VETS DAY TOURNAMENT TEAMS CATCH BIG WINS

Kwajalein anglers gathered at the Small Boat Marina for the culmination of the 5th annual Veterans Day Fishing Tournament Nov. 14 after completing a two-day run to Roi-Namur and back to haul in their catch for the chance to win this year’s silver tournament trophy.

Following their return, anglers cleaned and bagged their catch while MWR Manager Rick Jameson and Kwajalein Atoll International Sport Fishing Club officer William Boutu presented prizes and awards to winning teams.

Of special note this year was a 185-pound marlin hauled in by the Nauti Hookers. Top prize for overall biggest catch went to team H2, for 458 pounds caught. The Nauti Hookers placed second overall with 278 pounds, and in third place, Koba Maron hauled in a total of 175.6 pounds.

KWAJALEIN SCHOOLS THANK VETERANS AT COMMUNITY ASSEMBLY

The Kwajalein School System held an annual assembly to thank veterans and military-connected families in the community Nov. 11 at the Davye Davis Multi-purpose Room at Kwajalein High School.

The ceremony featured student vocalists and performers from both Kwajalein High School and George Seitz Elementary School, as well as a special performance utilizing American Sign Language by students in Carrie Corley's class and a slideshow of service photos from the community.

KSS Superintendent Paul Uhren recognized members of each branch of service, asking them to stand for a round of applause, and made special recognition of USAG-KA Command Sgt. Ismael Ortega for his contributions to the community during his tour of

duty on Kwajalein. The CSM is set to PCS in upcoming weeks.

In his keynote remarks, U.S. Army Veteran and Range Generation Next's Reagan Test Site Deputy Project Manager/Range Charles "Chuck" Hensley shared about interconnections of teamwork and military heritage, beginning with Armistice Day, an observance to commemorate the end of World War I and all future wars—or so it was hoped.

The year 1917 marked the formation of the U.S. Army 82nd Airborne Division, in which Hensley served early in his own military career.

The division was noteworthy for the points of origin of its Soldiers, Hensley said. "When that team was formed, they realized there was an American Soldier from every state in the United States—48, at the time. ...So, their name became the All-American Division."

The individual Soldier ultimately works in a team that serves a greater

purpose, Hensley said.

Thousands of miles away from the U.S., by virtue of military service, Hensley can claim an historic connection with the Soldiers of 1917 and the namesake for an island facility, 1st Lt. Paul DeMeo, of the high school's athletic field. A Kwaj kid, DeMeo joined the Army and went on to earn the Ranger Tab, the Army Service Ribbon, Air Assault Badge, the Global War on Terrorism service Medal, and other accolades. He passed away in 2013, and like the many other Kwajalein-connected family members who have served, he is not forgotten.

"When you join a team, you are joining a team that's a little bit bigger than yourself and has a little more history," Hensley said. "It creates pressure to perform better. There is a great joy that comes from sharing hardship with the members of your team and accomplishing difficult tasks," he said.

U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

This week in U.S. Space and Missile Defense Command history, we look back on the inception of the Safeguard Anti-Ballistic Missile Program and the Strategic Arms Limitation Talks.

On Nov. 10, 1971, the Defense Procurement Authorization Bill was approved in Congressional Conference. The bill included funds in the amount of \$1.106 billion for the Safeguard Anti-Ballistic Missile Program. Although previously authorized to proceed with additional sites at Whiteman AFB, Missouri, and Warren AFB, Wyoming, funds for these locations were limited to site preparation. Safeguard construction allocations were limited to the first two ABM sites - Grand Forks AFB, North Dakota and Malmstrom AFB, Montana.

This week in history, on Nov. 17, 1969, the United States and the Soviet Union began the lengthy Strategic Arms Limitation Talks, or SALT I, in Helsinki, Finland. Secretary of Defense Melvin Laird declared that a unilateral cut in SAFE-

GUARD funds, or discontinuance of the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty would impair the U.S. position in these talks. Thus, the SAFEGUARD program served as a "bargaining chip" in the negotiations which would continue over a period of two and a half years until an interim agreement was signed in May of 1972.

This was the first time during the Cold War that the two nations had agreed to limit the number of nuclear missiles in their arsenals. At this point, the ABM Treaty limited both nations to 200 anti-ballistic missiles each.

RETHINKING THE MYTH OF THE HOLIDAY BLUES

As you wish each other “Happy Holidays” this fall, remember: every smile you encounter is not a happy smile.

Over time, multiple sources have led mental health professionals and the community at large to believe that depression and suicide rates increase over the holiday season, the time just before and leading up to Thanksgiving and continuing through New Year’s Eve.

The rationale for this belief is that many people are separated from loved ones, may have experienced a significant loss, are experiencing isolation and loneliness and have expectations of happiness and connections during the holidays which they cannot fulfill. Other triggers may be stresses related to holiday preparation, economic circumstances and frustrations associated with hosting or attending a holiday gathering.

People do experience stress and varying negative mood states leading up to and through the holidays. However, evidence and empirical statistics do not support the widely accepted belief that major depressive episodes and suicides increase correlating with the winter holidays.

Research conducted by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Center for Health Statistics suggest that major depressive episodes and suicides have a more direct correla-

tion to Seasonal Affective Disorder, or SAD, than the winter holidays. The research demonstrates that suicides and major depressive episodes are lowest in the United States during the winter months and higher in the spring. Numerous other studies conducted in both developed and developing countries have yielded the same or similar results. According to the literature, ambient temperatures have been correlated to increased psychiatric and behavioral disorders.

These are unique implications for environments like Kwajalein, where there is little variation in seasons and the hours of daylight. In places with distinct seasons, spring tends to be a time when people’s moods improve due to increased exposure to sunlight and the availability of outdoor activities and recreation. These factors can reduce symptoms of SAD. In an environment with little variation, major depression can be pervasive and triggered by seeing others enjoy life and activities year-round. In our local context, those suffering from depression may struggle to feel the same excitement others have while cycling, swimming and boating.

Our general social expectation is that people living in a “paradise” year-round should be happy. In part due to that belief, those around you may be struggling to present as well-adjusted while internally they face deep emotional distress.

Every smile is not a happy smile. Some smiles mask feelings of deep depression and anxiety which can persist and may even be more acute due to a lack of fulfillment. Despite social engagement,



feelings of disconnectedness, worry, hopelessness, and low self-esteem can persist. People may also exhibit signs of irritability or poor sleep (more or less), poor appetite (more or less), tearfulness, increased alcohol use and compulsive shopping. These are pervasive and persistent issues, and they cannot simply be correlated to the holidays.

Remember, every smiling face is not happy. If you identify with, and are experiencing any of these symptoms, please reach out for support from family, friends and your local Employee Assistance Program. You are not weak, and you are not alone. It takes more strength and courage to get help than to get through one more holiday season.

PERSONAL VS OFFICIAL SOCIAL MEDIA ACCOUNTS

DoDI 5400.17


The following graphic demonstrates use of a personal account in an official capacity and was adapted from an actual senior leader account.

PROFILE PICTURE

Inclusion of rank or official command photo, ICW other information on profile, further misconstrues this as an official account. Images in uniform are acceptable, so long as it doesn’t imply DoD sanction or endorsement.

NAME & USERNAME

Rank and name are being used in conjunction with an unofficial, personal account. To fix, remove rank from name and do not use official titles or rank within a created username.



CONTENT

Posting information in an official capacity through a personal account is prohibited. Soldiers may forward, like, or link to official information as long as it doesn’t imply status as an official account.

VERIFICATION

A verified personal account does not constitute an official DoD account. Personal accounts that are verified as a government account may be misconstrued as an official account.

BIO

Mixes both official duty title and personal information, which may also imply endorsement of a commercial product. To fix, remove titles and do not include references to official positions.

WEBSITE

Inclusion of an official website on a personal account can easily imply that this is an official account. To fix, remove or replace with a personal website.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS ON THE USAG-KA TELEPHONE TRANSITION

PUBLIC NOTICE

Q: Why is the phone system changing, and who is performing the work?

A: The current telephone switch and supporting installation infrastructure is 40+ years' old and failing. Hardware/software support for the system ended almost 20 years ago, and the Army cannot continue to sustain it. The telecom transition is part of an overall Army modernization initiative in the Pacific Theater led by the Army Program Executive Office Enterprise Information Systems (PEO EIS).

PEO EIS has their own government oversight and contractor performing the work for this project, known as PAC VoIP. The NEC-KA is providing assistance with the final phase/cutover and will eventually be responsible for operation and maintenance of the new system, collectively known as unified capabilities, or UC.

Q: What is the difference between an IP phone and a VoIP phone system? Which one are USAG-KA residents getting?

A: USAG-KA is getting the same telecommunications setup that other Army installations have been using for several years. IP phone, VoIP phone, and soft phone are all the same things. They are just different names for a device

and software client designed to support transmission of voice over the Internet, also known as Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) technology.

The device used to make calls could be a laptop, tablet, desktop computer or anything with Internet calling capabilities. Skype, Google Voice, Ooma, WhatsApp, FaceTime and Facebook Messenger dialing are examples of using VoIP technology that residents may be familiar with.

Q: What changes can USAG-KA residents/users expect after this system is implemented?

A: All dialing will be different for inbound and outbound calls at USAG-KA. There will be no more "double ring" for inbound long-distance calls. In USAG-KA workplaces, NIPR users will have Defense Switched Network (DSN) dialing capabilities.

The government-provided Cisco phones will be programmed for each specific location so First Responders answering 911 calls can identify the building, room, and number the person is calling from. NEC-KA will not be providing VoIP phones to residential locations.

Q: I am a USAG-KA resident choosing not to purchase Internet service. Can I opt out of this transition and still have a working

telephone?

A: USAG-KA residents will continue to have local telephone service to include 911 and other USAG-KA residences/locations.

To call outside of USAG-KA, residents will need a VoIP device and an Internet connection, such as at public Wi-Fi locations.

Q: How will my phone number change?

A: USAG-KA area code and prefix will change: (805) 355-xxxx changes to (808) 580-xxxx. USAG-KA dialing will require 7 digits: 480-xxxx will be our local and DSN number.

Q: Will my phone service be impacted by island brownouts or power outages?

A: The UC system has its own uninterruptable power supply to ensure service during power disruptions. Please note: Cordless telephones require an additional power source and will not work during power disruptions.

ARMY REGULATIONS

TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

CANDLES and open flames are not permitted in BQ rooms. The Kwajalein Fire Department thanks you for keeping your neighbors safe.

METAL DETECTORS are not allowed on Kwajalein according to Army Regulation. Unexploded Ordnance exists and could be dangerous if disturbed.

Not allowed on USAG-KA: bow and arrow, air guns, paint ball and other projectile weapons.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation (e.g. trees, bushes, plants) may not be planted in the ground without an approved permit. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. In addition, do not place sprouted coconuts in your yard.



PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

To spray for mosquitoes and flies, island pest control services will utilize EcoVia EC, is a liquid botanical oil insecticide with Thyme and Rosemary oil as active ingredients. It is safe to use in and

around homes and near water. EcoVia is also safe to use around children and pets. The spraying schedule is dependent on weather conditions. It is recommended that island residents avoid fogged areas for 30 minutes.

Do your part to deter mosquitoes and flies

- Check for standing water where mosquitoes breed
 - Dump any accumulated water at least weekly
 - Trim heavy vegetation and eliminate accumulated leaves
- Do not add food waste directly into open trash cans such as the Emon Beach trash containers, large black trash cans, or residential green trash receptacles. Always seal food and animal waste inside trash/plastic bags before adding to trash cans. Periodically clean outdoor trash receptacles.





- Cooking fires are the number one cause of home fires and home injuries, yet nearly all of them are preventable.
- The leading cause of kitchen fires is cooking left unattended.

UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Remember the three Rs of UXO: **Recognize** an item as possible Unexploded Ordnance. **Retreat** from the area of the UXO. **Report** suspected UXO immediately by notifying EOD (5-1433) or CPS (5-4445).

WEATHER DISCUSSION

A broad trough within the Intertropical Convergence Zone will remain over Kwajalein on Saturday afternoon. Gradually, this trough will move west and allow less active weather to set up over Kwajalein Atoll Saturday night and Sunday.

Despite a low-level ridge moving over Kwajalein during the weekend, the ITCZ will remain disorganized over the central Marshall Islands most of next week. Winds will stay in the low teens on Saturday before decreasing to single digits on Sunday.

Starting on Monday, expect winds to vary between easterlies and light and variable conditions. Heavy scattered showers will linger on Saturday and early Sunday while the ITCZ trough continues west.

Widely scattered conditions are expected Monday through Wednesday as the ITCZ lingers over the atoll. Cloud cover will be thick and extensive across the Marshall Islands through next Thursday.

SATURDAY

Mostly cloudy with scattered showers and stray thunderstorms. Winds E-SE at 9-15 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY

Mostly cloudy with widely scattered showers and stray thunderstorms. Winds E-SE at 5-9 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Partly cloudy with widely scattered showers and stray thunderstorms. Winds ESE-SSE at 3-8 knots with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK

The Intertropical Convergence Zone will remain over the central Marshall Islands during the first half of the week.

Continued low pressure systems in mid-latitudes will keep the subtropical ridge weak and trade wind surges away from the central Pacific. Expect pulses of showers to form within the ITCZ throughout the week.

Weather models suggest winds will increase to moderate speeds by the holiday.

Another period of heavy rain is possible during Thanksgiving, however that requires a developed trade wind surge northeast of Kwajalein and the subtropical ridge to remain weak northwest of the Marshall Islands. In general, expect winds below 10 knots and widely scattered to scattered showers.
