Lt. Gen Daniel Karbler, commander, Space and Missile Defense Command, held a Kwajalein Town Hall meeting November 5 at the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room at Kwajalein High School during his week-long visit to U.S. Army Garrison—Kwajalein Atoll. This is an edited transcript of that meeting.

Thanks very much for the awesome hospitality when I ... and my team got here. As the senior commander, it allows me to gain great appreciation for what you do here. As a test customer, I kinda got a sense for what is going on here and what everybody does, but now as the senior commander, thanks to Col. Pugsley and many of you out in the crowd, the last four days have been very, very fulfilling for me to understand what you do. So whether you are DPW, RTS, Emergency Services, the Clinic, Food Services, MWR, you name it, I have been able to go across the waterfront and see what you all do.

And you have my great appreciation and admiration for what you do. It is not lost

on me the challenges that we have out here: remote, the environment, corrosion we're all resource challenged. And by the way, the adversary is not taking a timeout.

The work that we do here is critically important and it is recognized by all of our national leadership, the importance of Kwaj.

What I do

My job is to take everything that I will learn here in the 5 or 6 days ... here and take that with me and I'll start farming out tasks and asks, being the number one advocate for what we are doing on-island here at the Army Senior Leader level.

Don't get me wrong, Army senior leaders recognize the importance of Kwaj. We have to do a good job of articulating what the needs are out here and that is my job to take that message back to everybody, whether it's USARPAC, IMCOM, AMC, Army Contracting Command, Missile Defense Agency, you name it, I will make sure that at my level and above they are well

aware of what we need out here.

A quote that really resonates with me is 'Once it's gone, we'll never get it back.'

You talk about the capabilities that we have out here—if we allow it to deteriorate, if we don't maintain, if we don't replace it, if we don't upgrade it, if we don't modernize it—once it's gone we're never going to get it back. So I have to make sure I carry that message forward.

If you look at all the strategic documents and national defense strategy, look at Army 2030 – the Army of 2030 will not be built in 2030. The Army of 2030 is being built today by the testing that we are doing, by all the things that we do out here at Kwaj.

There needs to be a sense of urgency in the Army that we are fixing and addressing the challenges that we have out here to ensure that we get the resourcing that we need. You have my full commitment on that.

It's personal

I'm in this for the long haul. I have two kids: my daughter is a lieutenant in the Army stationed at Fort Bliss; I have a son-in-law who is a helicopter pilot, also stationed at Bliss; I have a son who is a Junior at West Point, so I have skin in this game.

The Army of 2030 isn't 'Dan Karbler is going to be retired for a few years,' the Army of 2030 for me will have a son who has been in the Army for six years and a daughter who will be in the Army for 10 years, and many of you probably have friends and family who are serving as well.

So, the commitment isn't just for the here and now for what we need to do now, but for those future generations who are going to stand on our shoulders like we stood on the shoulders of veterans ahead of us.

I got to meet the president (of the RMI) and he specifically made a point to thank the garrison for what they did to allow the RMI to pull through COVID, at the start of COVID, to be able to repatriate and bring people in to keep our missions going. He was appreciative and recognized how the garrison helped the RMI.

Family

At SMDC, I don't have employees and I don't have force structure or a workforce: you are part of the SMDC team and you are a member of the SMDC family – team, family – not employee. When you have a sense of team or family it just engenders a different sense of belonging and a different sense of contributing. I'd like everybody to make sure you embody that—you are part of the garrison team or the garrison family.

And the other thing, if you are a tenant here at Kwaj, you are not a tenant. You are a joint mission partner.

You are part of the team, a member of the family, and a joint mission partner.

Q&A

Q1: Can we reasonably expect some additional resources for infrastructure around here?

A1: I've taken pictures of all the crumbling infrastructure, the rust and the corrosion on my phone. My phone will be my truth-teller. You can expect that I will go fight for the resources. I would hope that my arguments will resonate with people that the Army of 2030 has to start to be built today and it can't be built on a crumbling infrastructure that is not going to last until 2025.

Q2: SHARP has an excellent program here but it doesn't extend out to the contractors or their families. When we talk about resources and the importance of resources, could we have some type of resource available that would extend out from SHARP that would cover our families like a senior leadership or key spouse?

A2: So we talked about that today. There is a giant continental divide between what Col. Pugsley can do as the leader and what the rules allow us to do for the contractors. We should not have this divide. One of the people I'm going to talk with is Brig. Gen. Christine Beeler, Army Contracting Command commander.

The normal contracting model doesn't fit very well in Kwajalein. It makes no sense to have SHARP capability here that I can't share with the contractors.

