USAG-KA SHARP PROGRAM PUTS PEOPLE FIRST

U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll welcomed a new advocate for the island's Sexual Assault/Harassment and Prevention Program this week.

Chief Warrant Officer 2 Nathan Elkins will serve as the garrison's sexual assault response coordinator together with Victim Advocate Sgt. 1st Class Effie Banks. He will assume responsibilities previously held by Chief Warrant Officer 3 Michael Schafer.

Elkins, who recently arrived on the garrison, looks forward to assisting the community.

"I'm grateful to represent Army SHARP on USAG-KA," Elkins said, during a Tuesday SHARP briefing at the Reagan Test Site Headquarters. "I look forward to getting to know all of you. I hope none of you ever experience circumstances that would require the expertise of a SHARP representative."

During the briefing, attendees re-

ceived training and takeaways to inform them and help them take SHARP concepts to heart. Program representatives also discussed island resources, reporting methods and their respective confidentiality measures.

As a focus area within Army Resilience Command programs, SHARP has received national attention as a health and wellness initiative alongside suicide awareness and mental health.

The Army SHARP program has evolved over the years to leverage the full strength of the diverse and inclusive Department of Defense community against harassment and assault. Featuring Department of the Army civilians and active-duty personnel, targeted messaging campaigns like "Not in Our Army," and "I am Strong" demonstrate unwavering support for victims while also providing important resources to communities and DOD-connected counselors and families.

On Kwajalein, the SHARP team wel-

comes opportunities to partner with a local Ebeye-based chapter of Women United Together Marshall Islands, or WUTMI. The organization works to assist and advocate for victims of assault in the RMI. USAG-KA SHARP will continue annual training for Kwajalein High School students in addition to employee training and consultations for all personnel.

The SHARP team wants the community to know there are resources and personnel available for those who need help.

"We want you to know that you can come to us for help," said Banks. "We are here to listen, and we are here to help you."



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KWAJALEIN COMMUNITY CONTINUES OUTREACH FOR NAMU NEIGHBORS

U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll thanks the community for its support of a recent, ongoing outreach program for the residents of Namu Atoll.

With coordination from the RMI Liaison Office in the island's downtown area, Kwaj residents selected recipients from the names of 121 school-aged children entered in the program to provide gifts and useful items for school, including clothing, school supplies, backpacks and sports equipment.

While all names have been selected, it is not too late to donate gently used household items for Namu families, said RMI Liaison Specialist Kalani Riklon.

"We would appreciate donations of kitchen items, clothing for children and adults, and supplies for teachers, as well," Riklon said. "Anything that can be utilized at a school environment is welcome, and we are still collecting items."

Sanitation items are welcome as well, to help Namu residents mitigate the spread of COVID-19 throughout their communities.

Organizations and individuals around Kwajalein have opened their hearts to participate in the donation project, said Riklon, including the Yokwe Yuk Welcome Club.

"The Bargain Bazaar has donated boxes of goods that we will be bringing to Namu in October," she said.

The Namu program is the second gift-drop coordinated between the RMI Liaison Office and the Kwajalein community in the past 10 months. A 2021 holiday gift-giving opportunity occurred during the fall and winter holidays with a special, culminating event in 2021.

The island donated fishing rods, laptop computers, sporting equipment, clothing, backpacks, school supplies, holiday gifts, treats and other items to children and families on Ebeye. Program participants selected by the RMI Liaison Office included new mothers, single-parent households and many students with special needs.

Namu, a remote outer island, is located in the Ralik Chain approximately 58 miles from Kwajalein Atoll. The atoll has four elementary schools, and high school students attend classes on Jaluit Atoll.

FIRE DRILLS USAG-KA FIRE PREVENTION OFFICE MONTHLY TIP

- Fire drills are conducted annually by the building manager/evacuation coordinators for each facility.
- The BM/EC must ensure the facility has a fire evacuation plan in place.
- Fire reporting procedures: Call 911, activate the fire alarm or shout, "Fire! Fire! Fire!" Once outside, report to a pre-designated area for accountability.
- Once outside, stay outside of your facility. No one is permitted to return until the "all clear" is given.
- Complete a fire drill report to document that the fire drill was conducted.
- Maintain a record of all the fire drills conducted at your facility.

MEMORANDUM FOR Subordinate Commands, Tenant Units, and All Individuals Located on U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein Atoll

SUBJECT: U.S. Army Garrison - Kwajalein Atoll (USAG-KA), COVID Work Safe, Live Safe Order #6

PURPOSE. This order seeks to educate the residents and visitors located on USAG-KA and identifies conduct that is prejudicial to good order and discipline, health, and safety of all personnel residing or working on the USAG-KA.

AUTHORITY. 10 U.S.C. Chapter 47 (Uniform Code of Military Justice); Title 18 United States Code 1382; Army Regulation 600-20 Army Command Policy; USAG-KA Policy 8-1, Command Sponsorship, USAG-KA Regulations 190-10, Entry & Exit Control; 190-50, Administrative Bar Actions, and W52P1J-19-F-0398 Contract Technical Exhibit I.

APPLICABILITY.

This Order applies to all individuals located on USAG-KA including those who are subject to military orders, DoD personnel, dependents, contractors, and individuals stationed, and/or attached to units on USAG-KA, whether on or off the installation.

This includes units, teams, and organizations rotating through and/or visiting USAG-KA for any reason including but not limited to missions, inspections, and training. For purposes of this memorandum, USAG-KA includes the eleven defense sites of the Kwajalein Atoll, all work and training areas, housing of all kinds, and all infrastructure and locations not specified.

1. USAG-KA is currently at HPCON-A, the following expectations and actions apply:

- Community members and workers are expected to maintain safe practices at all times. This includes maintaining adequate proper personal hygiene and reporting and seeking care for any potential influenza-like illness.
- Masks ARE MANDATORY on the ferries to and from Ebeye and Third Island.
- Masks ARE REQUIRED to enter the Hospital and Dental Clinic.
- Individuals may choose to mask at their own discretion at other locations.
- Masks should remain at the ready.
- Masks may still be required on government-owned or contract-operated vehicles, planes, and marine assets. Check before you travel.
- No restrictions on workplace occupancy.

2. STATEMENT OF MILITARY PURPOSE AND NECESSITY. The arrival of COVID-19 to the Republic of the

Marshall Islands (RMI) requires balance between mitigation measures and maintaining readiness. These measures preserve force readiness, limit the spread of COVID, and the health and welfare of service members, DA civilian employees, contractors, families, and the Marshall Islands.

3. COMPLIANCE WITH LOCAL HEALTH ORDERS. All service members, family members, DA civilians, and contractors, both on and off post, will comply with all applicable provisions of Command authority and respect the laws of the RMI regarding public health orders. In the event this order imposes a more restrictive requirement than the RMI, the terms of this order shall take precedence over any order issued by the Marshall Islands.

4. VISITATION RESTRICTIONS. The Non-Resident Domestic Workers and Unofficial Guest Programs are now authorized. Overnight guests (48os) are limited to guests from within the RMI. Approval process remains unchanged.

5. DINING-IN. DFAC (Zamperini Cafe-

teria & Café Roi) are open with full service. AAFES Food Court, Bakery, Outrigger, and American Eatery are open for dine-in and take-out service.

6. RETAIL SHOPPING GUIDANCE. In-person shopping is authorized. Individuals may wear masks as they see fit.

7. ESSENTIAL ACTIVITIES & TRAVEL. For purposes of this order "essential activities or services" includes, but is not limited to: official government duties, care of others (including adult and child caregivers). Space-A access and non-essential travel to Roi and Ebeye/3rd Island is authorized. Masks are mandatory on the ferries to and from Ebeye and Third Island. Masks are required to enter the Hospital and Dental Clinic.

8. PRIVATE & PUBLIC GATHERINGS, MILITARY CEREMONIES. All Community Activities, MWR, social events, and public or private gatherings are authorized. Individuals may choose to mask at their own discretion. Mask should remain at the ready.

9. UNIT FORMATIONS & PHYSICAL TRAINING. Conduct physical training IAW the current HPCON guidance.

10. PLACE OF DUTY & TELEWORK. All personnel subject to this order will report to their regular place of duty during normal work hours. Workplace guidelines allow for 100 percent occupancy.

11. DUTY UNIFORM. While in a federal facility, or performing official duties, personnel including all military, civilian, contractors, and family members may wear a face covering.

12. MASKS IN FEDERALLY FUNDED TRANSPORTATION. If directed, all individuals will wear a mask on

- All Community Activities, MWR, social events, and public or private gatherings **are Authorized**.



DoD aircraft, boats and other maritime conveyances, and buses traveling into, within, or out of the United States, and indoor DoD transportation hubs, regardless of vaccination status and CDC COVID-19 Community Levels.

13. **ACTIVITIES.** The Garrison Commander will determine rules governing the operation (including hours and maximum occupancy) of on-post activities, business, or facilities. Special categories of services include schools, CDC, and CYS. Masks are required to enter the Hospital and Dental Clinic. Individuals may choose to mask at their own discretion at other locations. Masks should remain at the ready.

14. **INSTALLATION ACCESS.** The Non-Resident Domestic Workers and Unofficial Guest Programs are authorized. Overnight guests (480s) are limited to guests from within the RMI. Approval process remains unchanged.

15. **PUNITIVE ORDER.** Paragraphs 3, 8, 9, 11, and 12, of this order are punitive. Persons subject to the UCMJ who violate this order may be punished according to its provisions or face adverse administrative action. Persons not subject to the UCMJ may face administrative sanctions to include suspension or revocation of privileges and removal from the installation, suspension or termination of access to Government facilities

and possible criminal prosecution.

16. **INDIVIDUAL AND UNIT COMMANDER RESPONSIBILITY.** Individuals subject to this order have the duty to know and understand these prohibitions as well as all applicable provisions of local authority public health orders. Supervisors will ensure their personnel are briefed on the prohibitions and requirements of this order.

17. **EFFECTIVE DATE.** This order is effective immediately. This order supersedes all previous COVID Work Safe, Live Safe Orders. This order will remain in effect until rescinded by me or superseded by a new order.




National Hispanic Heritage Month

FACTS

National Hispanic Heritage Month is celebrated from September 15th through October 16th. Each year the Department of Defense (DoD), along with the rest of the Nation, recognizes the important contributions and rich culture of Hispanic Americans.

This year's theme is: *Unidos – Inclusivity for a Stronger Nation*. Unidos can be roughly translated to mean united, connected, or close. This concept of unity and togetherness giving us strength is one that has been long held by the DoD, and it is a driving factor in our strive for inclusivity and equal opportunity.

Hispanic Heritage Month began as a commemorative week when it was first introduced in June of 1968. The push to recognize the contributions of the Hispanic community had gained momentum throughout the 1960s during the civil rights movement with the growing awareness of the United States' multicultural identities.

From 1968 until 1988, Presidents Nixon, Ford, Carter and Reagan all issued the yearly proclamations, setting aside a week to honor Hispanic Americans.

In 1987, U.S. Representative Esteban E. Torres proposed the expanding the observance to cover its current 31-day period. Torres wanted more time so that the nation could *“properly observe and coordinate events and activities to celebrate Hispanic culture and achievement.”*

In 1988, Senator Paul Simon, submitted a similar bill that successfully passed Congress and was signed into law by President Ronald Reagan on August 17, 1988.

On September 14, 1989, President George H.W. Bush (who had been a sponsor of the original Hispanic Heritage Week resolution while serving in the House in 1968) became the first president to declare the 31-day period from September 15 to October 15 as National Hispanic Heritage Month.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

Kwajalein will experience some drier weather on Saturday as a low-level ridge moves into the region, with stray to isolated shower coverage expected.

A weak disturbance will lead to a slight uptick in shower coverage Sunday afternoon but the timing and amount of shower coverage remains uncertain. A better opportunity for precipitation is expected on Monday with a low-level trough.

Isolated to widely scattered showers will remain possible from Tuesday through end of next week as series of low-level disturbances within the Intertropical Convergence Zone push through the region.

Winds will remain mostly light through the extend-

ed forecast period outside of showers.

Mostly sunny with stray showers. Winds SE-S at 5-10 knots, possibly calm at times, with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY AND MONDAY

Mostly to partly sunny with widely scattered showers. Winds at 4-9 knots from the ESE-E Sunday, and NE-ENE Monday. Winds possibly calm at times, with higher gusts near showers.
