ARMY SHARP ADVOCATES ADDRESS KWAJALEIN HIGH SCHOOL

Members of the U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Sexual Harassment/Assault Response & Prevention team hosted a discussion for Kwajalein High School students about how to identify, deter and prevent harassment and assault while protecting the personal safety and dignity of oneself and others.

SHARP Victim Advocate Sgt. 1st Class Effie Banks and SHARP Coordinator Chief Warrant Officer Two Nathan Elkins shared relatable examples to inform students about healthy and unhealthy relationships, assault, consent and harassment. They encouraged them to adopt wise standards for personal conduct. USAG-KA Commander Col. Tom Pugsley joined in the discussion to provide additional guidance and resources about island services.

One student offered an example of a stable, healthy relationship: "When you care for the other person and you both respect each other."

In contrast, a situation in which touch was used to hurt someone would never be right, said Banks.

"That is unsafe," Banks said. "That is an unhealthy, abusive relationship. There is no excuse for it. There is nothing that can be said to make up for it. [If that is happening,] you need to contact somebody to talk about that—a family member, a teacher."

Exhibiting manipulative

and abusive online behavior could have long-lasting consequences for cyberbullies and their victims, said Elkins. He discouraged students from posting anything that could be harmful, unkind or detrimental to others or their own future lives and careers.

"If you are undermining someone's dignity and are disrespecting them, you are doing something wrong," Elkins said. "If it's not respectful of another person, please, do not post it."

Forcing others to experience physical touch without their consent and commenting or posting with attacks based on sex and gender also undermined basic human dignity and respect, Elkins said.

"It must be consensual," Elkins said. "The person must let you know, verbally, or give freely. If they are trying to push away, and you are trying to hug, it's not good."

Pugsley reminded the students to think of their own support networks of trusted individuals.

"Don't underestimate the power of a trusted teacher, friend or family member," Pugsley said. "They are all active places to start having those conversations if you have an issue come up and you need help."

He encouraged the students to use communication as an effective tool.

"It's about communication always," Pugsley said. "Don't feel pressured to act a certain

way. Be yourself. Your friends, partners and families will understand."

In closing, KHS Principal Matt Gerber encouraged the students to do their part to maintain the school's safe learning environment.

"Thank you for considering these things," said Gerber. "Thank you for doing your part to make this school feel as safe and healthy as we would want it to feel at all times."

LOUIS BERGER SERVICES DELIVERS SCHOOL SUPPLIES TO ENNIBURR

Bearing boxes of donated school supplies and sports equipment, Louis Berger employees received a warm welcome from high school students and residents of Enniburr Oct. 13.

Thedonation is the second LBS contribution to a Marshall Islands school over the past two weeks, and the first of many, according to a long-term donation drive plan.

To establish classroom supply needs, before their visit, LBS employees met with teachers. Items like donated soccer balls, volleyball equipment, schoolbooks and writing implements were sourced for each classroom from purchases submitted and shipped through an online school supplies drive.

As changing classroom needs are reported throughout the year, the online inventory will be updated to reflect those new needs. Items added will be available for contributors to select and purchase for donation from on or off-island.

On Enniburr, students presented flower leis, fresh coconut juice and handshakes to their visitors, and broke into song in a showing of gratitude.

LBS Human Resources Supervisor George Navarro, Passenger Services Representative Nipaporn Schafer and Operation Specialists Monica Calep and Emina Kemem greeted all of the students, their educators and a traditional community leader who came to thank them.

It was their first trip to Enniburr, Navarro and Schafer said.

"We didn't do any of this for the credit," Navarro said. "We just want the schools to have what it is they need, and to give them the best shot. We will be back with more supplies for Enniburr."

LBS Site Lead Gregory Binford shared thoughts about the donation program in an email to The Kwajalein Hourglass. He said he was encouraged by the school supplies drive.


"It is so inspiring to think that if everyone helps even one student enjoy education just a bit more, it can create such a cycle of inspiration and good will towards our fellow humans."

For the many commuters who travel to Roi, the experienced flight operations personnel on both islands are an integral part of daily life. Each day, these valuable employees work together to help commuters and cargo reach their destinations and go above and beyond to provide aid when needed.

When it's time for passengers to travel back to Kwajalein, Roi-Namur Air Transportation Supervisor Kim Lemari checks passenger billets and baggage weights before slotting commuters into seats on the small metroliner. At a moment's notice, she may also be called on to help a new passenger find their destination, serve as public information contact and share tips as an acting Roi life expert.

Lemari has lived in the Roi community for four years and has family on the atoll. She finds it humorous that she works in flight operations and is the one staying put.

"I did not go anywhere [during lockdown]," Lemari said.

Working either end of the short hop between the islands means spending long, hot hours on the tarmac for Roi ramp crew members Dimi Damon and Konio Rubon.

Originally from Enniburr, Damon has worked as a cargo loader for eight years. Rubon lives and works on Roi and is a self-described "Roi rat." In a day's work, the duo transports hundreds of points

of luggage, tools and equipment. Working in a close team, they have learned to joke with each other.

Damon described his own day on the job as "not too hard."

After hearing this, Rubon smiled and offered his assessment: "He's lying.

Transporting fresh produce for their remote community is a key task for cargo loaders. At 5 a.m. on Kwajalein, as personnel are loading garlic, citrus fruits and vegetables, the Roi ramp crews are standing by to receive it. They transport the precious cargo to storage areas and the Roi Surfway, also known as the Third Island Store, and can drive the island's looping roads throughout the day to support the airfield with transportation or deliveries.

