride one per seat, with both hands on the handlebars, unless signaling a turn.

Carry all items in a backpack or strapped to the back of the bike.

Tuck and tie your shoelaces and pants legs so they don't get caught in your bike chain. Plan your route—if driv-

ing as a vehicle on the road,



choose routes with less traffic and slower speeds. Your safest route may be away from traffic altogether, in a bike lane or on a bike path.






GLASS BEACH OFF-LIMITS TO UNAUTHORIZED PERSONNEL



WEATHER DISCUSSION

After the active weather period over the last few days, Kwaialein Atoll will receive a

Kwajalein Atoll will receive a brief reprieve from showery weather prior to the start of this weekend as a transient ridge pushes the Intertropical Convergence Zone to the south of the RMI.

The subtropical high generating this ridge will weaken throughout the weekend, enabling the ITCZ to return northward.

With neutral middle and upper-atmospheric conditions, showers are unlikely to develop into thunderstorms.

By Tuesday, continued weakening of the subtropical ridge will result in the ITCZ becoming increasingly diffuse.

However, uncertainty still exists in whether this pattern change results in the development of a trough and active weather, or the development of dry doldrum type conditions, for the start of the work week.

SATURDAY

Partly cloudy with isolated showers. Winds will be NE-E at 13-18 knots. Shower coverage will be around 10 percent. **SUNDAY**

Mostly cloudy with widely scattered to scattered showers and a possible thundershower.

Winds will be NE-E at 12-17 knots early, veering to E-SE 7-12 knots during the afternoon. Shower coverage will be between 20 percent and 40 percent.

MONDAY INTO NEXT WEEK

Mostly cloudy on Monday with shower coverage tapering throughout the day. Winds will back from E-SE at 6-11 knots to NE-E at 4-9 knots during the day.

Into next week, expect winds to remain light, with periods of showery weather mixed with periods of doldrum like conditions.
