
IT'S DECEMBER

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USAG-KA COMMANDER DISCUSSES THE HONOR AND CHALLENGE OF TAKING THE CALCULATED RISK

HOLIRGI ASS REPORT

NASA astronaut and U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll Commander Col. Drew Morgan joined the AFN staff to share his thoughts on pursuing inherently dangerous work.

I've always had a hard time explaining what the thread through my career is. The bottom line is I enjoy challenges.

I love being challenged.

I like risk taking in a calculated fashion. Parachuting and military diving—the military approaches those things as calculated risk. It's always a risk trade, a risk discussion. It's the same thing at NASA almost to an extreme, the way they analyze problems and break them down. It's all calculated risk. When the risk is worth taking, it's very exciting.

When you've put all that effort in and bring it to a point where you decide "this is a go," or "ready for launch"—that sort of mentality—it's a lot of fun to be part of high performing teams doing

those types of things.

I've always been drawn to high performing teams that pursue challenges. I love solving complex problems. If you think about it, all those elements make sense.

Now that I'm here and have become acquainted with Kwajalein, I realize that's why I was drawn to it—for all the same things that drew me to my military career and drew me to my NASA career. Those are all present here.

It feels even more rewarding now that I am applying those things and giving back. Every day has been exciting here.

I view this experience for me and for my family as a continuation of service. That's what really drives me: the idea that I'm serving something greater.

I've been a Soldier. I've been a medical doctor. I've been an astronaut. Each of those have been phases of my service to the nation. This is a continuation of that: Serving in the Pacific as a Soldier, as a leader.

It's my honor to serve now as the commander of the garrison and as a leader of this community, Team Kwaj.

SEATTLE VICTIM WAS KHS RI-KATAK PROGRAM GRADUATE

Families and friends of Ebeve native Malkie Loeak are still in shock following the horrific murder of Malkie in his home in Auburn, Washington two weeks ago.

Multiple news stories of the shooting said law enforcement are treating the incident as an active case and the search for the gunman is ongoing.

According to his wife Jeffrina, Malkie died on their doorstep after being shot. "Our four children and I were there when he got shot," Jeffrina told the Journal though an online interview. "Especially our two-year-old daughter, she saw the whole thing unravel and she kept saying, mommy, dad's head hurts," Jeffrina said.

"At first there was a normal knock," the wife told the Journal. "The knocks escalated to loud bangs because we didn't open the door," she said. My husband tried to identify who was knocking through the peep hole but whoever was outside had that blocked off. Then he got shot the second he opened the door."

The 29-year old is the son of Shrue and Noda Loeak from Ebeye. His siblings are Goldie, Asako and Areshup.

The father of four enlisted into the US Armed Forces, Army following his graduation from the Ri-Katak Program at the US Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll.

Malkie initially met the woman he would later marry and have children with back in 2014 in Springdale, Arkansas. But it wasn't until 2020 that the two became an item.

"I had two kids of my own when Malkie came into our lives," Jeffrina said.

"He was so sweet with the children and treated them as his own from the beginning," she said. The two would later have two children of their own.

Jeffrina describes Malkie as her blessing in disguise. She said he was selfless and had to work multiple jobs and long hours a week with only one day off and that he would take care of his parents, her parents and their relatives without

complaining.
"I know a lot of people cared about Malkie by the number of people reaching out to us in this time of need," she said.

Family members have set up a GoFund-Me account to assist with funeral costs. His mother Shrue said Malkie will be buried in Seattle.

VAMPIRE SQUID

The Kwajalein Hourglass presents island writer Anne Marie Zink in Kwaj Writes, a featurette dedicated to communications produced by USAG-KA's correspondents in community. Zink discusses an unlikely specimen of "vampire" resides under th sea—the vampire squid.

The Vampyroteuthis infernalis more commonly known as the Vampire Squid is a deep sea cephalopod known for it black-to-red color, its massive eyes and webbed tentacles covered in fleshy spines called Cirri.

Despite many comparing them to the likes of the devil, they are completely harmless to humans and get to about a foot in length (about the size of the piece of paper you are reading this on).

Funky Squid Facts

- The have the biggest eye to body ratio in the entire animal kingdom
- To Protect itself, Vampire squids can use their spiny, webbed tentacles as a sort of cloak
- Another way that vampire squids protect themselves is that they can release a bioluminescent mucus from the tips of their tentacles that can glow for up to

- Depending on the region they are found, their colors can vary from red to black

Diet

As mentioned before, vampire squids are the known Cephalopods to be detritivores, which means they are scavengers and consume dead organic material called Marine snow. Marine snow includes particles of rotting animals and

Habitat

Vampire squids are found in temperate and tropical deep-water zones worldwide at depths of 600 to 1200 m.

This zone is a very difficult place for species to live in. There is little to no natural light, little food sources, very low oxygen levels, and high-pressure.

The vampire squid has evolved to be able to thrive in this type of environment, with its massive eyes and its scavenger diet, eating whatever dead thing floats by.

Reproduction

When Vampire squids mate, the male squid transfers the sperm to the female using his funnel, which cephalopods use for movement and respiration. Once the eggs are fertilized, the female releases them into the water column.

Abundance

There is a high abundance of Vampire squids in the world and they are not on the endangered species list. Though they are decently rare and difficult to find. Just because they are not on the endangered species list doesn't mean that they don't have any threats to their species.

Though in the deep they don't have many natural predators, vampire squids are threatened by ocean warming and decreasing oxygen levels in the water. They are also affected by overfishing and industrialization.

ENVIRONMENTAL TAKES STEPS TO BEAT COCONUT RHINO BEETLE

The coconut rhinoceros beetle, or CRB, is a potential ecological threat on Kwajalein. The beetle has been present in Hawaii since 2013 and in Guam since 2008.

It was recently identified on Majuro in September in the vicinity of the Amata Kabua International Airport, according to an October 13 article in The Marshall Islands Journal. Beetle larvae and numerous infested palm trees were identified near the airport vicinity.

The adult CRB does not bite or sting humans. It can grow to 1-2 inches in length and is known for aggressively attacking coconut palms and other tropical fruit-bearing plants, such as banana, agave, sugarcane and pineapple. The beetles will leave large holes ranging from one to two inches in the palm trees that will eventually kill the tree. It also attacks several other species of palm trees, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture website.

The beetles can infest mulch and green plant waste and is known to cross boarders by traveling in international cargo and passenger luggage.

Keeping the CRB out of U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll is a priority for contract and Army environmental authorities who continue to work on plans to mitigate the hazards posed by the invasive species.

Environmental authorities on Kwajalein have discussed options with Army Environmental Command experts and technical advisors at the University of Hawaii to deter the invasive pests should they make their way to Kwajalein. University personnel have provided CRB traps to be deployed in areas where cargo and passengers may offload.







On Kwajalein, the long black traps will be deployed in areas near the main entry points, such as the air terminals and marine docking areas such as the Dock Security Checkpoint and the Barge Slip Ramp. Other possible deployment sites may include areas close to the ground near vegetation waste sites. No beetles have been identified to date, but with almost daily flights from Majuro and routine cargo vessels, the Garrison does not want to take any risk.

Soon, the island's Vector Control team

will hang detection traps and place improvised ground traps in and around luggage and transit areas in hopes of capturing these unwanted pests. The community is requested to avoid disturbing the installed traps. More details will be shared regarding the potential impact to island vegetation and any action needed in the coming weeks.

Some corals can live for up to 5,000 years, making them the longest living animals on Earth.

What are the oldest living animals in the world?

Studies show that some corals can live for up to 5,000 years, making them the longest living animals on Earth.

Scientific studies of elkhorn coral (Acropora palmata) in the Caribbean and off the coast of Florida show that coral genotypes can survive longer than expected. Genotype refers to the genetic makeup of an organism.

Scientists are now using a genetic approach to estimate the ages of corals.

The method determines when a coral egg and sperm originally met to form the genome of a coral colony. The researchers then track the number of mutations that have accumulated in the genome since that time. Because mutations tend to arise at a relatively constant rate, researchers can estimate the approximate age of the coral genomes in their study.

These studies can help clarify how corals will respond to current and future environmental changes. Though corals can be resilient and live for thousands of years, elkhorn corals are listed as threatened under the U.S. Endangered Species Act.

The corals have suffered recent population declines, indicating that there are limits to how much change even these resilient creatures can handle.

PUBLIC NOTICE

The Environmental Standards for U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll identify the coconut crab as a protected species. For this reason, USAG-KA residents and personnel should not touch, harass, injure or kill coconut crabs.

The coconut crab (Birgus latro), known locally as barulep, is a type of landbased hermit crab. Unlike other hermit crabs, the coconut crab does not make use of a shell beyond the juvenile stages of its life. It is this characteristic that allows the coconut crab to grow so large in size.

Despite their name, coconut crabs have a varied diet which includes other fresh fruits and even meats, usually smaller crabs or dead animals. They use their strong sense of smell to locate food when they emerge from their burrows to hunt at night and, typically, remain inside their burrows during the day to protect themselves from the heat.

Coconut crabs can be found on many of the small islands throughout the Pacific and Indian Oceans. The state of their population remains unknown. For this reason, some nations have given this species protected status.

