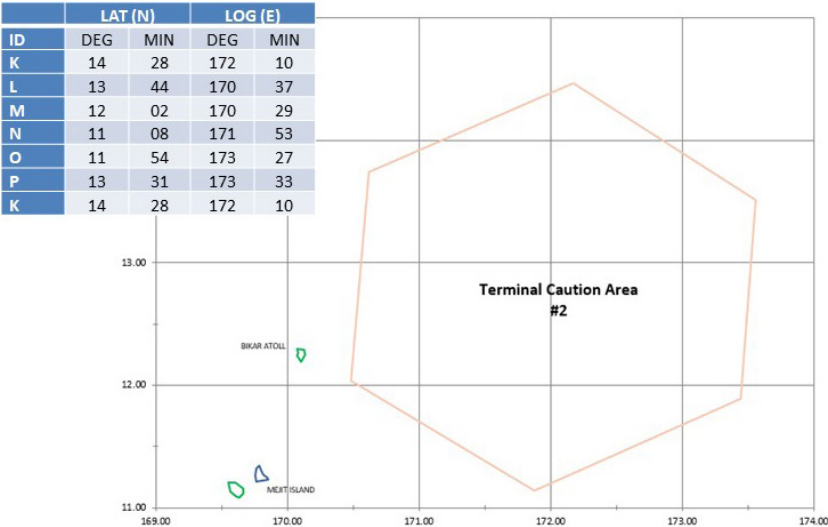
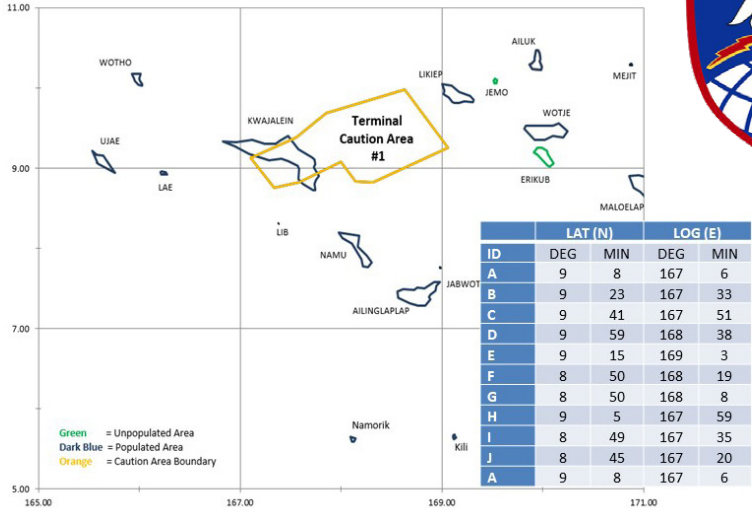
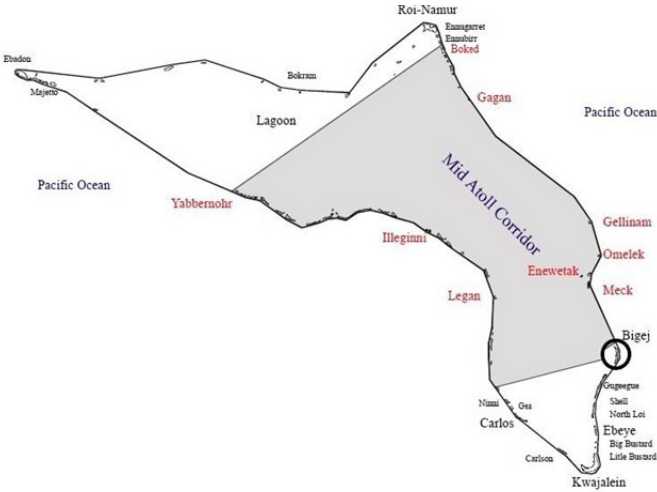

USAG-KA CSM ENLISTED TO SEE THE WORLD AND MAKE A DIFFERENCE

More than anything, as a youth growing up in Rupert, Idaho, U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Command Sgt. Maj. Ernest Miller wanted to travel.

“Most my time in high school was spent between school and working,” Miller said in a recent interview. “I had never really been anywhere. I joined the Army because I was told I could travel the world. Travel the world is what I did.”

Miller enlisted into Army service under the motto “Be All That You Can Be.”

He thanks the Army for helping him realize his goal.

Over the 30 years in his active-duty service career, Miller has worked in 46 of the United States, including Alaska, and has completed tours of duty in Bermuda, South Korea, Germany, Holland, Kuwait, Iraq and Afghanistan. He most recently served as the Headquarters and Headquarters Battalion Command Sergeant Major, 25th Infantry Division, Schofield Barracks, Hawaii.

Miller’s numerous distinctions earned—among them, the Bronze Star Medal, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, the Joint Service Commendation Medal, the Honorable Order of Saint Barbara and the Army Superior Unit Award—are the milestones of a career spent serving and working with others to bring out their best.

“To me, professionally, nothing can compare to the joy and commitment of serving your nation. ‘Be All You Can Be’ has taught me patience, commitment, and discipline. I learned many valuable and unique talents. I learned to be a leader and acquired the emotional intelligence it takes to be better every day.

It increased my personal confidence, strength and resiliency. I think overall, it has made me a better me.”

Miller and his family arrived on Kwajalein in late 2022. Soon after, he assumed responsibility from outgoing Command Sgt. Maj. Ismael Ortega. While stationed on Kwajalein Miller plans to explore the Pacific with his wife, Cat, and their son, Ethen. They have enjoyed getting to know the beautiful island community while they learn about their home together.

“Thank you to everyone who has made Kwaj a home for [my family] and myself. We continue to look forward

to serving with each of you and hope to continue always looking forward to what we can do to make Kwaj amazing.”

To meet some of their new neighbors, the family recently has visited communities throughout the atoll. Miller said he was struck by the kindness and character of the Marshalls.

“I love the Marshallese culture,” Miller said. “It’s such an amazing community, whose values on family, consideration, and concern for others is unmatched. I have had the chance to attend a few events, and I am always blown away with their appreciation of arts, dance and food. I am very thankful and bless-

ed to be given the opportunity to serve on their beautiful islands.”

The aspiring traveler from Idaho has come a long way. He appreciates that he continues his journey as a Soldier.

“The Army has provided me all these opportunities, and I wouldn’t have changed anything,” Miller said.

He shared some practical tips for future Army recruits looking to the future and those hoping to make a difference.

“You can continue your service and learn valuable skills you can apply to your next job,” Miller said. “I have had the opportunity to travel and have earned a Master of Science in Criminal Justice and Security for less than one month’s rent. I have made friends and been part of so many communities and cultures. The military is goal oriented. Its members come from all over the world and earn respect and prestige. Join, have fun, develop skills, and Be All You Can Be.”

On Building Leadership

The secret to being a good leader is that there is no secret, said Miller.

“You must develop your own style,” Miller said. “If I were to define the type of leader I want to be and want to try to follow, try to follow, it would be as follows:

- 1. Be Yourself. Be humble, be approachable and be empathetic. You must be willing receive feedback just as much as your willing to give it, and maybe most importantly, listen more than you talk.
- 2. Be the Example. We live in a glass houses. As leaders, the way we act and treat others is our instruction to them on how they should treat others. So, be that example.
- 3. It’s not the time to try and become a leader—you are a leader. So, develop new skills, confront deficiencies, and most of all, make a difference. A leader has the chance and potential to have the biggest impact on someone’s life. This responsibility should not be taken lightly, so again, be that example.
- 4. Influence and Inspire. Never underestimate the amount of influence a leader has. Every action you take, whether your aware of it or not, is closely scrutinized by everyone around you. So, be the example, and don’t compromise your standards.
- 5. Lastly, keep your promises, be authentic, be relevant, and be the leader you would follow.

Miller added: “One of my favorite quotes of all time is from John C. Maxwell: ‘The pessimist complains about the wind; the optimist expects the wind to change; the leader adjusts the sails.’ Leadership can be as simple as adjusting the sails.”

