ENRĀ BWE JEN LALE RĀRĀ ATOLL AT EBEYE KAMOLOL DAY CELEBRATION

“Enrā bwe jen lale rārā,” or “sharing is caring” was the theme for Ebeye’s Kamolol Day celebration, held at the Bolkeim Community Center on Feb. 9.

Per tradition, the Kamolol Day festivities brought together distinguished visitors, students, performing artists and diplomatic personnel from allied nations in the Indo-Pacific region.

The event began with a procession

from the Ebeye pier to the celebration grounds at the Bolkeim Community Center. A detail of RMI national and local law enforcement personnel led the way, followed by the Kwajalein High School marching band and attending dignitaries, to include Republic of the Marshall Islands President Dr. Hilda Heine and the first gentleman; Col. Drew Morgan and Stacey Morgan; a delegation from United States Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll; RMI senators; and members of the international diplomatic corps.

Dignitaries received wuts and flower garlands in a traditional showing of Marshallese welcome. Together, they stood for the playing of the RMI Nation-

al Anthem by the KHS Marching Band and a choral rendition performed by the Kwajalein United Church of Christ choir.

The ceremony included a special musical performance by the Mon LaMike Band, a dance performance by and heartfelt remarks, as leaders addressed those gathered to share observations about family, history and peace.

Irojilaplap Shares Family History

After an invocation delivered by Rev. Larson Matauto, Irojilaplap Mike Kabua took the podium to share welcome remarks and Kabua family history. He remarked on the celebration of Kamolol

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Day, or Thankfulness Day. The cultural observance was also previously called Remembrance Day, Kwajalein Day and Liberation Day. Its name reflects the resilience of the atoll community and its rich history and culture.

Kabua was born following the war in 1945, he said. His uncles and other relatives who were present on the atoll during the war experienced hardships. Looking to the future, Kabua said he hoped people would be thankful for peace and that the U.S. and Japan, represented at the ceremony along with Taiwan and Australia, were no longer at war.

“We should be happy that we are helping each other today,” Kabua said.

The senator thanked all for attending. He made special recognition of IroiJlplap Christopher Loeak, in whose stead he delivered remarks as Loeak attended to a family emergency; the newly elected RMI President, Dr. Hilda Heine; the president’s cabinet and speaker; RMI senators; attending members of the international diplomatic corps; and the USAG-KA representatives.

Due to a significant increase in Ebeye’s population, Kabua said he had determined to close the community’s graveyards. He recommended three islets near the atoll which he had opened for burials. Space was limited, he said, but he trusted that if everyone worked together, solutions could be found.

He thanked God for the Marshallese culture, which emphasizes respect for mothers, parents and traditions. He added that these cultural values should continue to be taught to Marshallese children so that they know and embrace them.

Before he ended his remarks, Kabua specially thanked the KHS Marching

Band for their participation.

Ebeye District Judge Davidson Jajo followed with the swearing in of the new Kwajalein Atoll Local Government councilmen and returning Mayor Hirata Kabua and his council. Five of this year’s councilmembers are new to KALGOV.

RMI President Speaks

RMI President Dr. Hilda Heine commented that the RMI national government is ready to help in any way possible with respect to any assistance that Kwajalein may need. There could be assistance from other partner nations as well, she said.

Heine said she was thankful for the

80th commemoration of WWII.

She recognized all in attendance and asked them to observe a minute of silent prayer for those who faced the hardships of WWII and especially for the casualties of war.

Heine congratulated KALGOV Mayor Hirata Kabua and new KALGOV councilmembers on recent public works projects, such as the ongoing paving of roads, housing projects and electrical work for Santo, also called Third Island.

She thanked the local leaders for the invitation to join the commemoration and concluded by saying that the national government owes a response to a question posed by IroiJlplap Mike Kabua regarding a plebiscite.

A New Mayor Returns

Reelected KALGOV Mayor Hirata Kabua acknowledged the presence of the Council of Iroij; his uncle, Iroijlaplap Mike Kabua; and the numerous community members and distinguished visitors in attendance. He shared a personal anecdote about his father, who would always say, "God is first."

The day was bittersweet for Kabua. As he took part in the festivities, he also mourned the recent passing of his oldest brother, Paul, a soft spoken, kind musical composer and a councilman, and another family member, Jackie.

He said he was privileged to honor the memory of his beloved relatives as the community commemorated the 80th anniversary of the atoll's liberation and remembered its casualties of war.

"They won't experience hardship or sorrow anymore because all of them are at peace, to the end," Kabua said.

Kabua said any families needing transportation to the new islet burial sites opened by the iroijlaplap would be permitted to use

KWAJ SUPPORTS HEALTH AND COMMUNITY WITH DONATION TO EBEGE SCHOOL

TEAM KWAJ recently donated a new autoclave sterilizing machine to the Ebeye Elementary School on Ebeye with several students on hand to witness the donation.

Speaking to the students of the Ebeye Elementary School, U.S. Army Master Sgt. John Phillips, team lead, 9th Mission Support Command, Oceanic Engagement Team to the RMI, U.S. Embassy-Majuro said, "This machine sterilizes surgical equipment for veterinarians when they come to Ebeye to look after your dogs and cats. This will help to keep you and your families healthy too because we are trying to prevent diseases spreading from animals to humans."

"The arrival on Ebeye of this autoclave is a significant milestone," said guest speaker

Maj. Dae Choi, host nation director, U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll. This has been an "ongoing collaboration of Irojilaplap Mike Kabua, the NGO RMI Loves Animals, the RMI Ministry of Natural Resources and Commerce, KALGOV, USAGKA, the U.S. Embassy-Majuro and many of our partners who work to maintain a healthy pet population on Kwajalein Atoll to ensure we have healthy families and communities."

Choi also thanked colleagues at USINDOPACOM, U.S. Army Pacific, the U.S. Navy's Pacific Fleet and the crew of the Navy's hospital ship Mercy, the Air Force and the Defense Logistics Agency who all played a role in getting this autoclave here from North Carolina to Ebeye.

"We look forward to having our voluntary veterinarian team back to Kwajalein

so we can have this autoclave turned on and continue supporting the zoonotic disease prevention mission."

KWAJALEIN RECLAIMED WATER STANDARD VIOLATION

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

The Reclaimed Water System Document of Environmental Protection requires public notification when reclaimed water standards are violated.

On Feb. 14 – 15, the Kwajalein Wastewater Treatment Plant observed elevated levels of petroleum oil entering the system. As a result, the reclaimed water generated had higher than normal turbidity levels.

Turbidity is the cloudiness or haziness of a liquid caused by individual particles that are generally invisible to the naked eye.

On Feb. 19, the 7-day rolling turbidity average at the point

of entry into the reclaimed water system and the distribution system measured above the 2.0 Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTUs) standard. The turbidity of the reclaimed water is expected to slowly decrease to normal levels over the next two to three weeks while the reclaimed water system recovers. No health-based restrictions on the normal use, such as irrigation, vehicle washing, etc., of reclaimed or non-potable water are necessary. A petroleum-based odor has been observed in the distribution system that is expected to dissipate with newly generated reclaimed water. There is no threat to public health or the environment because of this turbidity exceedance and the

petroleum-based odor observed. If you have any questions, please contact the V2X Environmental Department at 480-0722.

ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE HISTORY

Today is an important date in the history of the Joint Functional Component Command-Integrated Missile Defense.

