WHAT IS TEAM KWAJ?

In a 2009 viral TED talk, leadership author and speaker Simon Sinek shared a simple but revolutionary idea: to bring success to any endeavor, leaders must start with the "Why."

They must ask themselves, why is this community, organization, or project important? Or, why does it even exist?

As I prepared to take garrison command, I deliberately sought to understand Kwaj's "why." To do so, my family and I studied this unique place, learning about the people, culture, history and military purpose through academic research, talking with people who have lived, worked, and commanded here, and even watching old episodes of the Kwaj Current and reading The Kwajalein Hourglass.

While I continue to learn more every day, two fundamental truths about US-AG-Kwajalein Atoll emerged above the rest.

First, Kwaj is vital to our national security. It has a rich heritage of developing and demonstrating our valued strategic capabilities, which will remain true long into the future. We also recognize its increasingly vital geographical location in a newly competitive Pacific region.

The second and equally important truth is that this place is our home. Along with our Marshallese partners who have lived here for centuries, we

HUNDREDS OF MARSHALLESE WORKERS ATTEND RMI WORKFORCE TOWN HALL, ASK QUESTIONS

The Island Memorial Chapel was packed to the rafters with Marshallese teammates Sept. 6 for the first RMI Workforce Town Hall held by USAG-KA Commander Col. Drew Morgan since his change of command ceremony in late June.

Russ Hastings, Task Order Manager for V₂X, started off the town hall with an awards ceremony for six Marshallese employees.

The following individuals received certificates of appreciation: Jaclyn Lemari-Solomon, HR Specialist Sr.; Piamon Sorimle, human resources specialist Sr.; Joann Hermon, Surfway administrative associate sr.; Michael Michael, custodian supervisor; and Hensay Nenam, MWR recreation specialist.

"Congratulations to everyone who received an award," said Morgan. "They are examples of the workforce that I know that you all are.

"I have been the commander for the garrison for two months. I moved here from Texas with my family. Before we arrived, my family and I studied this garrison, the Marshallese culture and why it was important. And my family and I have grown to love this country, this culture and this garrison.

"There are two things that I've concluded about U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll and everyone who lives and works here: This garrison is important to both of our countries, it's important to the defense of both of our countries, and all of Kwajalein Atoll is our home. And, as our home, we live here and share this place and our love for it together.

"As we live in close proximity together, you participate in an important mission in supporting this garrison. You are part of an important team that I call TEAM KWAJ.

"We are all on the same team—ONE TEAM—performing this important mission for our countries, and living together on this atoll in peace. As an important part of fulfilling that important mission, there are important things that I want all of us to remember as the workforce here in Kwajalein. This is our agreement with each other, between all of us.

"First, do the right thing. There are many things that inform right and wrong. Maybe those are the laws of the RMI and U.S., the regulations of US-AG-KA, and things like even the Bible and other things that you learned in your own home. We all must trust that we all are doing the right thing.

"Second, for this important mission, we want to do our best work. We all work hard because the mission that we perform for our countries is important.

"Today, we recognized six individuals who are good examples of doing your best work. And every one of you can stand up in front of this room and be recognized doing that hard work for your country and for the U.S.

"And finally, the last thing is to be kind to one another. We all will show dignity and respect to everyone we work with or live with. And I believe that if we are all trusting that we're doing the right thing, that we're doing our best work and that we're being kind to one another, that we will be a stronger TEAM KWAJ together.

"It's my honor to be the commander of this garrison and be the leader of this community," Morgan said. "The CSM and I always want you to be comfortable coming up to us if you have a problem. Or, you tell the supervisors you work with to communicate with us if you have a problem. That is our role to help solve problems and make sure that you are a strong and ready workforce."

Questions and Answers

1. Since LOGCAP has been here for five years, we have not seen an increase in pay. New hires have higher pay than most of us. Will there be an opportunity for us to get a pay raise?

"When we transitioned the LOGCAP V contract, we looked at everybody's pay rates and we made sure that at least nobody got paid less than they were getting paid under LOGCAP IV," said Hastings. "Since then, we have developed new positions that are available and anybody is more than welcome to apply for these positions. There are also some positions that we are looking at the pay rates right now to see what we can do to increase those.

"If anybody has any particular question specific to their job or their pay rate, please come to HR and address those. The HR department is open to help you employees of V₂X/LOGCAP V, that's what they're there for. They are there to listen to you, to pay attention to you and to help you with these problems. You don't have to wait until a town hall; they are open every day. Please address these with them and if you don't get an answer, then come see me in Building 735."

"You have very supportive leaders," said Morgan. "Whether you work for V₂X, Chenega or Parsons—whichever contractor you work for, you have good leaders and there are ways to communicate short of coming to the town hall."

Scott Roesler, V2X human resources, added, "Right now, LOGCAP does not support standardized merit (yearly) increases; however, we will go back and discuss it."

Roesler also reiterated the V2X Human Resources Office hours operation. The office is in Bldg. 700 Hours of operation are Tuesday through Saturday, 7 a.m. – 5 p.m.; and Sunday and Monday mornings.

2. A question was raised about a past program called First Stop. Local Nationals could be seen at the clinic here but now they have to go to Ebeye to be seen.

Morgan said that this is something that we can look at.

Update: From Command Sgt. Maj.

Miller: "Utilization of the Kwajalein Hospital for emergencies while on instillation has always been an option for the RMI. If a Marshallese worker breaks his hand for example, he would be taken to the Kwajalein Hospital first. For everyday sick call, it makes more sense to utilize the Hospital on Ebeye prior to coming to base. If on base, it is only a 20 min ferry ride to Ebeye in which a Marshallese would be heading back home anyways. Utilization of the Kwajalein Hospital for normal sick call illness is not a current option."

3. Access at the Dock Security Checkpoint: In the mornings with the system down it takes a long time to process us in. It is exhausting and people have to wait. When will this be fixed?

"I'm aware that has been broken for a long period of time and I've made that an issue with my boss to ensure they know that it is broken and we need it fixed or we need a new system," said Morgan. "It will likely be many months before we have a fix. I know that means long, tiring lines coming in, but know that we have made this an issue for important generals. The first of those generals will be visiting us next week and we will emphasize that again."

4. For future town halls can we get advance notice to be better prepared with questions?

Having signage at the DSC in addition to notifying HR directors for notification was brought up.

5. How many more years is LOGCAP here for?

"We are in Option Year 1 now," said Hastings. "So, a couple more years."

"The government is always looking at ways to accomplish the services here, but V₂X has been a great partner for what we need right now," Morgan added.

6. For TEAM KWAJ, respect goes both ways from having worked under a different contract, I've seen complaints come through and it's important for supervisors and bosses to show respect

in how they speak and talk in front of others. Some of these complaints were raised with your predecessor but nothing changed.

"I absolutely agree with you," said Morgan. "Respect goes both ways. I want to clarify that those three things that I said: Do the right thing, do your best work and be kind to one another, are the same things I say to every audience here. I say it everywhere I go. That is the message to everyone. If they are part of TEAM KWAJ, that is what I expect.

"If there are cases of disrespect or mistreatment, bring that to your supervisors or HR immediately. If after using those, if the disrespect continues, you have the green light to come to me or the CSM.

Miller added: "Dignity and respect is our key to everything. I will tell you that Mr. Hastings and Mr. Olivares also believe in dignity and respect as do all our other directorates. Where I need your help is, many times it comes to me, we do an investigation to take care of the problem, but when it comes back to you, no one says anything—everybody just stays quiet because they don't want any issues. Stand up and say something. Let it go through its process so we can get these people who are mistreating you off this island.

7. The laundromat at the Dock Security Checkpoint. We can't use it because it's "government use." There are only two washers and two dryers available for all of us to use. Is that going to be fixed?

"That has been on my mind," said Morgan. "The CSM identified this as a problem as soon as I arrived. Currently, the laundromat is run by AAFES. Two weeks ago, we traveled to Hawaii and spoke with AAFES and told them this is unacceptable. We are currently looking at new options to provide laundry services. Like most things on Kwajalein, it will take us several months to fix. I understand access to a laundry facility here and on Roi is important to you and because it's important to you, it's important to me. We are going to fix this problem."

U.S. ARMY IN JAPAN RESIDENTS JOIN JAPANESE RIVER CLEANUP EFFORT

ZAMA CITY, Japan—U.S. Army in Japan personnel joined about 1,300 Japanese residents who gathered Sept. 3 for the 41st annual Sagami River cleanup event here near Camp Zama.

Soldiers, civilian employees and family members of U.S. Army Garrison Japan, the 38th Air Defense Artillery Brigade, the 35th Combat Sustainment Support Battalion, the 311th Military Intelligence Bn., and Logistics Readiness Center - Honshu volunteered to help with the community cleanup in the recreation area along the river.

"This is just something we always like to do," said Kevin Coleman, accompanied by his wife, Randi, the 311th MI first sergeant, and their twin daughters, Reyna and Kaylee. "We volunteer with the community anytime we can to give something back.

The Coleman family said their community cleanup volunteerism had a

humorous start. When their daughters were very young, just 3 or 4 years old, one launched a piece of garbage out of the window while they were driving. The parents explained to their children why that was wrong, went home and got a wagon, and returned to clean up the whole area.

Now, however, it is something the girls love to do and something they call 'helping the animals.'

Zama City Mayor Mito Sato opened Sunday's event with a speech thanking the participants and members of the Kanagawa Prefectural Waste Management Promotion Council for volunteering their free time to assist the city. The mayor explained that the Sagami River flows into the Sagami Bay, so cleanup efforts are crucial to prevent the spread of marine pollution.

We believe it is very meaningful for us to continue this activity in order to pass on a better environment for the future," she said.

Participants were given a safety briefing, cloth gloves and garbage bags and they quickly spread out across the area to begin cleaning.

Japan Ground Self-Defense Force Master Sgt. Hideki Ohara, from Camp Zama's 4th Engineer Group, joined three Soldiers from the 38th ADA to practice English while cleaning the area. He said he enjoys the opportunity for international engagement and greatly appreciates the partnership with the U.S. Soldiers on Camp Zama.


Sgt. Amelya Floyd said she enjoyed Ohara's company during the event, saying it was nice to work side-by-side with the IGSDF in a non-mission event where they could get to know each other.

"Soldiers are the same no matter where you are, so we have that bond," she said.

Capt. Alexander Derosa, assigned to the 35th CSSB, said the event was the first time he has been able to volunteer in Japan, but he hopes to do it again in the future.

"Any chance to be involved with the community and any chance to help is great," he said.

During a closing ceremony, Zama City officials told those gathered that they collectively gathered 3.5 tons of trash, helping to beautify the area.

For years, the Kwajalein Hourglass "rocket writer," former Editor Jordan Vinson, penned some of our finest historical journalism on the emergence and evolution Kwajalein's role in missile defense. Share this historic piece from the Hourglass archives with your friends. As you shall read, few folks knew this story.

Few folks know that for a brief spell in the early 1960s Kwajalein was at a state of constant readiness, equipped with nuclear-armed missiles ready to be fired at a moment's notice to destroy orbiting enemy satellites via nuclear blast.

For a test range designed purely for research, design and integration of early American anti-ballistic missile defense capabilities, it is unique that Pacific Missile Range Facility-Kwajalein was poised—albeit briefly—to make offensive military strikes against the Soviets. Here's the story.

The earliest of missiles tested at Kwajalein was the Nike Zeus, America's first anti-ballistic missile, designed to kill incoming Soviet warheads launched aboard intercontinental ballistic missiles. While early flights of the Zeus missile took place at White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico and elsewhere, the Army Rocket and Guided Missile Agency and contractors Bell Telephone Laboratories and Douglas Aircraft Company launched the first Nike Zeus-Missile 200047, Round ZK-1-from Kwajalein's Mount Olympus Dec. 15, 1961. By May 1963, Nike Zeus missiles had launched 19 times, scoring nine successful intercepts against the 13 Titan I, Atlas D and Atlas E ICBMs fired from Vandenberg Air Force Base, California.

Secretary of Defense Robert Mc-Namara had followed Nike Zeus' successes early in its anti-ballistic missile mission and had asked as early as 1962 for the Army and Bell Labs to prepare the missile system for an anti-satellite role. Bell Labs affirmed it could be done. While Nike Zeus would remain the missile for the job, it would be modified specifically for satellite destruction and come in new variants: DM-15B and DM-15S.

In the winter of 1962-1963, a DM-15B and DM-15S variant each took off from White Sands against computer-simulated satellites, reaching apogees of up to 151 nautical miles and scoring initial successes. Then on March 21, 1963, with testing having transferred to the open range at Kwajalein, a DM-15S shot from Mount Olympus but failed to score a hit against its computer-simulated satellite target. The problem? A Missile Track Radar malfunction at the current-day Range Radio building near the landfill. Another attempt against a simulated target at Kwajalein failed April 19, 1963.

Finally, ARGMA, Bell Labs and Douglas got their first real shot May 24, 1963 when a special "Agena D" booster stage of the Air Force 162A series made an

approach over the atoll. "The TTR first acquired the satellite at long range, and the missile was launched after a period of precision tracking," reads a 1975 Bell Labs history of its program at Kwajalein. "A close intercept was achieved, well within what was expected to the lethal range of the ZEUS nuclear warhead."

From that point on through 1964, Pacific Missile Range Facility-Kwajalein served as America's first operational anti-satellite contingent, with the Army maintaining anti-satellite Zeus variants at Kwajalein in a state of constant readiness. If the need arose, an agreement had been established allowing the Army to retrieve a live Zeus nuclear warhead from a secure location on the island to be installed into a Zeus missile for an anti-satellite mission. Importantly, only Army personnel on Kwajalein—not the civilian contractor team with Bell Labs or Douglas Aircraft Company—would be responsible for launching the missile in a real military operation.

As part of its new anti-satellite mission, the Army launched Zeus variants against simulated enemy satellites and actual booster space targets for the sake of training Kwajalein test range personnel through 1964. But a real attack was, to the relief of the teams at Kwajalein, never called up.

"Fortunately, intercept and destruction of an enemy satellite were never ordered," the Bell Labs reports in the 1975 document. "After 1964, we were relieved of this 'ready' requirement and were once more able to concentrate on the normal R&D test program."



This image shows a standing wave (black) depicted as a sum of two propagating waves traveling in opposite directions (blue and red). Similar in motion to a seesaw, a seiche is a standing wave in which the largest vertical oscillations are at each end of a body of water with very small oscillations at the "node," or center point, of the wave. Standing waves can form in any enclosed or semi-enclosed body of water, from a massive lake to a small coffee cup.

What is a seiche?

A seiche is a standing wave oscillating in a body of water.

If you have observed water sloshing back and forth in a swimming pool, bathtub, or cup of water, you may have witnessed a small-scale seiche (pronounced saysh). On a much grander scale, the same phenomenon occurs in large bodies of water such as bays and lakes. A seiche may occur in any semi- or fully-enclosed body of water.

Seiches are typically caused when strong winds and rapid changes in atmospheric pressure push water from one end of a body of water to the other. When the wind stops, the water rebounds to the other side of the enclosed area. The water then continues to oscillate back and forth for hours or even days. In a similar fashion, earthquakes, tsunamis, or severe storm fronts may also cause seiches along ocean shelves and ocean harbors.

Lake Erie is known for seiches, especially when strong winds blow from southwest to northeast. In 1844, a 22foot seiche breached a 14-foot-high sea wall killing 78 people and damming the ice to the extent that Niagara Falls temporarily stopped flowing. As recently as 2008, strong winds created waves 12 to 16 feet high in Lake Erie, leading to flooding near Buffalo, New York. Lake Pontchartrain, Louisiana, is also known to routinely form small seiches after the passage of afternoon squall lines during summer months.

In some of the Great Lakes and other large bodies of water, the time period between the "high" and "low" of a seiche can be as much as four to seven hours. This is very similar to the time period between a high and low tide in the oceans, and is often mistaken as a tide.

Flame Tree

FXTERNAL REPORT

From "Gardening on Kwajalein," by the Garden Club of the Yokwe Yuk Women's Club, 1983

Poinciana, also known as flame tree, is one of the most beautiful flowering trees. It is a native of Madagascar but has been widely planted in warm climates because of its immense clusters of brilliant flowers.

Each flower measures three to four inches across, with five widely spreading red petals. One of the petals is streaked and dotted with yellow. Ten long stamens stand well above the flower, adding to its beauty

Two-feet long seed pods follow the flower. The pods look like great purplish-brown lima bean pods. Inside the pods are hard oblong beans. The seed pods are used for fuel in some countries.

Royal poincianas are commonly found in southern Florida and the West Indies. The tree stays in bloom during the long summer months. Many roadways are lined with the poinciana, turning into lines of fiery red during the blooming season.

When not in bloom, the trees are still very beautiful because of their lacy, fernlike foliage of soft green leaves, divided and subdivided into many tiny leaflets.

The trees reach a height of 40 feet. The tree grows rapidly, developing strong, gnarled trunks and spreading branches.

Majuro, Marshall Islands, was recently beautified by the importing of flame trees to line the roads. Emmaline Kabua, wife of the president, initiated a beautification program on Majuro.

There were several large poincianas on Kwajalein. Quarters 219-B and 224-A, 403-B and 431-A had very large poincianas in the yards. It is interesting to note how fast small trees grow.

The seeds from the pods are strung into leis. The tree is a member of the Legume family.



UXO SAFETY

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ord-nance.

- Remember the three R's of UXO:
- Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- Retreat from the area of the UXO;
- Report suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433.

You can also call CPS at 480-4445.

Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

WEATHER WATCH

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Quiet, pleasant conditions will continue across Kwajalein Atoll for the remainder of the workweek and much of the weekend, with dry trade winds and strong upper-level subsidence in control.

Expect mostly sunny skies and light northeasterly winds on Saturday, which will gradually veer toward the east-southeast in the afternoon as a weak, subtle surface wave crosses the area. Winds will drop to the low single digits by evening, likely becoming calm or variable at times.

Expect to see a slight increase in showers and cloud cover overnight heading into Sunday due to a weak, larger-scale perturbation, but any showers that form will remain very shallow. Doldrum conditions will continue for Sunday with partly-mostly sunny skies and isolated shower activity before east-northeast trade winds begin to return on Monday.

A small increase in winds will yield a few isolated showers in the afternoon, but otherwise conditions should remain pleasant before a more significant surface wave develops over the region for the start of the coming workweek. Expect scattered showers and possible thunderstorms on Tuesday as a robust low-pressure trough crosses the RMI, amplified by increasing surface winds, moisture, and low-level convergence. Quiet, mostly dry conditions should follow on Wednesday in the wake of the exiting trade wind disturbance.

The latter half of the workweek will experience more typical wet season conditions as a relatively active

Intertropical Convergence Zone organizes across the central and northern RMI. Expect overall higher cloud cover and more frequent bouts of shower activity on Thursday into the following weekend. Showers may be heavy at times, and a stray thunderstorm or two cannot be ruled out.

SATURDAY

Partly to mostly sunny with stray showers. Winds ENE-ESE at 3-8 knots, becoming light and variable at times in the afternoon.

SUNDAY

Partly to mostly sunny with isolated showers. Winds light and variable, becoming calm at times.

MONDAY

Partly sunny with isolated showers. Winds ENE-E at 6-11 knots, gusting to the mid-upper teens near showers.

Expect scattered showers and stray thunderstorms for the beginning of the workweek followed by drier conditions by the mid-week, before unsettled, wet-season conditions close out the latter half of the week.

Expect intermittent widely scattered showers and the occasional stray thunderstorm. Winds will be ENE-ESE at 10-15 knots for the first half of the week, falling to around 5-10 knots for the latter half, becoming light and variable at times.