An example of one such adjustment in action will soon come to USAG-KA: a gathering of subject matter experts who will share program information with the community. Island residents are encouraged to attend this first community information exchange at the Kwajalein High School Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room from 5:30 - 6:30 p.m. on April 14.

“One of our biggest challenges on Kwajalein is communication,” Miller said. “The garrison is implementing a

Community Information Exchange. The purpose is to have many different groups, such as AAFES, medical and emergency services; the Emergency Operations Center; and Morale, Welfare and Recreation to put out information that is pertinent to the community.”

On Building Community

“It’s a small Island, and an even smaller community,” Miller said. “In my short few months, I have seen and heard many different things as it relates to the installation as ‘good’ or ‘bad.’”

Miller would like to ask the growing community on Kwajalein to help him accomplish a few valuable tasks.

- 1. Treat everyone with dignity and respect. It does not matter who you are: There is not one person that is more important than the other on this island. It’s our community and will only be as inviting as you make it.
- 2. Communicate—and over-communicate. If you see something, say something, help to fix it and get involved. Most of the time, miscommunication is the result of a misunderstanding or someone thinking they understand more than they do.
- 3. Do the right thing: Always! If it’s a rule and you don’t agree with it, follow

it anyways. Rules are invented for many reasons, mostly safety-related—to create a stable environment to facilitate human co-existence in the community. You may not agree with the rules; however, it’s not about you—it’s about all of us. With that said, if there is something you don’t agree with, bring it up.

4. Social media can be an amazing part of a community. It can provide predictability, sharing and positive communication.

It can also be a platform to seek win social validation, to criticize, to misinform or voice unrealistic expectations.

Misuse of social media has real consequences: depression, anxiety, bullying and addiction.

“I have learned 99 percent of our community uses social media in a positive way,” Miller said. “What I ask is that you be careful of the remaining percent.

I encourage everyone to utilize their chain of command to address questions. Don’t “let it linger,” or wait for months without receiving an answer. Talk to your leadership, your human resources staff and follow up.

USAG-KA COMMUNITY WELCOMES BACK NEW POLICE CHIEF

The second tour on Kwajalein proved to be the charm as U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll gains a new police chief.

Chief Thomas Prim was recently promoted in a ceremony with family, friends and coworkers in attendance.

Prim was a patrol sergeant on Kwajalein from May 2017 to May 2019. He supported Fort Wainwright, Alaska, as a supervisory police officer before returning to Kwajalein in July 2022 to fulfill that role.

"Starting out early in my career in

the Army, I worked hard, and to see it all come together with this promotion means a lot," said Prim.

Prim comes from a long line of law enforcement. "My uncle worked in the Sheriff's Department in the county we lived in and became the chief of police in the city I grew up in, Jacksboro, Tennessee. My father worked in the Sheriff's Department as well."

Prim joined the Army and served in the Military Police Corps. He served in the Army from 1993 until 2016, with many roles in law enforcement: certified customs inspector, protective services detail, traffic accident investigations and

served as the noncommissioned officer in charge of a traffic section, trained in physical security, anti-terrorism, K-9, and served as a kennel master and dog handler for explosives and narcotics dogs.

Prim's wife, Jenny, and his sons Felix, a high school junior, and Philip, a sixth grader, helped promote Prim to the rank of chief.

The chief said he told his family about the opportunity to return to Kwajalein while in Alaska.

"We were all open to the chance to be able to come back and be a part of the community again," he said.

SOLDIER SHARES PERSPECTIVES WITH HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

Living in the Republic of the Marshall Islands, it is possible to hear different languages being spoken each day. It is unique to encounter languages from beyond the Indo-Pacific region.

Capt. Ibrahima Sady, the operations officer for the USAG-KA Directorate of Planning, Training, Mobilization and Security for U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll, recently spoke with students enrolled in a Kwajalein High School French language class. He discussed his background as a multilingual Army Officer.

Sady, who was born in Senegal, raised in France and has lived in Knoxville, Tennessee where he attended the University of Tennessee, speaks French and Wolof, a Senegalese dialect.

"I personally felt very connected with the French students and was very impressed of their skills," said Sady. "It's an extra skill to acquire and be able to use the language, and travel to different countries, communicate with counterparts, learn new cultures and educate others."

When asked what she thought her students gained from speaking with Sady, French teacher Barbara Bican-

ich said, "They learned that there are many opportunities open to them as they move away from Kwaj. Similar to [Sady's] own experience, there are possibilities of community college, university and the military. There is also the pathway for career and technical programs available to students."

"Whatever they choose, education will open doors for them," she added.

Sady said that he would enjoy serving KHS students as a mentor.

"I would love to help them make better decisions, and move to the next level such as attending universities or schools of excellence," he said.

Sgt. 1st Class Effie Banks, SHARP victim advocate, planned the activity as one in a series of community events to take place throughout the month.

In the weeks to follow, the community can meet with Army and Navy SHARP advocates for information and educational training opportunities at an AAFES SHARP tent.

The community is also invited to dine at the Zamperini Cafeteria on April 19. The awareness themed “Teal Meal” will include a cake-cutting ceremony. Regular meal rates will apply.

Following the game, USAG-KA Commander Col. Tom Pugsley addressed the teams, encouraging them not to be passive bystanders if they witnessed harmful behavior.

During a SHARP briefing for new island residents this week, Banks encouraged the employees to call out poor behavior, and not to engage in questionable activities.

She reminded them that although individual employers and groups have their own mechanisms for dealing with SHARP-related complaints, that anyone in the community can come to speak with she or Chief Warrant Officer 2 Nathan Elkins for help and guidance.

The penalty for committing harassment and assault are punishable with expulsion from Kwajalein and loss of employment.

“We are a small community,” Banks said. “Just don’t do it.”

U.S. ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

From Trust Territory to Nation

In the five years following World War II, the United Nations established 11 trusteeships in various areas around the globe. Seventy-five years ago this month, on April 2, 1947, the United Nations Security Council approved a Strategic Trusteeship Agreement for the former Japanese Mandated Islands.

The islands in question, identified under Article 1, are the former German islands north of the Equator to Japan which were administered by Japan per the mandate under Article 22 of the Covenant of the League of Nations: the region now known as Micronesia.

Under Article 1, these islands were designated a Strategic Area and placed under Trusteeship per the charter of the United Nations. Under Article 2, the United States was formally designated the administrator of the Trust Territory. As such, the United States was given “full powers of administration, legislation, and jurisdiction over the Territory subject to the provisions of this Agreement” and may apply those laws of the United States “[deemed] appropriate to local conditions and requirements.”

To secure the area, the United States was authorized to fortify the islands, close off the area at any time for security reasons and forbid foreign nationals from entering the area.

The United States was to report periodically on the efforts made to help the local nationals recover and the United

Nations could send periodic inspection teams to evaluate the work undertaken.

As the districts began to vote in favor of ending trustee arrangement in the 1980s, the United States reported that its obligations had been met. The United Nations subsequently dissolved the Trusteeship in 1990.

The former Trust Territory of the Pacific Islands is now divided into four separate governing entities. The Commonwealth of the Northern Marianas has become a commonwealth of the United States.

The other three nations signed compacts of free association with the United States. These are the Federated States of Micronesia, comprised of Kosrae, Pohnpei, Chuuk, and Yap, the Republic of the Marshall Islands and the Republic of Palau.

Army Climate Change Strategies

The Department of the Army released its first-ever climate strategy in 2022. However, the Army has been pursuing environmental programs for several decades, both on Earth and in space.

Mid-April 1994, Lt. Col. Michael R. “Rich” Clifford served as a Mission Specialist aboard STS-59, Endeavour. The subject of a Discovery Channel Special, the primary payload aboard this flight was the multinational Space Radar Laboratory-1. The SRL-1 included Spaceborne Imaging Radar-C and X-band Synthetic Aperture Radar as well as an atmospheric instrument called the Measurement of Air Pollution from Satellites

developed by the German Space Agency and the Italian Space Agency. The mission of the SRL-1 was to create a radar map of the Earth’s surface in order to study human-induced vs. natural environmental change (carbon, water, and energy cycles). Coordinated by the Jet Propulsion Lab, this experiment included 49 principal investigators and more than 100 scientists from 13 countries and primary observation “supersites” located in Brazil, Michigan, North Carolina and Central Europe.

Split into two teams of three astronauts, the crew was able to work around the clock and collected 133 hours of data for this experiment alone. As reported in Human Spaceflight: A Record of Achievement, “the X-band Synthetic Aperture Radar imaged more than 400 sites and covered approximately 38.5 million miles of Earth, equivalent to 20 percent of the planet.”

Clifford was a 1974 graduate of the U.S. Military Academy at West Point with a Bachelor of Science. He earned a Master of Science in Aerospace Engineering from Georgia Institute of Technology in 1982.

Clifford was also a graduate of the U.S. Naval Test Pilot School and had earned the designation of experimental test pilot. STS-59 was the second of Clifford’s three space flights. Clifford retired from the Army in 1995 but continued to work with NASA and later Boeing in the space industry until 2011. Clifford passed away on Dec. 28, 2021, from complications of Parkinson’s Disease.

UXO SAFETY REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO;
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

For a detailed refresher on UXO safety, attend the new island orientation or call Kwajalein EOD at 480-1433.

HELP FOR SOLDIERS (And Military Dependents 18+)

WHO CAN HELP?

SEXUAL ASSAULT RESPONSE COORDINATOR (SARC)

Soldier or Civilian who oversees sexual assault awareness, prevention, and response training; coordinates medical treatment, including emergency care, for victims of sexual assault; and tracks the services provided to a victim of sexual assault from the initial report through final disposition and resolution. Conversations with SARCs are confidential. SARCs can take Restricted and Unrestricted Reports of sexual assault.

VICTIM ADVOCATE (VA)

Soldier or Civilian who provides non-clinical crisis intervention, information on available options and resources, and ongoing non-clinical support to victims. Conversations with VAs are confidential. VAs can take Restricted and Unrestricted Reports of sexual assault.

SPECIAL VICTIMS' COUNSEL (SVC)

Military attorney who assists you in a confidential, attorney-client relationship, whether or not you choose to file a report. SVCs can't take a report of sexual assault.

HEALTH CARE PROVIDER

A privileged health care provider who has been designated for Clinical Services, to manage sexual assault patient's medical treatment related to the sexual assault incident from initial presentation to completion of all follow-up visits.

CHAPLAIN

Military officer who provides confidential, spiritual advice and the opportunity to privately discuss your concerns, even if you aren't religious. Conversations with a chaplain are confidential and protected by military law. Chaplains can't take a report of sexual assault.

VICTIM WITNESS LIAISON (VWL)

Specially trained legal worker who supports the military prosecutor throughout the courts-martial process. They can help you get to military proceedings, arrange for transportation, and apply for crime victim's compensation. Conversations with VWLs aren't confidential. VWLs can't take a report of sexual assault.

DoD SAFE HELPLINE APP



The Safe Helpline App is a free mobile resource created to meet the unique needs of members of the Department of Defense community affected by sexual assault. By downloading the App, you can access 24/7 support through the Safe Helpline phone and on-line website and helplines. You can also obtain information, resources, and practical exercises to help address the short- and long-term effects of sexual assault so you can manage your self-care.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

The subtropical ridge remains in control on Saturday with breezy east-northeast trade winds and low shower coverage.

With the ridge weakening this weekend, more clouds and better chances for isolated to widely scattered showers can be expected.

A stray thunderstorm or two can't be ruled out, especially late at night when instability is at its peak. Wind speeds will be generally moderate through the weekend.

For next week, a weak Intertropical Convergence Zone brings occasional periods of showers with a decreasing trend in wind speeds.

SATURDAY

Mostly sunny with stray showers and a better chance for showers late at night. Winds NE-E at 13-18 knots with occasional higher gusts.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with widely scattered showers. Winds NE-E at 11-17 knot with occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

MONDAY

Partly to mostly sunny with widely scattered showers, especially in the morning. Winds NE-E at 10-16 knots with occasional higher gusts, especially near showers.

NEXT WEEK

A weak Intertropical Convergence Zone brings occasional periods of showers while wind speeds generally decrease.
