MARCH IS WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

This month, we remember the nuclear rights activist Darlene Keju-Johnson.

A powerful speaker, Keju-Johnson's lasting impact on the international community continues to unite Pacific anti-nuclear activists and to raise awareness of the legacy of nuclear testing in the Marshall Islands following World War II.

Born on Ebeye and raised on Wotje, Keju was raised downwind of Bikini and Enewetak during the years of the U.S. nuclear testing program. She graduated with a master's degree in public health from the University of Hawaii. Among the many international groups Keju-Johnson addressed are the 1983 Pacific Plenary of the World Council of Churches Assembly.

QUESTIONS RAISED AT RMI WORKFORCE TOWN HALLS

Employees on Enniburr and Kwajalein raised questions about employment, employee benefits and island facilities during two late-February RMI workforce town halls on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur, respectively. Here are a few of the questions and concerns raised during the town halls.

Q: A lot of Marshallese don't know about the Town Halls. Is there a way to notify them?

A: "My team will work with our mission partners to maximize dissemination that town halls are happening in addition to the newspaper and on the Roller channel," said USAG-KA Commander Col. Tom Pugsley. "We will look into communications, and we'll work with the human resources representatives to maximize participation."

Q: Why is there no translation during training? The training is not fair to us since it is not in our language. Some of us are ashamed we don't understand what is going on.

A: "This comes down to safety. We will look for opportunities or options to maximize the efficiency of that training so it's not just you listening to the training and understanding only 75 percent of it because the presenter is talking so fast. We'll dig into this over the next couple weeks."

Q: Why do the RMI dining facility employees now have to pay to eat meals?

A: "We are not authorized or allowed to provide free meals to anyone. It has gone on like this for many years. When it was discovered, we had to end it. We are looking into an exception to policy and a reduced rate for our RMI teammates. Both efforts are still ongoing."

Q: What's going on with the washing machines and dryers in the laundry facility by the Dock Security Checkpoints on Kwajalein and Roi-Namur?

A: "This should be an easy switch out," said Command Sgt. Maj. Ernest Miller. "It is AAFES-owned here and on Roi. The machines aren't here yet, but we do have extra outlets for them. AAFES leadership is visiting Kwajalein later this month."

Q: Who at the dining facilities decides how much meat to give each diner?

A: "We know it is an issue. We were trying to control portions to eliminate waste. You can now go back up to get more, seconds or thirds now," said Russ Hastings, LOGCAP V Kwajalein Task Order Manager for V2X.

Q: We pay for dental insurance but can't use dental on Kwaj and have to go to Ebeye.

A: "We will be looking into this."

Q: Can Third Island get used government furniture? This will help the Marshallese here instead of the furniture being sent to Majuro.

A: "The RMI government gets the right of first refusal on furniture items," said Col. Pugsley. "By law, they have 30 days to decide and then 30 days to pick it up. Next, we reach out to RMI Liaison Lanny Kabua and Kwajalein Atoll local government Ebeye Mayor Hirata Kabua. Finally, donated furniture is made available to Ebeye and Third Island residents."

Q: What is the status of power on Third Island?

A: Col. Pugsley said that we are working with the RMI government to tie in third

Island's power to Roi. "Hopefully in the next couple of years we'll be able to start providing power. It will be a huge win."

Q: Some people have gone off island for medical treatment and lost their jobs upon their return. One man has a family to support. Another works at the dining facility, and there are one or two more at the housing office. All of them are Vectrus employees.

A: Col. Pugsley said these individuals should approach their human resources offices to ask for documentation approving them to leave the island. It's an interaction between company and employee. He encouraged employees to speak with their HRs.

Q: It seems unfair that new hires are receiving the same pay as RMI employees who have worked here for years. It may affect how they perform.

A: From the V₂X leadership: "There is no time-in-service bump for pay. Get with your HRs. Employees must know what opportunities they have afforded to them."

Q: Supervisors tell employees their job title helps them get more money than new employees.

A: Col. Pugsley said for them to get with their HRs or supervisors. The garrison has no say in who or how Vectrus' employees are hired, while Vectrus leadership said employees must be in position for six months and have had no disciplinary action.

