COMMUNITY CONNECTION

Through history, many places on Kwajalein have become dear to the service members, scientists and families who have lived on the island. This could not be more true of the Island Memorial Chapel, which continues to host religious services for the community.

Written by Kwajalein historian Bill Remick, this article first ran in The Kwajalein Hourglass in February 2020, with the title “Island Memorial Chapel Celebrates 75 Years on Kwajalein.”

Soon after the assault on Kwajalein was finished, regular religious services began on the island.

Initially, these were improvised affairs, but as permanent structures went up some were converted to part-time use for services.

By the summer of 1944, the Richardson Theater was completed, and many of the services were held there. As many as 20 services on Sundays were held at different locations around the island.

Near the end of 1944, the Marine Air Wing commander asked the chaplains to see about building a dedicated structure for religious services. The chaplains got together with Lt. Daniel Warner of the 893rd Aviation Engineers to discuss designs for a chapel.

In a Dec. 6, 1944 meeting with the island commander, Gen. Ogden Ross (yes, the Army actually ran the island at that time, too) the chaplains were offered a couple of small quonset huts for a chapel. Warner offered to design a better and larger structure out of wood. That evening he completed the design, and crews broke ground two days later.

Construction of the chapel was an all-services project, and the dedication was held on Feb. 11, 1945. It has been in service since that time with only minor interruptions.

The chapel has undergone numerous renovations, with one so large it resulted in, essentially, a whole new building at completion.

A short article in The Kwajalein Post in December 1953 mentions renovations to the chapel, but did not spell them out. The chapel has a very large eave overhang, and the outside edge of the eave was orig-

inally supported by small logs. These were replaced by dimensional lumber in about 1959.

As built, there were interior pillars that bore the weight of the roof, and the roof was strengthened with collar ties. By 1963 someone must have noted an issue with the sturdiness of the roof, and trusses were added to the collar ties. By 1968 even the trusses were not sufficient to keep the building stable, and small concrete blocks were placed around the chapel with supported angled poles to brace the building.

In September 1975, the structure was probably condemned (a familiar theme on Kwaj) and was completely torn to the ground with the exception of the end caps. It is unlikely the end caps were in much better shape than the roof, but this procedure would allow the project to be funded as a renovation instead of new construction.

This time, huge concrete blocks were placed to support the roof beams, thus there were no walls or trusses inside the nave.

The “new” chapel opened on Nov. 8, 1975. The original chapel had a mezzanine behind the altar that seemed to be used for the choir. The 1975 renovation walled off this area.

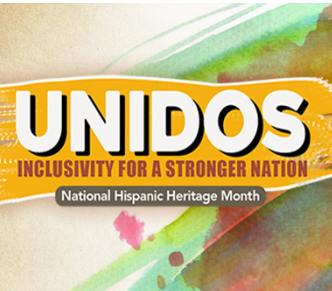
1988 saw an addition to the back of the chapel building for offices. In 1994 a large stained-glass window was added in the eastern wall of the chapel. Except for routine maintenance, the chapel remains pretty much the same today.

One may wonder why the services pushed to build an established chapel, seating just over 200 people, on an island teeming with more than 6,000 men after the war.

It’s likely the building’s seating capacity was not a significant part of the equation. Rather, the goal was likely to build a dedicated house of worship that could give a sense of community to the personnel stationed on the island. The Island Memorial Chapel still serves that purpose today.

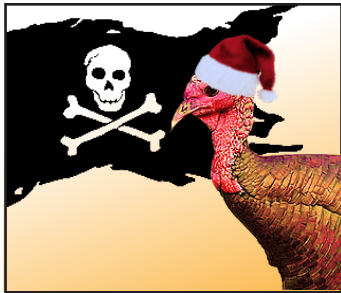
THE SCIENCE OF FALL

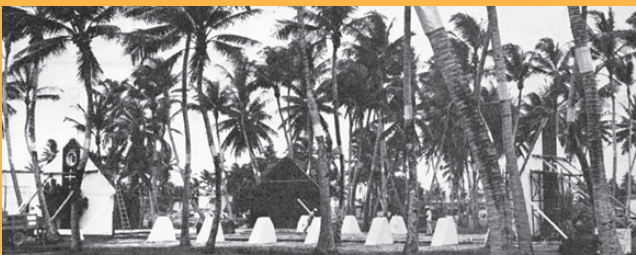

Island Memorial Chapel Dedication

The dedication of the Island Memorial Chapel Sunday marks the first anniversary of the taking of Kwajalein. The service will be at 1030.

General Ross will unveil the memorial tablet which has been beautifully carved by Dr. Libby of the Navy attached to MAG-15. Chaplain Robert D. Workman, Chief of Navy Chaplains and Chaplain Julius Mark, in charge of all Jewish work for the Pacific Ocean Area will participate in the service. The Chapel will be presented by General Oden J. Ross and representatives of the Jewish, Protestant and Roman Catholic faiths will receive it. The service is for all hands. The Naval Base has contributed its share to the Chapel. The furniture has been made by the Ship Repair Department Carpenter Shop; one altar by the Yard Craft Department, while the carpenters from the headquarters shop have spent days in completing the final details. Chief Hadson of the 15th Special C.B.'s and his men have put the touch of their talented hands to the staining of the furniture.

This photo by Julie Makovec shows the original placard included with the chapel. It reads: "This chapel is dedicated to the memory of the gallant officers and men of the armed forces of the United States who gave their lives in the capture of Kwajalein. February first to February fifth one thousand nine hundred and forty four. Rest in Peace. — 4 February 1945

Memorial Chapel Monument To Armed Forces

Although dedicated to the memory of those who lost their lives in the capture of Kwajalein, the island Memorial Chapel is also a monument to the spirit of co-operation of all religious groups and all branches of the Armed Forces.

The building was designed by a member of the 893rd Aviation Engineers at the request of Major General Louis E. Woods, Commanding Officer of the Fourth Fleet Marine Air Wing. Materials were furnished by the Army. Marine carpenters constructed the edifice, and the Navy men made the church furnishings. The dedicatory plaque was carved by a member of Marine Air Group 15. Just two months after ground was broken, the Chapel was dedicated on 11 February 1945.

The only native style building on Kwaj, the chapel is 110 feet in length and 35 feet in width. Low sweeping eaves end in open sides, the dark mahogany interior is free of obstruction, and in contrast to the white and light green exterior. There are two transepts, one fitted out as a permanent Catholic Chapel, the other for organ and choir.

Recent renovation and partial refurnishing has enabled the Kwajalein Memorial Chapel to keep secure its reputation as "one of the most attractive Chapel in the Pacific".

ISLAND BOY SCOUT TO RESTORE MEMORIAL WALL WITH VOLUNTEERS

This weekend, one island Boy Scout will take on the restoration of Kwajalein's largest memorial for a culminating community service project: the flower mural that runs parallel to Lagoon Road.

The memorial honors all service members and family members who have served on Kwajalein and was conceived by former island resident Beverly Vencill, who served as the secretary to the USAG-KA commander in previous years.

"I have chosen to restore this memorial because it is a memorial to honor veterans and their families who have served on Kwajalein since 1944," Acosta said. "Restoring this wall will show respect to the veterans and bring an overall better look to the island and its beauty."

Acosta has been planning the project for a long time, he said. The challenge of the wall, a high-visibility landmark, intrigued him. He made his decision after listening to different community members express their desire for the wall to be restored.

He formalized his ideas in a proposal to USAG-KA Commander Col. Tom Pugsley and Command Sgt. Maj. Ismael Ortega. After obtaining approval, he submitted the proposal to the Scouting Council in Guam for full approval, he said.

"Now it is approved, I am looking for any and all volunteers to help."

For the next two consecutive weekends, from Sept. 24-26 and Oct. 1-3, Acosta welcomes any and all volunteers

to pick up a paint brush and to join him at the wall. No experience is needed to assist with the memorial restoration.

"I anticipate having a large group of volunteers to help with all of the work," he said. "Coordinating this large of a group will be a challenge, but it is a worthwhile challenge, because so many people are passionate about the memorial, and want to volunteer their time to restore it."

Acosta recommends volunteers wear sun protection and bring bottled water and hats. All painting supplies will be provided.

To younger scouts who have yet to choose a project, Acosta encourages them to think broadly and to be creative.

