U.S. – RMI COMMUNITY RELATIONS COUNCIL AIMS To Improve Worker Performance, relations

After a three-year hiatus, the U.S.- Republic of the Marshall Islands Community Relations Council met for the first time since 2021, hosted by the U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll command group.

"Our friendship with the RMI is critical," said Col. Drew Morgan, commander, USAG-KA, noting that recent events highlighted that bond, notably the incident of flooding from several waves on Roi-Namur.

Morgan said that the residents of Roi-Namur, as well as the residents of Enniburr, or Third Island, was foremost in his mind. "Water delivery on Third Island remains one of our major concerns, one that we worked hard to resume immediately."

Attendees at the CRC representing the U.S. included the following: Lance Posey, deputy chief of mission, U.S. Embassy-Majuro; Col. Drew Morgan, USAG-KA commander; Command Sgt. Maj. Ernest Miller, USAG-KA senior enlisted advisor; Lt. Cdr. Brendan Kruse, U.S. Embassy-Palau; U.S. Coast Guard Capt. William C. Woityra, U.S. Indo-Pacific Command; Cdr. Jason A. Neal, U.S. Embassy-Palau. Attendees representing the RMI included the following: Kwajalein Atoll local government May-

or Hirata Kabue; RMI Minister David Paul; Sen. Kitlang Kabua; Sen. Kili Kabua; Councilman Terry Lorok Jr.; Councilman Conny Livai Sr.; RMI Liaison to USAG-KA Conny Livai Jr; Councilman Alvin Jacklick; KALGOV Protocol Officer Robert Nenam; Abacca Anjain-Maddison, assistant deputy chief secretary; Councilman Anjer Langinbelik; Councilman Tony Maika; and Dr. Gregg Nakano.

Before the meeting began, Morgan shared that the recent 8oth Anniversary Commemoration for Operation Flint-

lock, was an opportunity to showcase our shared heritage.

"This commemoration showcased our shared kinship with the RMI," said Morgan.

Electrical Power to Third Island

Maj. Dae Choi, host nation director, USAG-KA, moderated the council, and offered that the Kwajalein Atoll Joint Utilities Resources is working with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers on the issue. Minister David Paul said that his understanding was that a document was signed by the RMI and sent to the

U.S. and that the RMI was waiting on the U.S.' input with USACE to ensure RMI compliance. He added that RMI funding for the project has been allocated and that the RMI is working to install the grid on Third Island with the Marshall Energy Company doing the work in-house.

USACE representative Blair Jones said that his organization will take this, review and provide input, with Paul adding that this project had been in discussion for the past eight years.

Representing Kwajalein Atoll, Sen. Kitlang Kabua commented that the issue had been pending for some time and that confusion is caused by a mutual lack of awareness by U.S. and RMI counterparts for their respective points of contact on the issue. Kabua asked if the recent flooding on Roi caused the power to be affected.

Morgan noted that while the flooding on Roi-Namur affected the power distribution system, the flood did not cause the power plant to fail.

Micronesian Games

USAG-KA will host the swimming events of the upcoming Micronesian Games, June 17 – 21. Lt. Col. Travis Lynch, USAG-KA director of emergency services, said that the biggest issue would be the access of athletes and coaches and that DES would work with the RMI for the information. Paul said that Sen. Tony Muller would be the RMI point of contact.

Paul said that the athletes will come from the RMI, the Federated States of Micronesia, Palau, Kiribati and Nauru. "USAG-KA is a national asset," said Morgan, "and there will be some logistics to be looked at as we support the event."

Business Opportunities on US-AG-KA for RMI businesses

Paul said there hasn't been real traction, but previous discussion had touched on perhaps RMI businesses taking on the golf cart rentals or the American Eatery at the Dock Security Checkpoint.

Ian Morales, AAFES general manager added that AAFES is open for discussion and they would need business proposals.

Morgan added that with the right business model, there could have been vendors from Ebeye who could have sold food or merchandise during the recent 8oth Anniversary Commemoration for Operation Flintlock.

Proposed Memorandum of Understanding for shipment of fruits and vegetables on Asia Pacific Air Paul shared that there was a trial run in the shipment of fruits and vegetables that arrived on a flight from Guam, with USAG-KA helping to provide transportation from the airport to the DSC, prior to COVID. The RMI issue is getting space on the APA flights.

He said that the other issue is trying to get the APA flights that go directly to Majuro to stop here in Kwajalein first. The RMI will get with the APA to see if that is an option.

Morgan added that currently US-AG-KA cannot support night flights into the airfield. Paul said that the RMI would get more information from APA.

New Topics of Discussion Ombudsman

Paul stated that this issue is very important as it affects a most vital resource which are the people. He added that the idea being that the ombudsman is accountable to the Joint Labor Relations Board, that the applicant is screened by the JLRB membership (both U.S and RMI).

Morgan agreed that the installation will run smoothly if there is a process in place (in terms of addressing grievances). He then asked why the Liaison position can't be combined with the Ombudsman position, and still report to the JLRB. Paul said that the RMI is ready for the position and that they've budgeted for it.

Morgan further added that this is also very important to the command and agreed for the RMI to have an ombudsman position on USAG-KA.

Support for Kwajalein Atoll Sustainability Laboratory /Pacific Allies

Dr. Gregg Nakano briefed that the KASL's objective is to explore ways to improve the lives of the people on Ebeye and in Kwajalein in the RMI. He added they are trying to build collaboration with both RMI and U.S. interests to achieve their objectives of climate resilience.

Morgan thanked everyone for attending and participating with the CRC, highlighting the Team Kwaj values of doing the right thing, being kind to one another and adding that leaders are committed to being kind. "USAG-KA is committed to these values."

The shelter evacuation plan for Kwajalein housing residents and during off-duty hours is limited to three primary locations: Bldg. 361, 805 and 704.

The upper floors of bachelor quarters will also serve as residential shelter locations for BQ residents on lower floors, and the senior resident for each BQ will serve as the warden. BQ's will not normally store shelter kits prior to any emergency.

If an emergency occurs during hours of business, all shelters

will be available, and the senior government or contractor will act as the warden.

During normal hours, the south entrance to Bldg. 1010 will be opened and those without normal building clearance will be escorted to a safe location on the second floor.

The following instructions are a guide to be used by all shelter wardens prior to and during an emergency. In the event the primary shelter warden is unavailable, a secondary warden will be identified and fulfill this function.

1. Ensure any shelter kits at your shelter are secure, fully stocked, and within expiration dates. This will be checked quarterly and discrepancies reported to the contract emergency manager and USAG-KA Emergency Manager. 2. Designate a pet area or pet room for those residents with pets.

3. Test telephone and e-mail contacts for emergency management personnel and update your contact information as required.

4. Ensure facility keys are functional.

5. Ensure the facility has a

working television and radio for use during an emergency.

During An Emergency

1. At the onset of impending disaster notification via siren or other means, the shelter warden will immediately evacuate to and open the designated shelter. This will be conducted whether the warden is notified directly or not, or whether the impending disaster siren has been sounded. There may not be time to contact each warden to open shelters. The fire department may assist with opening shelters, as required.



2. The shelter warden is responsible to ensure all residents are aware that safety is a personal responsibility and that sponsors are responsible for the behavior and safety of their children, family, guests and pets. Residents may depart the shelter prior to the "all clear" but the warden shall inform them that they do so at their own risk. Unruly residents and sponsors will be reported to the authorities.

3. You will ensure any **shelter kit(s)** delivered to your location is complete and within expiration dates. This includes kits delivered and stored at your location ahead of time and at the time a disaster is likely to occur or is occurring.

4. You will **report** via telephone, e-mail, or runner as appropriate to the Emergency Operations Center at (480-0856) your total occupant and pet numbers and keep track of residents by name of sponsor and those sponsored. (ex. Capt. Smith, spouse, two children and one dog).

5. You will ensure **commu**nication to shelter occupants is timely and accurate via television, radio, or through reports you receive during a crisis.

6. A representative from the EOC will bring a radio (CH 13) to your shelter location so you may communicate with the EOC for critical emergency information and updates, as required.

7. Reassure residents during a crisis and maintain a calm and civil atmosphere.

After An Emergency

1. Ensure any **shelter kit items** used during the crisis are accounted for and reported through USAG-KA Operations for restocking.

2. Ensure shelter is clean, orderly and secure prior to departure.

Report closure of shelter to USAG-KA Ops and emergency management personnel.
 Turn in radio to EOC or maintain until it can be picked up from you.

The Emergency Roi-Namur Shelters are second floor hallways of the Nike Bldg. 8114, Spartan Bldg. 8115, Ratak Bldg. 8211 and Ralik Bldg. 8213.

Upon entering the shelter, please provide the following information to your shelter warden:

- Your quarters number
- Names of all members in your group
- Names of any family members who are not present

Medical personnel will be assigned to the emergency shelters. Only personnel who may require emergency medical treatment, as predetermined by the medical officer, will be sheltered in the hospital.

An officer in charge will be assigned to each emergency shelter. You are expected to cooperate with the OIC.

It is important that shelter assignments be followed.

The emergency shelter for all personnel east of the runway will be the Administration Bldg. 8035. For all personnel west of the runway, the second floor hallways of the Nike, Spartan, Ratak and Ralik bachelor quarters will serve as shelters.

Command Sgt. Maj. Ernest Miller, U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll senior enlisted advisor traveled to Roi-Namur Feb. 9 to hold the first town hall since the Jan. 20 wave inundation that damaged the northern part of the island.

He thanked everyone for what everybody has done with Roi so far.

"We still have a long way to go," said Miller, "but if you look at it now from when it first happened, it's 100 percent different—we will continue to push forward."

Miller added that 5,000 gallons of water is being pushed every day to Third Island. "The next step is to get the dining facility back up and running to feed a mass amount of people because the small kitchen they are working out of, it's amazing what they're doing every single day, but it's not sustainable."

He added that cleaning up

Roi and getting it back up to healthy is the next step.

Miller thanked the dining facility manager and his team for providing quality of life on Roi for serving 508 meals in one day.

"You and your team are awesome."

Miller added that there is unexploded ordnance, or UXOs, on the island and have been found. "If you see an area marked off with a pink flag, stay away. If you see something, say something. Mark near it to notify security and EOD so no one gets hurt."

Before the questions started, Anthony McAllister, Roi V₂X lead, thanked the Marshallese workforce. "Look where we've come in the last 10 days. You've really put in the work, the effort and the strength – I can't say thank you enough."

Only two questions came up during the meeting: lack of mail, and issues with the Bank of the Marshall Islands.

Regarding the mail, Miller said, "The mailroom has a list of everyone still on Roi and should be bringing it out. We're trying to get mail up once a week. Mail is a morale booster." Regarding the BOMI ATMs out of funds, Miller added that "We are working with the RMI to get the bank representatives up there and the machine has money available now."

ANYWHERE ATOLL IS HOME-GROWN ROCK

For those wondering where to show up for the next live music event, the answer is "Anywhere Atoll."

This island rock band adds their signature sound to any scene in any season in way that is both effortless and fun. If you've never seen the band play, kept watch for concert announcements featuring the band's signature icon—a shark guitarist playing face-melting rock.

Anywhere Atoll kindly co-authored the following interview to share a little about themselves and how they keep their Kwaj band going. Read up and get ready for their next concert.

Tell us about the band! How did this group form up?

Vocalist Jacque Phelon has loved offering live music to Kwaj and Roi residents since 2017. Unfortunately, many of the musicians she used to sing with PCS'd during COVID.

Jacque had been looking to get back into the band scene following maternity leave, so her Kwaj talent scout and husband, Patrick, recommended she talk with Buck (lead guitar) and Luke (bass).

The three got together to see if the

group could be a fit. Luke recruited Ashton on drums and Jon on rhythm guitar.

Guitarist Luke Letter was introduced to the band by David Bates, bass player for the Saggy G's.

**:

"We jammed one day and switched around to different instruments. It was fun, so we decided to try and get a band going," Letter wrote. "I work with Patrick, and I think someone mentioned that his wife, Jacque, was a singer, and she was looking to get back into the band scene.

"So, we all got together with Ashton who had mentioned that he played drums, and it was great, and we knew we had a good thing. I think we just got lucky. A few months later, we invited Jonathan Janke to come play, as we needed another guitarist. He played a couple songs with us at our first show, and did a great job, so we added the fifth member to our group."

Anywhere Atoll is a clever name. Tell us how you came up with it?

We liked the idea of using "atoll" in lieu of "at all." There was some disagreement on what name best fit the bill, but "Anywhere Atoll" was the winning compromise.

What are the challenges of keeping a band together on Kwajalein?



The voice of the band, Jacque Phelon is a classically trained singer who can tackle the wide array of genres in Anywhere Atoll's musical repertoire.

We all have work and personal commitments, much like anywhere. Unique to Kwaj is the ever-present possibility of PSC'ing, which can threaten the band's longevity. We also have the challenge of scheduling rehearsal and shows around mission requirements.



In a nutshell, please tell us a little about each performer's musical background.

Jacque started singing at church, performed in various choirs and musicals growing up, studied classical performance in college, and sang in the UMass Dynamics a cappella group after switching to a mechanical engineering major.

After college, Jacque sang with the Boston Pops Gospel Choir before moving to Kwaj and joining Kwaj bands Ballistic Love and Robbing Sunrise, active from 2017-2018 and 2018-2020, respectively.

Luke started playing bass and guitar in high school and had several bands.

I was involved with music in college, and continued over the years, but having a family and a career makes that a bit difficult," he said. "Kwaj actually affords us more free time to pursue some of our old hobbies, so it was a great opportunity to get back into it."

Buck Polya's quitar skills are the subject of much speculation from his bandmates.

"When [Buck] was 16, the devil offered to make him an amazing guitar player in exchange for his soul," Letter said. "He says he turned down the offer, and instead just practiced really hard, but every once in a while, I just get this feeling..."

Ashton started playing the drum set in 2002, and despite moving around the world with living situations not suitable for a drum kit has managed to keep the talent alive. This is complimented by going to at least a thousand shows and concerts since 2006.

Over the winter holidays, Anywhere Atoll had a Santa drummer. The crowd enjoyed

A catcher beach refers to any place where marine debris tends to pile up or aggregate.

Not to be confused with a dumping ground or heavily trashed public beach, a catcher beach typically receives its accumulations of debris due to its shape and location in combination with high-energy waves, storms, or winds.

Awareness and common knowledge of these types of areas vary significantly by state, although many states have a good understanding of where catcher beaches are located. In many cases, catcher beaches are found in remote areas that are difficult to access and can be challenging in terms of debris cleanup and removal.

A specific example of a catcher beach can be found along the shores of Gore Point, Alaska. The geography of this location makes it a very high-density catcher beach, as it sticks out like a hook into the Gulf of Alaska current. Scientists and community groups have been monitoring and cleaning this catcher beach for over nine years because a lot of debris ends up there each year. Most notably in 2007-2008, a cleanup effort in Gore Point removed more than 20 tons of debris from less than a mile of shoreline! The debris included piles of logs reaching 10-15 feet high-evidence of the force of the winter storms that bring debris ashore in that part of Alaska.

- Have all electrical work done by a qualified electrician.
- Major appliances should be plugged directly into a wall outlet receptacle.

- Test GFCIs monthly or according to the manufacturer's recommendation.
- Ensure electrical cords do not run across doorways or under carpets.
- Use lightbulbs with correct wattage as indicated on your light fixtures.

BUILDING A KWAJ GO-BAG FOR EMERGENCIES

HOURGLASS REPORT

Say a USAG-KA-wide disaster strikes—one that cuts off residents' access to electricity, water, shopping and communications. Will you and your family be ready?

Read on to learn about the sundry items to go out and grab to make your own survival kit. In the event of a crippling event such as a destructive typhoon—you'll be glad you did.

First grab a large travel bag or suitcase and then cram it with these items. This is what you'll want to bring along to the evacuation shelter in the event of a disaster.

In addition to preparing a go bag to take along to the evacuation shelter, you should also prepare a post-disaster supply kit. This should be packed in a water-tight container and left inside your living quarters.

Here's what you'll need:

- 1. A one-gallon jug of water for each person in your household
- 2. A one-day supply of non-perishable food to cover every person in your household
- 3. Manual can opener
- 4. Eating utensils, cups and plates
- 5. Sensible clothing
- 6. Rain gear, such as ponchos
- 7. Blanket for each family member
- 8. First-aid kit
- 9. Short-term supply of all required prescription medications taken by members of the household
- 10. Short-term supply of common overthe-counter medications
- 11. Personal hygiene items
- 12. Battery powered radio

CLOTHING FOR MEN

Opt for lightweight, breathable fabrics such as cotton or linen to stay comfortable in the warm and humid weather. Wear collared shirts or T-shirts that cover the shoulders. Avoid sleeveless shirts or tank tops, as they may be seen as inappropriate. Choose knee-length shorts or trousers. Avoid wearing excessively short shorts or swimwear in public.

Apply sunscreen, wear sunglasses, and carry a light shawl or umbrella for extra sun protection.

A FRIENDLY E-WARENESS REMINDER FOR WHAT NOT TO MAIL TO KWAJ

APO AP 96555 Mail Restrictions

One of the many restrictions for mail to ZIP Code 96555 is a prohibition on fruits, vegetables, live animals and live plants.

Please do not order these items to be delivered to APO AP 96555. Live plants are prohibited in the mail.

For a complete list of restrictions to all post office destinations, see the most recent Postal Bulletin pull-out section at the post office.

For a list of restrictions specific to 96555, go to: https://postcalc.usps.com/MilitaryRestrictions and enter zip code 96555. For more information on mailing restrictions to Kwajalein, keep reading.

Other than for the Priority Mail Express Military Service and the exceptions listed below, a customs declaration PS Form 2976 or PS Form 2976-A is required for all items weighing 16 ounces or more, and for all items (regardless of weight) containing potentially dutiable mail contents (e.g., merchandise or goods) addressed to or from the 96555 zip code.

Other than the exceptions listed below, all PMEMS mailpieces—regardless of mail contents or weight—addressed to or from this ZIP Code must bear a properly completed PS Form 2976-B. The surface area of the address side of the mailpiece must be large enough to contain the applicable customs declaration. The following exceptions apply to known mailers, who for this purpose are defined as follows:

- Business mailers who enter volume mailings through business mail entry units or other bulk mail acceptance locations, pay postage through advance deposit accounts, use permit imprints for postage payment, and submit completed postage statements at the time of entry that certify that the mailpieces contain no dangerous materials prohibited by postal regulations. Such business mailers are exempt from providing customs documentation on non-dutiable letters and printed matter.
- All federal, state, and local government agencies whose mailings are regarded as "Official Mail." Such agencies are exempt from providing customs documentation, except for any items addressed to a post office to which this restriction applies.
- Firearms of any type are prohibited, except firearms mailed to or by official U.S. government agencies. This restriction does not apply to firearms mailed from this zip code, provided ATF and USPS regulations are met. Antique firearms do not require an ATF form.
- Replica weapons and inert explosive devices such as grenades and weapons parts are prohibited.
- Fruits, vegetables, live animals, and live plants are prohibited.
- All alcoholic beverages, including those mailable under Publication 52, Part 421 are prohibited.
- Synthetic cannabinoids used to stimulate the central nervous system commonly known as "synthetic marijuana," "K2," or "Spice" are prohibited.
- Priority Mail Express Military Service is not available.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

On Saturday, unsettled weather with a modest bump in shower activity may be expected, but conditions will gradually transition to drier, quieter weather over the weekend.

The remnants of a shearline lingering across northern Micronesia will bring amplified low-level convergence to the region, causing this increase in showery weather.

Northeasterly to east-northeasterly sustained winds in the upper teens to low twenties will also persist throughout Saturday, and conditions in the lagoon may become hazardous for small craft if winds remain in the low twenties for several hours.

However, shower activity will begin to subside and wind speeds will decrease by Sunday afternoon as the shearline weakens and its influence on the weather pattern diminishes.

Relatively dry weather with winds in the low to middle teens will most likely take over and persist through Monday.

For the ocean forecast,

a powerful extratropical cyclone to the distant north is sending a strong northerly swell towards the Marshall Islands, which will elevate wave heights to the low to middle teens in feet.

As a result, a High Surf Advisory for Kwajalein and Roi-Namur, particularly for north-facing shores, will remain in effect through Saturday.

However, wave heights are expected to gradually decrease on Saturday then continue to drop over the weekend, and they are expected to remain well below advisory levels throughout next week.

Partly sunny and breezy with isolated showers. Winds NE-ENE at 15-20 knots with clear-air gusts in the low 20s and even higher gusts possible near any showers.

Shower activity will also increase to widely scattered or scattered and will likely peak around Wednesday or Thursday, hopefully delivering more much-needed rain to the southern part of the atoll.

Then, the end of next week will see a return to relatively drier weather as northeasterly trade winds take over the weather pattern once more.
