

- long tails





Referring to her Kwaj Kitty's one blind eye and the other crossed due to sharing the typical birth defects of its inbred island fellows, Ms. April Pacileo offered, "It's amazing to think about how these cats have evolved to become so resourceful



and clever. They're able to solve problems and find creative solutions to the challenges they face. And despite all the obstacles in their way, they're still able to live happy, healthy lives." Kwaj Kats are truly one of a kind - despite being severely inbred, they've developed into some of the most resilient and intelligent animals I have ever seen."

Ms. Carla Warren has adopted four Kwaj Kitties over the course of her 30-years on Kwajalein, "and have captured and/ or fostered upwards of 10-12 feral kittens until they found their forever homes," she said. Speaking about their family's cat Pancake (above): "We don't know what happened when she was a kitten in the wild 'Kwaj' maybe a rat or cockroach got to her one eye, it was shriveled up and sunken into her eye socket. Once we adopted her, the visiting vet removed [the eye tissue] and sewed it shut. We think she only has about 10% vision in her remaining eye. She still manages to navigate every inch of our house very well. When she gets excited, she gets 'the zoomies,' and will spin in circles and her tail puffs up to twice its size! She is hands down one of the sweetest and quirkiest cats we've ever had!"

Kwajalein Reclaimed Water Standard Violation

The Reclaimed Water System Document of Environmental Protection (DEP) requires public notification when reclaimed water standards are not met. For approximately 8 hours on November 13, 2024, the minimum residual chlorine concentration level at the Point of Entry to the Kwajalein reclaimed (or non-potable) water distribution system dropped below the 1 mg/L standard. Chlorine is added as a disinfectant at the Point of Entry into the Reclaimed Water System. Additionally, during 17-19 November 2024, the 7-day rolling turbidity average at the point of entry into the reclaimed water system measured above the 2.0 Nephelometric Turbidity Units (NTUs) standard. Turbidity is the cloudiness or haziness of a liquid caused by particles that are generally invisible to the naked eye. No health-based restrictions on the normal use (irrigation, vehicle washing, etc) of reclaimed (or non-potable) water are necessary. There is no threat to public health or the environment resulting from this turbidity exceedance. If you have any questions, please contact the V2X Environmental Department at 480-0722.



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

HOURGLASS REPORT

Postmaster here! Great question! When you ship something from the United States or Kwajalein to another country, you must follow USPS international both shipping regulations and the regulations of the destination country: That same rule applies when shipping from one international location to another. There are items that are prohibited (completely forbidden). Some are restricted (allowed under certain conditions).

When you send packages to U.S. military bases and em-

bassies outside of the United States, even though you're paying domestic prices, you'll still need to fill out a customs form. Learn About Military & Diplomatic Mail.

Find the country you're sending the package to in the International Mail Manual's Individual Country Listings for:

• What you're not allowed to send to that country (Also see general International Shipping Restrictions and Prohibitions.)

How much of it you can send (weight and size limits)
What shipping services

you can use

• Other country-specific information

Another frequently asked question is rules of engagement as it relates to custom forms. <u>You must fill out a</u> <u>customs form when you</u> <u>send packages to other</u> <u>countries</u>. All customs forms must be computer-generated:

• If you use Click-N-Ship service or Pirate Ship service to print your own postage, it will print a customs form for you.

• If you'll be paying for your postage at the Post Office, you can save time by printing your own customs form at home using our Customs Form Online tool.

• Otherwise, you can bring your package to the Post Office, fill out Form PS 2976-R, and give it to the Post Office associate so they can create and print your customs form.

When you fill out a customs form, you'll make a list of what you're sending, including how much each item is worth and its weight. There are also new requirements for providing more-detailed descriptions of contents in packages sent to countries that follow European Union (EU) customs rules. The receiving country may open and inspect your package, so you need to be accurate. You can see more information on our Customs Forms page.

TIP: The only time you don't need a customs form is when you send nonnegotiable documents (like letters or other papers with no cash value) weighing under 15.994 oz using First-Class Mail International[®] service.

As always, you can ask the Postal Staff any questions related to your international shipment.

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EARN YOUR TEAM KWAJ TAB

1. Attend Col. Morgan's TEAM KWAJ brief (either Teammate or Community version), read and adhere to the TEAM KWAJ Teammate Pact, presented at initial town halls, and periodically thereafter.

2. Attend the Island Newcomer's Briefing.

3. Attend at least one group greeting at air terminal for personnel arriving on island. Make them feel welcome and show them we are happy they are on Kwaj with us.

4. Attend at least two garrison after-hours team-building or social events (TEAM KWAJ Happy Hour, Commander's Call, Hail/Farewell).

5. Attend at least two TEAM KWAJ PT/Wellness sessions. Become a regular attender!

6. Visit Marshallese Cultural Center in last 3 months prior to tab award.

7. Visit Ebeye, Third island or Majuro in last 3 months prior to tab, use a Marshallese phrase or two and visit a store/restaurant.

8. Tell three co-workers how to earn the TEAM KWAJ tab.

FOR KWAJ COMMAND TEAM INFO & UPDATES

9. Swim, snorkel, boat or paddle on the lagoon at least once with a teammate.

10. Complete the TEAM KWAJ Circle-island 6-mile ruck march/walk/bike and read all historic battlefield markers. This is an organized USAG-KA hosted event several times per year.

11. Mission Partner wild card event—discuss with your supervisor any additional organizational requirement. Could be knowledge-based, achievement-based, or physical challenge.

12. Final event, "Board of Review" -- meet with Col. Morgan face-to-face individually or in a small group with all requirements fulfilled. Schedule with garrison front office. Discussion items may include but are not limited to; TEAM KWAJ pact - "Healthy Community of Excellence," Kwaj history, Marshallese culture, military/strategic missions and their significance, and future operational potential.

WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Discussion:

For December, we received 6.14 inches of rain, which is 1.73 inches below normal for the month. The total precipitation for 2024 received at the weather station was 89.63 inches of precipitation, 3.83 inches below normal. We have now entered the dry season (Ellap Kutu) in earnest here in the central RMI, and can expect only an average of four inches this month, down from the eight inches average for December. We experienced no thunderstorm days during the last seven days, as the vertical dynamics of the atmospheric column remained mostly negative over the last week for lightning development. This is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weather station. The Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) is south of the RMI, taking up its normal dry season position. This positioning will keep shower coverage at mostly the stray level for the next seven days. Broad troughing will give a boost to shower coverage tonight, and a trade-wind surge to the upper teens will induce another increase in shower coverage Monday afternoon into Tuesday morning. The Madden/

Julian Oscillation (MJO) will remain in its current moderate positive phase over the Marshall Islands for the remainer of the week, and then transition to its drier negative phase toward the middle of January. The positive phase of this global tropical circulation basically has the effect of helping to augment shower coverage for our part of the Pacific, but this factor is only effective, if the ITCZ is close to the central RMI. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) is in mild La Nina conditions with the central Pacific (ocean to the east of the RMI) actually about -0.5 degrees C below normal. Cooler temperatures in the Pacific to the east of the RMI works to temper our shower activity, as almost all of our precipitation producers come from the east, this cool anomaly in the central Pacific also tends to work again tropical cyclone development to the east of the RMI, where it could pose a threat to our region. We are also out of the tropical cyclone season as a whole for the western Pacific with the northern winter now climatologically in place.

Tropical Cyclones:

No significant tropical cyclone activity expected to affect anywhere in Micronesia, the Mariana Islands, Wake Island or Hawai'i. We are now in climatological winter for the northwest Pacific, which generally bring a considerable decline in tropical cyclone activity.

Damaging West Winds / Westerly Swell:

None expected. Micronesia is northeast trade wind dominant.

<u>Swell / Tide Inundation</u> <u>for Kwajalein Atoll and</u> <u>Wake Island</u>:


Moving through the first week of January, will see a waxing half-moon on the sixth, binging us into a neap tide situation. All high tides will be below four feet for the next seven days, before moving toward the spring tides and the full moon on the 13th. Trade-winds out of the northeast will sustain at about 13 knots, and then begin to increase to about 16 to 19 knots on Monday afternoon and for the start of the workweek. Expect some occasional higher clear-air gusts and near showers. We will be watching for the possibility of higher surf at Roi-Namur on the nineth. but still have some time to refine that outlook. It appears that High Surf Warning conditions will be met during the day tomorrow at Wake Island

as a northwest swell, which is the more vulnerable direction for the island. Wake gets their weather support from Honolulu except during missions involving Wake. Base Ops at Wake was notified just as a fyi on December 31st.

Purpose: This weekly briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/ from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

WEATHER DIS-CUSSION

Dry conditions appear likely across the Kwajalein Atoll for Saturday and through the upcoming weekend. The Inter-Tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) looks to be fragmented and remain well south of the Atoll, with the only shower chances coming from occasional areas of localized trade wind convergence. Thunderstorms also appear unlikely, as low-level convergence will be insufficient for deep convection to develop. Initially, a strong low-pressure system in the central Pacific will work to loosen the pressure gradient across the RMI, resulting in sustained wind

the low-mid teens through Sunday, with some higher gusts near showers. On Monday, a subtropical high-pressure system will begin establishing itself, allowing the pressure gradient to tighten and resulting in wind speeds increasing to the mid-upper teens.

SATURDAY

Mostly sunny with stray showers. Winds will be NE-E at 11-16 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY

Mostly sunny with stray showers. Winds will be NE-E at 12-17 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Partly sunny with stray showers. Winds will be NE-E at 14-19 knots with gusts in the upper 20s possible near showers.

NEXT WEEK

Dry, breezy conditions look to persist throughout much of next week. Once again, the only shower chances look to be generated by areas of localized trade wind convergence or pockets of stronger winds generating trade wind surges. The subtrophigh-pressure ical system to the north will work to further tighten the pressure gradient, resulting in elevated wind speeds. Sustained winds could reach as high as the low 20s at times throughout next week, which may lead to falling palm fronds and coconuts.
