Members of the Honolulu District joined partners April 15 to break ground for a new security fence at the Delap Port in Majuro, Republic of the Marshall Islands.

"The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers has a long history of work in the Pacific, but except for our work in Kwajalein Atoll, we have not had any recent projects in the Republic of the Marshall Islands," said Donald Schlack, project manager with the Honolulu District's International and Interagency Services. "We were delighted to be asked to be part of this


project, which will provide for enhanced security for the main seaport for the RMI." Joining the Corps team at the groundbreaking ceremony were representatives from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, RMI Ports Authority, the U.S. Embassy in Majuro and the contractor, Saint Mary's Native Corporation.

The Honolulu District's Construction Office on Kwajalein, which Schlack said has "extensive experience with the challenges of working in the tropical Pacific," is managing the work.

"Together, we are looking forward to providing the people of the RMI with a strong and long-lasting security solution for their port."

JOINT STATEMENT ON THE U.S.-NEW ZEALAND SPACE DIALOGUE

Pursuant to the desire of the Government of The United States of America and the Government of New Zealand, the countries held a bilateral Space Dialogue in Washington, D.C. on April 12, 2024, to strengthen bilateral space cooperation. The Space Dialogue demonstrates the robust and growing cooperation between the United States and New Zealand in outer space.

The U.S. delegation was led by Rahima Kandahari, Deputy Assistant Secretary, Bureau of Oceans and International Environmental and Scientific Affairs and the New Zealand delegation was led by Iain Cossar, Head of the New Zealand Space Agency. Chirag Parikh, Deputy Assistant to the President and Executive Secretary, U.S. National Space Council, delivered opening remarks. Both delegations included whole of government participation.

The participants welcomed the holding of this inaugural Dialogue during the 150th anniversary of the space relationship between the two countries, commemorating the work of two visiting American scientific parties and their New Zealand collaborators during the 1874 Transit of Venus.

A significant focus of the Dialogue was on the growth of the commercial space sector, to include the changing role of government in commercial space, and a growing range for commercial activities. Both sides expressed their intent to continue cooperation on a range of issues including launch, payloads, and space situational awareness.

The delegations recognized the potential for expanded cooperation on policy and regulatory interoperability related to commercial space, including launch and reentry, commercial remote sensing, and spectrum frequency management. Both sides also discussed opportunities to advance scientific education, research, and space cooperation between the countries.

Participants welcomed the open and productive nature of the Dialogue, which included discussion on space cooperation within international multilateral organizations, including supporting the work of the United Nations Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space and other UN bodies. Both sides emphasized the importance of promoting peaceful, sustainable behavior in outer space.

Participants acknowledged that New Zealand's geographic advantages has enabled frequent and responsive launch for U.S. industry and government agencies, adding strategic resilience to launch capacity. New Zealand's location has enabled hosting of ground-based infrastructure to enhance both space situational awareness and communications with space craft. New Zealand has also provided a base for important scientific programs, including the NASA Scientific Balloon Program's super pressure balloon flights from Wanaka and, previously, the southern hemisphere flights of the SO-FIA airborne observatory.

Both sides welcomed the signing of an updated Memorandum of Cooperation between the New Zealand Space Agency and the Federal Aviation Administration during Space Symposium. Participants recognized the success of this regulatory partnership which facilitated robust regulation of the world's fourth highest equal orbital launch cadence in New Zealand.

Participants observed the significant relationship milestones of the entry into force of the bilateral Space Cooperation Framework Agreement as well as the visit to New Zealand in 2023 of the Administrator and Deputy Administrator of NASA which led to New Zealand's deepening science, technology and educational connections with NASA.

They welcomed the announcement of the first round of joint research projects between New Zealand research institutes and NASA centers, focusing on Earth observation. These projects lay the foundation for future collaborations in other research areas, including contributions to the Artemis program.

The New Zealand delegation expressed its appreciation for the opportunities unlocked for high achieving students through the internships hosted by NASA and by the NASA Jet Propulsion Laboratory since 2019.

Participants welcomed the launch of MethaneSAT, noting the unique partnership involving the New Zealand

government, a US not-forprofit entity, academic and research institutions, and commercial organizations in both countries. They looked forward to the data from the mission being exploited to enhance understanding of anthropogenic methane emissions and for taking action to mitigate global warming.

Preceding the government-to-government discussions, both sides held a commercial roundtable on the margins of 39th Space Symposium in Colorado Springs, CO which brought together over a dozen private space companies from each of the two countries and highlighted existing partnerships. The Roundtable was co-chaired by the Hon. Judith Collins, New Zealand Minister for Space, and Richard DalBello, Director of the U.S. Department Commerce's Office of Space Commerce. The session allowed industry representatives to better understand how the United States and New Zealand promote their respective commercial space sectors and to outline opportunities and challenges for stronger bilateral cooperation. Participants welcomed reciprocal investment into each other's space sectors. Existing partnerships were examined to help boost ties between the two commercial space sectors.

Both countries are determined to continue work in the areas mentioned above and to explore other opportunities for strengthening bilateral cooperation to include facilitating bilateral commercial connections.

U.S. ARMY SPACE AND MISSILE DEFENSE HISTORY

In April 1954, ten years after Operation Flintlock, the World War II battle for the Marshall Islands, the press revisited Kwajalein Island and found a bustling Naval Air Station: a "Bus Stop in the Pacific," a humming logistics point, a major link in the U.S. supply network.

Bulldozers regularly removed the war era debris and temporary structures to prepare for modern buildings to support the nearly 3,000 residents and the daily transient population. In 1952 alone, the Navy allocated \$8 million, for permanent facilities, a warmup apron and plane parking area, etc. The flight line serves as "a major link in the military's transpacific flights to Guam, the Philippines, the Far

East and near-by Eniwetok." Air-sea rescue squadrons, security patrols and a coast guard radar station and weather station were stationed locally while approximately 20 planes transited Kwajalein each day carrying military personnel and their dependents and supplies. Per the Military Air Transit guidelines, each flight was ready to depart once again usually within a two-hour window. Meanwhile the floating drydock, also in full operation, can accommodate ships up to 1,000 tons.

Elsewhere in the news articles referenced above is mention that island residents fought two on-going battles: rust and boredom. Possibly to counter the latter, in April 1954, the installation held a contest to name the various roads. Though many thor-

oughfares are now renamed, current island residents may recognize some of them. Harland Road for example was named for Commander M.B. Harland who was Administrative Officer on Kwajalein from August 1952 to August 1953. He was killed soon after in a plane crash. Corlett Road meanwhile was named for Maj. Gen. Charles "Cowboy Pete" Corlettt, who led the 7th Infantry Division.

- 3. Attend at least one group greeting at air terminal for personnel arriving on island. Make them feel welcome and show them we are happy they are on Kwaj with us.
- 4. Attend at least two garrison after-hours team-building or social events (TEAM KWAJ Happy Hour, Commander's Call, Hail/Farewell).
- 5. Attend at least two TEAM KWAJ PT/Wellness sessions. Become a regular attender!
- 6. Visit Marshallese Cultural Center in last 3 months prior to tab award.
- 7. Visit Ebeye, Third island or Majuro in last 3 months prior to tab, use a Marshallese phrase or two and visit a store/restaurant.
- 8. Tell three co-workers how to earn the TEAM KWAJ tab

- 9. Swim, snorkel, boat or paddle on the lagoon at least once with a teammate.
- 10. Complete the TEAM KWAJ Circle-island 6-mile ruck march/walk/bike and read all historic battlefield markers. This is an organized USAG-KA hosted event several times per year.
- 11. Mission Partner wild card event—discuss with your supervisor any additional organizational requirement. Could be knowledge-based, achievement-based, or physical challenge.
- 12. Final event, "Board of Review" -- meet with Col. Morgan face-to-face individually or in a small group with all requirements fulfilled. Schedule with garrison front office. Discussion items may include but are not limited to; TEAM KWAJ pact "Healthy Community of Excellence," Kwaj history, Marshallese culture, military/strategic missions and their significance, and future operational potential.







WEATHER DISCUSSION

Dry and breezy conditions will start our weekend on Saturday for the southern atoll, but become more unsettled, as we move into Sunday and Monday with a drop in the winds.

After some wet conditions during the workweek, well positioned subtropical high-pressures with a lack of intervening mid-latitude cyclones to our north, have tightened the pressure gradient between themselves and lower pressure regions to the south of the Marshall Island. This factor means a weekend that will start out with some rather strong winds and mostly dry conditions.

Starting on Sunday, we will see that pressure gradient relax, which

means that the winds will decrease, and convergence along with minor troughing will approach the central RMI from the south, increasing shower chances for both Sunday and Monday with, for the most part, partly sunny days

With the arrival of the convergence and troughing on Sunday and Monday, thunderstorm possibilities will be elevated.

The sea state on the open ocean is currently 6-8 feet and 2-4 feet in the lagoon, but is expected to come down on Sunday and Monday to 4-6 feet on the open ocean and 1-3 feet in the lagoon.

SATURDAY

Partly sunny with only stray possible showers. Winds NE-ENE at 15-20 knots, decreasing to 13-18 knots in the afternoon with some higher clear-air gusts.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with isolated showers and only a slight chance of a stray thunderstorm.

Winds NE-E at 13-18 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Partly sunny to mostly cloudy with isolated to widely scattered showers and a slight chance of a stray thunderstorm.

Winds NE-E at 11-16 knots with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK

Tuesday will start with isolated shower chances, and then decrease to stray showers in the afternoon.

Starting on Tuesday evening and Wednesday, winds will once again increase to the middle to upper-teens,

Stray to isolated showers at times will remain in the picture on Wednesday.
