QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS FROM THE USAG-KA TOWN HALLS

On May 17 and 23, residents of Roi and Kwajalein participated in U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll's quarterly town halls.

The following were the concerns raised, with responses provided in the weeks that followed by personnel from the garrison command team and contract leaders from the Network Enterprise Center and AAFES.

ROI-NAMUR TOWN HALL

What is the status of disrepair to the Tradewinds Theater?

"DPW started the design work, and for next year's annual work plan, the intent is to build a similar theater to what Kwaj has," said Col. Tom Pugsley, commander, U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. The plan is to use the same footprint. My goal is to have it done by the end of 2025, providing better movies appropriate for the Roi audience."

What is the status of the pool repair?

"The pool repair contract has been awarded. LOGCAP is doing the design work, adding a bathroom and better pipes to drain quicker. It should be completed by early summer into the fall."

What is the status of the Wi-Fi on Roi?

"The IT folks are managing the hotspots we have here. We are trying to provide better service to the community. Common spots such as the pool and MWR areas will be covered."

Who can and cannot use the Adult Recreation Center on Roi? There is a sign that says C-badge individuals cannot use it. What about the ones who live here? Over 35 residents live on the island, and they cook there.

"We will look into this concern."

KWAJALEIN TOWN HALL

What is the status of our helicopters?

"We've been working this for two years. About a year ago, our helos were down for four months. We have zero operational helos yet again. It finally got some attention. One may be ready, but we don't currently have a functional check pilot. We have two coming TDY in the next couple of weeks, and our new maintenance COR is a functional check pilot. We have the oldest LUH's in the fleet. They are 12 years-old. There is no life-cycle management plan. We are looking at swapping out birds, looking at replacing them with Blackhawk helicopters, and looking for enduring solutions to get after our maintenance issues."

Is there any way we can receive regular-sized green trash cans?

"The Command Segeant Major is working with V2X on this issue."

What is the status of 911?

Someone tried calling from the main pavilion at Emon Beach, and it did not work. Someone said to call 480-2222.

From TribalCo: "Every week we go out and test the phones. Sometimes the weather makes the buttons stick."

After the town hall, TribalCo verified the status of the Emon Beach Pavilion 911 courtesy phone. At the time the call was initially made, 911 was working.

"We are currently investigating the issue and looking at moving the phone to a more conducive area at Emon Beach."

Community members at the town hall asked additional questions regarding the phone system. Personnel from Tribal-Co and USAG-KA Command responded that they complete tests on the phones monthly and keep track of the status of each phone.

We ask that if anyone finds a 911/ courtesy phone inoperable, to please report it to the Army Enterprise Service Management Portal. On island, dial 480-3000, option 1. This will connect you to the U.S. Army Enterprise Service Management Portal. You will be prompted to enter your DoD ID.

If you do not have a Common Access Card, enter 10 zeroes, and then # (pound key). As you go through the prompts wait for all the options to be presented before pressing any keys.

The next steps will be as follows:

- Press 1 for unclassified services
- Press 2 for ARMY hardware software or peripherals
- Press 2 for Pacific Theater

An island resident made a favorable suggestion to put a sticker with 911, 480-2222 and 480-3000, on each island phone.

Why did the B-boat rental fees increase?

"All garrisons across the Army have a responsibility to manage their revenue-generating facilities to try to break even. Unlike other garrisons in the Army, there is not a pool of money to draw from for nonappropriated fund activities.

The Army does not give me money to supplement our MWR activities. It comes out of the contract. I have to ensure we are at least breaking even. There is no lifecycle management plan for the island's B-boats, so we have to charge accordingly-not only to capture the cost of maintenance and labor but to set aside money for the long run, when we have to eventually replace those B-boats.

We looked at a 20 percent increase of B-boat rental prices to nudge us in a direction where we can look at lifecycle management requirements for the fleet that the Army isn't going to replace.

"We are looking across all MWR activities as well. Of all that generate revenue, only two make money-lodging and B-boats. If we were any other garrison in the Army, I would have been told to cut off or cancel all our MWR activities.

They are supposed to generate revenue that goes into a pool that ends up replacing stuff like our golf cart fleet, replacing B-boats and redoing the library—those other things that we've been trying to advocate for. If we can't get close to where we are actually making money in areas, we can't compete well at Army levels for those type of resources."


What is the status of United Airlines pulling bags off flights?

'The garrison has no oversight, responsibility, or say into how United Airlines operates. The only agreement they have with USAG-KA is their ability to land here and that is at the request of the Republic of the Marshall Islands. We pass on issues through the RMI when we get concerns with cancellations.

"USAG-KA would like to remind everyone that the ATI is under Air Mobility Command, which is Air Force-contracted MILAIR. During the pandemic lockdown, we had an emergency exception that allowed contractors to fly MILAIR. After Covid-19, the Air Force went back to their standard operating procedures."

Why is the cost of bottled water high at the AAFES EXpress?

"We received our latest shipment of water from a private vendor from Hawaii. We pay bottle fees for water from Hawaii. AAFES is looking at getting water from other sources. AAFES does have some water on the PXtra side, usually about one pallet. We have customers who purchase water for their employees who cannot shop there. It goes fast, like on the EXpress side.

EMON BEACH SLIDE TO BE REPAIRED AFTER RECENT STORM SURGE

A strong storm surge last weekend resulted in damage to the Emon Beach waterslide. The apparatus was removed from the water this week by island residents.

A work order has been placed to remove the damaged equipment from the beach, and to remove metal retaining brackets from the floating slide platform, said MWR Manager Rick Jameson.

Since its installation a few years ago, the MWR waterslide has become a popular floating playground for adults and children alike. It was last closed for maintenance in December 2021 after being installed by logistics personnel under LOGCAP IV.

Jameson cautioned the community to refrain from using the platform to avoid injury until the brackets were removed.

"We will try to repair this as soon as possible," he said.

On June 8, 2007, Col. Patrick Forrester, retired, and the crew of STS-117 Atlantis launched into space aboard the STS-117 for a 14-day mission.

Atlantis docked with the International Space Station on June 10 and began a joint mission to increase the complex's power generation capability" with the installation of another set of giant solar array wings.

On D-Day anniversary, Austin, Milley call on all to defend democracy

The men who stormed Normandy 79 years ago saved democracy "and it is all of our duty to defend with undimmed vigor the principles for which the Allies fought," Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III said today.

Austin and Army Gen. Mark A. Milley, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, spoke at the service at the Normandy American Cemetery and Memorial in France. More than 9,000 service members are buried at the cemetery located just above Omaha Beach.

The secretary and general spoke directly to some of the veterans who stormed the beach on June 6, 1944 — now in their late 90s or over 100 years old. "To the veterans of World War II: We salute you," Austin said. "You saved the world. We must merely defend it."

The invasion was the greatest military operation of World War II landing 150,000 men from the United States, Britain, Canada, Australia, France and other nations on the shores of Normandy

There were more than 6,000 ships in the armada with more than 14,000 aircraft providing cover that fateful day. They came to set free a suffering humanity from the oppression and brutality of Adolf Hitler.

"It's easy to forget how desperate the battle was, how loud the clash was, how many things could have gone wrong, and how many things did go wrong, Austin said. "But, on D-Day, courage won out over terror, daring over cruelty, and liberty won out over tyranny."

Normandy was the demonstration of the strength of a free people, the secretary said. "Free soldiers will fight more bravely than the armies of tyrants," he said.

"The men who landed here on D-Day did just that. And they wrote themselves into the pages of history as a grand refutation of Hitler's bile. D-Day reminds us that there is no force multiplier stronger than a just cause."

Democracy is still a just cause, and it is still worth defending, Austin said.

"We still seek a world where aggression is a sin, where human rights are sacred, where those who preach hatred, tyranny and genocide are cast out," he said. "We seek a world where civilians are safe from the ravages of war. Where sovereignty and territorial integrity are respected. And we seek a world where all states and all peoples can pursue their own destinies in freedom."

The men and women who served and sacrificed during World War II laid the foundation for the open world of rules and rights enjoyed today, the secretary said. "Today's rules-based international order is the legacy of those who won the bloodiest war in history," he said.

Milley pointed to the graves in the cemetery. "These Americans and so many others sacrificed and gave their lives in the crucible of combat," he said. "Thousands of miles from their birthplaces, they gave their lives so that others they didn't even know would remain free. They gave their lives for us, so that you and I would live free. Peace and freedom are never guaranteed. They must be guarded and cherished and sometimes fought for and paid in blood."

Democracy still requires work and determination and effort, Austin said. "For most of us, the demands of democratic citizenship are far less stern than they were in 1944, but we must meet today's challenges with our full strength — soldier and civilian alike," he said. "If the troops of the world's democracies could risk their lives for freedom, then, surely the citizens of the world's democracies

can risk our comfort for freedom now."

The secretary spoke directly to the Russian assault on democracy in Ukraine. "On a recent trip to a U.S. training post in a free Germany, I met brave young men and women from Ukraine who were learning how to fight for their lives and for their country, and, today, I am more determined than ever to stand by them for as long as it takes," he said.

Democracy is under attack, and there are those who see the rule of strongmen as the future. They see democracies as weak and divided, the secretary said.

"They are wrong," he stated. "And every D-Day, citizen by citizen, we remember that we each have the ability — and the responsibility — to fight for the principles that drove the Allied armies forward."

Milley reiterated the secretary's point. "Now it is up to us, the living to ensure that these exceptional men ... who fell on the sands did not die in vain," he said. "Each of us has a duty, a duty to carry forward this experiment in democracy."

Austin quoted from Army Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's message to the troops. "The eyes of the world are upon you. The hopes and prayers of liberty-loving people everywhere march with you." Eisenhower was the commander of the D-Day invasion, dubbed Operation Overlord.

Austin said the eyes of the world still shine in admiration on the heroes of D-Day. But the eyes of the world "are upon us, as well, and we will not let the torch of freedom go out," he said.



REGULATION UPDATE

USAG-KA Regulation 56-4 Motor and Non-Motor Transportation, Vehicle Operation and Control, was signed into effect April 26. (This action rescinds US-AG-KA Regulation 190-5, Motor Vehicle, Non-Motor Vehicle and Bicycle Traffic Supervision, and consolidates its contents into USAG-KA 56-4).

If you enjoy listening to music or audiobooks while walking or doing physical fitness activities around Kwajalein, this regulation applies to you.

Wear of portable listening devices is authorized only while walking, running, jogging and cycling on USAG-KA roads between 6th Street and Northpoint Street, so long as the device is not "noise canceling."

Wear of listening devices south of 6th Street is unauthorized.

- Bicycles and/or riders are required to operate a form of lighting in use while operating on USAG-KA roads between sunset and sunrise. Headlamps on the rider and/or flashlights affixed to the bicycle are acceptable.
- Wear of protective helmets while cycling is a Sponsor's decision. However, helmets are required when conducting "speed training."



This NASA image from the Apollo 8 mission shows the Earth viewed over the horizon of the moon. While the moon and sun cause tides on our planet, the gravitational pull of these celestial bodies does not dictate when high or low tides occur.

Are tides higher when the moon is directly overhead?

Tides originate in the ocean and progress toward the coastlines, where they appear as the regular rise and fall of the sea surface. Thanks to Sir Isaac Newton's 1687 discovery, we know that tides are very long-period waves that move through the ocean in response to forces exerted by the

moon and sun.

However, these gravitational forces do not control when high or low tide events occur. Other forces, more regional than the moon or sun, control the tides. Many of them have to do with the geography and shape of the Earth.

The shape of our planet has a lot to do with differences in gravitational pull at various locations. If Earth was a true sphere covered by an ocean of constant depth, then it would be true that a high tide event would occur at the location with the moon overhead. The tidal "bulge" would move around the Earth with the moon, but this is not the case with our planet.

The Earth is not a true sphere, but bulges slightly at the Equator. It is also dotted with large land masses (continents). Areas where the Earth's surface is higher, such as mountains, have a stronger gravitational force than do places where the surface is lower, such as a valley or cavern. At the same time, the depth of the world ocean varies greatly. All of these factors play into the height of the tides.

Another thing to consider when thinking about tides is the dimension of time. There are lags in time when an observer experiences high or low tide, and the lag varies from one location to another. For example, the rising slope of the ocean floor approaching the U.S. East (known as the continental rise, continental slope, and continental shelf) slows down the tidal "bulge" or "wave" of water.

The lag can be hours or even close to an entire day in some parts of the world. Think of the wave or bulge that you see when you throw a rock into a pond. The wave travels outward in a ring. If there is a tree or other obstruction in the pond, the ring of waves would travel and wrap around it. The same holds true for the tides

The Ministry of Police, National Security, and Correctional Services has signed a memorandum of understanding with the HALO Trust, a British and American charity, to map and record the location of unexploded ordnance across the Solomon Islands.

The Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Police, National Security, and Correctional Services, Karen Galokale, during the signing stated that "We are pleased to see the HALO Trust getting to work. Mapping UXO is a vital first step in ridding the Solomon Islands of deadly explosives."

HALO's project is made possible through a US \$1 million grant by the U.S. State Department.

Russell Comeau, Chargé d'Affaires, U.S. Embassy: "The U.S. Government is committed to advancing the safety and prosperity of all Solomon Islanders. The work of the HALO trust is an important complement to our ongoing support of the Explosive Ordnance Disposal efforts of the Royal Solomon Islands Police."

HALO's Solomon Islands staff began their training in March and spent much of the past two months in Cambodia and Laos learning cutting edge UXO mapping techniques, including using the

latest GPS tools.

Chris Whatley, Executive Director, the HALO Trust, USA: "Solomon Islanders are impressive professionals. Our team is ready to hit the ground on Monday, mapping UXO with technology and approaches that HALO has developed through our operations in 28 countries around the world. We are deeply grateful to the government of the Solomon Islands and the US State Department for their support.

After the mapping is complete, the Solomon Islands Government will work with development partners to create a national plan for the clearance of high priority areas including housing, agriculture, community resources and infrastructure so that Solomon Islanders can live and prosper.

The United States-supported partnership with the HALO Trust and the Ministry of National Police and the Royal Solomon Islands Police Force is part of President Biden's announcement at the United States-Pacific Island Country Summit, where UXO priorities were one of nine U.S. commitments to implement the Declaration on U.S.-Pacific Partnership.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

Pleasant conditions will continue through Saturday morning before a Tropical Upper Tropospheric Trough cell situated near Wake Island will shift westward Saturday evening and allow for the Inter-tropical Convergence Zone to shift further north.

This will provide favorable dynamics to support widely scattered to scattered showers on Sunday with a possible thunderstorm.

Although, these dynamics will likely be short lived as the TUTT cell weakens with drier and breezier conditions returning for Monday.

SATURDAY

Partly cloudy with isolated showers increasing to widely scattered showers and a stray thunderstorm during the evening. Winds will be ENE-ESE between 11-16 knots, with occasional higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY

Mostly cloudy with widely scattered to scattered showers and stray thunderstorms. Winds NE-E between 10-15 knots, with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Partly to mostly sunny with stray to isolated showers. Winds NE-E between 13-18 knots, with occasional higher gusts near showers.

TUESDAY INTO FRIDAY

A quieter weather pattern settles over the area as the ITCZ shifts back to the south with the subtropical high building to the north of Kwajalein Atoll.

This will tighten the pressure gradient to allow moderate to fresh trade winds to develop next week. Also, expect partly cloudy skies next week with stray to isolated showers, as weak perturbations continue to pass through the central RMI. gradually increase next week with NE-E winds between 12-17 knots by mid-week.

UXO SAFETY REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

- Remember the three R's of UXO:
- **Recognize** an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO;
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder
