ARMY BIRTHDAY HISTORY

EXTERNAL REPORT

Far from the festive celebrations observed around the world by Soldiers on this year's 248th Army birthday, the first Army birthday was a decisive action as America fought to distinguish itself as a fledgling and independent nation.

Read on to learn about the history of June 14 from the U.S. Army Center of Military History.

America's Revolutionary War began on April 19, 1775, with exchanges of musketry between British regulars and Massachusetts militiamen at Lexington and Concord.

As their fellow citizen soldiers from New Hampshire, Connecticut, and Rhode Island responded to the alarm, a state of war existed between the four colonies and the British government. Called the Army of Observation, a force of New Englanders surrounded Boston and had the British troops who occupied it under siege, but they needed help. They appealed to delegates who represented all thirteen colonies to join them in the struggle for American liberty.

When the delegates to the Second Continental Congress convened in Philadelphia on May 10, they soon learned that armed men commanded by Ethan Allen and Benedict Arnold had captured the British forts at Ticonderoga and Crown Point on Lake Champlain in New York.



The constitutional crisis, in which Americans sought a redress of grievances from the British king and Parliament, had become open hostilities.

The delegates realized that even though many desired reconciliation, they would now have to address the new military situation. The Congress took the next step that eventually transformed a local rebellion into a war for independence when it established the Continental Army: the force we know today as the U.S. Army.

On June 14, 1775, Congress "Resolved, that six companies of expert riflemen, be immediately raised in Pennsylvania, two in Maryland, and two in Virginia... [and] as soon as completed, shall march and join the army near Boston, to be there employed as light infantry, under the command of the chief Officer in that army."

The delegates then prescribed an oath of enlistment that required the soldiers to swear:

"I have, this day, voluntarily enlisted myself, as a soldier, in the American continental army, for one year, unless sooner discharged: And I do bind myself to conform, in all instances, to such rules and regulations, as are, or shall be, established for the government of the said Army."

The next day Congress voted to appoint George Washington "to command all the Continental forces" and began laying the foundation for "the American army."

With words that sound hauntingly familiar two hundred forty-five years later, "The delegates of the United Colonies ... reposing special trust and confidence in the patriotism, valor, conduct, and fidelity" of George Washington, issued its first commission by appointing him 'General and Commander in chief of the Army of the United Colonies, and of all the forces now raised, or to be raised by them, and of all others who shall voluntarily offer their services, and join the Defense of American liberty, and for repelling every hostile invasion..."



U.S. ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

Just two days after the official withdrawal from the Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty, on June 15, 2002, Brig. Gen. John W. Holly, program director of the Ground-based Midcourse Defense Joint Program Office, oversaw a momentous ground-breaking ceremony at Fort Greely, Alaska.

The occasion kicked off the installation of underground missile silos for the Fort Greely Ground-based Midcourse Defense Testbed. Other participants included Arkansas Republican Sen. Ted Stevens, Lt. Gen. Ronald T. Kadish, U.S. Air Force Missile Defense Agency director; and Lt. Gen. Joe Cosumano, commanding general, U.S. Space and Missile Defense Command.

The initial plans for the testbed called for six silos. Located 100 feet apart and measuring 24-feet in circum-

ference and depth, they would be suitable for the 70-foot-long interceptors, an inflight communications system data terminal and a battle management command and control node.

From this point, the SMDC commander served as the senior mission commander, while SMDC was tasked to provide base operations and security for the testbed and Fort Greely. Meanwhile, MDA would operate the testbed facility through a contract with Boeing to allow for system-level testing of all GMD operations, short of an actual launch, and a potential contingency capability.

"We are now in the execution phase of the program," Holly later announced to his staff. "We have been a program that involved a lot of testing and planning; now we have crossed over to the execution of a very important program for our national defense."

KWAJALEIN ATOLL WRECKS 3D-MAPPED FOR EDUCATION

Members of the National Park Service Submerged Resource Center and the Air Sea Heritage Foundation recently assisted with a Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency mission to locate a missing WWII aircraft in the Pacific atoll of Kwajalein.

SRC utilized systematic remote-sensing survey operations to cover 7.5 square kilometers of the lagoon floor.

At the conclusion of the survey, the team documented several aircraft wrecks located in the northern atoll area of Roi-Namur with assistance from the Kwajalein MIA Project. This airplane graveyard, as well as other WWII aircraft in the lagoon, represent the most comprehensive underwater collection of WWII aviation technology in the world. The images and 3D models were produced in partnership with Pacific Historic Parks to develop educational materials about WWII aviation from an underwater perspective.

Scientists Shed Light on the Unusual Origin of a Familiar Meteor Shower

Look into the night sky at the right time and from Kwajalein, it is not difficult to spot an ocassional satellite or meteor. NASA's Parker Solar Probe team has been searching the skies to determine the origin of the winter-time Geminid meteor showers.

Each winter, the Geminid meteors light up the sky as they race past Earth, producing one of the most intense meteor showers in the night sky. Now, NASA's Parker Solar Probe mission is providing new evidence that a violent, catastrophic event created the Geminids.

Most meteor showers come from comets, which are made of ice and dust. When a comet travels close to the Sun, the ice evaporates and releases gas, dislodging small pieces of the comet and creating a trail of dust. Slowly, this repeated process fills the comet's orbit with material that produces a meteor shower when Earth passes through the stream.

However, the Geminid stream seems to originate from an asteroid—a chunk of rock and metal—called 3200 Phaethon. Asteroids like Phaethon are not typically affected by the Sun's heat the way comets are, leaving scientists to wonder what caused the formation of Phaethon's stream across the night sky.

"What's really weird is that we know

that Phaethon is an asteroid, but as it flies by the Sun, it seems to have some kind of temperature-driven activity. Most asteroids don't do that," said Jamey Szalay, a research scholar at Princeton University and co-author on the science paper, recently published in Planetary Science Journal.

The research builds on previous work by Szalay and several of his Parker Solar Probe mission colleagues to assemble a picture of the structure and behavior of the large cloud of dust that swirls through the innermost solar system. Taking advantage of Parker's flight path —an orbit that swings it just millions of miles from the Sun, closer than any spacecraft in history—the scientists were able to get the best direct look yet at the dust grains shed from passing comets and asteroids.

Built and operated by the Johns Hopkins Applied Physics Laboratory in Laurel, Maryland, Parker Solar Probe does not carry a dedicated dust counter that would give it accurate readings on grain mass, composition, speed, and direction. However, dust grains pelt the spacecraft along its path, and the high-speed impacts create unique electrical signals, or plasma clouds. These impact clouds produce unique electrical signals that are picked up by several sensors on the probe's FIELDS instrument, which measures electric and magnetic fields near the Sun.

To learn about the origin of the Geminid stream, the scientists used this Parker data to model three possible formation scenarios, and then compared these models to existing models created from Earth-based observations. They found that violent models were most consistent with the Parker data. This means it was likely that a sudden, powerful event —such as a high-speed collision with another body or a gaseous explosion, among other possibilities—that created the Geminid stream.

WORLD WAR II ARMY HISTORY GOING TO SPACE

YTEDNOI DEDNOT

In June 2019, The Kwajalein Hourglass ran a special report authored by Anthony McKinney about the efforts made by an Army astronaut to bring World War II history into space.

REDSTONE ARSENAL, Ala.—U.S. Army astronaut Col. Andrew Morgan will not only make history in space, but take a piece of World War II Army history to space with him.

Morgan, Astronaut Detachment commander for U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command/Army Forces Strategic Command, received the artifact from Paul Morando, chief, Exhibits Division for the National Museum of the United States Army, May 30, at the Johnson Space Center, Texas.

An active duty Army medical doctor and NASA astronaut, Morgan has a deep family connection and personal love of World War II history. This passion for history, medicine and his unique status as an Army NASA astronaut are set to combine in a unique opportunity for the Army space, medical and history enterprises. As a part of his personal allowance items, the artifact—a combat medic's brassard-- will launch to the International Space Station to join him for his nine-month mission in space.

"It's a great honor to take this with me to the International Space Station," said Morgan. "It touches on a number of points that are of interest to me. I'm a medical corps officer in the Army and deployed in combat so there is that connection, along with having two grandparents and a great uncle who fought in World War II."

Morgan is currently scheduled to launch July 20 from the Baikonur Cosmodrome, Kazakhstan, on the 50th anniversary of the Apollo XI lunar landing, to the ISS. Upon his return he will personally travel to the museum after it opens to install the brassard in its permanent display with other medical-artifacts in the "Army and Society Gallery."

When opened, the 185,000 square foot National Army Museum will portray more than 240 years of Army history and honor the service and sacrifice of more than 30 million men and women who have worn the U.S. Army uniform since 1775. The artifact now in Morgan's care will join a collection of artifacts, artwork

and materiel culture most of which have never been seen by the public.

According to Morando, the "Army and Society Gallery" chronicles the symbiotic relationship between the Army, its civilian government, and the people. The gallery introduces visitors to the many Army advancements in medicine, aviation, communications and technology that helped shape American society, culture and economy.



"Interestingly, Col. Morgan's Army experiences, combined with his interest in history, represents the Army and Society Gallery storyline," observed Morando. "History, space, medicine they're all here. This collaboration was a perfect match and the artifact's journey to space with Col. Morgan adds a personal connection to the National Army Museum."

The U.S. Army's deep involvement in the nation's space program and close work with NASA dates to the 1958 launch of Explorer 1, the United States' first satellite. It was also a U.S. Army rocket that carried the first U.S. astronaut into space. Over the years, 18 Army astronauts have been selected by NASA to fly aboard the Space Shuttle, Russian Soyuz spacecraft, and the International Space Station.

E-WARENESS: PETROLEUM PROD-UCT STORAGE TANK WEEKLY INSPECTION

Each department must inspect tanks weekly. A trained custodian must perform the following actions:

- Examine the tank and piping for evidence of leaks and weeps.
- Examine the tank for evidence of fuel/water within interstitial spaces.
- Inspect the secondary containment area and ensure locks are in place, if applicable.
- Inspect leak detection system and alarm panels to ensure they are functional.
- Verify an adequate spill response kit is readily available.



REGULATIONS

TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation may not be planted in the ground without approved permits. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. Do not place sprouted coconuts in yards.

DON'T TAKE CULTURAL ARTIFACTS. It is illegal to remove cultural resources from the atoll. This includes any protected species, unexploded ordnance, WWII-era artifacts and ancient Marshallese artifacts. These resources are protected under U.S. federal and RMI law. Do not remove these pieces of atoll history from Kwajalein. For questions contact the Kwajalein Archaeology Office at 480-8867.












REGULATION UPDATE

USAG-KA Regulation 56-4 Motor and Non-Motor Transportation, Vehicle Operation and Control, was signed into effect April 26. (This action rescinds US-AG-KA Regulation 190-5, Motor Vehicle, Non-Motor Vehicle and Bicycle Traffic Supervision, and consolidates its contents into USAG-KA 56-4).

If you enjoy listening to music or audiobooks while walking or doing physical fitness activities around Kwajalein, this regulation applies to you.

Wear of portable listening devices is authorized only while walking, running, jogging and cycling on USAG-KA roads between 6th Street and Northpoint Street, so long as the device is not "noise canceling."

Wear of listening devices south of 6th Street is unauthorized.

Unauthorized wear of listening devices

- Bicycles and/or riders are required to operate a form of lighting in use while operating on USAG-KA roads between sunset and sunrise. Headlamps on the rider and/or flashlights affixed to the bicycle are acceptable.
- Wear of protective helmets while cycling is a sponsor's decision. However, helmets are required when conducting "speed training."

WEATHER DISCUSSION

The relatively dry conditions that we have seen for the last several days have come to an end, as we move into a period of wetter weather for the next few days. This is due to the Intertropical Convergence Zone gradually moving closer to Kwajalein from the south.

Surface troughing propagating along the ITCZ is expected to expound our shower chances and give us the possibility of stray thunderstorms as well.

Winds, however, are expected to weaken from the highs experienced recently.

This is due to the continual diminishing and movement of the subtropical high-pressure ridges to our north. Some of the showers will be capable of prolonged heavy rainfall and strong gusts, with a peak in activity anticipated for Saturday, and then diminishing as we move into Sunday.

In addition, the upper levels have become more favorable for deep convection across the RMI, resulting in the possibility of a few stray thunderstorms for this peri-

This unsettled weather pat-

tern is expected to carry into Monday but at a decreased level, as the ITCZ becomes more disorganized and frag-

SATURDAY

Mostly cloudy with scattered showers and a possible stray thunderstorm. Winds will be ENE-ESE between 8-13 knots, with occasional higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY


Partly sunny with widely scattered showers. Winds ENE-E between 9-14 knots, with higher gusts near show-

MONDAY

Partly sunny with isolated to widely scattered showers. Winds NE-E between 9-14 becoming 11-16 knots in the late afternoon, with occasional higher gusts near showers.

UXO SAFETY REMINDER

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

- Remember the three R's of UXO:
- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ord-
- **Retreat** from the area of the UXO;
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder
