



THE FINAL TOWN HALL | COMMANDER COL. DREW MORGAN

HOURGLASS REPORT

Before the Town Hall event started, we found Commander Col. Drew Morgan and Command Sgt. Maj. Ernest Miller huddled with the Audio Visual team. Carefullygoing over the flow of the evening to ensure everyone was on the same page, the scene was a perfect symbol of how Col. Morgan's Command Team demonstrated a confident competence in leadership born from being thoroughly informed and prepared.

Once satisfied, the two made their way around the Kwajalein High School Multi-Purpose Room, shaking hands, fist bumping and exchanging warm spoken greetings with the early arrivals at this very last Town Hall we'd get to share with Col. Morgan and CSM Miller this past Tuesday, May 13, 2025. The show began with a moving photo slideshow of highlight images throughout the Command Team's time here on Kwajalein Atoll. CSM Miller then took the mic and joked that the door prizes were the only reason for the huge turn-out.

Col. Morgan shared a curious fact about Russian Cosmonauts, whom he trained with in preparation for his mission to space. They held an interesting superstition of avoiding using terms like "last" and "final" for events or other concluding activities

before launching into space, fearing that to do so invited bad luck or other misfortune. Instead, they substituted a Russian word that literally translates as "ultimate." "So, in that same tradition," offered Col. Morgan. "This will be the Ultimate Town Hall." A chuckle rolled through the packed MP Room, as we all tested how the new title felt on our tongues.

A video clip played of NASA Astronaut Col. Anne McClain giving Col. Morgan a warm send-off from her spectacular view from the International Space Station. Col. McClain reminded the Team Kwaj community that their mission is important, and it is our beloved home before

floating a Team Kwaj spirit stick in front of the camera. Col. Morgan was clearly very moved, calling the special shout out from his Space Flight Battle Buddy and longtime dear friend a "mic drop."

Col. Morgan gave a short and touching timeline breakdown of his family's discovery of the Kwajalein Atoll, and their subsequent deep-dive into the islands' history and traditions. "We came to love Kwajalein in our diligent selfstudy; we love it even more today now that we've experienced the community," he said. Col. Morgan spoke of the virtuous principles of the TEAM KWAJ Pact that the Command Team introduced to us in his first Town Hall,

explaining that even though the incoming Commander very well may have his own version, that these principles would continue to guide us as they were timeless.

He reminded us of the great challenges we all experienced over the last couple of years, which included the Roi-Namur megawave and the challenges with the Power Plant. The ability to assemble the team and meet those challenges head-on to emerge victorious on the other side cannot be overestimated.

Both Col. Morgan and CSM Miller stressed that Kwaja-lein's best days still lay ahead as the Command Team has not only listened and worked assiduously to meet the community's needs, but they also

successfully increased Kwajalein visibility at the highest levels of U.S. government leadership. With Lieutenant General Gainey's help, that new-found visibility has led to movement that will measurably improve infrastructure, mission and community quality of life.

CSM Miller shocked everyone by breaking character in an emotional moment. "People are watching, and things may be moving slowly, but you *will* have a better Kwaj!"

Even though there would only be a week of crossover between Col. Morgan and the incoming Col. Matthew Cannon, the Commander revealed that the two have been in contact for about a year to ensure a smooth transition.









COMMUNITY ANNUAL BALLROOM DINNER DANCE

HOURGLASS REPORT

The Annual Ballroom Dinner Dance, a popular collaboration between the music department, culinary arts classes, and the Family, Career and Community Leaders of America (FCCLA) at Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School, was held Sunday night, May 4. Considered one of the community's premier events, tickets sell out quickly each year. The evening offers guests a chance to dress up, enjoy a meal prepared and served by students, and hit the dance floor.

Each year, the Kwajalein Jr./Sr. High School band pre-

pares a core set of standards to streamline rehearsal time and encourage mentorship among student musicians, according to band advisor Kyle Miller. Veteran players help guide new members, and the group builds on that foundation by adding selections from their other concerts. The final setlist typically includes around 35 tunes, offering a balanced mix of swing, Latin and ballads.

"It's a really energizing experience on stage because it's so different from our curricular band concerts," Miller said. "We're providing the entertainment, but we're not the sole focus of the evening — the guests are having a

night out to socialize."

Miller noted that performing live music brings a different kind of elegance compared to a DJ. "Our setlists, like a DJ's, can influence the energy of the crowd," he said. "But really, it's about the kids putting on a great show and demonstrating what they can do."

Some of Miller's favorite pieces this year included "Moondance," "Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy," and new additions like "Feeling Good" and "Save the Last Dance for Me." Featured guest performances also stood out, including the Advanced Vocal Ensemble, AJ Parra, Sofia Morgan and Lauren Fontanez.



Student Aqualisa Calep shared that her favorites of the night were Besame Mucho, Boogie Woogie, and Macarena. "It was lively and full. It was amazing that you can feel so much energy from the floor that it makes you have the same energy in the way you play. One stand out for me was watching Mr. and Mrs. King's new foot work that happened to fit to almost every song we played."

Student Rachel Harper shared that she too enjoyed Moondance and Boogie Woogie Bugle Boy, and shared, "I think for the most part the room was electric as the energy and the crowds dancing followed suit to our fast-paced music. However, slower songs made the space feel more intimate."

In addition to a great night of music, guests were also treated to a meal prepared by Kendra Robinson's pastry arts and culinary arts classes. Students were able to choose whether they wanted to work the front or back of the house. From there, if a student had a family member attending, they would typically

take care of that table or volunteer if they know someone well at another table. Robinson shared, "there is definitely not a shortage of students excited to help out with this event."

The students spent countless hours on the logistics of the event, they helped in choosing the protein served, researched different pasta sauces and practiced making several different parts of the dish beforehand. Different classes focused on different parts of the meal. For example, Baking and Pastry Arts focused mainly on bread and pasta, while Culinary Arts worked through the protein, side, and sauce.

There are always challenges in a fast-paced kitchen/ restaurant environment balancing moving items from one area to another to switch out warming items and items that need to be cooked. Another challenge is lack of experience as the students don't have the opportunity to work in an environment beforehand, like Ballroom Dinner Dance provides, so working as a team, and depending on others can be difficult. Robinson is very proud of how the students worked through each issue that arose, "most of the problems are solved by leaning on others and working together."

Robinson shared that it was also great to have spare adult hands to help, "I could not have survived this event without the help of Heather Miller in the front, and Christi Cardillo and Michelle Huwe in the back."


For Robinson, one of the most memorable moments comes at the end of the evening.

"The students are so exhausted, but I love listening to them reflect on what some of the problems were and what we can do to make improvements," Robinson said. "But they're also proud of the work they just completed, and that's always a great moment as a teacher — to see them reflect but also be proud of their accomplishments."

Community members widely agree that the Annual Ballroom Dinner Dance is a highlight of the year, offering a unique blend of student talent, fine dining and live entertainment. Many residents mark their calendars in anticipation, making it a must-attend tradition each spring.

Staffing shortages can make timely evaluations and support difficult, but Presence provides access to a network of licensed clinicians and a secure, HIPAA- and FERPAcompliant platform, helping educators stay on track and effectively meet student needs.

EARN YOUR TEAM KWAJ TAB

- 1. Attend Col. Morgan's TEAM KWAJ brief (either Teammate or Community version), read and adhere to the TEAM KWAJ Teammate Pact, presented at initial town halls, and periodically thereafter.
- 2. Attend the Island Newcomer's Briefing.
- 3. Attend at least one group greeting at air terminal for personnel arriving on island. Make them feel welcome and show them we are happy they are on Kwaj with us.
- 4. Attend at least two garrison after-hours team-building or social events (TEAM KWAJ Happy Hour, Commander's Call, Hail/Farewell).
- 5. Attend at least two TEAM KWAJ PT/Wellness sessions. Become a regular attender!
- 6. Visit Marshallese Cultural Center in last 3 months prior to tab award.
- 7. Visit Ebeye, Third island or Majuro in last 3 months prior to tab, use a Marshallese phrase or two and visit a store/restaurant.
- 8. Tell three co-workers how to earn the TEAM KWAJ tab.

- 9. Swim, snorkel, boat or paddle on the lagoon at least once with a teammate.
- 10. Complete the TEAM KWAJ Circle-island 6-mile ruck march/walk/bike and read all historic battlefield markers. This is an organized USAG-KA hosted event several times per year.
- 11. Mission Partner wild card event—discuss with your supervisor any additional organizational requirement. Could be knowledge-based, achievement-based, or physical challenge.
- 12. Final event, "Board of Review" -- meet with Col. Morgan face-to-face individually or in a small group with all requirements fulfilled. Schedule with garrison front office. Discussion items may include but are not limited to; TEAM KWAJ pact "Healthy Community of Excellence," Kwaj history, Marshallese culture, military/strategic missions and their significance, and future operational potential.



The U.S. Department of the Navy (Navy) prepared a Final Environmental Assessment / Overseas Environmental Assessment (EA/OEA) to evaluate the potential environmental impacts of conducting missile flight tests in both Atlantic and Pacific Ocean regions. Testing would involve flight tests from sea-based launch locations, vehicle flight over the ocean, splashdown of boosters in the ocean, and payload impact either in broad ocean areas or on land at a U.S. Army test site at Kwajalein Atoll in the Republic of the Marshall Islands. Based on the analysis presented in the EA/OEA, the Navy has concluded that implementation of the Proposed Action will not significantly impact the quality of the human and natural environment and will not significantly harm the environment of the global commons (high seas). Accordingly, there is no requirement to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement or Overseas Environmental Impact Statement, and the Navy has completed a Finding of No Significant Impact (FONSI) / Finding of No Significant Harm (FONSH) for Navy Conventional Prompt Strike Weapon System Flight Tests

COMMUNITY **BOY SCOUTS ON KWAJALEIN | JACKSON LADD**

HOURGLASS REPORT

When Jackson Ladd of Kwajalein's Boy Scout Troop 314 began considering options for his Eagle Scout service project, he knew the greatest service impact would be somewhere on Ebeye. There, Jackson discovered the Ebeye Deaf Education Center (EDEC), a class that supports Deaf students from kindergarten through high school.

Through one hearing teacher and two Deaf assistant teachers, the students of EDEC are taught in American Sign Language (ASL). In and outside of school, this Deaf community operates as a family, and their classroom itself is a central element to

their daily lifestyle.

Jackson found out that some students use the class-room sink to brush their teeth when arriving to school in the morning, due to lack of oral hygiene supplies or water at home. Deaf residents also do not have access to a dentist that can explain oral care to them in their primary language. Learning of these dilemmas prompted Jackson into action.

After having the classroom area surveyed, Jackson went to work gathering supplies. He chose to create a shelf over the classroom sink that would house individual oral hygiene kits, labeled with the students' names. But more importantly than supplies, Jackson desired to give the

students knowledge.

For his presentation, he used a visual slide show and a credentialed ASL interpreter to disseminate important information on oral hygiene. He also provided hands-on experiments to show the students how teeth can become damaged if left unbrushed, and manipulatives to demonstrate proper brushing and flossing techniques.

The students enjoyed being quizzed over their understanding of healthy vs unhealthy foods, and were surprised to learn the importance of brushing for two whole minutes. They were very excited to be provided a flashing visual timer, and a supply of mouthwash to be used should their school sink lose water due to construc-

tion or conservation.

As a part of his project's criteria, Jackson also demonstrated emerging leadership skills by guiding fellow boy scouts through supporting his efforts. With the help of their leaders, boys from Troop 314 assisted in transporting supplies from Kwajalein to Ebeye, built a new shoe rack for the students, and performed some minor repairs in the classroom. The Deaf students countered this kindness by teaching the scouts the manual ASL alphabet, thus opening a channel of communication between new friends.

TRASH & RECYCLING PICKUP SCHEDULE

The Green Residential TRASH receptacles are collected every Tuesday and Friday.

The blue RECYCLE bins are also collected every Tuesday and Friday.

The large black General Solid Waste Community Containers are emptied on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Saturday.

Safety First! Please keep any curious children away from the Compactor Truck as it feeds contents into the truck.

Recyclable materials are also collected by both solid waste and horizontal maintenance personnel, in conjunction with general trash collection. Currently the island only recycles glass, aluminum, metal, and bulk organic materials. Cardboard and plastics are not recycled materials on Kwajalein. These items should be placed into the general trash stream for disposal/incineration.



Residential users will be given a green trash receptacle and a smaller blue receptacle for recyclable materials. It is requested that residences place their recyclable items into the blue containers, and stack larger materials next to the bins. Lawn clippings and leaves should be bagged and placed next to bins. Palm fronds and coconuts should also be stacked up next to the bins for removal by horizontal maintenance personnel.

WEEKLY TROPICAL WEATHER THREAT OUTLOOK

RTS WEATHER STATION STAFF

Discussion:

At the mid-point in the month of May, we have recorded 2.39 inches of rain, which is 0.60 inches below normal for the month. So far in 2025, we have only received 10.90 inches of precipitation, 9.17 inches below normal for the year. Things have improved in May, but Kwajalein Atoll is still in Severe Drought (D2) conditions on a scale of D1-D4. The dry conditions are even worse in the Ratak Chain, where Wotje Atoll has now been classified in Extreme Drought (D₃). The trend will be to erode the drought conditions due to the change in the El Nino state of the central tropical Pacific. Look for increased shower coverage on the second half of Saturday into early Sunday morning, and a more significant increase in shower coverage for the first half of the workweek. The thunderstorm risk will also be augmented during these periods, but more so on the latter. No thunderstorm days occurred over the past seven days. A thunderstorm day is defined as an "in situ" lightning strike within five miles of the weather station. The Madden/Julian Oscillation (MJO) remains a bit incoherent as a result of rapid movement, but is currently in a mild positive, which gives an advantage to increased shower coverage for the RMI until at least the end of the month. The El Nino Southern Oscillation (ENSO) has now transitioned to ENSO-neutral conditions, as La Nina has officially ended for the Pacific. This transition will be favorable to increased shower coverage, as we also move into the start of the rainy season. Sea surface temperatures (SST) in the central Pacific between the RMI and the Date Line are now at about normal. Besides increased rainfall, these warming near normal SSTs tend to favor tropical cyclone development, but the RMI is not currently in its climatological tropical cyclone season, thus little threat is expected in May.

Tropical Cyclones:

No significant tropical cyclone activity expected to affect anywhere in Micronesia, the Mariana Islands, Wake Island or Hawai'i. We are

now in climatological spring for the northwest Pacific, but still rest outside a favorable environment for tropical cyclone activity, as sea surface temperatures in the western Pacific are still in their climatological cool state, and south to north shear in the mid-levels of the atmosphere remains unfavorable for TC development.

<u>Damaging West Winds /</u> <u>Westerly Swell</u>:


None expected. Micronesia is northeast trade wind dominant.

Swell / Tide Inundation for Kwajalein Atoll and Wake Island:

We are now moving into a waning half-moon, which will occur on the 20th. Expect neap tides with high tides above four feet until the morning of the 17th, then not again until the 24th. Winds will be in the middle to upper teens today, and then settle into the mid-teens until about the second half of Sunday, when they will be mostly in the low teens with a low point in the upper single digits to low teen on Tuesday with the arrival on the arrival

of the troughing on Tuesday into Wednesday. Gusty outflow winds will be possible at that time near heavy showers, which could briefly initiate a SCA. Small Craft Advisory (SCA) or High Surf Advisory (HSA) conditions are not expected for the next seven days.

Purpose: This weekly briefing is delivered Thursday mornings to island leadership. The intention of this briefing is to provide situational awareness of weather events that may interrupt operations and transportation around Kwajalein, to/ from Hawaii and Guam, and in the Wake vicinity. The main threat assessed in this brief is existing and potential development of tropical cyclone activity. This brief also provides an outlook of abnormal winds, sea state, and precipitation guidance for next 7 days around the Kwajalein Atoll. The distribution list will also receive updates on any developing tropical cyclone activity in the Kwajalein region that occur between the weekly outlook product.

Intertropical The Convergence Zone (ITCZ) has reorganized to the south over the southern Marshall Islands and is expected to gradually push northward. However, it will remain south of the atoll for the next couple of days. As the ITCZ edges closer to the central RMI, isolated showers may develop-primarily over Kwajalein Island and the southern portion of the atoll. By Sunday morning, the ITCZ is expected to shift westward and move out of the area, bringing in pleasant and mostly dry weather for the weekend. the meantime, In look for east-north-

easterly winds in the mid-teens and mostly sunny skies. Some evening cloud cover is possible due to debris clouds associated with the approaching ITCZ. Looking ahead to early next week, forecast models indicate an atmospheric wave moving through the region, which will likely increase the chance of rain showers and could bring a slight risk of thunderstorms.

SATURDAY

Partly sunny to mostly cloudy at times with stray showers and at times isolated showers. NE-E at 13-18 knots with higher gusts near showers.

SUNDAY

Partly sunny with

stray showers. NE-E at 12-17 knots with higher gusts near showers.

MONDAY

Partly sunny with stray showers. NE-E at 12-17 knots with higher gusts near showers.

NEXT WEEK

Stray to isolated showers with stray chance of thunderstorms to begin the workweek, with winds from the NE-E at 10-15 knots with higher gusts near showers.