HISTORY WITH U.S. SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND

In preparation for the interceptor and system tests planned for the Spartan and Sprint missiles at the Kwajalein Test Site, on Dec. 5, 1966, representatives from the Nike X Project Office were in Washington, D.C.

The purpose of their visit was to present new briefings to higher authorities on the need for 200 additional family housing units at KTS.

As Kwajalein history would subsequently record, "family quarters again became scarce during the NIKE-X/ SENTINEL build up, but in 1968, two large seagoing barges, carrying the answer to Kwajalein's latest housing problem, appeared off Echo Pier. They brought several dozen 55-foot house trailers: the first of 191 trailers that arrived on Kwajalein by the end of the year. The trailers were positioned on the "contingency" fill at the north end of the island. This new trailer camp, with row upon row of mobile homes of gleaming aluminum promptly became known as "Silver City.

Since 1959, the Kwajalein Missile Range was seen as the ultimate missile test range. Situated as it is in the Pacific Ocean, the range can support testing for both national and theater missile defense mis-

sions.

At the same time the range's radars and telemetry provide a wealth of data to the Air Force for their Glory Trip program which evaluates the Minuteman missiles. Less well known is the relationship between Kwajalein Test Site—also called the Kwajalein Missile Range, U.S. Army Kwajalein Atoll, Reagan Test Site—and the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

Beginning with the Apollo program in the 1960s, Kwa-jalein radars have tracked NASA spaceships, satellites, and observatories. Since then, Kwajalein radars have participated in the Space Object Measurement Program, while the range has provided an equatorial launch site for variety of NASA research programs.

On Dec. 15, 1965, the Nike-Zeus Discrimination Radar and the Target Track Radar, on Kwajalein and at White Sands Missile Range provided support to the Gemini 6A manned space mission. During this 26-hour mission, astronauts Walter Schirra and Thomas Stafford were tasked "to demonstrate on-time launch procedures, closed-loop rendezvous capabilities, and station keeping techniques with Gemini 7." They were also "to evaluate the spacecraft reentry guidance capabilities, and conduct spacecraft systems tests and four experiments."

As part of the NIKE-ZEUS system—the Discrimination and Target Track Radars were two of the four radars needed to operate the system. When a battery was assigned a cloud of threatening objects, the Discrimination Radar would assess all components differentiating between the lethal and non-lethal

elements. Once it designated the target, the data was transferred to the Target Track Radar which would provide continued data on the small highspeed targets throughout the terminal phase of flight and intercept.

In a written statement on Dec. 17, 2002 President George W. Bush announced a plan to deploy, within two years, the first phase of a limited system designed to protect the United States against a ballistic missile attack.

"Throughout my administration, I have made clear the United States will take every measure necessary to protect our citizens against what is perhaps greatest danger of all—the catastrophic harm that may result from hostile states or terrorist groups armed with weapons of mass destruction and the means to deliver them."

This initial system, which consisted of interceptor missiles based at Fort Greely, Alaska, was "a starting point for improved and expanded capabilities later as further progress is made in researching and developing missile defense technologies and in light of changes in the threat."

U.S. ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE COMMAND HISTORY

Speaking at the Association of the U.S. Army Symposium in El Paso, Texas, on Dec. 7, 2000, Lt. Gen. John Costello, U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense commander, announced a new operational concept for globally integrated missile defense which incorporates cruise, theater and national missile defense.

Costello observed that "the line between theater and global missile capabilities will become increasingly blurred as countries begin developing the delivery to reach the United States and to threaten our allies."

Noting that these weapons could

be launched from platforms operating offshore or in the Western Hemisphere, the cruise and tactical missiles could be directed against the United States and our shorter-range interceptors would in fact be providing a defense for the nation.

Costello added that the theater commanders and the Commander in Chief, U.S. Space Command, use the same satellite constellations to detect missile launches and the same early warning networks to provide the necessary alerts.

This commonality should be extended to the interceptors to create "three families of systems completely interoperable with each other."

TRACK SANTA WITH HELP FROM NORAD

Every day of the year, NORAD defends North America using an all-domain and globally integrated approach to track everything that flies in and around Canada and the United States. On Dec. 24, NORAD adds a special mission: tracking Santa.

Like many origin stories, NORAD's mission to track Santa began by accident. In 1955 a young child, trying to reach Santa, dialed the misprinted phone number from a department store ad in the local newspaper. Instead of calling Santa, the child called the Continental Air Defense Command (CONAD) Operations Center in Colorado Springs, Colo.

Air Force Col. Harry Shoup, the commander on duty that night who answered the child's phone call, was quick to realize a mistake had been made and assured the child he was Santa.