"Choosing an Eagle Scout project is very fun and important to do as you finalize your time as a Boy Scout," he said. "Your project will need to be beneficial to your community, or your church or school. It doesn't have to be anything too big, but it needs to be impactful."

VOCATIONAL TRAINING PROGRAM COMING SOON FOR MARSHALLESE EMPLOYEES

Vocational cross-training opportunities are coming soon for a cohort of more than 30 Marshallese employees working on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll.

The program is part of a developing educational initiative supported by the College of the Marshall Islands and Vectrus, base operations services contractor on USAG-KA. Kwajalein employees living on Ebeye will be able to diversify their skill sets and increase their technical aptitudes across a variety of career areas through a combination of coursework and skill building.

Vectrus Deputy Task Order Manager Oscar Olivares addressed members of an initial cohort selected from public works and automotive department personnel in a Sept. 17 meeting at the Island Memorial Chapel with CMI representative Elmi Keju.

"You have my full support in this program," Olivares said to attendees. "We want to give you the opportunity to succeed and to train in new areas related to

your field of expertise. If you're in carpentry and want to try welding or electrical work, this program will give you that chance."

Day-to-day logistics activities on US-AG-KA can provide students preparatory and observational learning opportunities in a "working classroom" to build knowledge to bring to their coursework, Olivares said. He looks forward to the growth of the program and its students.

"It's as much about the mindset you bring to your work as it is what you do," he said. "We're not building Ferraris at Kwajalein Automotive, but it is still a place where you can grow and develop knowledge and great team dynamics. You've got to work hard and go to class. We will give you the time to make sure you can do these things."

Olivares, who recently completed coursework through the Harvard Business School, also had a promise for the students.

"I'm going to check in with each of you about how your classes are going," he said.

Delivering his remarks in English and

Marshallese, Keju next walked prospective students through an applications and financial aid package. He encouraged everyone to participate and to take advantage of the learning opportunity. He answered several questions about the materials provided.

"If you do not know the answer to a question, fill things out as best you can," Keju said, distributing information packets to students. He stressed that students who did not possess standard high school diplomas could still qualify for the program by taking an equivalency test. Additional help with application materials would be provided for any prospective students.

The CMI-Vectrus initiative will be the first training program of its kind on US-AG-KA since Vectrus arrived to assume logistics operations. Future program plans in development include inviting course instructors from Majuro to lead guided learning opportunities.

"You were specially chosen for this program," Olivares said. "Tell your friends about it. Let's get others in here to give them the chance at success."

Kwajalein School System Superintendent Paul Uhren spoke with the Kwajalein Hourglass about what he loves about teaching and living on Kwajalein. The variety of activities available for the island’s youth and being outdoors are just a few of the things that make life on Kwajalein unique. “I love that we have small class sizes,” Uhren said. “The teachers can really do some fun and neat things

with their individual classes. At the elementary school, we started the Robotics Club this past year, and had an open-house night for the community. One thing that makes Kwajalein unique is that we have students at the high school playing sports with other adults on this island. You won’t see that anywhere else in the world except on this base, where you have students and adults interacting together professionally and respectfully on the

game courts. It’s really a unique place where we get to do that. There are lots of opportunities to learn and to just enjoy life here together.” During his free time, Uhren enjoys being outdoors. “I love to go up to Roi to just relax and get away from here. But when I’m on Kwajalein, I like to ride my bike, go out over right around the airport, go sit down on the west end of the island and watch the waves come in.”

MEMORIAL CUSTOMS MARSHALLESE LANGAUGE LESSON

The traditional Marshallese funeral custom crosses all religious denominations, and with little variation, involves five phases: emmej, a vigil held immediately after death; ilomej, viewing; kallip, burial; anak, time spent with the deceased’s spirit; and eoraak, the deceased’s family’s acknowledgement of community support. The part of a funeral you may be most likely to attend would be the ilomej; don’t forget to bring cash to offer the family to defray the expenses of the funeral.

Rimij, the deceased
Ilomej, wake
Kallip, burial
Lob, grave
Mon-jar, church
Buromoj, mourn, sadness
Eoreak, gravel-spreading

Rar bok rimij eo nan ia?
Where did they take the deceased?

Rar bok e nan mon-jar en.
They took the deceased to the church.

Edrein raan in ilomej ke?
The last wake is today, right?

Aet bwe rej kallip ilju.
Yes, because the burial is tomorrow.

Ilo ia?
Where at?

Ilo lob kan an Handel.
At Handel’s graveyard.

Oh, rej bar eoreak ijene.
Oh, they will have gravel-spreading there.

Ak ewi jinom kio?
Where is your mother now?

EMot nan mweo.
She went home.

Jab, kwon lelok ao nan in buromoj.

FIRE DRILLS

USAG-KA FIRE PREVENTION OFFICE MONTHLY TIP

- Fire drills are conducted annually by the building manager/evacuation coordinators for each facility.
- The BM/EC must ensure the facility has a fire evacuation plan in place.
- Fire reporting procedures: Call 911, activate the fire alarm or shout, "Fire! Fire! Fire!" Once outside, report to a predesignated area for accountability.
- Stay outside of your facility. No one is permitted to return until the "all clear" is given.
- Complete a fire drill report to document that the activity was conducted.
- Maintain a record of all the fire drills conducted at your facility.

THIS MONTH IN U.S. ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

Unlike the Down Under Early Warning Experiment—Dundee Project—documentary, which chronicles a UFO festival in a small mid-Western town, the September 1997 Project Dundee was a 14-day early warning experiment conducted in Australia.

This research and development experiment involved the Ballistic Missile Defense Organization, predecessor to the Missile Defense Agency, and the Australian Defense Science and Technology Organization. Project Dundee sought to assess the ability of the prototype Australian Jindalee Over the Horizon radar and other sensors to detect theater ballistic missiles, the threat identified during the Gulf War.

Of particular interest with these tests was the ability to detect the missiles in the boost phase soon after launch. Four unarmed Terrier missiles were fired out to sea to test the radars. Today, the Jindalee can claim detection ranges of 1,000 to 3,000 kilometers and has even reported detecting Chinese missile launches over 5,500 km away.

On Sept. 8, 2014, Gen. Raymond Odierno, Army chief of staff, designated Lt. Gen. David Mann, USASMDC/ARSTRAT commander, as the Army's Air and Missile Defense Enterprise Integrator in support of the Army's vision for Force 2025 and beyond.

Focused on modernization initiatives,

the role of the AMD enterprise integrator includes “development and synchronization of a strategy that incorporates force planning requirements, coordinated combat and materiel development, AMD acquisition and life cycle management and strategic communications,” or essentially, “all aspects of organizing, training, equipping, providing, and em-

ploying Army AMD forces.” The AMD concept incorporated everything from Ground-based Midcourse Defense, Ballistic Missile Defense, Cruise Missile Defense, as well as Counter-Unmanned Aerial Systems and Counter-Rockets Artillery and Mortars.

On Sept. 15, 1975, the Stanley R. Mickelsen SAFEGUARD Complex, located in North Dakota, began a nine-day Department of the Army Technical Proficiency Inspection. They successfully achieved a satisfactory rating and received their nuclear certification—a milestone toward full operational deployment of the nation's first deployed missile defense system.

On Sept. 22, 2000, the Tactical High Energy Laser Advanced Concept Technology Demonstrator, developed by the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command, the Israeli Ministry of Defense and prime contractor TRW, successfully completed the second of two dual-salvo tests at White Sands Missile Range.

On Aug. 28 and again on Sept. 22, the THEL Demonstrator detected, engaged and destroyed a pair of Katyusha rockets fired in succession. This achievement occurred just three months after the THEL was first used to destroy a single short-range tactical threat.

As Lt. Gen. John Costello, USASMDC commanding general observed following the tests, “Killing one rocket was significant, but being able to show that we can consistently kill two or more targets per engagement puts THEL/ACTD in a class by itself. ...

These tests are making it increasingly clear that directed energy weapon systems have the potential to provide some unique and very effective defensive options on the tactical battlefield.”

