The roar of MV-22 Ospreys in the skies over U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll signaled to Kwajalein residents that special visitors had arrived in time for the weekend.

**USAG-KA became** a unique destination for a recent Pacific tour by the "Red Dragons"—VMM-268, a Hawaii-based U.S. Marine Corps helicopter squadron.

During their visit, the traveling team of pilots and aviation mechanics conducted an April 8 community engagement at Bucholz Army Airfield. Kwajalein residents had the chance to check out four MV-22 Osprey tiltrotor aircraft and to meet crewmembers.

Though the flight to Kwajalein is unique, it is by no means the longest VMM-268 flight on record. Writing for the USMC in 2017, Cpl. Robert Sweet reported on a first, historic transatlantic flight made by the squadron to Australia.

Nevertheless, after a long journey, Kwajalein Atoll is a welcome sight for passengers and pilots alike. Their arrival felt good, said VMM-268 Capt. Sean Becker, at BAAF.

"I think it's the first time for us to make a transition crossing to include this island," he said. "We are extremely thankful to have a place to land."

Ahead of the event, team members worked to coordinate visit details with Chief Warrant Officer 3 Alex Brown, Lt. Col. Ben Jackson, and members of the Kwajalein Flight Ops crew. The US-AG-KA command team provided additional support to ensure the safety and security of the visitors and community.

During their engagement window, the Red Dragons welcomed island residents of all ages. Crewmembers answered technical questions and shared

their military experience with several of the island's senior high school students. Others tried on pilots' helmets and a pilot's vest, which can weigh as much as 30 pounds when fully packed with necessary tools and supplies.

"It's one of those special opportunities," Becker said, of the engagement. "There's nothing classified or sensitive on the aircraft. We're allowed to meet the general public here with a little bit of preparation and work to share a unique aircraft."

For some visitors, the Ospreys were a familiar sight. The sight of the distinctive, three-blade proprotors in compact configuration, caused some island residents on the tarmac to share their own service stories of working with and around Ospreys. Many pointed out unique features on the aircraft to family members.

Following the engagement, Becker said the island community showed its hospitality to his squadron mates. Several were invited on fishing excursions and got to enjoy a day of golf, snorkeling trips and the chance to relax and explore the island. He appreciated the opportunity to share their work with Kwajalein and hopes they will be able to return.

As a parting gift, after takeoff on April 11, the Red Dragons performed a flyover before disappearing into the skies.

#### **Emergency Management**

#### Housing

The topic that was on everyone's minds at the CIE was housing.

Mold is a big issue here in Kwajalein with our high temperatures, high humidity and rain being the primary contributors. All inhabited facilities are climate controlled to limit mold growth.

A "Facts About Mold" pamphlet is being distributed to all residents soon.

USAG-KA Commander, Col. Tom Pugsley, briefed the community on the plan to move everyone out of New Housing on the north end of the island to alternate locations while the existing dilapidated houses are demolished.

Several questions as to when and where were posed by community members. A memorandum to all affected residents in new housing is coming soon.

#### Family and Morale, Welfare and Recreation

Maintaining stock/replenishment: The team is working to replenish the stock. Emergency shipments/requests need to fulfill the same we currently have. Currently working on ordering from vendors in Hawaii as they can support the high demand of our location, but, it will come with a significant sell price increase due to the high cost of merchandise.

Since Asia Pacific Airlines has been unable to fly to Kwajalein, air lifting was attempted through UPS for paper goods and cleaning items. The merchandise was stuck for two weeks in Guam and was sent by boat.

#### USAG-KA Host Nation Office

May 1 is Constitution Day in the Marshall Islands.

As per RMI Travel Advisory requirements dated Oct. 6, 2022, completion of primary series Covid-19 vaccination is required for those aged 18 years and above entering the country.

Individuals who provide essential services to the RMI can apply for an exemption with the Minister of Health, who may, after consultation with the Secretary of Health & Human Services and Public Health, grant an exemption to the vaccination requirement.

On arrival in the RMI, any individual who is symptomatic and tests positive for Covid-19 will be required to undergo a minimum of five days and up to 24 hours after symptoms cease of home isolation.

#### **EASTER FOOD DRIVE PROVISIONS RESIDENTS OF DISTANT EBADON**

**A group** of U.S. Army Garrison – Kwajalein Atoll residents and friends recently delivered much-needed water and supplies to a remote part of Kwajalein Atoll —the islet of Ebadon.

Donations were collected at the Republic of the Marshall Islands Liaison Office for weeks and the supplies were transported by boat first up to Roi-Namur and then onward to Ebadon in time for Easter.

"After docking in Mejatto, the larger neighbor island, we offloaded supplies to the long, yet shallow banana boats," said David House, office of the deputy chief of staff, engineering, and spearhead of the operation to donate supplies. "We boarded the small boats and made our way to Ebadon."

House said that the pilots of the small boats were elated with the supplies but possibly were more elated with having visitors. "News of our arrival had spread through the community and they were impressed with having the first U.S. Army lieutenant colonel (Lt. Col. Ben Jackson) to overnight with them."

Thought not a sanctioned Garrison effort, the RMI knew of past aid programs to reach and support the needs in the atoll. "They (the people of Ebadon) were so appreciative of the Kwajalein, Roi-Namur and outreaching U.S. supporters coming all the way to ease their burdens and fellowship for an evening," House added.

"After greeting some of the people, we offloaded supplies and were taken to a small house on stilts, surrounded by a small fence," House said. "A local gentleman brought us small snacks and it was

explained to us that we needed to stay in the controlled area, not for the safety of the inhabitants, but for our safety. The man explained that island spirits would not recognize us and might take us as invaders. Given that Ebadon has a long culture of battling neighboring tribes and had many wars fought in the past, we obliged and stayed put.

"Later that evening, a few men from the village came to collect us from our quarantine area and brought us to the town center," House said. "In the background, we heard a ukulele and distant singing. The sounds grew louder as the entire village entered, slowly walking toward us, singing the most beautiful and welcoming songs. They welcomed us with smiling faces. The children were curious but shy at first, growing bolder as the songs continued."

In the Marshallese culture, both land and office are passed down to the matriarchs of the island. "A stoic and poised woman – the Chief or Leroj – sat at a nearby table to ours but deferred the introductions to very colorful gentlemen who spoke to us for some time," said House. "They spoke about the supplies and how needed they were. They spoke about the children and how they would benefit from the school and hygiene supplies. A gentleman made it very clear that they were honored by our efforts and even more so that we were spending time with them, learning and fellowshipping."

Jackson offered words of kindness and respect to the people of Ebadon. "I offered comments to our brothers and sisters thanking them for their hospitality of hosting us, as well as the outpouring of love and support not only from the inhabitants of Kwajalein but from others all over the world in support of the people of Ebadon," House said.

After the speeches, every man, woman and child in the village came up to the table and shook hands with the visitors. "One by one, we were formally introduced to the people, the island and any spirits who might be observing our presence," said House. "The Easter Food Drive brought supplies to the people of Ebadon, but in some way, it gave us back more than we ever imagined."


## **U.S. ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY**

**In the** fifth flight test for GTV-2, held on April 20, 1986, the Flexible Lightweight Agile Guided Experiment or FLAGE successfully achieved a direct hit of a stationary target.

In this experiment, designed to repeat the conditions of GTV-1 conducted in January 1986, the target was a 44-inch diameter aluminum sphere held aloft by a balloon.

U.S. Secretary of Defense Caspar Weinberger described the event as "another significant breakthrough taking us closer to guidance accuracy needed for non-nuclear intercepts of missiles within the atmosphere."

## **KWAJALEIN REMEMBERS EMLAIN KABUA**

**The community** on U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll offers heartfelt condolences to the Kabua family following the recent death of Republic of the Marshall Islands' former First Lady Lejla Emlain Shizuko Kudo Kabua. She was 95 years-old.

Memorial services honoring the first lady took place April 14 through 17 at the Bukien Lobo Weto.

The Marshall Islands Journal reported that "thousands of people came to pay their respects to the Kabua family." RMI flags were ordered to fly at half mast through this week by Minister in Assistance Christopher Loeak.

The former first lady is the mother of RMI President David Kabua and the spouse of the late first RMI President Amata Kabua. She also designed the flag of the Marshall Islands, an enduring national symbol adopted after the RMI became an independent nation.

The bold blue field bears a 24-point star to represent the electoral districts of the RMI and its chief centers of culture—Jaluit, Majuro, Ebeye and Wotje. Two bands of rising orange and white represent the Ratak or "sunrise" Chain of the RMI.

## **RULES AND TIPS FOR GLASS BEACH VISITORS**

**The area** at the south end of the runway, known as Glass Beach, is the nesting site for green turtles, also known as Chelonya mydas, from May through October.

Green turtles are protected under U.S. law, the U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll Environmental Standards in the Republic of the Marshall Islands. They are also protected by the United Nations worldwide.

Last year, the beach was closed while the nesting season occurred primarily due to ongoing construction activities at the end of the runway.

This year, the beach will not be closed. Here are the rules to safely enjoy the beach, and to help ensure the safety for the turtles as well.

- The top crest of the beach area, to include all vegetation near the orange fencing, is off limits.
- There is a single point of entry to Glass Beach. It is located at the end

of the orange safety perimeter fence. There is a small palm tree denoting the entry and exit spot.

- No large groups or party gatherings are permitted in this area. Visitors must retrieve any trash before leaving the area.
- Violators of these safety orders must be reported to USAG-KA.
- During flight-operation hours, observe all applicable airfield/runway

restrictions and safety rules.

 Visitors must not park golf carts near the Glass Beach entry and exit point during airfield operation times. Carts must be parked away from that spot.

New signs will be posted soon to indicate the beach vegetation zone, areas to keep out, and the entry and exit spot onto the beach.

Enjoy the beach but help keep the residents who nest there safe.For more information, contact Patrick Chauvey at 480-0129.





#### REGULATIONS

TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

NOT ALLOWED ON USAG-KA: bow and arrow, air guns, paintball and other projectile weapons.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation may not be planted in the ground without approved permits. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. Do not place sprouted coconuts in yards.

CANDLES and open flames are not permitted in BQ rooms. The Kwajalein Fire Department thanks you for keeping your neighbors safe.

METAL DETECTORS are not allowed on Kwajalein according to Army Regulation. Unexploded Ordnance exists and could be dangerous if disturbed.



#### WEATHER DISCUSSION

A reprieve from wet weather is expected for this weekend, before resuming to start the next work week. The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) remains draped across the central RMI, and is not expected to move much this weekend.

However, courtesy of upper level outflow from a tropical cyclone well to the west (and moving away from) the RMI, the upper level atmosphere will promote sinking air and temper shower activity. Nevertheless, various surface perturbations are likely to continue to produce periodic lines of showers.

With upper level conditions generally unsupportive of convection for this weekend, thunderstorm development and strong winds are not anticipated.

#### SATURDAY

Mostly cloudy with widely scattered showers. Winds NE-E at 7-12 knots with gusts up to 20 knots near showers.

#### SUNDAY

Mostly cloudy with isolated to widely scattered showers. Winds NE-E at 10-15 knots with gusts up to 20 knots knots near showers.

#### MONDAY

Mostly cloudy with widely scattered to scattered showers. Winds NE-E at 12-17 knots with gusts up to 25 knots near showers.

#### NEXT WEEK

The slightly suppressive conditions expected to keep shower conditions somewhat moderated this weekend will give way to a more supportive upper level environment next week, allowing for a resumption of robust ITCZ pulses with periods of scattered to numerous showers and stray to isolated thunderstorms.

Expect generally wet conditions to persist for the duration of the work week.





## **UXO SAFETY REMINDER**

#### PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

**Unexploded ordnance** should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO:

- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO;
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder
