KWAJALEIN DONATES SCHOOL SUPPLIES TO NAMU ATOLL

On Oct. 10, Kwajalein volunteers delivered school supplies and housewares to the people of Namu Atoll in a first-time outreach event. With special coordination from the RMI Liaison Office and U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll, island residents purchased items for the 121 school-aged children selected to participate in the program. They also provided home and kitchen items for families and supplies for new mothers.

'This program could not have been done without the community," said Chief Warrant Officer 3 Michael Schafer, the USAG-KA coordinator for the Namu outreach. "The people who contributed to this project were the ones that made this possible.

Why had Schafer chosen Namu Atoll for a school supplies outreach?

Why not choose Namu," he said. Assisting a fellow community in the RMI felt right.

Offering aid and resources is some-

thing Schafer began to do with purpose years ago. When chances to help come along, Schafer takes them-and he encourages others to do so, as well.

There were times, growing up, that we had nothing," Schafer said, of his childhood. "Sometimes, people gave us something: food, a toy, candy, gloves for the winter. I remember those days. I always told myself if I ever had a chance to give back, then I would," he said.

In the weeks leading up to the voyage to Namu, the RMI Liaison Office served as

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the drop-off point for garrison residents to deliver their contributions. Bags and bins of toys, toiletries, clothing, kitchen and craft supplies, crayons, basketballs and books crowded the office. The number of child-sized backpacks delivered surpassed 100.

"There were multiple contributes for

"There were multiple contributors for this project," said Schafer. "The Kwajalein School System provided plastic tubs of books, and a church community from Clear Lake, South Dakota, provided clothes, linens, toys and shoes."

It became evident just how far word of the program had spread. On Kwajalein, employees of Louis Berger Services contributed items purchased through their online school supplies drive. When the USAV Mystic returned to Kwajalein after routine maintenance in Cairns, Australia, it contained sports equipment donated by the Tropical Reef Shipyard.

On Kwajalein, AAFES confirmed that when the delivery vessel departed for Namu, it would be laden with cookies for that community, and lunches for the crew, Schafer said. Donations came in from members of the Marshallese workforce. They added local fare and food staples like bags of rice and boxed, frozen chicken to the ever-growing inventory.

"[The Marshallese] approached me and asked if they could donate, too," said Schafer. "They said, 'I'm from there,' or, 'I know people on Namu. Let me help, too."

In the week before their voyage, student volunteers from Kwajalein High School picked up last-minute contributions from island quarters.

"They were natural leaders," Schafer said, of the students. "This outreach needed them."

Others joined the loading team, piling boxes into the Timur, a fishing vessel from the Marshall Islands Marine Resources Authority provided by the RMI national government for the trip.

On Oct. 10, the Timur plowed a steady trough through the gray waves as the morning rains cleared. More than three hours and 40 miles later, the vessel entered Namu Atoll and anchored in its tur-

quoise lagoon with blue skies overhead.

On the beach of Majkin island, Kwajalein's visitors could see Namu community members—adults, families, and numerous students—singing a welcome. They had had travelled from their respective home islands to greet them, said RMI Liaison Specialist Kalani Riklon. To ensure all community members could be present, the atoll mayor had purchased fuel for numerous small transport boats.

After treating their visitors to fresh coconut juice, island residents gathered under spacious shade shelters for introductions and a welcome address by acting Mayor Manuel Kilma.

A party of volunteers from the beach helped the Timur's crew haul up its precious cargo and to carry the numerous boxes, bags and crates up from the lagoon. High school students arranged row after row of patterned, colorful backpacks before rows of seated Namu students.

Then, it was time to give gifts. One by one, KHS student Lana Kabua called each student by name to receive backpacks and school supplies. Children and parents laughed and cheered as young recipients insisted on carrying packages that were higher than they were tall. One Namu youth received a blue and white basketball—from Cairns?—and seated around him, his peers leaned in to admire it.

To return Kwajalein's generosity, the Namu community prepared bountiful baskets of traditionally prepared breadfruit, baked chicken and foods for their visitors to eat on the way home. They also provided gifts like colorful amimono items, or handicrafts, necklaces and large shells for everyone who contributed to the voyage. Those who donated are welcome to visit the RMI Liaison Office during business hours to select a gift.

Together, the two communities formed receiving lines, and Namu residents personally thanked everyone who had come to share their gifts. They watched on the beach as the Timur disappeared on the horizon—and while the two communities may have lost sight of each other for now, Kwajalein's visitors cherish the kindness and generosity shown by Namu.

"I just want to you to know that we're always thinking about you," Schafer said in his remarks to the community. "It doesn't matter where we are, or what island we're on. You're always with us. We're always thinking about every Marshallese community."

"I am so honored," said Kilma, in an interview conducted by AFN Kwajalein film crew members Tolum Lucky and Maurice Lokeijak about the day's events. "I believe that we will bond [in] friendship, between [the] Kwajalein community and Namu community."

As for Schafer, the outreach will not be the last time he will work to help others, and the people of Namu have a permanent place in his heart.

"Seeing all the community standing in a line, clapping and singing was such an amazing experience," he said. "The Marshall Islands is such a beautiful place and has a beautiful culture. I hope everyone will remember the smiles from the children, and the love, from our community."

The fair is a must-see event for newcomers, seasobal shoppers and anyone hoping to send a bit of Kwajalein home to loved ones.

On display last weekend, crafters showcased handmade jewelry, pottery and textiles; 3D-printed collectibles; calendars; and home décor items.

"We had more than 15 vendors register for this year's event," said KAG President Christy Johnson. "I am grateful for the incredible turnout and for everyone who helped. I'd also like to thank our high school volunteers who ran a drawing for donated crafts. Money from the drawing goes to support scholarship funds for graduating seniors."

to socialize in island style—with jumbo pretzels.



KWAJ FIRE SERVICES CELEBRATES 100 YEARS OF FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

The Kwajalein Fire Department hosted an open house in honor of the 100th anniversary of Fire Prevention Week, an annual observance to educate communities about fire safety and to raise awareness about how to prevent hazards in and around the home.

Island residents and children visited the station to tour the facility and learn more about daily life around the fire department. The visitors got to check out the 24-hour service alarm room, to chat with firefighters and to take the driver's seat in emergency response vehicles like fire trucks and ambulances. Later, kids got to take photos with Sparky the Fire Pup, a favorite team.

"This is really fun," said one child who attended. "I learned a lot about what to do in case of emergencies."

The open house follows a week of special classroom visits, where firefighters provided workshops for students and shared safety knowledge and best practices.

Together, they reviewed good fire safety communication skills; how to stop, drop, and roll; and basic safety checks for homes.

Fire Chief Charles Chambers and Assistant Fire Chief of Prevention Errol Celestine said they were pleased with the community's response to the festivities. Celestine hopes the island's children will take their training to heart and share it with others.

"You are never too young to help stop a fire from hurting those you love," Chambers said. "We remind families to discuss their emergency plans to prepare. For example, if there are pets in the home, they must decide which family members will retrieve the pet so everyone can make a safe escape, the best exits to take to leave the home and where they will meet after making that exit."

Fire Prevention Week began in 1922 as a commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire of Oct. 8 - 10, 1871. The devastation of the city prompted numerous fire safety reforms that led to developments in fire safety reforms throughout the 20th century. Fort Greely, Alaska, is named for Maj. Gen. Adolphus Washington Greely. Originally from Newburyport, Massachusetts, following the Civil War, Greely assisted in founding the U.S. Weather Bureau.

In 1881, Greely led the Lady Franklin Bay Expedition to the Canadian Arctic. The group planned to found a meteorological station as part of the first International Polar Year. However, disaster would strike before the party could return.

Weather conditions left them stranded in the Arctic for two years. Only seven soldiers from the expedition would survive.

As Chief of the Signal Corps, a position he held for 20 years, Greely was responsible for constructing tens of thousands of miles of telegraph and submarine cables connecting Puerto Rico, Cuba, the Philippines and Alaska. Greely also expanded the weather notification service provided by the weather service and was one of the founders of the National Geographic Society.

Greely received the Medal of Honor on his 91st birthday for "his life of splendid public service" and 47 years of service to the U.S. Army. Greely passed away of Oct. 13, 1935, at the age of 91.

1) Maj. Gen. Adolphus Washington Greely served for 47 years in the U.S. Army. Among his many assignments, Greely served as the chief of the Signal Corps. He is known for his leading role in the Lady Franklin Bay Expedition to the Canadian Arctic, wherein more than half of the mem-



Ground Rules for Halloween


- Island scooter rentals end at 4 p.m. on Oct. 31
- **Roads in all housing areas** are closed to traffic at 6 p.m.
- **Trick-or-treating** begins at 6:30 p.m. and ends promptly at 8:30 p.m.
- Trick-or-treaters can travel in and around the old Navy housing and North Point housing
- Only visit houses with lights on
- For safety, during trick-or-treating hours, only emergency vehicles are allowed in island housing areas
- An extra ferry is available to return guest trick-or-treaters to Ebeye at 9 p.m. Guests should return to the DSC prior to 9 p.m. to return home safely. A final ferry will leave Kwajalein at 9:30 p.m.











WHALE EXCLUSION ZONE – KWAJALEIN LAGOON

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

A male whale tentatively identified as Blainville's Beaked Whale (Mesoplodon densirostris) species has moved into an area of the lagoon approximately 1,000 feet from shore between Coral Sands Beach and the Barge Slip Ramp (BSR). The whale may be either sick or injured and is not likely to leave this area.

- Recreational water activities near the area are temporarily not permitted and could result in very serious injuries to personnel and/or the whale.
- Harassment of marine species are strictly prohibited under U.S., RMI and international laws and treaties, including the USAKA Environmental Standards (UES) which govern all U.S. activities within the RMI.
- All water recreation activities such as boating, paddle-boarding/kayaking, windsurfing, swimming, snor-

keling, SCUBA diving, etc. are strictly prohibited in area circled on map until further notice.

- If the whale temporarily leaves the circled are, it must be avoided, and a minimum safe distance of 300 feet must be kept in case of incidental encounters while leaving the area.
- The area is under permanent surveillance by the Marine Department and is patrolled by Kwajalein Law Enforcement.
- Observation and photographing of the whale are only allowed from safe onshore locations.
- Only Marine Department cleared vessels and barges are allowed to access the BSR.
- Only USAG-KA cleared personnel are allowed in the exclusion zone.

TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

CANDLES and open flames are not permitted in BQ rooms. The Kwaja-lein Fire Department thanks you for keeping your neighbors safe.

METAL DETECTORS are not allowed on Kwajalein according to Army Regulation. Unexploded Ordnance exists and could be dangerous if disturbed.

Not allowed on USAG-KA: bow and arrow, air guns, paint ball and other projectile weapons.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation (e.g. trees, bushes, plants) may not be planted in the ground without an approved permit. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. In addition, do not place sprouted coconuts in your yard.

MEMORANDUM FOR Subordinate Commands, Tenant Units, and All Individuals Located on U.S. Army Garrison Kwajalein Atoll

SUBJECT: U.S. Army Garrison - Kwajalein Atoll (USAG-KA), COVID Work Safe, Live Safe Order #7

PURPOSE. This order seeks to educate the residents and visitors located on USAG-KA and identifies conduct that is prejudicial to good order and discipline, health, and safety of all personnel residing or working on the USAG-KA.

AUTHORITY. 10 U.S.C. Chapter 47 (Uniform Code of Military Justice); Title 18 United States Code 1382; Army Regulation 600-20 Army Command Policy; USAG-KA Policy 8-1, Command Sponsorship, USAG-KA Regulations 190-10, Entry & Exit Control; 190-50, Administrative Bar Actions, and W52P1J-19-F-0398 Contract Technical Exhibit I.

APPLICABILITY. This Order applies to all individuals located on USAG-KA including those who are subject to military orders, DoD personnel, dependents, contractors, and individuals stationed, and/or attached to units on USAG-KA, whether on or off the installation. This includes units, teams, and organizations rotating through and/or visiting USAG-KA for any reason including but not limited to missions, inspections, and training. For purposes of this memorandum, USAG-KA includes the eleven defense sites of the Kwajalein Atoll, all work and training areas, housing of all kinds, and all infrastructure and locations not specified.

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- 1. USAG-KA is currently at HPCON-A, the following expectations and actions apply:
- Masks are no longer required in Medical and Dental Facilities.
- Community members and workers are expected to maintain safe practices at all times. This includes maintaining adequate proper personal hygiene and reporting and seeking care for any potential influenza-like illness.
- Individuals may choose to mask at their own discretion.
- Masks may still be required on government-owned or contract-operated vehicles, planes, and marine assets. Check before you travel.
- No restrictions on workplace occupancy.

- 2. STATEMENT OF MILITARY PURPOSE AND NECESSITY. The arrival of COVID-19 to the Republic of the Marshall Islands (RMI) requires balance between mitigation measures and maintaining readiness. These measures preserve force readiness, limit the spread of COVID, and the health and welfare of service members, DA civilian employees, contractors, families, and the Marshall Islands.
- B. COMPLIANCE WITH LOCAL HEALTH ORDERS. All service members, family members, DA civilians, and contractors, both on and off post, will comply with all applicable provisions of Command authority and respect the laws of the RMI regarding public health orders. In the event this order imposes a more restrictive requirement than the RMI, the terms of this order shall take precedence over any order issued by the Marshall Islands.
- 4. VISITATION RESTRICTIONS. The Non-Resident Domestic Workers

- and Unofficial Guest Programs are now authorized. Overnight guests (480s) are limited to guests from within the RMI. Approval process remains unchanged.
- DINING-IN. DFAC (Zamperini Cafeteria & Café Roi) are open with full service. AAFES Food Court, Bakery, Outrigger, and American Eatery are open for dine-in and take-out service.
- RETAIL SHOPPING GUIDANCE. In-person shopping is authorized. Individuals may wear masks as they see fit.
- 7. ESSENTIAL ACTIVITIES & TRAV-EL. For purposes of this order "essential activities or services" includes, but is not limited to: official government duties, care of others (including adult and child caregivers). Space-A access and non-essential travel to Roi and Ebeye/3rd Island is authorized.
- 8. PRIVATE & PUBLIC GATHERINGS, MILITARY CEREMONIES. All Com-


- UNIT FORMATIONS & PHYSICAL TRAINING. Conduct physical training IAW the current HPCON guidance.
- 10. PLACE OF DUTY & TELEWORK. All personnel subject to this order will report to their regular place of duty during normal work hours. Workplace guidelines allow for 100 percent occupancy.
- 11. DUTY UNIFORM. While in a federal facility, or performing official duties, personnel including all military, civilian, contractors, and family members may wear a face covering.
- 12. MASKS IN FEDERALLY FUNDED TRANSPORTATION. If directed, all individuals will wear a mask on DoD aircraft, boats and other maritime conveyances, and buses traveling into, within, or out of the United

- States, and indoor DoD transportation hubs, regardless of vaccination status and CDC COVID-19 Community Levels.
- 13. ACTIVITIES. The Garrison Commander will determine rules governing the operation (including hours and maximum occupancy) of on-post activities, business, or facilities. Special categories of services include schools, CDC, and CYS. Individuals may choose to mask at their own discretion.
- 14. INSTALLATION ACCESS. The Non-Resident Domestic Workers and Unofficial Guest Programs are authorized. Overnight guests (480s) are limited to guests from within the RMI. Approval process remains unchanged.
- 15. PUNITIVE ORDER. Paragraphs 3, 8, 9, 11, and 12, of this order are punitive. Persons subject to the UCMJ who violate this order may be punished according to its provisions or face adverse administrative action. Persons not subject to the UCMJ may face administrative sanctions

- to include suspension or revocation of privileges and removal from the installation, suspension or termination of access to Government facilities and possible criminal prosecution.
- 16. INDIVIDUAL AND UNIT COM-MANDER RESPONSIBILITY. Individuals subject to this order have the duty to know and understand these prohibitions as well as all applicable provisions of local authority public health orders. Supervisors will ensure their personnel are briefed on the prohibitions and requirements of this order.
- 17. EFFECTIVE DATE. This order is effective immediately. This order supersedes all previous COVID Work Safe, Live Safe Orders. This order will remain in effect until rescinded by me or superseded by a new order.

DURING SOFFTY DANDUNGEMENT

Provide the following information: Location (building #, GPS, landmarks, etc); Size (compared to common items - football, scuba cylinder, etc). Treat UXO like you would treat dangerous sea creatures. Look but do not touch. For a detailed refresher, please attend the Island Orientation Briefing on the fourth Wednesday of every month.