Q: Regarding the ability to purchase fuel at Roi's Small Boat Marina, can the hours change from 9 a.m. – 3 p.m. to when more people can use it?

A: "We'll look into it."

STUDENTS PRACTICE SAFETY AT ANNUAL BIKE RODEO

Children in grades K – 4 participated in the Bike Rodeo Feb. 24. The annual joint initiative of the island's school system and Kwajalein Police Department brings together safety experts, volunteers and law enforcement to help the island's youngest commuters become familiar with the rules of the road.

"We want to make sure everyone is comfortable on the road, and feels safe riding their bicycles throughout the community," said Lt. Shawn Delaney, of the event.

For the island's youngest commuters, the rodeo is a fun learning experience that lets them practice valuable skills in an encouraging learning environment. Many are still learning basic directions and biking skills, in addition to basic balance and bike handling.

The course includes a classroom session for students to review road safety rules and directional hand signals. Sgt. Kalvinjohn Bayona met each student group to review reminders and tips for safe transit.

"When you come to a stop sign, what does that mean you're supposed to do? Does it mean I can keep going?" asked Bayona. When the students answered correctly, Bayona described the vehicles of all sizes they would see during a Kwajalein afternoon.

"Remember, when you come to a stop sign, you're looking for bikes, cars and golfcarts," he said. "Once you see that all of those are cleared from the road, you can go ahead and proceed and move forward.

Next, students demonstrated their skills on an outdoor learning course in a nearby residential neighborhood. As they passed each checkpoint on bikes and scooters, they received helpful reminders. For each checkpoint, they received stickers as rewards. By the time they complete the course, students have navigated obstacles and become more aware of the challenges posed by vehicles and the island's roadways.

"Careful—don't forget to look both ways," said an upperclassman at a simulated four-way stop. The student received a sticker and a high-five for getting the checkpoint right. Some obstacles are even harder to detect.

Myles Sylvester, a senior at Kwajalein High School, volunteered to assist with the rodeo. Reflecting on a lifetime of island biking, he would like to remind new bikers about the impact of the environment. He stressed that hydration was important for bikers of all ages.

"It's hotter on Kwajalein than in other places, and we are biking all the time," Sylvester said.

More than 40 students and 20 vol-

unteers participated in the activity, said Mindi Gerber, a Kwajalein School System teacher. This year was her first rodeo. Gerber specially thanked the volunteers from the island's emergency services, law enforcement and religious services programs for volunteering along the course. She also thanked AAFES personnel for going the extra mile to support island road safety with donated giveaways of child-sized bike helmets and protective kneepads and elbow guards.

During the grand finale, kids from both islands were mixed into groups to help them meet new friends. Food was served and participating Ebeye kids received a special gift.

"Each kid was given a wristband and water bottle as well as a plate of food (hotdog, juice, vegetable kabobs, and fruit)," Brady said. "Additionally, the kids who traveled from Ebeye were all given a pair of tennis shoes to take home with them. My most memorable part of the clinics was connecting with the kids and watching them enjoy a sport they don't normally get to play. Seeing the enthusiasm and progression each week made the time on Ebeye very enjoyable."

Brady hopes that the students will retain what they learned during the camp.

Together with the CYS volunteer team, he thanks everyone who helped make the camp a success.

"We would like to give a big thanks to all the Kwaj kids who spent their Mondays helping with the clinics on Ebeye," Brady said. "This could not have been done without all your help! Thank you to the volunteers who assisted with cooking and prepping for the main event, MWR for setting up the fields and providing inflatables/tents, USAGKA Command and the Dock Security Checkpoint for providing an efficient way of sponsoring these kids and their chaperones on island. Many people pooled together to make this happen and that is why we love the Kwajalein community so much."

STEPHANIE BROWN: KWAJ KID TURNED TEACHER

USAG-KA Public Affairs Officer Mike Brantley invites you to meet Kwaj kid Stephanie Brown. This article is one in a series of three interviews with island residents who came back home. Keep an eye on next week's Hourglass for another Kwaj kid interview.

People say that Kwajalein is shaped like a boomerang and people eventually come back to it over time.

This is evident with several Kwaj kids, the term bestowed upon individuals who grew up part of their life on Kwajalein and have returned to live and work here.

When were you here as a kid?

I lived on Kwajalein from 1993-2000, I was here from KAPS (what the preschool was called then) up to the fifth grade. I did not graduate from Kwajalein High School.

How was it growing up here?

I absolutely loved growing up here. One of my favorite memories of living out here was hanging out at North Point almost every weekend, while my dad would windsurf.

One time, the fin of his board broke off on the reef. We snorkeled out to where he remembered it breaking, and I found it stuck on the coral. We were able to retrieve it and super glued it back to his board.

Where did you go after graduation?

Once we PCS'd from Kwaj, my family relocated back to Boston.

I went to college at the University of New Hampshire and graduated in 2012 with a Bachelor of Science in Social Work.

What brings you back?

I have always wanted to return to Kwaj, ever since I left as a kid, for the unique experience as an adult.

Do you think the island has changed?

I am still relatively new to being back on island, but I have noticed that a lot of buildings that used to host events are run down and non-operational, which I hope will eventually change.

What is your role on Kwaj now?

I am the lead teacher of the Baru classroom at the Child Development Center. I am responsible for the infants, pre-toddlers, and toddlers.

What inspired you to become a teacher? I wanted to come back and teach Kwaj Kids because I wanted them to have the

same incredible experience that I did.

I can still remember all my teachers' names and how they made our school year fun and adventurous, given the environment. I think it's unique that I am teaching kids in the same building that I once attended preschool.

What is the best part of Kwaj life?

For me, the best part of living on Kwaj so far has been reconnecting with a lot of Kwaj kids that I grew up with in the 90's, some of which I hadn't seen in over 20 years. I also really enjoy riding around.

Are there drawbacks to living on Kwaj?

I would say the distance between here and the States is a slight drawback, only because it takes a few days to get back to see any family members.

Tell me about the kids on Kwaj and why you dedicated your life to teaching.

The kids on Kwaj are full of energy! They are eager to learn and play. As I mentioned before, I took the opportunity to come back to Kwaj to teach because I felt that I wanted these kids to have a similar experience.

Î want to be a model of the unique education that I experienced and grew up to tell everybody about back in the States.

How long have you been back on Kwaj, and is this the first time you've returned since you lived here?

I just got back to Kwaj at the beginning of August 2022. Before that, I visited in 2000 and 2010.

DON'T TAKE CULTURAL ARTIFACTS. Remember, it is illegal to remove cultural resources from the atoll. This includes any protected species, unexploded ordnance, WWII-era artifacts and ancient Marshallese artifacts. These resources are protected under U.S. federal and RMI law. Please do not remove these pieces of atoll history from Kwajalein. For questions contact the Kwajalein Archaeology Office at 480-8867.

NOTIFY THE VET. Please notify Kwaj Vet Services before going on leave if you have pets. A pet sitter authorization form for treatment is required prior to departing the island. You can reach Veterinary Services at 480-2017 Tuesday through Saturday from 7:30 a.m. – 4:30 p.m.

ELECTRICAL SAFETY TIP FROM THE USAG-KA OFFICE OF FIRE PREVEN-TION. You do not need a flame to start a fire. Fires can start when heat builds up near things that burn.

- Have all electrical work done by a qualified electrician.
- Major appliances should be plugged directly into a wall outlet receptacle.
- Use ground-fault circuit interrupters to reduce the risk of shock.
- Test GFCIs monthly or according to the manufacturer's recommendation.
- Make sure electrical cords are not running across doorways or under carpets.
- Use a light bulb with the right number of watts as indicated on your fixture or lamp.

REGULATIONS

TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

CANDLES and open flames are not permitted in BQ rooms. The Kwajalein Fire Department thanks you for keeping your neighbors safe.

METAL DETECTORS are not allowed on Kwajalein according to Army Regulation. Unexploded Ordnance exists and could be dangerous if disturbed.

Not allowed on USAG-KA: bow and arrow, air guns, paint ball and other projectile weapons.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation (e.g. trees, bushes, plants) may not be planted in the ground without an approved permit. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. In addition, do not place sprouted coconuts in your yard.

UXO REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO;
 Perpert suspected UXO immediate
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

• Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks • Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder



WEATHER DISCUSSION