After many years working to sustain Roi life and operations, the operators have come to know the small population and quiet roadways of the island well. When asked about the toughest part about a day on the job as a vehicle operator, one detail stands out to Damon above all the rest.

It isn't the heavy lifting, the time in the sun or the perpetual motion of supporting logistics. It's something someone from off-island might not recognize, but cannot help but notice, as Roi becomes a more familiar destination.

'The truck is loud," Damon said.

YOKWE YUK WELCOME CLUB LAUNCHES NEW YEAR WITH MEET-AND-GREET

More than 50 island residents explored volunteer opportunities with the Yokwe Yuk Welcome Club Oct. 8 at a barbecue meet-and-greet event hosted at the Emon Beach main pavilion.

Attendees sampled a potluck buffet and visited tables staffed with YYWC members to check out the club's numerous activities and to learn about its continuing mission to support education in the Marshall Islands.

The YYWC has several longtime initiatives which rely on volunteer support throughout the year. Among them, the Bargain Bazaar, a longtime resale shop near Kwajalein's Dock Security Checkpoint; and Mic Shop, a Marshallese handicrafts and Pacific products outlet, offer opportunities to support business operations, to serve as chairpersons and to lead activities.

The club also hosts silent auctions and fundraiser events, such as the upcoming Oct. 24 plant sale.

Proceeds donated from club activities fund everything from teaching supplies to student books. Grant awards are made by the club's Education Assistance Committee.

The YYWC formed on Kwajalein in the early post-World War II era as a women's philanthropic and social club. Over the years, the growing organization has adapted, and now includes a cultural liaison, executive board members and subcommittees. The YYWC continues to host an array of events that bring club membership together with women's civic organizations on Ebeye.

YYWC President Amber Bates said she was pleased with the turnout.

"I'm so excited for the new direction the club is going in," she said.

RMI RECEIVES AUSTRALIAN FOREIGN AFFAIRS MINISTER

HOURGLASS REPORT

The Republic of the Marshall Islands national government welcomed Australian Foreign Affairs Minister Penny Wong on a visit to Majuro this week.

Wong's visit marks the official opening of the Australian Embassy to the RMI which commenced operations in 2021. Her agenda included meetings with traditional and government leadership to explore partnerships, climate change and other topics of mutual interest. Among the local leaders, Wong has met with the Marshall Islands' Council of Iroij Chairman Jimata Kabua; Climate Envoy Kathy Jetnil-Kijiner; and RMI Minister of Foreign Affairs and Trade Kitlang Kabua.

On Oct. 13, Wong toured the Alele Museum of Marshallese culture, where she signed a commemorative memorandum of understanding with RMI Minister of Internal Affairs and Culture Ota Kisino.

After more than five years, Marshallese citizens will be able to tune in to hear Radio Australia on the airwaves.

"I will also be putting to air the first Australian Broadcasting Corporation (ABC) radio programme on the Republic of the Marshall Island's national broadcaster in six years," Wong announced in an Oct. 12 press release.

A formal agreement has already been signed by managing director of Radio Australia ABC and Marshall Islands officials, as confirmed in a RMI Radio V7AB YouTube video livestream.

Even more content made by, and for, our Pacific family, will be heard soon," Wong announced in a social medial post this week.


U.S. ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

Early Army space history encompasses several Army organizations. In 1959, the Army Ballistic Missile Agency, a precursor to today's Aviation and Missile Command, launched its last Explorer satellite.

A Juno II rocket launched the Explorer VII, part of the American International Geophysical Year program, to study the X-rays emitted by the sun and their influence on the ionosphere. It also identified the heavy particles constituting cosmic rays and measured the heat emitted by the Earth: "Explorer VII 'relayed more information from outer space than had any other U.S. satellite to date."



TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

CANDLES and open flames are not permitted in BQ rooms. The Kwajalein Fire Department thanks you for keeping your neighbors safe.

METAL DETECTORS are not allowed on Kwajalein according to Army Regulation. Unexploded Ordnance exists and could be dangerous if disturbed.

Not allowed on USAG-KA: bow and arrow, air guns, paint ball and other projectile weapons.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation (e.g. trees, bushes, plants) may not be planted in the ground without an approved permit. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. In addition, do not place sprouted coconuts in your yard.


PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

WEATHER DISCUSSION

The Intertropical Convergence Zone will drift northward, reaching Kwajalein Atoll by early Sunday morning and bringing the threat for increased showers, stray thunderstorms and a few strong gusts of wind throughout the day.

Decreased shower coverage is expected Monday as the ITCZ pushes back south of Kwajalein Atoll. Presently, only modest shower coverage is expected on Tuesday before the ITCZ pushes north with more showers and a few thunderstorms by Wednesday.

Winds will remain light to moderate before decreasing towards the end of the upcoming work week.

SATURDAY

Partly sunny to cloudy with stray showers increasing to scattered, and stray thunderstorms in the evening. Winds E-ESE at 9-14 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY

Mostly cloudy with scattered showers and isolated thunderstorms, especially in the morning. Winds ESE-SE at 8-16 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Mostly cloudy to partly sunny with scattered showers and stray thunderstorms in the morning decreasing to stray showers in the afternoon.

Winds ENE-ESE at 8-13 knots with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK

Only modest shower coverage expected Tuesday before unsettled weather returns Wednesday as the ITCZ remains nearby.

Areas of modest low-level convergence bring occasional periods of rain, possibly heavy at times, with stray thunderstorms and a few strong wind gusts to close out the week. Winds ENE-SE at 8-15 knots to start the week, becoming lighter later in the work week.




