More than 100 students gathered on Ebeye for Music in Our Schools Month March 3, as part of a collaborative initiative between the Ebeye Public Schools and Kwajalein School System musicians.

The afternoon concert featured multiple performances for the EPS K-7 public school students, and featured the Kwajalein High School Singers, KSS Concert and Stage Bands, Ebeye Middle School Ukulele Club and KSS Advanced Vocal Ensemble.

Ebeye students also had the opportunity to engage with the performers, joining George Seitz Elementary School music teacher Ashley Wright in a drumming activity.

"Music In Our Schools Month is all about sharing in music," wrote Wright in a press release to The Marshall Islands Journal.

Student leaders from the KSS Tri-M Music Honor Society, the KSS band leadership team, prepared the event. They have high hopes for increased opportunities to keep playing music with their peers.

MARCH IS WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

This month, we celebrate a prolific member Kwajalein's extended community: Cris Lindborg.

Together with her spouse, Dr. Eric Lindborg, Cris lived on Kwajalein for 27 years. She was active in island civic life and in forming connections between atoll communities.

The Lindborgs' deep and abiding respect for the Marshallese people led them to found the former Kwajalein Hospital Diabetes Clinic, the US-AG-KA Manit Day celebration, and the

Marshallese Cultural Society and Marshallese Cultural Center, a collaborative educational outreach project sourced with the help of friends, communities and families within the atoll.

The Lindborgs also assisted in the preservation of an important collection of precious historical photographs on display at the MCC.

In the years since their PCS, Cris and Eric have continued their outreach efforts to assist new Marshallese residents of the United States.



BUNKER HILL


If you head north through the residential area on Kwajalein, you will eventually pass by an unassuming, but oddly placed mound of dirt capped by a layer of partially shattered concrete. No sign notes the meaning or former use of it, but every resident can tell you it is Bunker Hill.

I have never been able to find the source of the name, but having been a kid once, it is easy to imagine that youngsters playing on the “hill” (it only stands about eight feet tall but used to be about six feet higher) resulted in its colorful name.

There are any number of stories out there about what Bunker Hill was during the war. The most common one is it was a Japanese bunker—hence the name. Bunker Hill is the remnant of a base and revetment for a Japanese anti-aircraft gun during WWII.

If you ascend to the dizzying height of the top, you can still see the circular track upon which the gun mount would have rotated. It was designed to mount a Type 89 12.7cm twin dual-purpose gun. The entire assembly weighed over 28 tons and could lob 52-pound shells at surface targets out to 16,000 yards or rise to shoot at aircraft up to 31,000 feet in elevation.

Bunker Hill was one of three gun emplacements in the battery that stood at what was one time the northern tip of Kwajalein. All were elevated above grade. After a landfill was created in 1964, the site is now about a third of a mile south of the current northern tip of the island. The Bunker Hill site never had a gun mounted on it before the

island was captured by the 7th Division in February, 1944. This may be due to delays in shipping war material due to US attacks. Or, the decision to add a third gun to the battery may have just been made too late to complete it before the invasion.

The layout of the battery can be easily seen in this pre-invasion photo, probably taken in November or December 1943. If you look carefully, you can see the shadows cast by the guns in positions #1 and #2. Note there is no shadow in the Bunker Hill position. This is confirmed by post-invasion army engineers who mapped and studied the Japanese defenses. All three gun positions can be seen in a ground-level photo following the assault in February 1944.

This is looking approximately north along Lagoon Road. From this photo it appears that the #1 gun is still mounted in its cradle. While not apparent in the photo, the #2 gun was blown off its mount in the attack and can be seen in a photo taken in mid-1945. This site has been frequently credited in the past as being Bunker Hill. It is not, for as we have seen, Bunker Hill never had a gun mounted on it.

Reconstruction of Kwajalein into a forward fighting and staging base began even before the assault was complete. Photos from 1945 show that the #1 gun position was demolished rather quickly for reasons yet unknown. Nothing was ever built on the site and the Navy kept quite several Japanese structures intact as war memorials. These were more like sight-seeing opportunities for visiting dignitaries, I would imagine. Interestingly, there was no attempt to demolish the circular concrete base that the gun had rested on. It can still be seen in photos from mid-1946 and as late as 1952.

In 1953, MCB 10 arrived on Kwajalein to construct new concrete-block residences to replace the rapidly decaying post-WWII homes that had sprung up. Plans required the removal of the remains of gun positions #1 and #2. Fate seemed to have spared the Bunker Hill position for the time. Nothing seems to have changed at the site until sometime around 1962-63. Somewhere in that time frame a decision was made to pull the revetment wall down and to reduce the footprint of the site.

The fill dirt around it was removed to the height of the floor of the revetment. I have not been able to find what the reason for this reconfiguration was. It is a pity, as Bunker Hill represents the only example of this type of Japanese gun installation that was elevated above grade.





MYSTERY TEETH, AND THIS WEEK'S UNIDENTIFIED OBJECT

Kwajalein Archaeology thanks the community for its good guesses.

While we do not have a definitive answer, it is good to know that the extended Kwajalein community is interested in this fish.

Kwajalein resident Brian Greene has concluded that the teeth most likely belong to the *Monotaxis grandoculis*, also known as a big-eye emperor. A second guess named *Archosargus probatocephalus*, the sheephead, as the likely owner of the sizeable fish teeth. So far, the identity of the specific specimen remains a mystery, but it's easy to see why these are likely guesses.

The big-eye emperor makes its home in the Central Pacific, near the Hawaiian Islands and areas near coral reefs anywhere from 20 to more than 90 feet in depth. Prized as a food source, it can grow up to 24 inches in length.

The sheephead is found in abundance throughout the world and especially near south-western Florida. Its teeth, which resemble flat molars, help the fish to crunch through the shells of its next meal.

Check out the next item, recovered in the excavation of an oceanside fill on Kwajalein. About four inches in diameter and rusted or corroded, the khaki and black colored disc bears the impression of a compass rose on one side. Archaeologist Susan Underbrink believes the disk could be an endcap for any number of items and would like to hear about your next guess.

"It could be any number of things," Underbrink said, of the discarded item. "I thought this was metal but I think it's plastic. It is interesting how the sides appear to be different."

Attendees at the March 5 Variety Show raised \$1,001 in donations for Waan Aelōñ in Majel, a nongovernmental Majuro-based school dedicated to preserving traditional Marshallese skills and knowledge.

The talent showcase gives the island’s singers, comedians, and musicians an opportunity to entertain their neighbors while supporting a cause.

Highlights from the evening’s 19 acts included Andres Alvarez’s stirring rendition of “Tequila,” classical piano performance by Arianna Dela Cruz, and multiple skits by the Keystone Club. The Saggy G’s performed a grunge rock music set—their second performance fea-

turing drummer Danny Barthle.

The evening also included a coffee and popcorn social hour and a short film introducing WAM’s current mission.

For more than 30 years, WAM has trained Marshallese youths in the indigenous arts of canoe building and sailing. A March 2022 fire damaged the WAM campus workshop and office building. It also consumed traditional artifacts and the school’s vehicle. Since then, WAM and donors around the world have worked to raise funds to repair facilities and replace tools and equipment.

An affiliate organization of The Boys and Girls Club of America, the island’s Keystone Club is a youth leadership organization which challenges its youth to strive for excellence.


THIS WEEK IN U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

The Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense released a press release on March 9, 1989, announcing that Acting Secretary of Defense William H. Taft IV, great-grandson of President Taft, had approved program initiation, Milestone Zero, for both kinetic energy and directed energy anti-satellite ASAT systems, as recommended by the Defense Acquisition Board.

According to a period history, the DAB was "favorably impressed by [U.S. Army Strategic Defense Command's] management of the Ground-Based Free Electron Laser technology program."

As a result, the Army and USASDC were named to head the joint kinetic energy ASAT program. Taft's predecessor Defense Secretary Frank Carlucci had said that ASAT is the single most serious deficiency in the U.S. military posture.

SHAWN BRADY: KWAJ KID TURNED TEACHER

USAG-KA Public Affairs Officer Mike Brantley invites you to meet Kwaj kid Shawn Brady. This article is the final in a series of three interviews with island residents who came back home. Keep an eye on next week's Hourglass for another Kwaj kid interview.

People say that Kwajalein is shaped like a boomerang and people eventually come back to it over time. This is evident with several Kwaj kids, the term bestowed upon individuals who grew up part of their life on Kwajalein and have returned to live and work here.

When were you here as a kid?

I arrived on Kwaj at age 3. I attended preschool all the way through high school out here on Kwaj. I graduated from Kwajalein High School in 2012.

Where did you go after graduation? When I left Kwaj I went to Tucson, Arizona, where I attended the University of Arizona.

What brings you back?

There were several things that drew me back to Kwaj. My mother and father still live here, and my brother and sister-in-law had just moved back when I made the trip back. In addition, my girlfriend, Annalise, had also accepted a job on Kwajalein and was awaiting her travel dates.

How was it growing up here?

Growing up on Kwaj was an absolute dream. There is so much to do in such a small proximity that you can fill your days with endless activities. In the United States, seemingly every event brings with it a commute. On Kwaj you can bounce around from one activity to another with a 2-minute bike ride or walk. My favorite memory of living on Kwaj was spending weekend days beach hopping and/or being out on the boat. I loved finding spots that people don't usually visit and feeling like an explorer.

