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

The Kwajalein Dental Clinic is pleased to announce the installation of its new dental chairs and equipment.





WHERE THE WILD THINGS ARE: VET TECH TIPS FOR ISLAND ANIMALS

When she isn't caring for the island's pets, Kwajalein Veterinary Technician Heather St. Peters sees to the needs of Kwajalein's wildlife. Keeping both animal populations in good health requires an understanding of their nuanced medical needs and behaviors.

St. Peters recently wrote to The Kwajalein Hourglass with helpful guidelines for island residents who care about animal health and safety. Those with questions are encouraged to call 480-2017 for more information.

Kwajalein may not be known for having a highly diverse wildlife population, but there are more than 70 known species of birds-including 15 species of seabirds-known to breed throughout the Marshall Islands.

Veterinary Services and Animal Control/DES is regularly contacted when one of these birds looks distressed or iniured.

Characteristics of birds in distress are:

- On the ground not moving
- Does not fly away when approached
- Easily picked up •
- Extremely fluffed up feathers
- Eyes closed, squinted, crusty, weepy, swollen, bleeding
- Evidence of blood or wounds
- Obvious injured limb (dangling leg, drooping/hanging wing, wings not symmetrical)
- Tries to fly but can't

The Word on Injured Birds

Birds go into shock very easily when injured, and often die from the shock. If you find an injured bird, carefully place a towel over the bird to move it to a cool,

safe place out of direct sunlight. If a bird has hit a window and is still alive, it may just need a little time to regain its senses before flying away.

Do not try to force feed or give water to the bird. Give the bird time to recover and fly away. If it is still staying put after a few hours, you can call Veterinary Services for further advice and instructions.

Zoonotic Reminders

Although we may be inclined to rush to the aid of an injured bird it is good to remember that they can harbor zoonotic diseases. These are diseases that may be passed between animals and humans.

This most commonly occurs between birds, rodents, and other pest animals.

Remember: Never pick up a wild animal with your bare hands. If you find a deceased wild animal call Vector Control (480-4738) for proper disposal. If

you find a deceased cat or dog call Veterinary Services (480-2017).

Feathered Friends and Their Age Groups

While baby birds may look helpless, they usually do not need your assistance unless you see clear signs of injury, such as a broken wing. Do not try to keep a wild bird as a pet.

If you find a hatchling or nestling—a young bird without feathers-outside the nest, you can try to return it to its nest or create an artificial nest. The parents will not reject it if you touch it.

If you find a fledgling—a young, fully feathered bird—outside the nest, leave it alone. While it is spending some time hopping around on the ground learning how to fly, the parents are usually nearby still taking care of it.

Should you find a fledgling near a road or exposed to danger, it can be moved to a safer, sheltered location nearby. Young birds naturally have lower survival rates, which keeps populations in balance with available resources.

In cases where a wild bird or other wild animal is sick and suffering, Veterinary Services can provide humane euthanasia services. Although Veterinary Services may be able to occasionally release an injured animal back into the wild, a federal permit is required to care for migratory birds, songbirds and waterfowl.

Community Cats

On Kwajalein, the other vast population of animals we all know well are the numerous black and white cats meandering around the island. It is imperative to their long-term health and wellness that these community cats to be brought to Veterinary Services.

During a visit, they will be assessed for injury or illness, and then vaccinated. Kwajalein Animal Control/DES and Veterinary Service can help coordinate efforts to humanely trap these "Kwaj cats" as they are often referred.

If a cat is deemed feral, meaning the cat is unwilling to become domesticated, it will be released back into the community, usually where it was originally



captured. These cats will have their right ear "tipped," meaning the right ear will have the tip cut flat for easy recognition it has been vaccinated and altered.

Unless sick or injured, these cats do not need to return to Veterinary Services if accidentally re-captured.

Cat Adoptions

In cases where community cats are tame and will be good adoption candidates to awaiting families, Veterinary Services should be informed promptly. The cat needs to be transported to Veterinary Services for medical care and altering before being permanently placed in a home.

Failure to report an unregistered animal in your care is a violation of the USAG-KA Animal Control Regulations and could result in administrative and/ or legal action.

If you are interested in adopting the cat yourself, you will need to contact Veterinary Services and follow the application and approval process before you can permanently house the cat.

Dog Do's and Don'ts

There have been rare occasions where unregistered dogs have been found on Kwajalein. It is critical that these dogs be reported to Veterinary Services and/ or Animal Control/DES immediately. Stray dogs from Ebeye or other outlying islands do not have access to veterinary medical care.