After more incoming calls, Shoup assigned a duty officer to continue answering calls and a tradition was born, that continued when NORAD was formed in 1958.

Each year since, NORAD has dutifully reported Santa's location on Dec. 24 to millions of children and families across the world. Because of the support, services and resources generously provid-

ed by volunteers and our government and corporate contributors, NORAD Tracks Santa has persevered for more than 65 years.

In fact, what started because of a typo has flourished and is recognized as one of the Department of Defense's largest community outreach programs.

Each year, the NORAD Tracks Santa Web Site receives several million unique visitors from more than 200 countries and territories around the world. Volunteers typically answer more than 130,000 calls to the NORAD Tracks Santa hotline from children across the globe.

WARDROBE FOR VISITING EBEYE



When visiting Ebeye in the Marshall Islands, it is advisable to dress modestly and respectfully, considering the local cultural norms and the warm tropical climate. Here are some general guidelines for both men and women by Yolanie Korab.

CLOTHING FOR MEN

Opt for lightweight, breathable fabrics such as cotton or linen to stay comfortable in the warm and humid weather. Wear collared shirts or T-shirts that cover the shoulders. Avoid sleeveless shirts or tank tops, as they may be seen as inappropriate. Choose knee-length shorts or trousers. Avoid wearing excessively short shorts or swimwear in public areas.

CLOTHING FOR WOMEN

DRESSES OR SKIRTS: Wear kneelength or longer dresses, skirts, or sarongs. Loose-fitting and lightweight fabrics are recommended.

Select modest tops that cover the shoulders and avoid low necklines or revealing clothing. Hats or caps are useful for protecting yourself from the sun, especially during the hot daytime hours. Apply sunscreen, wear sunglasses, and carry a light shawl or umbrella for extra sun protection.

FOOTWEAR FOR MEN AND WOMEN: Comfortable shoes or sandals are suitable. Bring a pair of sandals that are easy to slip on and off when visiting home or certain establishments.

WATER PLANT.

Water Distribution personnel are continuing with annual flushing of the potable water fire hydrants and pipes on Kwajalein. Over the next three weeks, the water coming out of faucets and showers on Kwajalein in the BQ's and the Housing area may turn reddish brown from rusty cast iron pipes in the water distribution system. If your water becomes discolored, let the tap run until the water clears up. If your water turns very red for a day or two, avoid washing white clothes until the clarity of the water returns to normal. Call Stan at 480-1847 with any questions.

FIRE TIP FROM THE USAG-KA FIRE PREVENTION OFFICE Christmas Safety

- Live cut trees are not permitted in the garrison's dining facilities, bachelor quarters, hospital, dispensary and Macy's.
- Place any live holiday trees a minimum of three feet away from fireplaces, radiators and other heat sources.
- Turn lights off before going to bed or leaving the home.
- Use no more than three standard-size sets of lights per single extension cord and avoid areas where the cords can become a tripping hazard.
- Choose decorations that are flame flame retardant.
- Safety first! More than one third of home decoration fires are started by candles, and more than two of every five decoration fires happen because decor was placed too close to a heat source.



WEATHER DISCUSSION

Our overall synoptic setup remains largely the same as it has been over the past week or so, as a robust subtropical high remains to our northeast, and a broad Near-Equatorial Trough is located to our south. This setup has resulted in a strong pressure gradient over the region and has been the reason for the breezy conditions we have been experiencing.

Periodic waves generated from the NET will bring us more showery conditions from time to time, and that will likely be the case at times this weekend.

In fact, a wave is expected to move close to the RMI this weekend and shower chances will likely increase somewhat as a result. This wave should stay to our south, keeping most of the stronger showers and thunderstorms south of the Atoll; however, the wave may deepen a bit which would further increase the pressure gradient over the RMI, further elevating our winds to the upper-teens to low 20s. In fact, model guidance has Sunday through Tuesday having sustained winds forecasted in the low 20s for an extended amount of time.

If this ultimately verifies, then a small craft advisory will be needed at times this weekend and/or at the beginning of the work week. Furthermore, showers throughout the weekend will be capable of producing an occasional gust in the low-to-mid 30s as well.

The good news is these elevated winds will help keep thunderstorm chances low as the mid-to-upper-level wind shear environment is rather unfavorable for thunderstorm development.

SATURDAY

Partly sunny with isolated showers becoming widely scattered at times. Winds NNE-ENE at 15-20 knots with a few gusts in the upper 20s to low 30s near showers.

SUNDAY

The main impacts expected are somewhat elevated winds mainly in the upper-teens and increased cloud cover, along with periodic periods of widely scattered to possibly scattered showers for a brief time.
