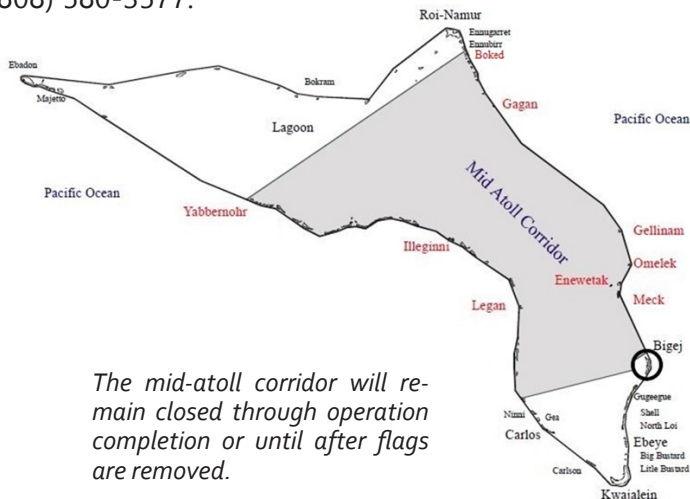

THE JAPANESE AND AMERICAN POOLS

COMMUNITY CONNECTION

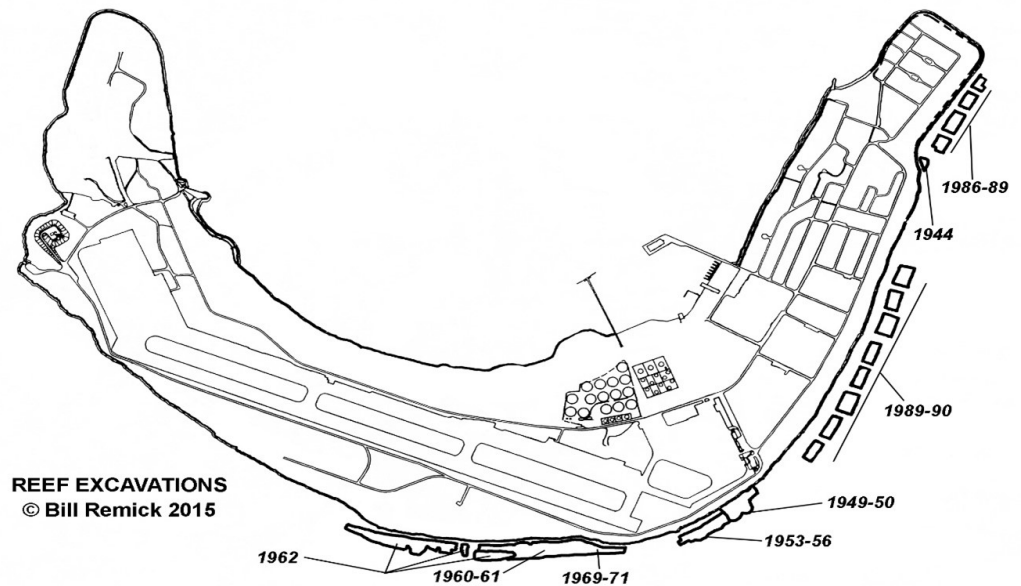

Over the years, island residents have asked me about the location of Kwajalein's Japanese and American pools.

I corresponded with Kwaj historian Bill Remick on this topic. He had done an analysis of the aerials from pre-invasion to around 1994. We had both been told that the pools by the terminal and the golf course were "Japanese". Bill said that the only pools that he saw on the aerial's pre-invasion were on the lagoon side north of Echo Pier. These are now gone.

So, the short answer is there are no "Japanese" pools anymore. The oldest existing "American" pool is known as the bomb crater up behind homes (shows as 1944 on the map (right)). This pool shows up on the June 21, 1945, aerial but not in the previous known aerial photos available.

Some of Kwajalein's oceanside tide pools are visible on the far right in this undated aerial photograph of the island.



ARMY MISSILE DEFENSE HISTORY

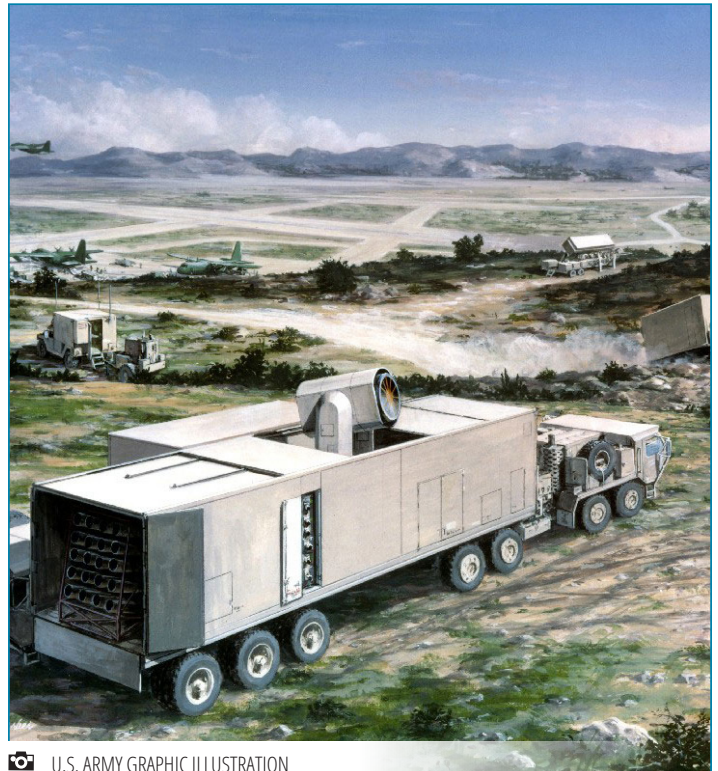

Twenty one years ago on March 7, 2003, Claude M. Bolton, Jr. the assistant secretary of the Army for Acquisition, Logistics and Technology and the Army acquisition executive, approved the Transition Plan for the Mobile Tactical High Energy Laser Weapon System Program.

The MTHEL traced its history to the Tactical High Energy Laser, an Advanced Concept Technology Demonstration program begun in 1996. The MTHEL itself was a collaborative effort between the U.S. Army—the Space and Missile Defense Command—and the Israeli Ministry of Defense.

The program was designed to address three goals: to meet common U.S. and Israeli operational requirements; to provide operational capability to address U.S. Army transformation objectives; and, to help with Israeli security requirements by providing a defense against short-range missiles, rockets and other air defense threats.

Having demonstrated its capabilities against Katyusha rockets and artillery projectiles, the MTHEL transferred from the USASMDC to the program Executive Office Air and Missile Defense, now PEO Missiles and Space, in a ceremony conducted on February 28.

UXO SAFETY REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO: **Recognize** an item as possible unexploded ordnance; **Retreat** from the area

of the UXO; and **Report** suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

- Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates

and any prominent landmarks

- Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

ARMY ASTRONAUT EXPERIENCES ENDLESS OPPORTUNITIES, CHALLENGES DURING RECORD-BREAKING CAREER

He had practiced it many times before, but this day in 2022 was different for Army astronaut Col. Frank Rubio as he walked to the launch pad at the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Kazakhstan.

This time he was going to space.

“You realize this [spacecraft] has 300 tons of rocket fuel, and I’m about to get on it,” he said with a laugh. The good thing, he said, was they didn’t give him or his two colleagues, cosmonauts Sergey Prokopyev and Dmitri Petelin, much time to think.

Before he knew it, he was strapped in. A calm came over him as he waited for the final countdown. All the prepara-

tion and training led to this moment. Then, liftoff!

The rocket thrust into the air at breakneck speeds as the G-force hit the crew in seconds. And then within minutes, they were in space.

“It’s a pretty incredible ride to go from zero to 15,000 mph and soon after that you’re at 17,000 mph,” Rubio said. “It’s easy to say those numbers but until you’re doing it, it’s really hard to comprehend how incredible that is.”

As amazing as the journey to space was, Rubio’s path through life has been equally as remarkable thanks to his desire to continuously improve.

“I don’t ever want to be stagnant,” he said. “I want to continue to grow and contribute. I think those things are what drive me to keep challenging myself.”

Rubio was born in Los Angeles to a teenage, single mother who had difficulties raising him. She initially sent him to live with his grandmother in El Salvador until a civil war broke out in the country. He returned to America five years later to live

with his mother in Miami.

“Together, we made things work,” he said. “Ultimately, it was still a challenge for her. She probably wasn’t fully ready, but she did an amazing job of setting a positive example and showing me what hard work could do, and it turned out well.”

As a kid, he enjoyed taking care of injured animals and helping people. He used that passion and the work ethic he learned from his mother to help him chase his dream of becoming a doctor.

That led him to the United States Military Academy for pre-medical school. While he was there, he took advantage of everything the school had to offer. He joined the cycling team, got scuba qualified and even joined the parachute team.

“I tried to do as much as I could because the opportunity was there,” he said. “If you’re lucky enough to be selected for a team, you just have to go all in and make the most of the opportunity.”

Near the end of his time at West Point, he got slightly burned out on the rigorous amounts of studying and the thought of four more years of school became unappeal-

ing. He decided to gain some practical leadership experience and become a helicopter pilot.

He served as the platoon leader for Alpha Company, 2nd Battalion, 82nd Aviation Regiment flying the UH-60 Black Hawk for more than 600 combat flight hours during deployments to Bosnia, Afghanistan and Iraq. He quickly fell in love with aviation and the Soldiers he served with, he said.

"[The Army] just pushes you to do things that are such a challenge, and you grow so much because of that," he explained. "I absolutely would not change that for anything because it made me who I became after."

He then went on to be the company commander of Alpha Company, 2nd Battalion, 3rd Aviation Regiment where he deployed to Iraq for a year. The responsibility of being in charge during combat operations was a heavy weight to bear, Rubio said.

"That was really impactful in my life because you almost forget about the risk to you because you're so incredibly invested in the lives of those you're entrusted to lead," he said. "But learning in that opportunity, I think shaped the rest of my career and helped me to be a much better leader later on."

Those early years in the service also taught him how to deal with failure, learn from it and grow, he said.

After serving in the aviation community for several years, the calling to continue his dream of practicing medicine returned.

He resumed his studies and earned a doctorate from the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in 2010. He then served as a clinic supervisor, executive medicine provider and flight surgeon at Redstone Arsenal's Fox Army Health Center in Alabama, where he took care of retirees, Soldiers and their Families.

Following that stop, he be-

came a surgeon for the 3rd Battalion of the 10th Special Forces Group. He used his training and previous combat experience to provide care for his patients.

"It made me a much more sympathetic and empathetic doctor," he said. "It just feels a little bit different when someone comes into your clinic and talks to you about things you've already lived and you're able to be a lot more compassionate. Because of that, I think I was a much better doctor."

Never one to let himself get too comfortable, Rubio acted on his love of adventure and applied to NASA after talking about it with a friend. The ability to explore science and technology while working on a mission for the benefit of mankind was too good an opportunity to pass up.

NASA selected him for the 2017 astronaut candidate class.

He spent the next several years training. It was a five-part process. He learned about the International Space Station and what it takes to maintain it, how to use the robotic arm on the station for spacewalks, how to move in the 300-pound spacesuit during a spacewalk, how to speak Russian and how to fly the T-38 Talon.

The biggest challenge for Rubio, believe it or not, was learning to fly the jet.

He wasn't used to the speed he needed to make decisions coming from a helicopter background.

It took a few months of hitting the flight simulator and putting in the work, but he eventually got the hang of it.

"It was very humbling as a senior pilot to come in and not be good at piloting things," he explained. "Now, it's one of my favorite things."