Q3: The One-Team philosophy does not apply to the housing policy here. How should we feel as one team with the policy the way it is.

A3: I will look at that with Col. Pugsley. I will make sure that there is equity. As we try to attract more experienced talent, we have to be able to ensure a sense of community and a sense of fairness is baked into the policy and it's not just categories that are government only and Category D is everybody else.

Q4: Housing—our neighbors just had to move out due to termites. But there is nothing in place to help people when they are forced to move. The only thing that is moved is government furniture and some of these people have lived here for some time.

Can we look into something to help people who are being forced to move and having to come up with all the things and cost to do it themselves?

A4: From Command Sgt. Maj. Ismael Ortega, former Garrison CSM: We have corrected that for any life, health or safety that the government forces people to move, the housing office will support with packing material and assist with moving. Col. Pugsley: The same thing goes for during renovations when we ask people to move that will be an expense and resources covered by the garrison because we are asking you to do it in support of the renovations.

Q5: Infrastructure and buildings issue. I just went to Carlos for the first time. The building there is in bad shape. It would be nice if there were a program in place where if people take on those roles and responsibilities that are in contracts for other companies, it would be nice if the company got points or credit for it for people to pitch in to help.



A5: Someone owns every building here. Someone is signed for it. We have to put somebody in charge of the buildings. Too often if no one is in charge, the responsibility crept away from who was responsible.

We can commit to if there are groups who want to go out there, we ought to be able to commit to support that but I don't want to let some contractually off the hook if it's their job to do it.

Q6: What reading on leadership and the INDO-PACOM region do you recommend to understand how we can support the mission?

A6: I just finished the book 'Radical Candor.' 'Radical Candor' is a really good book about telling the truth and right upfront saying what is good and what is screwed up. You can't have radical candor if you don't have good relationships and have trust with each other.

Another book I am reading is called "Range." It's about broadening and not being a one-trick pony.

They use the example of Tiger Woods and Roger Federer. Tiger Woods is very specialized from a young age with golf. His dad taught him golf. Federer grew up playing soccer, swimming, track and tennis – very broad.

The purpose of the book is to show that when you have range you continue to really increase on your abilities. If you are specialized, you will get up to a certain point and then you will plateau. The book 'Hawaii' by Michener is a wonderful book about how Hawaii has developed over time and has a lot of history in it.

Q7: I'm concerned about international developments in Russia and China, personally I'm concerned with what I am seeing. What is the Army's plan to how Kwajalein plays into that?

A7: When I meet with USARPAC on Monday I will ask how Kwaj plays in the Army of the Pacific.

We've talked a lot about missile defense, but Kwaj hasn't been a part of our discussion. I want him to become an advocate. He understands the strategic importance that Kwaj plays.

Q8: Security posture on island. Due to recent events what are we doing to increase and better our security posture to include vetting people coming on and ensuring we have support if something happens on the island?

A8: Foundational is messaging and information and the garrison is currently looking for better mechanisms in which to rapidly inform the right part of the community to ensure incidents and issues are quickly messaged to the team so everyone has the right information as quickly as possible.

Second, not only trying to ensure the capacity of security forces, making sure they are at the right places at the right time, they are being random and providing the best coverage possible for the installation to mitigate and minimize risk as much as possible. Same thing goes for growing the PMO outside of security, we are about 70% there and looking at more patrols and trying to navigate and resource better and more experienced talent as well.

There is also the infrastructure piece and some installation-wide notification systems that we are trying to get after, there is also an installation-wide monitoring system we are trying to get after. For about two years we've been working a program to get CCTV cameras around the installation at key checkpoints and key locations to help monitor that. COVID got in the way of a lot of that and currently we have it on order through LOGCAP and the plan is when they arrive to implement them across the installation.

An underlying piece is the informational infrastructure, a lot of comms have to be run to help support those systems. Fundamental to the overall architecture is really trying to empower the community, if you see something say something, and on the garrison side we have to make sure that people are in place to do what is expected of them to support the community.

Q9: Any update on the Fit to Fight teacher requirements from the last town hall?

A9: USAG-KA Requested relief from that requirement in the contract and it is at Rock Island Arsenal, Illinois at the moment. Every one of you is critical to the success of this mission. We can't afford to lose anyone. When we found out about this we addressed it rapidly to get a solution and hopefully it will be resolved.

Q10: Which chain of command am I supposed to use here? I was in the Navy and I understand the chain of command. How do I figure out who to talk to for specific issues?

A10: Talk to your boss. If it is a problem with the Garrison then talk with your boss and bring it up.

Q11: Is there an ICE here?

A11: We are going to be standing up ICE, an interactive customer evaluation. We will work with USAG-KA Public Affairs to get the word out.

U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE Defense command history

Prior to the beginning of Operation Flintlock, leaders had determined that the Army would run Kwajalein and the air bases while the Navy would manage Roi-Namur.


From the end of the battle until Dec. 1, 1944, operations on Kwajalein had been managed by GROPAC 2, operating under the Island Commander, an Army Brigadier General.

A GROPAC could take many forms, depending upon the location and requirements. Its focus was on operations of the harbor and the waterfront.

On Dec. 1, the Kwajalein base reached its next phase of development as the Navy formally established Naval Base Kwajalein under the command of Capt. Walter Thomson. The new unit was short lived, however, as it was replaced by U.S. Navy Operating Base Kwajalein under Admiral William Harrill, in June 1945. Unlike its predecessor, the NOB Kwajalein was under the commander of Kwajalein Atoll and over the Island Command.

Six months later, after the end of the war, on Dec. 22, 1945, Commodore Ben Wyatt was named the Commander of Naval Air Base Kwajalein. As the wartime command structure dissolved, as one source described the situation, Wyatt also assumed the duties of the former island commander, Kwajalein, Commander NOB Kwajalein, AtCom Kwajalein and ComMarGils (Deputy Military Governor of the Marshall and Gilbert Islands).

In addition to Kwajalein, installations at Roi-Namur, Ebeye, Majuro, Eniwetok, Tarawa, Marcus Island and the civil administration of the Marshallese and the Gilbertese were under his command.





On Jan. 19, 1944, the tank landing ship USS Addison County, LST-31, left Pearl Harbor Navy Yard and returned to the Pacific Theater to support combat operations at Kwajalein Atoll.

LST-31 was a component of Task Force 52, the Southern Attack Force's Advance Transport unit. It carried a complement of 17 tracked landing vehicles, ammunition, supplies and fuel to support operations. For her mission into the Marshall Islands, LKST-31 received new 40 mm Bofuors guns, 20 mm Oerlikon cannons and an engine overhaul. She purred like a new car and wore a squeaky-clean shade of haze gray.

After arriving on Kwajalein Atoll Feb. 1 to offload cargo, transport Soldiers and equipment, the ship resupplied and prepared for the next operation: the battle of Eniwetok.

This week marks the beginning of LST-31's voyage to Kwajalein. To commemorate the ship's mission support, the Hourglass has reprinted materials by LST-31's Lt. Cmdr. John D. Schneidau, who described the voyage and conflict at Kwajalein Atoll in photographs and letters to his wife, Katherine.

Schneidau might have received a few surprised looks in January 1944 when his fellow officers saw the contents of his sea bag—several personal cameras—but then again, perhaps not. Schneidau, a native of New Orleans, where LST-31 was also laid down, was a photography enthusiast.

"Hope the sun is out so I can get some good pictures," he notes along the way.

Schneidau composed his letter—at one point, he calls it a "book"—as one massive text block over several days in late January 1944 before mailing it home. He also followed a strict format for his correspondence. There are no line or paragraph breaks. Writing in a diary or chronological format was prohibited by operational security standards, as was naming specific dates and locations.

In one passage, Schneidau says he's excited that there is a camera operator aboard from Commander in Chief Pacific Fleet Headquarters.

"There are several photographers aboard, and I have a couple of cameras myself, so I hope to get some interesting pictures," he says.

At first, Schneidau describes life aboard the ship as relatively uneventful: "Usually, in the afternoon around 3:30 [p.m.], I go out on deck in my shorts and pitch the medicine ball around with some of the officers to get a little exercise. Don't infer from this, however, that we have lots of leisure time. We haven't. Ship's work keeps us fairly busy most of the time. Our particular group of ships is considerably larger this time than last and is better escorted."

Of course, the quiet does not last. Those familiar with Kwajalein WWII history may find certain passages describing "heavily fortified islands" have resonance: "It is now two days after D-day and one day after troops landed on the main objective," writes Schneidau. "Yesterday morning before dawn, we steamed out of the lagoon to rendezvous in our area from which we were to take part in the operation. As we approached the island, the battleships opened their bombardment."

On the atoll, Schneidau describes violent scenes, casualties, and beaches illuminated at night by the glow of explosions and beacons. His post-bombardment photographs frame splintered tree trunks, but also several standing coconut palms, dispelling Kwaj myths of a lone coconut palm that withstood tons of shelling.

Schneidau went on to serve in the Pacific Theater at Eniwetok, Tinian, Okinawa and Saipan. Records of his many photos and letters have been widely archived in museum collections and are available online. While he was not part of an embedded public affairs support team, Schneidau's photos and writing are invaluable and instructive about the day-to-day life of Soldiers and Sailors.

The text of Lt. Cmdr. John D. Schneidau's letters has been gently edited for publication. The text of the letters can be found online in full, without line breaks online at the National WWII Museum.

Dear Katherine:

Well, here we are, on the way to hit the [Japanese]. This is the first I have writ-

ten while we are underway although we have been going for a week now. I am not dating this as it is against regulations to keep a diary or to write in diary form. So, although I will add to the letter from time to time, I won't write it as a day-today chronicle, but merely as a continuous story.

Naturally, I won't mail it until a considerable amount of time after the operation is over and most of the stuff has been announced to the public.

We are on our way to invade the enemy in one of his biggest strongholds. In fact, this will be one of the most important and biggest operations in the Pacific war to date. Naturally, we are all proud to be able to play such a major part in it. The particular island our outfit is going to hit is the biggest and strongest of the group, so we expect plenty of trouble.

Makin and Tarawa were set-ups compared to what we are going into, since there will be enemy air bases all around us. Of course, they will attempt to knock these out before we get there, but it is highly doubtful if they can completely knock out all of them.

The last week has been one of very little activity. We just roll along day after day at our seeming snail's pace with nothing to see but blue water and sunny skies.

The weather really has been fine. Clear and sunny every day, and not much sea, just a long swell that makes us roll gently from side to side, but not enough to bother with, although some of the Soldiers get seasick the first few days. Time means very little out here on the ocean. I seldom know what day of the week it is. A thousand miles gets to mean little to you in such an illimitable expanse of water. In fact, from where we were this morning, one could travel a thousand miles in any direction and not see land. We play poker most every night in the wardroom as there is no other pastime except reading.

HUNTSVILLE, Ala.—The U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command's senior enlisted leader encouraged veterans to talk about their experience of service to friends, family and even strangers, no matter where the opportunity arises.

Command Sgt. Maj. Finis A. Dodson told a group of faculty, students and alumni at the Alabama A&M University, Nov. 8, during their Veterans Day program that veterans sharing their stories can inspire future generations to serve the nation.

"Today, only 1 percent of our nation serves in the military, and 61 percent of those who serve are more likely to have been exposed to military life through friends and family," Dodson said. "Veterans have firsthand knowledge of the benefits of a military career and can bridge the gap between those who are familiar with military life and those who have never considered the military as a career."

All around the country these veterans serve as teachers, doctors, engineers, social workers, community leaders, first responders, elected officials and more, Dodson said.

"They continue to serve our communities by making positive contributions, building stronger futures and inspiring future generations," he said.

Veterans Day is an important day for the country to recognize all who have served the nation with honor and distinction, Dodson said.

"We honor the brave men and women from all walks of life who have stepped forward to defend our nation throughout our history," Dodson said. "Generations of patriots have dedicated themselves to the defense of our country to make us stronger and more resilient as a nation."

He said the Army is focused on its people and is committed to taking care of its Soldiers' health, readiness and development both personally and professionally.

"In the Army, we know our greatest asset is our people," Dodson said. "Our all-volunteer Army is a credit to Americans of all races, genders, and creeds. And our common commitment to the defense and love of country binds us together and unifies us."

The U.S. now has the largest population of young veterans since the Vietnam War, Dodson said.

"Duty to our country is a prime reason people want to serve in the Army, but the Army is great career," Dodson said.

"We owe it to these men and women


to make sure they transition from active-duty careers with skills and experiences to find meaningful employment."

Dodson reminded attendees that the nation did not unite and support its veterans during the Vietnam War.

On Veterans Day, and every day, Dodson encouraged attendees to thank veterans for their service.

"As a nation, we must ensure that the service and sacrifices of our veterans are never overlooked or forgotten," Dodson said. "As we all know, freedom is not free."







MONTHLY FIRE TIP FROM THE USAG-KA FIRE PREVENTION OFFICE **Christmas Safety**

- Live cut trees are not permitted in the garrison's dining facilities, bachelor quarters, hospital, dispensary and Macv's.
- Dispose of any live greenery used to decorate when needles or leaves begin to easily fall off or the leaves turn brown. For live cut trees, choose a sturdy stand that holds at least one gallon of water.
- Place any live holiday trees a minimum of three feet away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources.
- Turn lights off before going to bed or leaving the home.
- Use no more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord and avoid areas where the cords can become a tripping hazard.
- Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Safety first! More than one third of home decoration fires are started by candles, and more than two of every five decoration fires happen because decor was placed too close to a heat source.

UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch. You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO; and
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder
