

For more than 20 years, the Kwajalein **School System Ri-Katak Student Program** has welcomed cohorts of Marshallese students to attend and matriculate from Kwajalein's schools—but it's not easy.

Kwajalein High School Senior and Ri-Katak Program student Erenty Jacob speaks plainly about the challenges of attending school on one island and living on another in her interview with Shannon Robert.

The Kwajalein Hourglass is proud to feature reporter Shannon Robert, a 2022 graduate of Kwajalein High School on US-AG-KA, as she embarks upon an original interview series to explore the lives and thoughts of Marshallese students who have particiated in the KSS Ri-Katak student program.

Shannon Robert: How would you describe the Ri-Katak life?

Erenty Jacob: It is tiring. Living in two different worlds and having to swap personalities is exhausting. It is mentally and physically tiring.

SR: To my knowledge, there is a misconception that Ri-Katak kids are "privileged." What are your opinions on this idea?

EJ: I feel offended. I guess you can call us privileged, but I do not feel like that's what is happening. Yes, it is a privilege to come to school on an army base, but it also has downsides, like discrimination and what people think of us. It's just all about perspectives.

SR: What were some of the struggles you faced as a Ri-Katak student and as an Ebeye local?

El: Going back and forth between the two islands is a struggle. The boat schedule and how they are 30 minutes, or an hour apart is very time consuming-especially when we're supposed to be doing homework or chores at home.

SR: Would you say you were fortunate to be a part of the Ri-Katak program?

EJ: Yes, because it's a benefit. If I had gone to school on Ebeye I wouldn't know as much about jobs here or my college plan. I feel like I would've been more alone. ... I have more mentors and teachers to help me plan out my future.

SR: Do you feel you had a good, balanced life on both Ebeye and Kwaj? If so, how did you balance it?

EJ: Right now, and throughout my whole high school career, I think that there hasn't always been a balance. It's either staying on Kwaj to do something or needing to go back home right away. I take it one day at a time and see what I should prioritize every day, instead of

laying it all out on a calendar. There's not really a balance for me.

SR: Were there times where you felt you did not fit in on both Kwaj and or Ebeye?

EJ: No, I feel like I don't fit in either worlds one way or another. On Kwaj, I feel like I am "too Marshallese" even though I'm as "white" on Ebeye.

SR: How has living on Ebeye and going to Kwaj for school shaped you for your

EJ: It has really taught me about time management. It's opened my eye to new perspectives.

SR: What was the school dynamic like?

EJ: To me, school has always felt the same each year. I wake up at dawn, get ready, hop onto the 7:15 boat and ride a bus to school. Morning has never changed drastically. Sports and after school activities are where we truly learned [about] prioritizing time management.

If we never signed up for said things, then we would not have learned the struggles of needing to take a shower at a friend's place 15 minutes before the boat leaves, or deciding whether to do our homework or rest 30 minutes before practice.

SR: Do you feel everyone got along well and you created "a family away from home," and such?

EJ: Yes, I do have family-like bonds here and I am forever grateful. My family bonds here are different than my family. Because I feel like I am not as close to them. I could talk about my struggles with the family I have here which brings us closer. We are also close because we experience the same things.

SR: Did you ever feel the need to "fit" into both worlds (Ebeye and Kwaj)?

EJ: No, I did not feel the need to "fit" into both worlds.

SR: What did that look like?

EJ: Both places made me feel like I am a black sheep. When I'm on Kwaj it seems like I'm too "Marshallese" and when I'm on Ebeye I am too "white." It never felt like I belonged to one place.

SR: What motivates you to get up in the mornings?

EJ: My parents and my auntie who wakes me up every morning. I wouldn't feel motivated to get up, but then I remember that I must get up and because it is my last year and I need to try hard this year.

SR: Have you ever felt pressure as a Ri-Katak student?

EJ: There is always pressure. It's either coming from parents, teachers, whoever, or even people that are related to me even though I don't know them. They think that since I go to school on Kwaj, I'm smart, I must have good grades, I must have a 4.0 GPA but really, it's not. I wish it were, but it's not.

SR: Tell me about a mentor you had?

EJ: Ms. Masina McCollum has been there the longest since kindergarten. I feel like she knows more about us. We have a close bond with her, and she is like a second mother

SR: What is your favorite Ri-Katak memory?

EJ: Boat rides, because it is usually the time for us to play games, bwebwenato (talk stories) and sleep. Sport events because we support each other, and we show it through cheering and others.

TRACK SANTA WITH HELP FROM NORAD

Every day of the year, NORAD defends North America using an all-domain and globally integrated approach to track everything that flies in and around Canada and the United States. On Dec. 24, NORAD adds a special mission: tracking Santa.

Like many origin stories, NORAD's mission to track Santa began by accident. In 1955 a young child, trying to reach Santa, dialed the misprinted phone number from a department store ad in the local newspaper. Instead of calling Santa, the child called the Continental Air Defense Command (CO-NAD) Operations Center in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Air Force Col. Harry Shoup, the commander on duty that night who answered the child's phone call, was quick to realize a mistake had been made and assured the child he was Santa.

After more incoming calls, Shoup assigned a duty officer to continue answering calls and a tradition was born, that continued when NORAD was formed in 1958.

Each year since, NORAD has dutifully reported Santa's location on Dec. 24 to millions of children and families across the world. Because of the support, services and resources generously provided by volunteers and our government and corporate contributors, NORAD Tracks Santa has persevered for more than 65 years.

In fact, what started because of a typo has flourished and is recognized as one of the Department of Defense's largest community outreach programs.

Each year, the NORAD Tracks Santa Web Site receives several million unique visitors from more than 200 countries and territories around the world. Volunteers typically answer more than 130,000 calls to the NORAD Tracks Santa hotline from children across the globe.



DEAR KATHERINE

JOHN D. SCHNEIDAU WRITES FROM KWAJALEIN

This week, The Kwajalein Hourglass continues the letters of Lt. Cmdr. John D. Scheidau, who wrote home to his wife, Katherine, as his tank landing ship, USS Addison County, LST-31, performed mission support operations during its January 1944 voyage to Kwajalein Atoll.

Our particular group of ships is considerably larger this time than last and is better escorted. This morning before dawn, one of the destroyers picked up two subs on the surface about ten miles away. They submerged before the DD could get near and we don't think our group was spotted: however, one never knows. Subs will not be as much of a bother, though, as planes.

I think we have enough escorts to take care of the subs if there are only one or two.

Tomorrow, we enter the area of enemy air search, that is, the area which the enemy probably patrols with his planes, and every day thereafter, the likelihood of being picked up by them becomes stronger.

We will probably make up a pool on when the first real General Quarters will be sounded. Took the crew up on the forecastle this morning and gave them the dope on the coming operation and also a little pep talk.

Think they are all raring to go. So are we, for that matter.

Wonder if the [Japanese] know we are on the way yet.

Probably not.

He'll pick us up soon, though. Well, it won't make much difference as he has probably been expecting us anyhow.

What did we give Janet for her birthday? Today is her birthday, I believe. Give her my greetings, although she'll get them a month or two too late.

Incidentally, I guess we will be out here on this thing for at least a month and perhaps two. It's a sort of progressive affair and will take a good bit of time to finish everything up. When it's all over, I think we stand a good chance of getting sent back to the States this time. Hope so.

This ought to be one good show. There are several photographers aboard, and I have a couple of cameras myself, so I hope to get some interesting pictures.

Well, that's all, to date. Will write more when more develops, which shouldn't be long, now.

Tomorrow is possibly a little early but expect hot doings sure by day after tomorrow. Maybe we'll get a couple of more flags to paint on the bridge. ----


U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

Even before the development of long-range nuclear missiles, faced with an escalating arms race, President Dwight Eisenhower delivered his "Atoms for Peace" speech before the United Nations on Dec. 8, 1953.

"Let no one think that the expenditure of vast sums for weapons and systems of defense can guarantee absolute safety. ... The awful arithmetic of the atomic bomb does not permit any such easy solution." Eisenhower recommends that "experts ... be mobilized to apply atomic energy to the needs of agriculture, medicine, and other peaceful activities," but recognizes that "the coming months will be fraught with fateful decisions" for all nations.



NOTICE OF AVAILABILITY U.S. SPACE FORCE - SPACE SYSTEMS COMMAND FLIGHT TESTS FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT / OVERSEAS ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT (EA/OEA)

PUBLIC NOTICE

The United States (U.S.) Space Force (USSF) proposes to test a flight launch vehicle from launch facilities on Wake Island to the U.S. Army Ronald Reagan Ballistic Missile Defense Test Site (RTS), managed by the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command (USASM-DC), in the Kwajalein Atoll. While Wake Island is managed and controlled by the U.S. Air Force Pacific Air Forces Regional Support Center, the launch facilities themselves are controlled and operated by the U.S. Missile Defense Agency (MDA).

The test mission would require two test flights, which would be executed by the U.S. Space Force (USSF) – Space Systems Command (SSC) Launch Enterprise, Small Launch and Targets Division, located at Kirtland Air Force Base, New Mexico.

The Department of the Air Force (DAF) has environmental management and oversight authority for USSF and is therefore the lead agency for this National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) analysis. On 21 April 2022, the USASM-DC and MDA were requested by the DAF to become Cooperating Agencies. The Final USSF SSC Flight Tests EA/OEA analyzed the environmental impacts from the test launch of up to two flight test demonstrations from Wake Island toward the RTS in the Republic of the Marshall Islands, which operates under a Compact of Free Association with

the United States and follows regulatory provisions of the NEPA.

The Final USSF SSC Flight Tests EA/OEA and signed Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) are available at http://ussf-ssc-eaoea.govsupport.us.

Copies of the Final EA/OEA and Final FONSI were placed in the Grace Sherwood Library, Kwajalein Island; the Roi-Namur Library, Marshall Islands; and the Wake Island Airport Lobby, Wake Atoll.

- Live cut trees are not permitted in the garrison's dining facilities, bachelor quarters, hospital, dispensary and Macy's.
- Dispose of any live greenery used to decorate when needles or leaves begin to easily fall off or the leaves turn brown. For live cut trees, choose a sturdy stand that holds at least one gallon of water.
- Place any live holiday trees a minimum of three feet away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sourc-
- Turn lights off before going to bed or leaving the home.
- Use no more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord and avoid areas where the cords can become a tripping hazard.


• Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame



ARMY REGULATIONS

TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

CANDLES and open flames are not permitted in BQ rooms. The Kwajalein Fire Department thanks you for keeping your neighbors safe.

METAL DETECTORS are not allowed on Kwajalein according to Army Regulation. Unexploded Ordnance exists and could be dangerous if disturbed.

Not allowed on USAG-KA: bow and arrow, air guns, paint ball and other projectile weapons.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation (e.g. trees, bushes, plants) may not be planted in the ground without an approved permit. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. In addition, do not place sprouted coconuts in your yard.

UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch. You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

Recognize an item as possible unex-

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder



E-WARENESS GIANT CLAMS

Two species of giant clams are found at Kwajalein Atoll, Tridacna Gigas and Tridacna squamosal.

- Both are protected throughout the atoll by the USAKA Environmental Standards and the Endangered Species Act.
- Please do not harass or collect living species.
- Please do not collect or export giant clam shells.

Giant clam shells found in pack-outs or mailed packages can result in large fines.