The countless hours of training paid off when he and his crew launched to the station on Sept. 21, 2022, and were transferred to Expedition 68. They were joined by NASA astronauts Nicole Mann and Josh Cassada as well as Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency astronaut Koichi Wakata and cosmonaut Anna Kikina. On board, the crew studied cardiovascular health in space, explored 3D tissue printing and worked on several other projects as they developed a daily routine.

The days started to pass by as Rubio and the crew stayed focused on the mission.

"Every day you are touching world-class science that universities have worked years to get to the ISS," he said. "You feel a little sense of responsibility to get it right for the team."

The initial six-month trip was pushed into a yearlong stay following a space debris strike that caused the return capsule to lose all its coolant. Rubio, Prokopyev and Petelin stayed aboard the ISS for Expedition 69 and were joined this time by NASA astronauts Stephen Bowen and Warren Hoburg as well as United Arab Emirates astronaut Sultan Alneyadi and cosmonaut Andrey Fedyaev.

During his time in space, Rubio supported numerous research projects including particle vibration experiments and biological testing while also performing three spacewalks outside the station.

Then, after spending more than a year in space and logging more than 157 million miles, the three men finally returned to Earth Sept. 27, 2023. Rubio became the new record holder for the longest spaceflight for an American astronaut, something he said was not an individual achievement.

"I absolutely would not be here without the support of other people," he explained. "Both my family and the Soldiers around me, peers, all those things make us who we are. I think it's important to acknowledge all these accolades are really because a whole lot of people helped me and allowed me to get where I am."

NOAA PROPOSES NATIONAL MARINE SANCTUARY IN PAPAĤANAUMOKUĀKEA

Public comment on Sanctuary draft proposal requested through May 7, 2024.

Following input from state and federal agencies, local communities and the public, NOAA released for public comment its draft proposal to designate marine portions of Hawaii's Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument as a national marine sanctuary. The proposed Papahānaumokuākea National Marine Sanctuary would supplement and complement existing authorities, including the area's designation as a marine national monument.

Sanctuary designation would provide clarity and comprehensive protections for Papahānaumokuākea's ecosystems, wildlife and

cultural and maritime heritage resources. NOAA and the State of Hawaii would co-manage the proposed sanctuary, complementing the existing management structure for the monument. The monument is currently jointly administered by four Co-Trustees — the Department of Commerce, the Department of the Interior, the State of Hawaii and the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.

"This proposed designation furthers the Biden-Harris Administration's steadfast commitment to conserving and protecting vital marine ecosystems," said NOAA Administrator Rick Spinrad, Ph.D. "NOAA looks forward to continuing our work with partners and co-managers to strengthen the conservation of Papahānaumokuākea's natural, cultural and historic treasures."

Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument, in the Northwestern Hawaiian

Islands, is the largest contiguous, fully protected conservation area (582,578 square miles) under the U.S. flag, and one of the largest marine conservation areas in the world. Home to the endangered Hawaiian monk seal, threatened green sea turtles and many species found nowhere else on Earth, the complex and highly productive marine ecosystems of the monument are significant contributors to the biological diversity of the ocean.

Papahānaumokuākea is of great importance to Native Hawaiians, and Hawaiian culture is a foundational element in the management of Papahānaumokuākea. The monument is also home to a variety of post-Western-contact historic resources, such as 19th-century commercial whaling shipwrecks and artifacts and those associated with World War II's Battle of Midway.

"NOAA has worked for

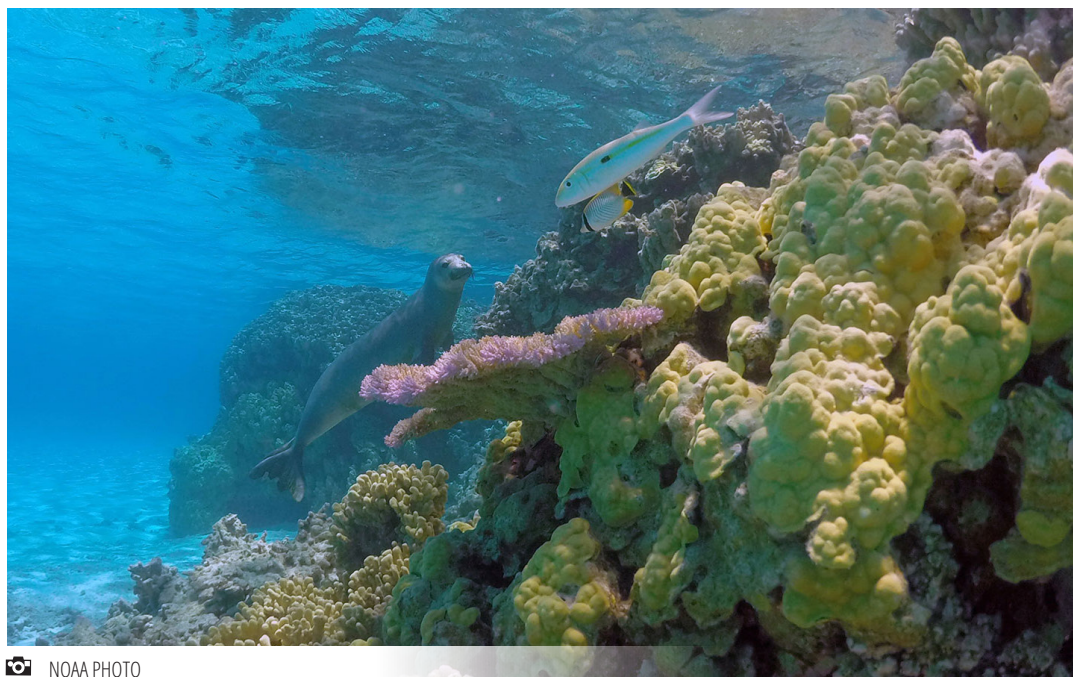
decades with partners to incorporate Native Hawaiian heritage, knowledge and values into co-management of Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument," said NOAA's National Ocean Service Assistant Administrator Nicole LeBoeuf. "A sanctuary designation would continue to honor spiritual and cultural relationships with this special place."

A detailed description of the proposed sanctuary, as well as additional information about opportunities to provide public comment, can be found on the website for the proposed Papahānaumokuākea National Marine Sanctuary. The public can submit comments until May 7, 2024, through the Federal eRulemaking Portal. The docket number is NOAA-NOS-2021-0114 and comments will be accepted in both English and 'ōlelo Hawai'i (Hawaiian language).

In addition, NOAA will host in-person and virtual public comment meetings during which members of the public can offer oral comments. Detailed information on the dates, times and locations for public meetings is available at: <https://sanctuaries.noaa.gov/papahanaumokuakea/>.

NOAA follows a well-established designation process for national marine sanctuary proposals. After NOAA receives written and oral public comments, it will address and respond to those comments as it determines if final designation of the proposed sanctuary is warranted and which NOAA program and management actions are necessary. NOAA has a goal of a final action on designation in winter of 2024/2025.

E-WARENESS

SHORELINE PROTECTION.

USAG-KA-leased islands at Kwajalein Atoll have several miles of shoreline that are protected naturally or with man made structures. Shoreline areas provide habitats (birds, crabs, turtle nesting), recreation for residents, and protection from waves. Threats to the shoreline areas include run off from on island activities, offshore spills, and erosion from wave action. Vegetation along the shoreline provides soil stability, habitat areas, and prevents runoff.

What can you do?

- Scoop the poop! Pet waste can contribute bacteria and excess nutrients to surface waters.
- Any activities with the potential to impact areas within 50 ft. of the shoreline (demolition, construction, vegetation removal, etc.) require review and approval.

