USASMDC COMMANDING GENERAL VISITS USAG-KA

Lt. Gen. Sean Gainey, commanding general, U.S. Army Space and Missile Defense Command, Redstone Arsenal, Alabama, toured Kwajalein April 1 - 5 following taking over command in January. He was accompanied by his spouse, Vera Gainey as well as the senior enlisted advisor for USASMDC, Command Sgt. Maj. John Foley and Chief Warrant Officer 5 Mark Dohogn, the command's chief warrant officer.

While on Kwajalein, Lt. Gen. Gainey flew by Black Hawk helicopter to the islands of Omelek and Roi-Namur. On Roi, he toured the damage from the Jan. 20 wave inundation and was briefed on the recovery efforts ongoing. He toured the fuel pier, the helicopter hangar, several housing units, the Worthy, as well as Ebeye.

While on Kwajalein Gainey held a town hall at the Davye Davis Multi-Purpose Room at Kwajalein High School

From Lt. Gen. Gainey

"Having the command team (Command Sgt. Maj. John Foley and Chief Warrant Officer 5 Mark Dohogn) with me is not by accident. It is the way I do business. We are a team. We can travel together and show our support to wherever we go and serve as a feedback to me across the team is how I like to do business.

"What's very refreshing here about Team Kwaj and the One Team concept is essentially our vision at SMDC is shaped around the One Team concept, built on trust. It's not easy to gain trust. You've got to earn it. And with the command one of the things I'll highlight early is I will trust you. You have my trust immediately. And I ask for your trust in me immediately and I will earn that trust continuously over time.

"One of the things I really love about

Team Kwaj is you all have really two key components of team building: trust and the inner circle. Normally when you build a team you want to start with building an inner circle. I feel that inner circle is extended out to the fringes in this community just based off what I've seen.

"One Team concept means we are all a team in this. Every component is an important one and I'm going to invest my energy to every part to make sure everybody feels a part of that team."

Lt. Gen. Gainey said that his job is relatively easy because he provides that push to where things are stuck in the process to move forward to help create the long-term vision for Kwajalein.

"I can't think of a better place than here in Kwajalein. That's going to cause some change to be able to do that. Change is good, as long as it's embraced and as long as we can show you the path. It's about how do we move forward as a team to demonstrate that. Everything inside

of DoD circulates around what value you bring to the larger enterprise. I can think of no better value that's being provided here at Kwajalein with several critical mission sets at this location that are not provided anywhere else in the world and opportunities that exist by being here in INDO-PACOM.

"It is my job to help show that value across the larger DoD as we move forward. Kwajalein was already a hot topic but that (the wave inundation) pushed it more to the forefront with the other challenges that we know we have to work on here – that's where I really get to move the ball forward.

"What happens after I leave here? What do I do with the feedback? In April, after I do testimony to the House highlighting the great work being done here across the command in the entire integrated air missile defense organization, I get to have a one-on-one with the Chief of Staff of the Army - twoon-one because I'm bringing Col. Morgan with me. We will highlight how we want to move forward with Kwaialein and how we want to move forward differently.

My intent is to have that conversation about the command and control structure here to gain some efficiencies by changing it to better suit the organization. We will then take our long-term plan and maximize our ability to get after key projects (such as helicopters). If we get that support, then we'll be off and running. Change is not going to happen overnight but we are going to try to move as fast as we can and make it very transparent over that horizon what we're able to get done in the short term.

Responses to Questions

"I foresee personally no scenario where DoD can do without the Reagan Test Site and all the support that goes to it. The importance of

this joint test site – there are things you can't do anywhere else in the world that you can do here. The way our adversaries are constantly improving their capabilities and the way we have to ensure we're improving our capabilities, again, this is the place to do it.

Medevac/casualty evacuation from Roi ... it's not ideal. We'd like to know what is coming down the line. Housing issue on Roi if the Metro goes down, we don't really have a plan for our guys sleeping on Roi other than bumming a spot on a couch or the floor.

"We were very fortunate to

bridge a 30-day gap as part of the recovery for 25th ID to support. My last conversation with our senior leaders was that we are losing the helo support, and I'm concerned that we don't have enduring capability in place. That is the second topic in conjunction with the C₂ piece that I'll highlight. As of today, no direct action has happened yet. There is a course of action development but no direct action that I can tell you about right now. But that doesn't mean it's not going to happen. The Army is going to have to decide how we are going to move forward within the next month or so with

aviation support.

Col. Morgan added that for housing on Roi, there is a logistics support area with 50 beds to be mobilized this summer to help alleviate the pressure of limited quarters. Containerized housing units will provide Roi greater housing capacity.

"We have a plan to come here twice a year. I'm glad I got here so early in my command. I can seize on the opportunities. When I come back here hopefully we can provide some update on how we are going to move forward.

ROI-NAMUR DIVER SHARES STUNNING SHARK SHOTS

Photographers on Kwajalein Atoll have many opportunities to capture the atoll's underwater residents on camera—especially its sharks.

The Republic of the Marshall Islands was declared the world's largest Central Pacific shark sanctuary in 2011. Even so, it can be tough to capture a great shark shot.

For those considering diving certification, check out the beautiful photos above for inspiration. The shots were submitted to The Kwajalein Hourglass by Roi-Namur resident Travis Mattern. Mattern is as much a shark enthusiast as a he is a dive enthusiast. At Roi, he has captured many grey reef sharks and black and white tip reef sharks on camera.

"I love sharks," Mattern said. "I call them 'water puppies.' It's thrilling to encounter them, and I would go out with the intent of finding and filming or photographing them. So long as you respect the fact that you are in their home and learn to understand their method of 'communicating,' then you are pretty safe."

Mattern recommends that new divers pursue their sport safely and learn about the habits of these underwater creatures.

"I would highly recommend that if someone wishes to check out the sharks that they do it with people who have been diving for a while. And just remember to keep [to] your space. [Sharks] are curious animals, and they will want to know what you are so they can approach. Keep calm, don't splash, try and stay vertical and keep your eyes on them."

AUKUS PARTNERS CONSIDER COOPERATION WITH JAPAN

The U.S., Australia and the United Kingdom, members of the AUKUS partnership, are considering cooperation with Japan on advanced capabilities projects.

An aim of AUKUS is identifying the optimal pathway for Australia to acquire conventionally armed, nuclear-powered submarine capability, as well as cooperation on a range of other advanced defense technologies.

Japan is being considered because of its strengths and its close defense partnership with all three countries, said Deputy Pentagon Press Secretary Sabrina Singh, who held a press conference today.

Singh noted that this was announced in a joint statement by the three nation's defense leaders: Secretary of Defense Lloyd J. Austin III; Australian Deputy Prime Minister Richard Marles, who also serves as his country's defense minister; and British Defense Secretary Grant Shapps.

Other items of recent progress, Singh noted, was Australia's selection of ASC Pty Ltd.

and BAE Systems to build its submarines and its selection of ASC Pty Ltd. as Australia's submarine sustainment partner. Also, Australia now has dozens of sailors and civilians participating in maintenance and operations training in Guam; Pearl Harbor, Hawaii; Connecticut and elsewhere, she said.

Earlier this month, the U.S. Navy awarded the first contracts for submarine training simulators to Australia, she said.

AUKUS has also made

strong progress on multiple components of advanced technologies and capabilities, she said, noting that this month will be the launch of the AUKUS Advanced Capabilities Industry Forum, and last month was the inaugural AUKUS Pillar II Innovation Challenge on electronic warfare, "a collaborative initiative between respective innovation accelerator units."

In the trilateral statement, the three countries said they seek to maximize the strategic benefits of the AUKUS partnership to support security and stability in the Indo-Pacific region and beyond.

They went on to state Australia's acquisition of a conventionally armed, nuclear-powered submarine capability is a necessary response to the rapidly evolving strategic environment. Strengthening their trilateral defense capabilities and their industrial capacity will enable AUKUS partners to deter coercion or aggression in the region more effectively.

Phase 2 begins June 2024 through March 2024 for the rebuild. Phase 3 begins March 2024 and is projected to be finished March 2026 for the dining and serving area. Be careful around the dining facility during the phases.



Do Not Take Cultural Artifacts. It is illegal to remove cultural resources from the atoll. KWAJALEIN RECLAIMED WATER STANDARD VIOLATION

EXTERNAL REPORT

The Reclaimed Water System Document of Environmental Protection (DEP) requires public notification when reclaimed water standards are violated.

On March 24 the Kwajalein Wastewater Treatment Plant observed elevated levels of sedimentation buildup from the filtration process during routine filter media maintenance.

As a result, the reclaimed water had higher than normal turbidity levels. Turbidity is the cloudiness or haziness of a liquid caused by individual particles that are generally invisible to the naked eye.

On March 24 the 7-day rolling turbidity average at the point of entry into the reclaimed water system measured above the 2.0 Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTUs) standard until 28 March 2024.

No health-based restrictions on the normal use (irrigation, vehicle washing, etc.) of reclaimed or non-potable water are necessary. There is no threat to public health or the environment as a result of this turbidity exceedance.

WEATHER DISCUSSION

This weekend, Kwajalein Atoll's weather will transition from dry, windy season weather to more of a wet season-like pattern. The pattern shift will be brought by an incoming Near Equatorial Trough which will intrude into the region due to the waning strength of the subtropical ridge.

Atmospheric moisture content, low level convergence, and upper-level divergence will all increase to the presence of this trough, promoting deep convection around the atoll. Shower coverage could increase to scattered, especially during the early morning hours, and a few heavy downpours may also be possible.

Despite this pattern change, the probability for lightning looks to stay low due to relatively warm mid-level temperatures and residual stability in the upper levels of the atmosphere. Outside of showers, wind speeds are likely to remain around the midteens because of the subtropical ridge's diminishing strength. However, on Sunday, a trade wind surge arriving in the afternoon could kick wind speeds back to the upper teens. After Sunday, wind speeds will likely drop to the low teens and remain at this gentler level for much of next week.

Wind direction is expected to generally remain east northeasterly.

Seas will peak up to 9 feet on Sunday due to the potential trade wind surge, but after Sunday, seas will gradually decrease to more typical levels. Because King Tides have ended, advisory-level surf appears unlikely throughout the extended forecast period.

SATURDAY

Partly sunny with isolated afternoon showers. Winds NE-E at 12-17 knots with higher gusts possible near showers.

SUNDAY

Cloudy with scattered showers in the morning, becoming partly sunny with

isolated showers in the afternoon. Winds ENE-E at 14-19 knots with higher gusts possible near showers.

MONDAY

Cloudy with scattered showers in the morning, becoming partly sunny with isolated showers in the afternoon.

Winds ENE-E at 11-16 knots with higher gusts possible near showers.

NEXT WEEK

The new weather pattern is likely to remain dominant, so above-normal rainfall will be possible over the upcoming week. Although the region remains well below average for precipitation for both the month of April and for the year so far, these increased rain chances may help to mitigate the ongoing drought conditions.

Nevertheless, total rainfall over the upcoming week may still not be enough to make up for the rainfall deficit which has persisted since the start of 2024. The good news is that the Pacific climate has begun transitioning out of El Niño, and ENSO-neutral conditions are likely to take effect between April to June. This means that monthly rainfall may return to normal levels over the next few months.

Wind speeds next week will generally stay gentle with speeds in the lower teens, but light speeds in the single digits may periodically occur. Wind direction will also predominately remain northeasterly to easterly. A return to dry season-like weather with increased trade wind speeds may be possible by the end of the work week.