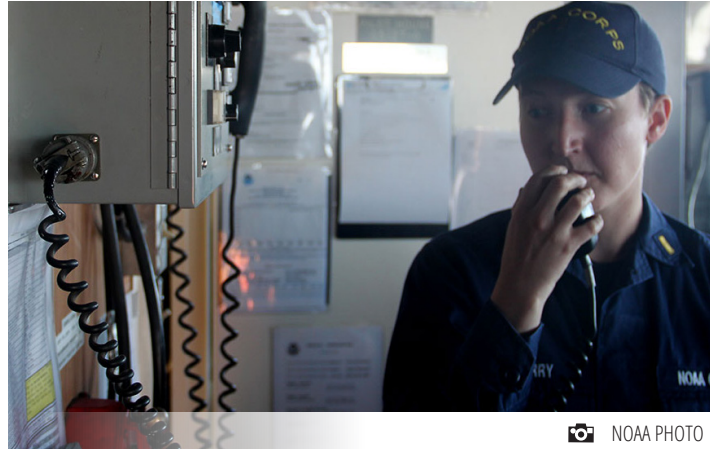
On this date in 2006, Lt. Gen. Larry J. Dodgen, the U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command and commander, Joint Functional Component Command-Integrated Missile Defense; and U.S. Marine Corps Gen. James E. Cartwright, commander, oversaw the ribbon cutting for the new JFCC-IMD Operations Center located at Schriever Air Force Base, Colorado.

At that time, the JFCC-IMD [was] responsible for meeting the USSTRATCOM's Unified Command Plan responsibilities for planning, integrating, and coordinating global missile defense operations and support. JFCC-IMD conducts the day-to-day operations of assigned forces and coordinates activities with associated combatant commands, other USSTRATCOM Joint Functional Components and the efforts of the Missile Defense Agency." With the implementation of the 2022 Unified Command Plan, the JFCC-IMD was recently realigned under the U.S. Space Command.

WHAT IS SEASPEAK?

Seaspeak is the official language of navigators around the world.

Have you ever wondered how crews on ships at sea communicate? Nowadays, crews consist of men and women from all over the world, and often, a single ship's crew comes from a number of different countries. But that was not always the case.

Back in the 1960s, the United States and the United Kingdom dominated ocean traffic, and 80 percent of ships' crews were native English speakers.

By the end of 1970s, however, the situation had reversed, and today, 80 percent of ship's crews do not speak English as a first language.

So what happens when a ship captain needs to communicate with his or her crew, to another ship, or to shore? Whether on the high seas or at port, misunderstood communication can lead to serious and even dangerous situations.

To avoid such confusion, in

1983 a group of linguists and shipping experts created a new system of communication called Seaspeak. English was chosen as the principle lexicon for Seaspeak because it was the most common language spoken on ships at that time, and, importantly, it was also the language of civil aviation. In 1988, the International Maritime Organization made Seaspeak the official language of the seas.

Seaspeak defines the rules of how to talk on a ship's radio. The number of words is limited to ensure that messages and conversations are short and clear. Eight words, called message markers, precede each sentence. These words are Advice, Answer, Information, Instruction, Intention, Question, Request, and Warning.

An important rule of Seaspeak is that numbers made up of two or more digits are spoken in single digits. For example, the number 33 is spoken as "three three" and the time 9:33 a.m. is spoken as "zero nine three three." Coordinated Universal Time—the primary time standard or international time scale by which the world regulates clocks and time—is always used at sea.

The Defense Department participated in a meeting of the Combined Space Operations Initiative Principals Board, known as CSpO, in Berlin.

The annual event, held this week, brought together DOD political and military space leadership from the U.S., Australia, Canada, France, Germany, New Zealand, the United Kingdom, and also welcomed three new members of CSpO: Italy, Japan and Norway.

The 10 members of CSpO discussed opportunities to further advance both operational cooperation and information sharing for the space domain.

Established in 2014, the initiative is a multinational partnership. Its stated mission is to generate and improve cooperation, coordination and interoperability to sustain

freedom of action in space, optimize resources, enhance mission assurance and resilience, and deter conflict. Defense leaders discussed the emerging security challenges and explored ways to cooperate to prevent conflict in space.

The nations' representatives emphasized the need to continue to promote a rules-based international order and responsible behavior in space, while collaboratively addressing challenges to

the safety and security of space-related operations.

Participants from the U.S. included John Plumb, assistant secretary of defense for space policy; Space Force Gen. Chance Saltzman, chief of space operations; and Army Gen. James Dickinson, commander of U.S. Space Command.

"Cooperation with our allies and partners is essential to promoting responsible space operations and protecting our interests in the do-

main. Expanding this cooperation in the space domain is one of my top priorities, and I was extremely proud to have Italy, Japan and Norway participate at the principals' board for the first time. Through CSpO, we will collectively work to reinforce the safety, security, stability and long-term sustainability of space," Plumb said.

"The CSpO Initiative is an important forum for improving coordination and integration while striving toward combined space operations. We appreciate the opportunity to meet with our allies and find avenues to optimize resources and build resilience," Dickinson said.

"The U.S. Space Force is committed to deterring conflict and reinforcing the security of the space domain," said Saltzman. "Our partnerships are strengthened through CSpO, and this coalition of like-minded nations enhances our ability to address the complex challenges we collectively face."

We have a moral responsibility to ensure delivery of space capabilities to the Joint Force, the Nation, and our Allies and to achieve space superiority in order to protect and defend our assets. Inherent in this is our responsibility to protect the Joint Force from space-enabled attack.

SHORELINE PROTECTION.

USAG-KA-leased islands at Kwajalein Atoll have several miles of shoreline that are protected naturally or with man made structures. Shoreline areas provide habitats (birds, crabs, turtle nesting), recreation for residents, and protection from waves. Threats to the shoreline areas include run off from on island activities, offshore spills, and erosion from wave action. Vegetation along the shoreline provides soil stability, habitat areas, and prevents runoff.

What can you do?

- Scoop the poop! Pet waste can contribute bacteria and excess nutrients to surface waters.
- Any activities with the potential to impact areas within 50 ft. of the shoreline (demolition, construction, vegetation removal, etc.) require review and approval.



UXO SAFETY REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

- **Remember the three R's of UXO:**
- **Recognize** an item as possible unexploded ordnance;
- **Retreat** from the area of the UXO;
- **Report** suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks
- Size of the UXO as

compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

WEATHER DISCUSSION

Dry and mostly sunny skies will bring the central RMI into the end of the workweek with some thin high cirrus clouds from areas of showers and deep convection to the south of the Marshall Islands.

The weekend looks to be mostly quite pleasant with lingering effects from a shear line, that originated as a cold front associated with a mid-latitude storm, keeping off-and-on stray showers over Kwajalein for both Sunday and Monday.

These elevated shower chances will also be assisted by slightly higher moisture at about the 10,000-foot level along with small perturbations in the trade wind flow.

Expect Monday to have the greatest chance of showers when they could increase from stray to iso-

lated showers at times. We are also anticipating a decrease in the trade winds into the middle to low teens, as the pressure gradient that has kept our wind mostly in the upper teens relaxes due to a weakening of the subtropical ridge to the northeast of the Marshall Islands.

Looking beyond the weekend, expect the relaxed pressure gradient to continue into the first part of the workweek, keeping our wind mostly in low teens out of the northeast.

Shower chances are anticipated to remain low due to the absents of any real forcing mechanism to induce the surface convergence necessary of any significant shower activity.

The sea state is currently decreasing and is expected to be between about 4-6 feet for the weekend on the open ocean and 1-3 feet in the southern part of the lagoon.

SATURDAY

Partly sunny with possible stray showers. Winds NE-ENE at 14-19 knots with higher clear-air gusts and near any showers.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with stray showers. Winds NE-ENE at 12-17 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Partly sunny to mostly cloudy at times with stray, increasing to isolated showers at times.

Winds NE-ENE at 12-17 knots with higher gusts near any showers.

NEXT WEEK

The workweek will start with our normal February trade wind inversion pleasant weather conditions and partly sunny skies along with winds mostly in the low teens out of the northeast. Shower chance will only be stray in nature.