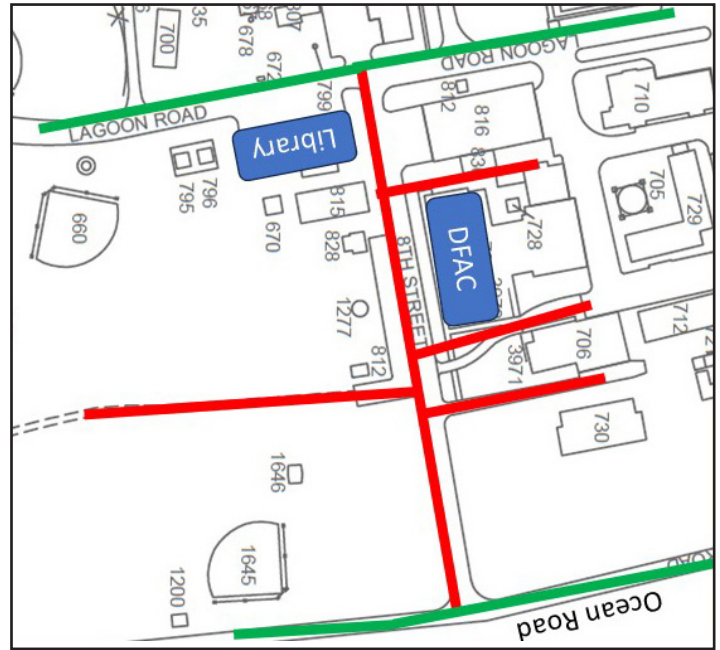

KWAJALEIN RECLAIMED WATER STANDARD VIOLATION

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

The Reclaimed Water System Document of Environmental Protection requires public notification when reclaimed water standards are violated.

On Feb. 14 – 15, the Kwajalein Wastewater Treatment Plant observed elevated levels of petroleum oil entering the system. As a result, the reclaimed water generated had higher than normal turbidity levels.

Turbidity is the cloudiness or haziness of a liquid caused by individual particles that are generally invisible to the naked eye.

On Feb. 19, the 7-day rolling turbidity average at the point

of entry into the reclaimed water system and the distribution system measured above the 2.0 Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTUs) standard. The turbidity of the reclaimed water is expected to slowly decrease to normal levels over the next two to three weeks while the reclaimed water system recovers. No health-based restrictions on the normal use, such as irrigation, vehicle washing, etc., of reclaimed or non-potable water are necessary. A petroleum-based odor has been observed in the distribution system that is expected to dissipate with newly generated reclaimed water. There is no threat to public health or the environment because of this turbidity exceedance and the

petroleum-based odor observed. If you have any questions, please contact the V2X Environmental Department at 480-0722.

