Brenda McCullough, director, Installation Management Command-Pacific, Fort Shafter, Hawaii, made her first visit to U.S. Army Garrison-Kwajalein Atoll March 4 – 8.

McCullough was accompanied on her site visit by Command Sgt. Maj. Jon Williams, IMCOM-P senior enlisted advisor.

McCullough toured US-AG-KA assets such as the fuel farm, power plant, fuel pier, dock security checkpoint, Surfway, Child and Youth Services, AAFES, the Emergency Operations Center, Marshallese Cultural Center and infrastructure on Roi-Namur which was inundated Jan. 20 by several large waves.

"It's a lot different when you see pictures on a computer screen than when you're on the ground seeing it in person with the teams who are doing the work," said McCullough.

"I am immensely impressed and amazed with the work the team up at Roi-Namur have done in their recovery efforts. The amount of work they've done in such a short amount of time is truly amazing. It really emphasizes what our IMCOM teams will do to get the job done—their resilience, their stick-to-itiveness, and doing what they've done with the resources they have. I thought it was important for me to see that and to thank the folks on the ground."

Col. Drew Morgan, US-AG-KA commander, said, "We appreciate senior leaders visiting Roi-Namur and Kwaj to build their situational understanding and first-hand appreciation for TEAM KWAJ... why it is important for our nation, and why we love calling this place 'home."

CURRY SPICES UP KWAJ AND ROI GROCERY, BAKERY OPERATIONS

HOURGLASS REPORT

In this week's Kwajalein Hourglass, filmmaker Anjowest Naisher and I interviewed Ernest Curry, Surfway manager for Kwajalein and Roi, and senior manager for the Sunrise Bakery.

Curry arrived on Kwajalein in November 2021. Since that time, he has worked to help improve grocery options at the Surfway stores on Kwajalein and Roi.

To help the Kwaj Surfway feel more like a "community store," residents are occasionally able to purchase fresh baked goods from the Sunrise Bakery, too. The community response during the holiday season was positive.

At the small Roi Surfway, also called the Third Island Store, residents of Roi and Enniburr are permitted to shop. On Kwajalein, a larger store, different rules and regulations apply for shopping access.

The biggest challenges of working with the grocery stores are getting merchandise on the shelves. Receiving replacement stock can sometimes be impacted by long supply chains and shipping schedules.

"The way I look at it, the stores support the Army's mission because they take care of people who work here [and] the government pays their salaries," Curry said. "We take care of everyone and meet their needs with food."


Curry said when he arrived on the atoll, no one knew him, and the Marshallese community welcomed him immediately as a member of the family. Whenever he needed help, someone was there to lend a hand.

"It was like asking a brother or sister. ...That is what

I try to do for anyone who comes to Kwaj. I tell them to embrace the Marshallese culture. [The Marshallese] have a wonderful history and are a wonderful people."

He described life on the atoll as a great opportunity to learn about a new culture. He encourages newcomers to jump right in and to learn all they can about our unique island home.

"Learn the background behind everything," he said.

ARMY MISSILE DEFENSE HISTORY

Fifty-five years ago on March 14, 1969, the Ballistic Missile Defense program reached a significant crossroads in its history. On this date, President Richard Nixon announced a new direction for the BMD program.


The Sentinel deployment concept, which focused upon providing a defense for urban areas and Minuteman sites, was replaced with the SAFE-GUARD concept.

Nixon specified three defense objectives, in his multiphased deployment plan: "Protection of our land-based retaliatory forces against a direct attack by the Soviet Union": "Defense of the

American people against the kind of nuclear attack which Communist China is likely to be able to mount within the decade"; and "Protection against the possibility of accidental attacks from any source."

President Nixon explained: "the gravest responsibility I bear as President of the United States is for the security of our nation. Our nuclear forces defend not only ourselves, but our allies as well.

The imperative that our nuclear deterrent remain secure beyond any possible doubt requires that the U.S. must take steps now to ensure that our strategic retaliatory forces will not become vulnerable to a Soviet attack."

WHAT IS CORAL SPAWNING?

Hard or stony corals reproduce by releasing their eggs and sperm all at the same time. This spawning cycle is one of nature's most spectacular events.

Once a year, on cues from the lunar cycle and the water temperature, entire colonies of coral reefs simultaneously release their tiny eggs and sperm, called gametes, into the ocean. The phenomenon brings to mind an underwater blizzard with billions of colorful flakes cascading in white, yellow, red, and or-

In ways that scientists still do not fully understand, mature corals release their gam-

etes all at the same time. This synchrony is crucial, because the gametes of most coral species are viable for only a few hours. The "blizzard" makes it more likely that fertilization will occur.

The gametes, full of fatty substances called lipids, rise slowly to the ocean surface, where the process of fertilization begins.

When a coral egg and sperm join together as an embryo, they develop into a coral larva, called a planula. Planulae float in the ocean, some for days and some for weeks, before dropping to the ocean floor. Then, depending on seafloor conditions, the planulae may attach to the substrate and grow into a new coral colony at the slow rate of about .4 inches a year.

Every August, seven to 10 days after the full moon, the reef-building corals of Flower Garden Banks National Marine Sanctuary put on a fantastic spawning display, one of the most abundant displays in the entire Caribbean. Most scientists agree that these mass spawning events are designed to allow genetic mixing and dispersal of offspring over large distances. Plus, the sheer volume of the events allow for the fertilization and survival of a significant number of larvae despite the best efforts of predators.

KWAJALEIN RECLAIMED WATER STANDARD VIOLATION

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

The Reclaimed Water System Document of Environmental Protection requires public notification when reclaimed water standards are vi-

On Feb. 14 – 15, the Kwajalein Wastewater Treatment Plant observed elevated levels of petroleum oil entering the system. As a result, the reclaimed water generated had higher than normal turbidity levels.

Turbidity is the cloudiness or haziness of a liquid caused by individual particles that are generally invisible to the naked eye.

On Feb. 19, the 7-day rolling turbidity average at the point

of entry into the reclaimed water system and the distribution system measured above the 2.0 Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTUs) standard. The turbidity of the reclaimed water is expected to slowly decrease to normal levels over the next two to three weeks while the reclaimed water system recovers. No health-based restrictions on the normal use, such as irrigation, vehicle washing, etc., of reclaimed or non-potable water are necessary. A petroleum-based odor has been observed in the distribution system that is expected to dissipate with newly generated reclaimed water. There is no threat to public health or the environment because of this turbidity exceedance and the

PCS & VACATION TIPS. Customers must notify the post office before leaving for 30 days or PCS'ing. Per DOD 4525.6-M, mail is only allowed to be held for 30 days with or without prior notice. Mail is considered unclaimed on day 31 and will be returned to the sender. Email the post office to authorize pick up for your mail and packages. When PCS'ing, provide a forwarding address. REGULATIONS

TOBACCO USE. USAG-KA Policy Memorandum 600-8 protects others from the negative impact of tobacco use. On USAG-KA, smoking is permitted in designated smoking areas only. Smoking and cigarette butt receptacles must be at least 50 feet from the entrance of facilities.

VEGETATION. Per USAG-KA Regulation 420-1, vegetation may not be planted in the ground without approved permits. Residents may be asked to remove items if planted without approval. Do not place sprouted coconuts in yards.

DON'T TAKE CULTURAL ARTIFACTS. It is illegal to remove cultural resources from the atoll. This includes any protected species, unexploded ordnance, WWII-era artifacts and ancient Marshallese artifacts. These resources are protected under U.S. federal and RMI law. Do not remove these pieces of atoll history from Kwajalein. Contact the Kwajalein Archaeology Office at 480-8867.



UXO SAFETY REMINDER

PUBLIC SAFETY ANNOUNCEMENT

Unexploded ordnance should be treated like dangerous sea creatures: Look, but do not touch.

You can play an important role in keeping Kwajalein safe by knowing what to do when you spot unexploded ordnance.

Remember the three R's of UXO: Recognize an item as possible unexploded ordnance; Retreat from the area

of the UXO; and **Report** suspected UXO immediately.

If you discover an object that could be UXO, notify Kwajalein Explosive Ordnance Disposal immediately by calling 480-1433. You can also call CPS at 480-4445. Provide the following information about what you found:

 Location. Note helpful details like the building number, GPS coordinates and any prominent landmarks

Size of the UXO as compared to common items like a football or scuba air cylinder

For a detailed refresher on UXO safety, attend the new island orientation or call Kwajalein EOD at 480-1433.



WEATHER DISCUSSION

Kwajalein Atoll continues to enjoy seasonally dry and breezy conditions, but trade winds are coming down from last week's levels.

A series of mid-latitude low-pressure areas transiting the north Pacific are helping to weaken the subtropical high-pressure ridge to the north of the RMI, leading to gentler trade winds and easing sea conditions.

Expect east-northeast winds in the low to upper teens on Saturday, falling to around 10 knots to the low teens this weekend and remaining in this range for much of next week.

This weakening the subtropical ridge will allow more rain-causing features, such as the This weakening of the subtropical ridge will allow more rain-causing features, such as the Intertropical Convergence Zone, to shift north into the area at times next week.

Although low-average rainfall is still expect-ed throughout the period, better chances for showers will arrive on Monday as a weak wave builds over the central and southern RMI.

Next week, light east-northeast trades will prevail with occasional periods of isolated showers, driven by weak low-level trade wind convergence in addition to usual nocturnal instability effects. Skies will remain mostly sunny, becoming mostly cloudy at times in the upper levels as thick cirrus debris spills over-head from strong convection far to the south.

In the low levels. expect mainly few-toscattered fair weather cumulus with increased cloudiness at times near any shower activity. By the end of next week, winds may begin a gradual climb back to the mid- to upper teens as the subtropical ridge restrengthens.

Combined seas on the open ocean will be 5-7 ft on Saturday and Sunday, decreasing to 4-6 ft on Mon-day through next week.