Until these stray dogs are assessed and treated, they can potentially bring contagious illnesses and parasites to our community dog population.

Please always keep in mind that bringing animals to Kwajalein from Ebeye or any of the other outlying islands is against garrison policy. If violated, this can lead to administrative and/or legal action.

Twenty-four years ago in March 1999, the JLENS, or Joint Land-Attack Cruise Missile Defense Elevated Netted Sensor System, provided a link between an offshore Navy Aegis cruiser and a land-based Patriot air defense system located at Fort Stewart, Georgia, via the sensors suspended beneath the smaller 15-foot JLENS aerostat tethered at Horse Shoe Beach, Florida and its processing station.

This was the first real-time live data exchange between the two services and the process was flawless.

On March 16, the Army Acquisition Executive approved the JLENS as an Acquisition Category II program, elevated from an Advanced Concepts Technology Development.



"JILEL" PRESENTS A MODERN FAIRYTALE FOR CLIMATE CHANGE

Majuro-based Microwave Films, a community film production company, recently announced multiple new screenings of its 2014 short film, "Jilel - The Calling of the Shell."


Billed as a fairytale for global warming, the plot focuses on the family of Molina, a young woman who inherits a trident shell of power from her dying grandmother, Bubu Titi. The magical object changes hands until it returns to Molina, who must contend with her great responsibility while facing an uncertain future as global warming threatens her island home.

Following its world premier at the University of Washington's Burke Museum of Natural History, the film has received screenings at the Big Island Film Festival, the Guam International Film Festival, and the Columbia Gorge and Salem Progressive film festivals. It will be screened in Arkansas this week.

Co-director Jack Niedenthal reached out to Oregon-based composer Les Anjolok to write the film's title song, and worked with musician Steve Latin-Kasper and poet climate activist Kathy Jetnil-Kijiner to produce the film.

In an interview with Jacqueline Froelich of KUAF National Public Radio and news magazine "Ozarks at Large," Niedenthal described the film as a love story written for the islands he has called home for 34 years.

"When I started to write this story—it comes out of a lot of frustration I was feeling," Niedenthal said. "There are a lot of people in the US who feel like cli-

mate change isn't happening."

Audiences can watch the trailer for the film and earlier productions online at microwavefilms.org.

Niedenthal hopes the film will help to raise awareness and about the Marshallese experience of climate change.

"We're like the canary in the climate change coalmine," he said, of the islands. "I just wanted to write a story and do a film where the Marshall Islands wins."

JOINT LEADERS Issue statement on aukus

WHITE HOUSE PRESS RELEASE

Released March 13, 2023

In September 2021, Australia, the United Kingdom and the United States announced AUKUS—a new security partnership that will promote a free and open Indo-Pacific that is secure and stable.


The first major initiative of AUKUS was our historic trilateral decision to support Australia acquiring conventionally-armed, nuclear-powered submarines. Today, we announce our pathway to achieve this critical capability.

Together we will deliver SSN-AUKUS – a trilaterally-developed submarine based on the United Kingdom's next-generation design that incorporates technology from all three nations, including cutting edge U.S. submarine technologies. Australia and the United Kingdom will operate SSN-AUKUS as their submarine of the future. Australia and the United Kingdom will begin work to build SSN-AUKUS in their domestic shipyards within this decade.

In order to deliver conventionally-armed, nuclear-powered submarines to Australia at the earliest possible date, we intend to pursue the following phased approach, moving through each phase based on mutual commitments from each nation:

Beginning in 2023, Australian military and civilian personnel will embed with the U.S. Navy, the Royal Navy, and in the United States and United Kingdom submarine industrial bases to accelerate the training of Australian personnel. The United States plans to increase SSN port visits to Australia beginning in 2023, with Australian sailors joining U.S. crews for training and development; the United Kingdom will increase visits to Australia beginning in 2026.

As early as 2027, the United States and United Kingdom plan to begin forward rotations of SSNs to Australia to accelerate the development of the Australian naval personnel, workforce, infrastructure and regulatory system necessary to

establish a sovereign SSN capability.

Starting in the early 2030s, pending Congressional approval, the United States intends to sell Australia three Virginia class submarines, with the potential to sell up to two more if needed. This step will systematically grow Australia's sovereign SSN capability and support capacity.

In the late 2030s, the United Kingdom will deliver its first SSN-AUKUS to the Royal Navy. Australia will deliver the first SSN-AUKUS built in Australia to the Royal Australian Navy in the early 2040s.

This plan is designed to support Australia's development of the infrastructure, technical capabilities, industry and human capital necessary to produce, maintain, operate, and steward a sovereign fleet of conventionally-armed, nuclear-powered submarines. Australia is fully committed to responsible stewardship of naval nuclear propulsion technology.

When we announced the AUKUS partnership in September 2021, we committed to set the highest nuclear non-proliferation standard. The plan we announce today delivers on this commitment and reflects our longstanding leadership in, and respect for, the global nuclear non-proliferation regime. We continue to consult with the International Atomic Energy Agency to develop a non-proliferation approach that sets the strongest precedent for the acquisition of a nuclear-powered submarine capability.

Our plan elevates all three nations' industrial capacity to produce and sustain interoperable nuclear-powered submarines for decades to come, expands our individual and collective undersea presence in the Indo-Pacific, and contributes to global security and stability. In these outcomes, AUKUS reflects the principle that shared action, taken in partnership, can benefit all.

Implementing AUKUS will also require robust, novel information sharing and technology cooperation. Our nations are committed to further trilateral collaboration that will strengthen our joint capabilities, enhance our information and technology sharing, and integrate our industrial bases and supply chains while strengthening the security regimes of each nation.

For more than a century, our three nations have stood shoulder to shoulder, along with other allies and partners, to help sustain peace, stability, and prosperity around the world, including in the Indo-Pacific. We believe in a world that protects freedom and respects human rights, the rule of law, the independence of sovereign states, and the rules-based international order. The steps we are announcing today will help us to advance these mutually beneficial objectives in the decades to come.

SMOKING SAFETY TIP FROM THE OFFICE OF FIRE PREVENTION.

- Fires have occurred while e-cigarettes were being used, the battery was being charged, or the device was being transported. Battery failures have led to small explosions. Never leave charging e-cigarettes unattended. E-cigarettes should be used with caution.
- Keep cigarettes, lighters, matches, and other smoking materials up high out of the reach of children, in a locked cabinet.
- Ensure ashes and butts are completely out before discarding.
- Do not discard cigarettes in vegetation such as grass, bushes, potted plants, leaves, or other things that could ignite easily.
- E-cigarettes are considered by the Army to be in the same category as tobacco products and may not be utilized in any government building.
- Army Regulations provide guidance and enforcement as to where smoking is or is not permitted – No Smoking within 50-feet of any buildings Entrance, Exit or Air Intake.
- All unaccompanied personnel housing (UPH or BQ's) is designated as no smoking.

REGULATIONS

TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

CANDLES and open flames are not permitted in BQ rooms. The Kwajalein Fire Department thanks you for keeping your neighbors safe.

METAL DETECTORS are not allowed on Kwajalein according to Army Regulation. Unexploded Ordnance exists and could be dangerous if disturbed.

NOT ALLOWED ON USAG-KA: bow and arrow, air guns, paint ball and other projectile weapons.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation (e.g. trees, bushes, plants) may not be planted in the ground without an approved permit. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. In addition, do not place sprouted coconuts in your yard.







Develop an acclimatization plan

Acclimatization is the result of beneficial physiological adaptations (e.g., increased sweating efficiency and stabilization of the circulation) that occur after gradual increased exposure to a hot environment.





Be aware that protective clothing or **personal** protective equipment may increase the risk of heat stress.





UXO SAFETY REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO; Report suspected UXO immedi-
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

• Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

USAG-KA WEATHER WATCH

WEATHER DISCUSSION:

A trough to the north, near Wake Island, is transiting eastward and is keeping the pressure gradient relaxed over the area with the subtropical ridge expected to strengthen on Sunday allowing winds to increase.

Another trade wind trough is also expected to pass through the region Saturday night with a period of enhanced showers into Sunday. There remains sufficient forcing to allow the potential for isolated lightning with stronger cells Saturday night into Sunday.

Winds will be east-northeasterly to east-southeasterly between 5 - 10 knots with higher gusts near showers through Sunday morning before increasing by Monday to 12 - 17 knots from the northeast with a further increase to 15 - 20 knots on Tuesday.

The Intertropical Convergence Zone is expected to become better organized next week and will bring rounds of showers throughout the work week.

SATURDAY: Partly sunny with stray showers increasing to isolated showers. Winds will be ENE-ESE at 4-9 knots. Occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

SUNDAY: Partly to mostly cloudy with widely scattered showers. Winds will be NE-E at 9-14 knots. Occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

MONDAY: Partly sunny with isolated showers. Winds will be NE-E at 13-18 knots. Occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

NEXT WEEK: Partly to periods of mostly cloudy skies with rounds of showers are expected throughout the week. Winds will be NE-E between 15-20 knots.