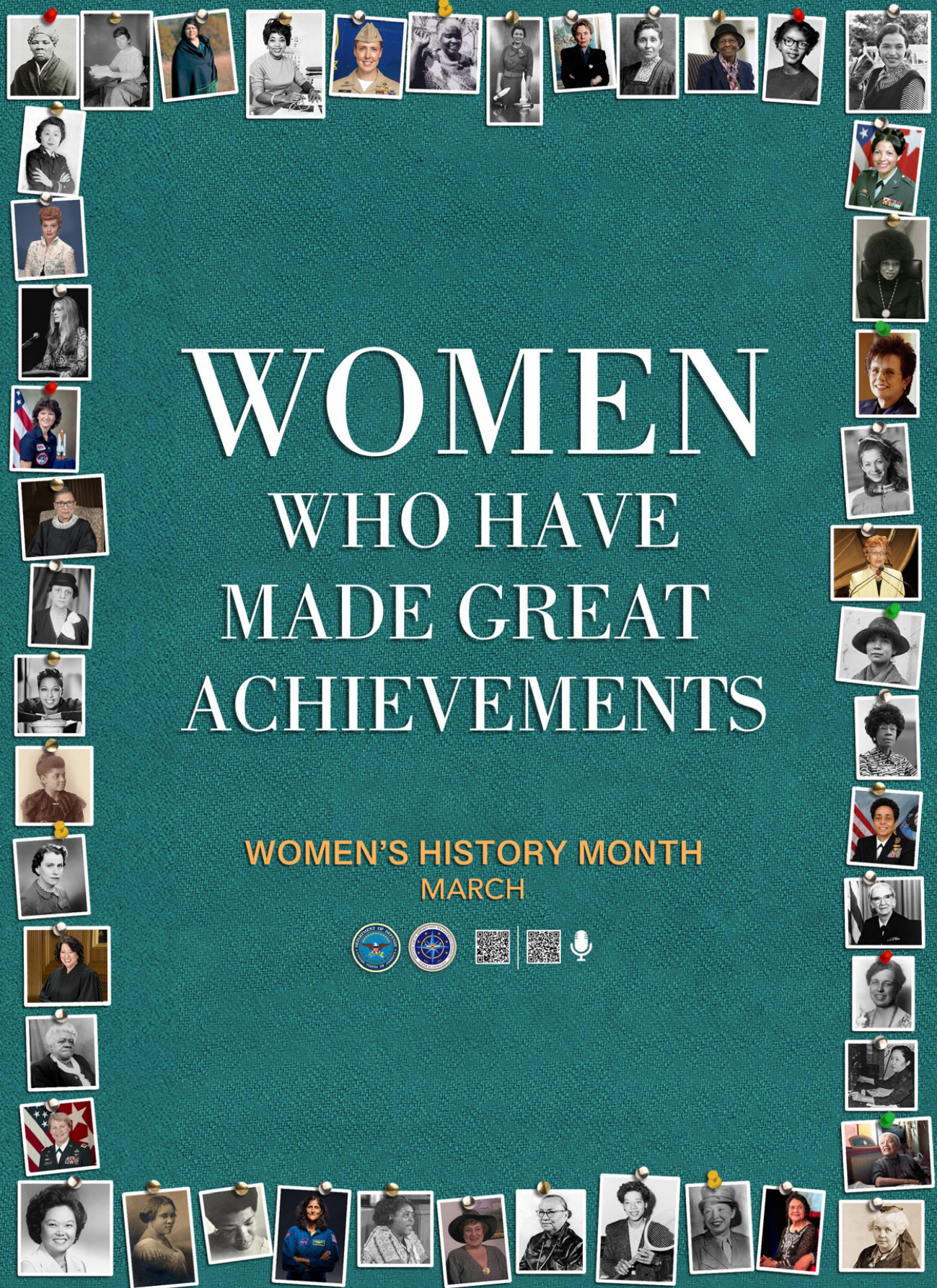

WEATHER DISCUSSION

Kwajalein Atoll is experiencing peak windy season conditions, driven by strong, persistent high-pressure ridging over the central North Pacific. A broad area of strong trade winds stretching just southwest of the Hawaiian Islands is now pushing westward over the RMI, leading to sustained east-northeast winds at around 20 knots to the low 20s. Clear-air gusts in the mid- to upper 20s have become frequent, and strong gusts exceeding 30 knots will be likely at times near incoming showers.

These strong winds are contributing to rough sea conditions and higher incoming trade swells, and a Small Craft Advisory is in effect for B-Boat areas until further notice.

Additionally, a High Surf Advisory is in effect until 00:00L on March 14 at time of writing, due to expected nine to 13-foot seas coinciding with the arrival

of King tides. Daily peak tides will exceed 5 ft from 9 March to 12 March, contributing to a heightened shoreline inundation risk for north- and especially east-facing exposures.

Exercise caution and do not venture out onto exposed reefs or shorelines, especially 1 to 2 hours on either side of high tide times. Check the local weather channel (20.1) or <https://www.rts-wx.com> for updates on advisories and warnings.

Elevated trade wind conditions will continue through the weekend and into the middle of next week, with a slight lull in wind speeds expected for Monday.

Most shower activity will remain stray, weak, and fast-moving, suppressed by very dry and sinking air aloft. Occasional trade wind speed convergence and nocturnal instability will boost shower coverage from time to time, mainly during late overnight to pre-dawn hours.

By the end of next week, winds will relax into

the low to mid-teens, well below Small Craft Advisory conditions.

SATURDAY

Partly to mostly sunny with isolated showers early, decreasing to stray showers. Winds NE-E at 19-24 knots with frequent higher gusts, especially near any showers. Strong gusts exceeding 30 knots will be likely at times.

SUNDAY