Do you think the island has changed?

This is a question I have fielded quite regularly since being back. I truly do not think many things have changed at all. Sure, there are a few less people and the buildings look a bit older, but in my mind, it's all the same. When I close my eyes, the sound of the waves and the smell of the air bring me right back.

What is your role on Kwaj now?

I am the Child and Youth Services sports coach. I have the unique role of working with youth between the ages of 3 and 18.

I have always loved sports and admired the people in my life who spent time coaching me on the court, on the field and in the pool. So, I am happy to be back to try and transfer that same energy and attention that I received when I was young to the new crop of Kwaj Kids.

What is the best part of Kwaj life?

The best part about living on Kwaj is being close and connected to community. Some of my greatest memories growing up here involved large community gatherings like the Spring Break Music Festival at Emon Beach. There is a great energy that exists when our whole community is gathered and enjoying each other's company.

What inspired you to become a teacher?

I have been working here for one year now and I have had the opportunity to meet most of the children between ages 3-18. I have to say I am very impressed with how smart, kind and respectful they are. Getting to know the kids makes me proud to be a Kwaj Kid.

How long have you been back on Kwaj, and is this the first time you've returned since you lived here?

I have been back for one year. I was here every year from 2012- 2019.

Is there anything else you'd like to add?

I would like to encourage all members of our Kwajalein community to learn about the Marshallese culture and visit Ebeye and Majuro. We are so lucky to be out here in the Marshall Islands enjoying the beautiful weather and the gorgeous ocean.

If you feel connected to the islands, take time to learn about the history of the greatest ocean seafarers who used starlight, stick charts and outrigger canoes to navigate these vast waters.

SMOKING SAFETY TIP FROM THE OFFICE OF FIRE PREVENTION.

- Fires have occurred while e-cigarettes were being used, the battery was being charged, or the device was being transported. Battery failures have led to small explosions. Never leave charging e-cigarettes unattended. E-cigarettes should be used with caution.
- Keep cigarettes, lighters, matches, and other smoking materials up high out of the reach of children, in a locked cabinet.
- Before you throw away butts and ashes, make sure they are completely out.
- Do not discard cigarettes in vegetation such as grass, bushes, potted plants, leaves, or other things that could ignite easily.
- E-cigarettes are considered by the Army to be in the same category as tobacco products and may not be utilized in any government building.
- Army Regulations provide guidance and enforcement as to where smoking is or is not permitted – No Smoking within 50-feet of any buildings Entrance, Exit or Air Intake.
- All unaccompanied personnel housing (UPH or BQ's) is designated as no smoking.

METAL DETECTORS are not allowed on
Kwajalein according to Army Regulation.
Unexploded Ordnance exists and could
be dangerous if disturbed.

NOT ALLOWED ON USAG-KA: bow and
arrow, air guns, paint ball and other pro-
jectile weapons.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regula-
tion 420-1, vegetation (e.g. trees, bushes,
plants) may not be planted in the ground
without an approved permit. Residents
may be asked to remove items if plant-
ed without approval. In addition, do not
place sprouted coconuts in your yard.






UXO SAFETY REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO;
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks

- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

For a detailed refresher on UXO safety, attend the new island orientation or call Kwajalein EOD at 480-1433.

WEATHER DISCUSSION:

A trough will develop north-west of Kwajalein Atoll this weekend and will help to initiate widely scattered showers late Saturday through Sunday.

This trough will aid in bringing deeper moisture throughout the atmospheric column, along with stronger surface convergence.

Some showers may be heavy at times on Sunday. The subtropical high will remain weak through the forecast period with east-northeasterly to east-southeasterly trade winds between 8-13 knots, with occasional higher gusts in and near showers.

The Intertropical Convergence Zone will slowly become more organized through the week with periods of enhanced shower activity, although the deepest convection appears to remain south and west of Kwajalein Atoll.

SATURDAY: Partly sunny with isolated showers increasing to widely scattered showers late. Winds will be ENE-ESE at 9-14. Occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

SUNDAY: Partly to mostly cloudy with widely scattered showers. Winds will be ENE-ESE at 8-13 knots. Occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

MONDAY: Partly sunny with isolated showers. Winds will be ESE at 8-13 knots. Occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

NEXT WEEK: Partly to periods of mostly cloudy skies. Winds will be ENE-ESE between 8-13 knots. Tuesday into Wednesday are expected to also have isolated to widely scattered showers. Knots are forecast to slacken late in the week. Wednesday and Thursday are expected to be the windiest days.
