

HOURGLASS REPORT

Sunday, March 2nd marked Michelle Huwe's return to dance on Kwajalein with the Life in Color dance recital. Huwe enjoys theming a show to tie the dances together. This year she came up with "Life in Color" to teach the students about how we use color symbolism in dance to show emotion and tell a story.

Huwe started dancing a age three, but did not really fall in love with dance until the middle school years. "Dance became an outlet for me to relive stress, express myself, and spend time with friends. I never imagined I would dance, let alone teach dance past my college team years, so I feel incredibly thankful for the opportunity."

The show featured fifty-five dancers, ages toddlers to adult, who practiced for twenty weeks to prepare for the recital. Dances included hip hop, lyrical, ballet, jazz and hula. Huwe explains, "I tend to choreograph the dances as we go so I can see what students know and then add moves to routines that will stretch them as dancers.

Huwe added quite a few difficult moves into the grade

7-12 hip hop routine. She explained that one of the moves was a feature for Mariel Pace and Mikayla McDiffitt to hit a toe each. "Halfway joking, I said they could make it more difficult by doing a split jump to the ground the way the Dallas Cowboys Cheerleaders do. They took up the challenge and nailed it during the performance," shared Huwe very proudly.

Some other memorable moments were the K-2 class bringing their "stuffies" to class each week and they introduced them like a show and tell. At the recital, when Zaviah Wheeldon was asked

who enjoyed dancing more, she or her stuffie, Snowflake, her answer was "Snowflake."

This is not Huwe's first time on Kwajalein. She had four current students who were five years old when she was here on her first tour: Brooklyn Hill, Mariel Pace, Mikayla McDiffitt, and Juliet Delisio. She and Brookly recreated a photo from when she was five, to capture the moment.

A personal highlight was the boys' hip hop class performance as minions. Jason Huwe, event emcee, spoke with two of the minions and asked what they learned, "time to be serious and a time to be silly – and this is the time to be silly!!" They definitely nailed it! Michelle Huwe confirmed that those boys were taking their dancing very seriously.






COMMUNITY KWAJALEIN CORAL CREW | KENDRA ROBINSON

HOURGLASS REPORT

"The Kwajalein Coral Crew is an organization designed to help monitor and grow the coral reefs of Kwajalein Atoll. The group manages a coral nursery, where coral fragments are grown. The group also manages Stephanie's Reef, which is an artificial reef being established and expanded yearly. Kwajalein Coral Crew gathers data on water temperatures, tracks coral growth and coral bleaching, cleans the nursery, and works to educate the community on coral and reef health." ~School Course Catalog

What is the Coral Crew?

Coral Crew is a group of students at Kwajalein Junior Senior High School that are dedicated to learning about, restoring, and keeping the ocean healthy. Students can join an internship to become part of the Coral Crew.

What does Coral Crew do?

Coral Crew researches, observes, and upkeeps a manmade reef and nursery. Sometimes they go on dives or snorkels to observe different coral and marine life health. Other times, they watch documentaries, study data from temperature sen-

sors placed on Stephanie's Reef (the man-made reef), or discuss interesting current events happening with the oceans.

What are you working on right now?

Currently, students are looking through a year's worth of temperature data collected from a sensor. We are working to make links between the health of the coral and the data collected. They have also been watching videos and reading the manual for the new sensor. We are hoping to place the new sensor in the coming weeks.

Do you have any plans for upcoming projects?

We are hoping to continue to build the students interested in learning about Coral through Coral Crew. In the coming years we are hoping to partner with SCUBA instructors to get specialty certifications. We also hope to work with students to go on more dives and set up ways to take pictures on a regular basis from the same spot to be able to see the coral over time and link it to the data collected by the sensor.

What is your favorite part of Coral Crew?

My favorite part of Coral Crew, so far, has been seeing the students work through tough moments. We have moved nursery trees, collected small pieces of coral to place on the trees, and soon will be placing a sensor. It can be so difficult to work with others under water. The students always find a way to adapt to the situation and find a way to communicate their needs under water. This has also been one of the most

common things they discuss when we reflect. It is not often they are put in a working environment where you cannot talk something through.

How long has Coral Crew been around?

Matt Gerber, Ed.D, High School Principal, began Coral Crew in 2020.

What obstacles have you faced with the project?

Environmental barriers are

the biggest obstacle. We are very limited on Kwajalein, so we have to be sure we follow the original proposal for gathering, maintaining, and managing the nursery tree and reef. Supplies and resources are another obstacle, and of course, busy schedules can be difficult when planning dive time where everyone can be involved.

What is the most rewarding part of Coral Crew?

One of the most rewarding parts, according to one of the students that has been involved, is seeing how the project, especially the coral, develops over time.


For me, the most rewarding part is seeing students overcome fears and learn to work together in a tough, unfamiliar setting. They are so proud of their accomplishments after a working dive. Their excitement is contagious.







EARN YOUR TEAM KWAJ TAB

- 1. Attend Col. Morgan's TEAM KWAJ brief (either Teammate or Community version), read and adhere to the TEAM KWAJ Teammate Pact, presented at initial town halls, and periodically thereafter.
- 2. Attend the Island Newcomer's Briefing.
- 3. Attend at least one group greeting at air terminal for personnel arriving on island. Make them feel welcome and show them we are happy they are on Kwaj with us.
- 4. Attend at least two garrison after-hours team-building or social events (TEAM KWAJ Happy Hour, Commander's Call, Hail/Farewell).
- 5. Attend at least two TEAM KWAJ PT/Wellness sessions. Become a regular attender!
- Visit Marshallese Cultural Center in last 3 months prior to tab award.
- 7. Visit Ebeye, Third island or Majuro in last 3 months prior to tab, use a Marshallese phrase or two and visit a store/restaurant.
- 8. Tell three co-workers how to earn the TEAM KWAJ tab.

- 9. Swim, snorkel, boat or paddle on the lagoon at least once with a teammate.
- 10. Complete the TEAM KWAJ Circle-island 6-mile ruck march/walk/bike and read all historic battlefield markers. This is an organized USAG-KA hosted event several times per year.
- 11. Mission Partner wild card event—discuss with your supervisor any additional organizational requirement. Could be knowledge-based, achievement-based, or physical challenge.
- 12. Final event, "Board of Review" -- meet with Col. Morgan face-to-face individually or in a small group with all requirements fulfilled. Schedule with garrison front office. Discussion items may include but are not limited to; TEAM KWAJ pact - "Healthy Community of Excellence," Kwaj history, Marshallese culture, military/strategic missions and their significance, and future operational potential.

Kwajalein Reclaimed Water Standard Violation

The Reclaimed Water System Document of Environmental Protection (DEP) requires public notification when the standards for reclaimed water are not met. In February 2025, 87% of all reclaimed water samples were ≥ 0.5 mg/L chlorine concentration which is less than the required 95% standard. Chlorine is added as a disinfectant at the Point of Entry into the Reclaimed Water System. No health-based restrictions on the normal use (irrigation, vehicle washing, etc) of reclaimed water are necessary. There is no threat to public health or the environment resulting from this chlorine minimum. Questions? Contact V2X Environmental at 480-0722.

Tatianna Way started painting when she moved to Kwajalein. You can see her imagination at work before you even walk into her house. She has fun painted buoys all around her yard. Inside her home, her studio has an entire wall filled with her paintings. It is apparent she is always creating whether it is on canvas, coconuts or buoys.

What sort of art/craft do you make?

I am a painter. I work mostly with acrylic paint on canvas, but I have done surfboards, buoys, murals on concrete, and coconuts.

What material and techniques do you prefer, and why?

I prefer to work with acrylic paint on canvas and use bold brushwork to layer on the paint. I typically use a filbert brush to blend background colors and then I switch to a fine round or rigger brush to add in the details. I choose acrylic paint as my preference because it dries quickly, creates a crisp outline, and it holds its color over time.

How long have you been making art/and crafts?

I was always interested in

art as a child; I have been scrapbooking for the better part of a decade now, but it was not until I got to Kwaj that I really started to paint anything.

Can you describe your creative process?

From start to finish I work on most projects for about a week. Once I find inspiration, I will paint the background first and then use charcoal pencils to put the design on the canvas. I prefer to work with one color of paint at a time, so colors do not dry out before I am done with them.

After all the paint has been applied and dried, I will erase any charcoal smudges and then I like to apply a Liquitex varnish to seal the painting and make it appear glossy.

How do you approach a new project?

I like to keep an open mind when going into a new project because mistakes happen, but I have some type of personal connection to each piece that I make so for me the act of painting is more important than the outcome.

What on Kwajalein in-

spires you?

On Kwajalein I am most inspired by the people I have met. As I mentioned before, I did not start really painting until I got to Kwajalein where I was introduced to the Art Guild and a large community of creative minded individuals that encouraged me to step out of my comfort zone and pursue something new.

What is the best or most interesting art/craft you've made? Why?

The most interesting art that I have made has been painting on coconuts. A person can paint on canvases anywhere, but it is so unique to say that I painted on coconuts from my backyard. X



WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK

Discussion:

yesterday, we Through have received 0.45 inches of rain for March, which is 0.93 inches below normal for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received 3.77 inches of precipitation, which is 4.92 inches below normal for the year. The anomalously dry conditions are getting a bit of a break for the coming week, as we see the Intertropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) start to reestablish west of the Date Line and north of the Equator. This trend will continue through the weekend, and mean greater shower coverage as a whole for the coming seven days over the central RMI. No thunderstorm days occurred over the past seven days. A thunderstorm day is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weather station. The. The Madden/ Julian Oscillation (MJO) is now in its negative phase for our part of the Pacific, which tends to work against shower development. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) is in La Nina conditions, with the sea surface temperatures (SST) in the central Pacific between the RMI and the Date Line at about one degree C below normal. Cooler temperatures in the Pacific to the east of the RMI work against shower activity, and are one of the main reasons for the

moderate drought condiaffecting Kwajalein tions Atoll and the northern RMI. These cooler temperatures are having a disproportionate effect on the central Pacific compared to their normal impacts on the eastern Pacific. Cooler surface ocean temperatures in the central Pacific also tend to work again tropical cyclone development to the east of the RMI, where it could pose a threat to our region. We are also out of the tropical cyclone season as a whole for the western Pacific with the northern winter now climatologically in place.

Tropical Cyclones:

No significant tropical cyclone activity expected to affect anywhere in Micronesia, the Mariana Islands, Wake Island or Hawai'i. We are in climatological winter for the northwest Pacific, which generally bring a considerable decline in tropical cyclone activity.

Damaging West Winds / Westerly Swell:

None expected. Micronesia is northeast trade wind dom-

Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island:

We will continue waxing the Moon to a Full-Moon tomorrow with high tides above four feet today into the 19th. Winds will sustain between

14-19 knots for today and tomorrow, and then creep up to 16-21 knot on Saturday through the weekend. On the open lagoon and ocean anticipate winds at 18-23 knots for periods of time, moving into the weekend. The second half of Tuesday looks to be our peak in winds, sustaining around 20 knots for periods of time with higher clear-air gusts. Expect that a Small Craft Advisory (SCA) will be issued at times, when winds are anticipated to sustain at 20 knots or greater for a 30-minute period.


There is a powerful mid-latitude cyclone transiting the northern Pacific, and sending some long period swells toward north-facing reef edges of all atolls in the RMI. Roi-Namur will feel the greatest impact from these swells, but will be offered some shadowing protection from Rongelap Atoll and neighboring atolls to our north. We are anticipating the issuance of a High Surf Advisory (HSA) for about a three-hour period for Roi-Namur tomorrow afternoon around high tide at about 1645L to 4.6 feet. There will be some splash over at sea facing barriers. As we move into Saturday and the weekend Swells will be more out of their normal northeast direction, and will synch up more with the wind for combined seas in the 8-11 feet range just seaward of the reef. There

will be some splash-up on all east-facing shores around the times of high tides. We are anticipating to remain just shy of a HSA violation for the eastern facing shores.

We will also be keeping our eyes on the 19th for the possible issuance of a SCA and HSA due to combined seas.

This weekly Purpose: briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/ from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

WEATHER DIS-CUSSION

Dry and breezy conditions are expected across Kwajalein Atoll to start the weekend off. Strong winds from a high-pressure system to the north are causing higher winds and seas. If a stray shower moves across the atoll expect it be light and brief. These conditions will likely last through Saturday. Winds will generally be in the mid-teens, with occasional gusts reaching up to 25 knots. The main concern will be higher surf along the northern and northeastern shores of Roi-Namur due to swells from a distant subtropical storm. A High Surf Advisory has been issued for Roi-Namur from 1300L to 1900L with 9-11ft wave heights expected on northern facing shores. From Sunday to Monday, the Inter-tropical Convergence Zone (ITCZ) may shift closer, which could bring more showers and the possibility of isolated thunderstorms to the Atoll.

Partly sunny with stray showers. NE-E at 16-21 knots with occasional higher gusts, especially near any showers.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with stray to isolated show-

ers. NE-E at 16-21 knots with occasional higher gusts, especially near any showers.

MONDAY

Partly sunny with stray to isolated showers. NE-E at 16-21 knots with occasional higher gusts, especially near any showers.

NEXT WEEK

Stray showers to begin the workweek, with winds from the NE-E at 18-23 knots, gusting higher near showers. By Wednesday, shower coverage is expected to increase to isolated. Winds will be NE-E at 18-23 knots, with higher gusts near showers.