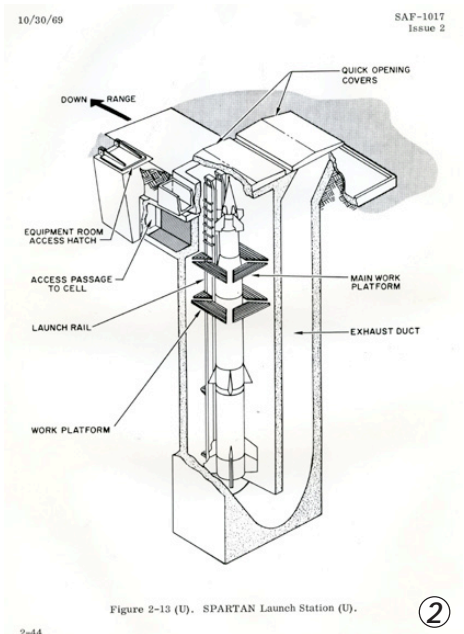


Figure 2-13 (U). SPARTAN Launch Station (U).

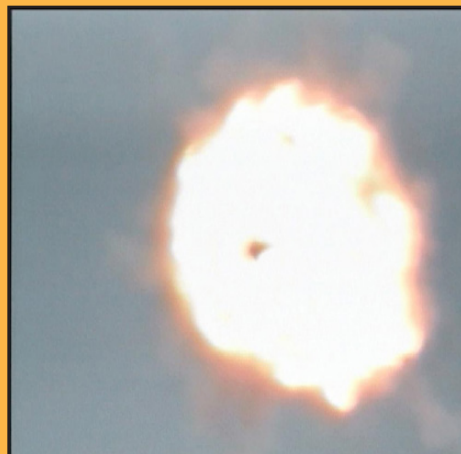

Dr. Cordova now serves as the 11th president of Purdue University, and the first Hispanic woman to lead the Indiana campus.

On May 23, 1943, in Alaska's Aleutian Islands, Private Joseph P. Martinez of Colorado became the first Hispanic-American to receive the Medal of Honor for his actions during World War II. His posthumous award was for the first act of combat heroism on American soil (other than the 15 at Pearl Harbor) since the Indian Campaigns.

Ellen Ochoa, a veteran astronaut, became the 11th Director of the Johnson Space Center in 2012. Ochoa is the first Hispanic director and second female director.

Ochoa became the first Hispanic

woman to go to space when she served on a nine-day mission on the space shuttle Discovery in 1993. She has flown in space four times, spending almost 1,000 hours in orbit.

Preserving Peace

After the Sept. 11, 2001, terror attacks, Senior Master Sgt. Ramon Colon-Lopez took the fight to the enemy during four deployments in support of Operation Enduring Freedom from July 2002 to September 2004.

Over the course of 60 combat missions, his actions resulted in the apprehension of 30 high-value targets. He received his first Bronze Star with Valor for courage under fire while supporting the Presidential Security Detail for Hamid Karzai.

During a direct action mission, his helicopter was crippled by anti-aircraft fire originating from the target area. After the crash landing, Colon-Lopez and two SEALs assaulted a fortified position, killed five combatants, and removed the threat to the remainder of the helicopter assault force. His second Bronze Star with Valor was for heroism displayed during that mission.

Colonel Maritza Sáenz Ryan graduated from the United States Military Academy (USMA) in 1982 as a member of the third class to include women cadets.

In her career, she has served as a Trial Counsel at Fort Sill, a Brigade Legal Counsel for a field artillery brigade of 1,000 Soldiers, and in 2006, Ryan became Professor and Head of the Department of Law at USMA, a position requiring presidential nomination and congressional confirmation.

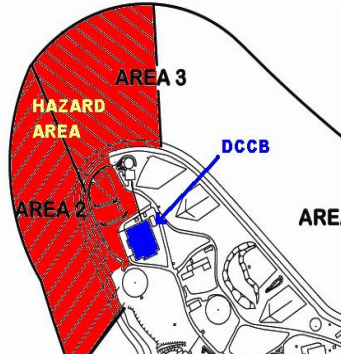

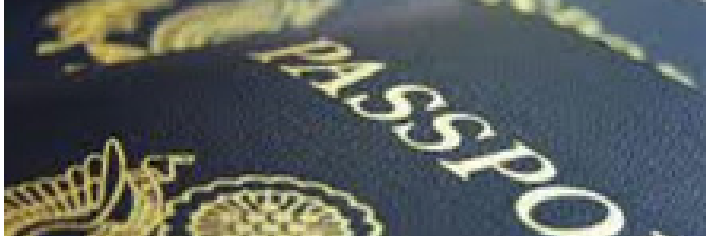

MEMORANDUM FOR Subordinate Commands, Tenant Units, and All Individuals Located on U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein Atoll

SUBJECT: U.S. Army Garrison - Kwajalein Atoll (USAG-KA), COVID Work Safe, Live Safe Order #6

PURPOSE. This order seeks to educate the residents and visitors located on USAG-KA and identifies conduct that is prejudicial to good order and discipline, health, and safety of all personnel residing or working on the USAG-KA.

AUTHORITY. 10 U.S.C. Chapter 47 (Uniform Code of Military Justice); Title 18 United States Code 1382; Army Regulation 600-20 Army Command Policy; USAG-KA Policy 8-1, Command Sponsorship, USAG-KA Regulations 190-10, Entry & Exit Control; 190-50, Administrative Bar Actions, and W52P1J-19-F-0398 Contract Technical Exhibit I.

APPLICABILITY.

This Order applies to all individuals located on USAG-KA including those who are subject to military orders, DoD personnel, dependents, contractors, and individuals stationed, and/or attached to units on USAG-KA, whether on or off the installation.

This includes units, teams, and organizations rotating through and/or visiting USAG-KA for any reason including but not limited to missions, inspections, and training. For purposes of this memorandum, USAG-KA includes the eleven defense sites of the Kwajalein Atoll, all work and training areas, housing of all kinds, and all infrastructure and locations not specified.

1. USAG-KA is currently at HPCON-A, the following expectations and actions apply:

- Community members and workers are expected to maintain safe practices at all times. This includes maintaining adequate proper personal hygiene and reporting and seeking care for any potential influenza-like illness.
- Masks ARE MANDATORY on the ferries to and from Ebeye and Third Island.
- Masks ARE REQUIRED to enter the Hospital and Dental Clinic.
- Individuals may choose to mask at their own discretion at other locations.
- Masks should remain at the ready.
- Masks may still be required on government-owned or contract-operated vehicles, planes, and marine assets. Check before you travel.
- No restrictions on workplace occupancy.

2. STATEMENT OF MILITARY PURPOSE AND NECESSITY. The arrival of COVID-19 to the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI) requires balance between mitigation measures and maintaining readiness. These measures preserve force readiness, limit the spread of COVID, and the health and welfare of service members, DA civilian employees, contractors, families, and the Marshall Islands.

3. COMPLIANCE WITH LOCAL HEALTH ORDERS. All service members, family members, DA civilians, and contractors, both on and off post, will comply with all applicable provisions of Command authority and respect the laws of the RMI regarding public health orders. In the event this order imposes a more restrictive requirement than the RMI, the terms of this order shall take precedence over any order issued by the Marshall Islands.

4. VISITATION RESTRICTIONS. The Non-Resident Domestic Workers and Unofficial Guest Programs are now authorized. Overnight guests (48os) are limited to guests from within the RMI. Approval process remains unchanged.

5. DINING-IN. DFAC (Zamperini Cafeteria & Café Roi) are open with full service. AAFES Food Court, Bakery, Outrigger, and American Eatery are open for dine-in and take-out service.

6. RETAIL SHOPPING GUIDANCE. In-person shopping is authorized. Individuals may wear masks as they see fit.

7. ESSENTIAL ACTIVITIES & TRAVEL. For purposes of this order “essential activities or services” includes, but is not limited to: official government duties, care of others (including adult and child caregivers). Space-A access and non-essential travel to Roi and Ebeye/3rd Island is authorized. Masks are mandatory on the ferries to and from Ebeye and Third Island. Masks are required to enter the Hospital and Dental Clinic.

8. PRIVATE & PUBLIC GATHERINGS, MILITARY CEREMONIES. All Community Activities, MWR, social events, and public or private gatherings are authorized. Individuals may choose to mask at their own discretion. Mask should remain at the ready.

9. UNIT FORMATIONS & PHYSICAL TRAINING. Conduct physical training IAW the current HPCON guidance.

10. PLACE OF DUTY & TELEWORK. All personnel subject to this order will report to their regular place of duty during normal work hours. Workplace guidelines allow for 100 percent occupancy.

11. DUTY UNIFORM. While in a federal facility, or performing official duties, personnel including all military, civilian, contractors, and family members may wear a face covering.

12. MASKS IN FEDERALLY FUNDED TRANSPORTATION. If directed, all individuals will wear a mask on DoD aircraft, boats and other maritime conveyances, and buses traveling into, within, or out of the United States, and indoor DoD transportation hubs, regardless of vaccination status and CDC COVID-19 Community Levels.

13. ACTIVITIES. The Garrison Commander will determine rules governing the operation (including hours and maximum occupancy) of on-post activities, business, or facilities. Special categories of services include schools, CDC, and CYS. Masks are required to enter the Hospital and Dental Clinic. Individuals may choose to mask at their own discretion at other locations. Masks should remain at the ready.

14. INSTALLATION ACCESS. The Non-Resident Domestic Workers and Unofficial Guest Programs are authorized. Overnight guests (48os) are limited to guests from within the RMI. Approval process remains unchanged.

15. PUNITIVE ORDER. Paragraphs 3, 8, 9, 11, and 12, of this order are punitive. Persons subject to the UCMJ who violate this order may be punished according to its provisions or face adverse administrative action. Persons not subject to the UCMJ may face administrative sanctions to include suspension or revocation of privileges and removal from the installation, suspension or termination of access to Government facilities and possible criminal prosecution.

16. INDIVIDUAL AND UNIT COMMANDER RESPONSIBILITY. Individuals subject to this order have the duty to know and understand these prohibitions as well as all applicable provisions of local authority public health orders. Supervisors will ensure their personnel are briefed on the prohibitions and requirements of this order.

17. EFFECTIVE DATE. This order is effective immediately. This order supersedes all previous COVID Work Safe, Live Safe Orders. This order will remain in effect until rescinded by me or superseded by a new order.

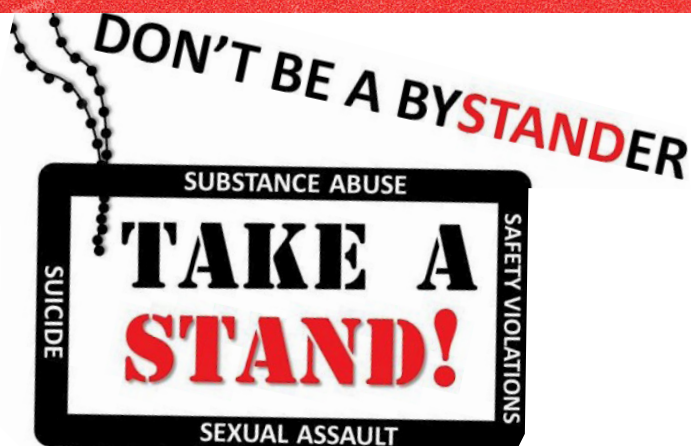

UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Remember the three Rs of UXO:
Recognize an item as possible Unexploded Ordnance. **Retreat** from the area of the UXO. **Report** suspected UXO immediately by notifying EOD (5-1433) or CPS (5-4445).

Provide the following information:
Location (building #, GPS, landmarks, etc); Size (compared to common items - football, scuba cylinder, etc). Treat UXO like you would treat dangerous sea creatures. Look but do not touch. For a detailed refresher, please attend the Island Orientation Briefing on the fourth Wednesday of every month.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

The end of the work week is expected to be showery.

A surface wave will move through the RMI Saturday, bringing with it periods of scattered showers.

Modest middle atmosphere shear and a lack of upper atmosphere support means that thunderstorms will be unlikely to occur with this event. Nevertheless, low level convergence will be robust and showers heavy at times.

After the passage of the wave, the complete breakdown of subtropical ridging to the north ensures the development of dry doldrum conditions with mostly clear skies, light and variable winds, and isolated slow-moving showers, for Sunday and Monday.

Winds begin to redevelop

on Tuesday, with possible Intertropical Convergence Zone redevelopment leading to increasing shower chances towards the end of the next work week.

SATURDAY

Mostly cloudy with scattered showers. Winds E-SE at 5-10 knots, becoming light and variable at times, with gusts up to 20 knots near showers.

SUNDAY AND MONDAY

Mostly sunny with isolated, slow moving, showers. Winds will be light and variable, with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK'S OUTLOOK

Light to gentle winds will persist throughout the week.

Shower chances will gradually increase through the week as the ITCZ redevelops.
